THE GOVERNOR ON SAFARI

Sir E. Northey's Visit to the Kavirondo Country

THE EFFECT OF THE TRIP

The route followed was the main road from Kisumu to the Pwani which is now used by the motor postal cars and passes through the Locations of Kismayu, Kapsa and Nyangaru Central Kavirondo, and Terik, North Kavirondo District. It then enters the Kaimosi Park Area which lies on both sides of the Yala River, traversing on route the Terik Native Reserve. The Government (Sole) road is reached just beyond the Kaimosi farms and Kapsa which is approached by way of a fine forest line due east of the Trading Centre of Chusumo on the border.

The Governor was received on arrival by the District Commissioner and Assistant District Commissioner who are as present the only two officers resident in the District.

At the baraza held on the following morning, the Hon. Headman and representatives of each of the 24 Locations were present and listened attentively to His Excellency's address which together with the subsequent proceedings were duly recorded. A very large number of Nandi tribesmen were present and before the Governor left the ground he witnessed a well executed 'ngoma' by the various present as well as dances by the young women.

Kakamega.

Kapsa was left during the course of the afternoon for Kakamega 80 miles distant. The route followed was the Sole road which traverses a corner of the Kaimosi farms and thence passes through the Kakamega Government forest and the Locations of East and West Kakamega in which Kakamega Station is situated.

Owing to the inaccessibility of Mumsia, the old District Headquarters, the Station was moved in July, 1920, to the present site. The whole of the buildings which include 4 Administrators and 3 Medical Officers' quarters are temporary, and the Station's house being composed of sun-dried bricks. The entire Station was erected by Station Hands by whom the buildings are maintained and repaired.

All the materials of Mumsia Station which could be salvaged by burning of corrugated iron, the ceiling boards, scuttling door and window frames, etc. were carried free of cost to Kakamega to the number of 3,000 loads by North Kavirondo natives. The M.H.S. Mission at Mumsia for the purpose of erecting a Church.

The Administrative Officers resident at Kakamega and the Medical Officers of the District received His Excellency on arrival, and visited the Native Civil Hospital the same evening and was shown over by the Medical Officer in charge. His Excellency showed the greatest interest in the various activities of the Medical Department which were explained to him in detail.

En route to the Hospital a visit was paid to the District Offices in front of which the tails of 60,000 letters were laid out in the high letters to form the word "Welcome". The most important section of the vigorous anti-plague campaign which is being waged in Central and North Kavirondo and which has reduced to almost zero the death rate in the latter District from three to five thousand before the opening of the campaign from three to five thousand victims a year. Four deaths only have occurred during the first six months of 1922, a successful comparison with the success obtained in the anti-malaria work carried out by Colonel Gorges in Havana and during the building of the Panama Canal.

The methods used by the natives in capturing the 2,000,000 rats destroyed during the previous 12 months in North Kavirondo were illustrated by a series of native traps placed side by side with instruments of the latest European pattern. Particular interest was shown by the Governor in the rat-catching apparatus spread on the sheets of card-board.

The Hospital.

The existing Medical Offices built from relics of old Mumsia and the up-to-date operating theatre constructed from the same materials were next inspected and the Medical Officer's patient register where containing large quantities of grain for the patients was visited.

The inspection of the purely medical work was next followed by the health officer, tubercle bacillus, flu, pneumonia and the structure lung disease were displayed. Maps illustrating the various activities of the Kavirondo Medical Department were shown and the 2 specimens of rats from North Kavirondo, which were the first of the kind to be captured after the commencement

of 21,000 children while a third indicated by flag the illness of the 10 specimens of which Kakamega is the present hospital.

Much interest was shown by His Excellency in the information given to him in the Station. Kakamega which contains a large number of patients and a native child who has been disabled by a crocodile while bathing guests received particular attention.

The greatest sympathy and interest was shown by His Excellency during the course of his tour through the various Locations.

The baraza held at Kakamega on the morning of the 9th was not the least important of the tour and was attended by Head Chief Mumsia and all the Chiefs of the 19 Locations of North Kavirondo. The East Kavirondo who live in this District of Nymsa are an intelligent hardworking and tractable community and owing to the amount of money earned by them while employed by their native tribes called Kavirondo and in later North Kavirondo contains in fact some of the best members of the native community of Nymsa.

After speaking a few words to those present His Excellency presented the King's silver medal to Mumsia and Mulama and the Governor's medal to Mumsia. Head Chief Mumsia's medal was bestowed on him in recognition of long and faithful service during the tour and was presented to him by the Governor. Head Chief Mulama's "in recognition of marked activity in obtaining parties and livestock for military purposes and of particularly gallant conduct of his troops in recognition of general activity continuingly exhibited in obtaining recruits and labourers during the tour and in collecting livestock for transport and supplies."

The address subsequently given by the Governor occupied slightly over an hour and the assembly broke up shortly after mid-day.

The Effect.

This ended the series of 5 meetings of the Native Chiefs of Nymsa addressed by His Excellency on this tour. His reception was everywhere enthusiastic in most cases with considerable and real feeling for coming and making himself known to his native people to whom he frequently reminded his presence by stood in the station was however by during the course of his tour as their guardian and it was evident that implicit reliance was placed on his promise to protect native interests whenever they were in danger. By making himself personally known to the people's representatives in Nymsa His Excellency has forged a link which will unite the Head of the Government and the governed for so long as it is maintained intact.

The return route to Kisumu yesterday was made through the heart of the 9 Margali Locations and the new Administrative Headquarters on the Yala crossed en route. Kisumu was reached soon after noon.

The total distance covered by His Excellency from the 1st to the 10th inst. was just over 200 miles by road.

of Western Canada, has made remarkably democratic and unobtrusively discussing all sweeping conventional views on the subject of climate. Since I first knew Canada the whole has been moved north a thousand miles; for the length of the summer day in higher latitudes seems to compensate for the shorter growing season. And now has since an original thinker and practical explorer, one Stefansson by name, who tells us that the uninhabitable Arctic is all a myth; that in Montana, Manitoba and Dakota men and women are to-day already living unobtrusively, and children going to school, in a winter temperature many degrees colder than that to be found at the North Pole. That both for residential purposes and food production Canada's barren lands—give a dog a bad name and hang him—will ere long be being spread in a settlement is going to spread in the next fifty years to the utmost territorial limits of that hitherto condemned country. The Pole itself, unfortunately, is, however, unlikely to form an eligible site for an important city as it happens to be situated on drifting ice.

As to the Equator.
The relevancy to the Equator of Stefansson's discoveries and theories concerning the North in it seems to me, apparent. For years my mind has been groping after some reasonable explanation of certain confusing climatic conditions of the earth, and this early Canadian gives the clue and partially clears up my difficulties. On one occasion only I reached the edge of the barren lands north-east of Edmonton. The time of the year was towards the end of July; and instead of the frozen tundra and stunted bog mosses that one expects there lay an expanse of rolling greenlands indistinguishable from the prairies of the south, interspersed with flowers of which my memory recalls vividly a wonderful red lupin.

So it seems my experiences in these two cities justifies a claim to having endured the insupportable of a climate warmer than the North Pole. This in turn leads one to the conclusion that if the arrangements of Nature in her delicately adjusted scheme of terrestrial physical, and climatic composition, (transcribing by the-by the idea of the season, for the year's official longest and shortest days always precede respectively the solstices and most wintry months) fixes the greatest extremes of cold around the sixtieth degree of latitude instead of where we find it, then humanity has always relieved it to be, it may be logically calculated that the earth's greatest heat will be found along the twentieth line or between that and the tropics of Cancer and Capricorn. Look up the map and you will find that this imaginary division passes through some of the most noted hot places outside of Hades. They include the Sahara desert, the Kalahari, Southern Mexico, the Deccan, Iquique and much of Central Australia.

Un-Equatorial Africa.
In my early days of travel, especially after a summer or two in Australian harvest fields, I shrank from the idea of the Equator—even as a lad fresh from home to the lumber camps of Manitoba might picture to himself shudderingly the awfulness of Polar cold. Yet I had already sun and heat surpassing in intensity any that tropical places could certainly anything the Kenyan Highlands can produce. I remember one particular Australian summer, when even the Test matches had to be postponed; for it created a volcanic, semi-diluvian effect on me that lasted off and on for months. I was to the area of several hundred acres had to be cut. Though not to come in at different times the appalling heat brought them along quicker than was expected; and for weeks I sat my rasper and bridle on a treeless plain, lurching my machine, and bringing down 15 to 20 acres daily from dawn to into the moonlit night, bathed in a sun temperature that was hours constantly in the range of 100 to 105 deg., but reaching a maximum of 175 deg. in the hot day of that year. I also know nothing of hours and the South Queensland border, where 120 deg. in the shade was often registered; of a interior were blowing; and, though in hard physical training at a flower of manhood's vigorous youth and health, have wondered whether I could hold out for a few minutes without collapsing.

The Equator.
That the tropics have their peculiarities requiring study; their dangers that must be respectively avoided; their diseases that must be guarded off or grappled by a combination of scientific treatment and common sense, will be frankly admitted. But great heat, such as the people, including women and children, have become accustomed to in places much further away from the Equator than Kenya, is not the supreme difficulty that imagination and conventional report would have it, even as set forth. The near future is going to clear the mental fogges of

And so we come to the fact that though the vertical rays beat down on one's head at Nairobi where the altitude is 5,500 feet, necessitating a strong hat, the maximum sun temperature is 105 deg. and the least even above 80 deg.; the minimum being 100 deg. and 60 deg. respectively.

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KENYA PROBLEMS

Secretary of State's Speech in Parliament

PROSPECTS OF AN INDIAN SETTLEMENT

NATIVE TAXATION AND PRODUCTION

part of the speech made by Major E. F. L. Wood, Secretary of State for the Colonies, in the House of Commons July 4 when introducing the Colonial Office Bill of Kenya, Major Wood said:

"I had no staple industry after the war like the cotton of Uganda, to which the natives could turn. The best were flax and sisal. It was also a place in which a great many ex-servicemen settlers were settled. It is to all these circumstances that must be attributed the fact that no greater progress has hitherto been made in exploring the possibilities of the producer."

"These circumstances have proved changed, and my right hon. Friend in his communication with the Government in order to explore more fully the possibilities of the development of the native production in Kenya."

"There is no need, as far as I can form an opinion, that the development of the necessary labour here is required for European settlements. There is room for both. Each needs the other."

"The European will, I think, increasingly find it to his advantage to use his labour more economically than in the past, and the native will find it to his advantage to improve his methods of agriculture by the improvement of stock, the prevention of cattle disease, and so on, and the result of such native development must ultimately be to the advantage of the whole community; means are being taken, too, to bring about a reduction of railway rates."

Inter-Action.

"One cannot study these problems without being conscious of how much they react on one another. Native education, taxation, labour, the land policy, political and social development, are all very closely connected, either by cause or by result, with the decay of the old tribal authority, and the clash of old customs and the new civilisation comes. These matters are not to be considered in order to obtain the greatest possible measure of harmony."

Indians.

"They are difficult enough, but in Kenya they are complicated by the problem of the presence of a large Indian community. There were very full discussions last year between the Colonial Office and the Governor of Kenya and the India Office. My right hon. Friend formulated proposals which I am sorry to say, failed to get the consent of either side in Kenya. I have been engaged, at his request, on two further discussions with my noble Friend the representative of the India Office, and I am not at all unprepared of the possibility of reaching agreement. The best I can say is that we have obtained to the first real step towards a solution of these difficulties."

Highlands.

"The Committee will remember that previously on three things—the preservation of the Highlands, the question of segregation, and that of franchise. With regard to the Highlands, my right hon. Friend always has been prepared to offer other lands for the exclusive use of the Indian community, but he still holds the view that with regard to the area of the Highlands his hands are tied by past history, and that to throw the Highlands open to settlement would not be a solution."

GERMANY

PROPOSALS FOR CARRYING NEW FINANCIAL SCHEME.

SOVEREIGNTY UNIMPAIRED.

[THROUGH LETTER'S AGENCY.]

Berlin, July 26. In reply to the President of the Guarantors Committee the Imperial Chancellor says that despite the heavy burdens imposed on Germany the German Government will undertake to carry out the measures mentioned in the Committee's memorandum for the duration of the moratorium.

The German government assumes the sovereignty of the Reich would be preserved and the course of administration would not be disturbed and secrets connected with taxation and business will be protected.

As regards the prevention of the flight of capital the German Government insists that the resolution of the Supreme Council of the Allies, August 13, 1921, regarding the raising of military and economic sanctions will now be carried out. German legislation in regard to the export of capital will be strengthened.

The delay in the Anglo-French conversations in regard to reparations has been terminated by the French Government officially intimating that it will place itself at the disposal of Mr. Lloyd George for an interview as from August 1.

In the House of Commons in reply to questions Sir Robert Horne said the Government had not offered to excuse France from her debt to Great Britain provided her German reparations claims were reduced.

At his request, on two other with that understanding. With regard to segregation, it would seem possible to secure those general objects of public health and social convenience.

Franchise.

"The real difficulty, as we all know, deals with the matter of franchise. While it has not, indeed, as yet been possible to find agreement, I think there is little doubt that with the full assent of the white community of Kenya it would not be impossible for my right hon. Friend to-day to secure such representation for the Indians as will enable them actively and effectively to participate in the public affairs and government of the Colony."

Stubborn Facts.

"That is where the matter of the moment stands. These matters, grave, difficult and complex as they are, can and will only be settled by having regard to practical facts as they present themselves. When the facts are as stubborn as they are in Kenya, there is an amicable solution between Europeans and Asiatics and, as a third party the natives, whose interests are sometimes in danger of being overlooked, I cannot but think that it would be an act of the greatest wisdom on the part of my right hon. Friend at this juncture to endeavour to impose a solution that would be likely to lead to violent action and disturbance in any quarter."

"In such an unhappy case the prospects of success which today are not in the least doubtful, would be completely in my judgment, because both uncertain and unwise."

BOARD OF TRADE ENQUIRY OPENS.

CAPTAINS & LASCARS.

[THROUGH LETTER'S AGENCY.]

The Board of Trade enquiry into the loss of the s.s. "Egypt" opened at the Royal Courts of Justice, today Mr. Aspinall, K.C., the W. Commissioner, presided and Mr. Solicitor-General, Mr. Leslie Scott, representing the Board of Trade pointed out that the collision between the "Scine" was not represented. He would not ask the Court to decide responsibility for the collision so far as the "Scine" was concerned.

He added that the gravest task of the Court would be to consider how with such large sea screws, steam and so few passengers such serious loss of life occurred.

It was also important to ascertain the "Egypt's" speed at the time of the collision and whether precautions were taken to prevent collision.

Boats Ample.

Mr. Leslie Scott declared that the six boats which got away were more than enough to have taken all the passengers and crew. It was clear that some, perhaps many of the Indian crew who early crowded the boats were in a state of terror.

He suggested that the Court should investigate the truth of the particular allegation that they were unaware where to find life-jackets and also whether there were any difficulties of language in transmitting orders.

He concluded that his chief function would be to ascertain why particular men did not seem to have gone each to his particular boat at the time of collision.

Tributes to Lascars.

Replying to questions on behalf of the Amalgamated Marine Workers Union, Captain Notley said (paraphrasing) that he had not seen the report of the enquiry and that most of the officers had knowledge of Hindustani.

Enquiry was adjourned.

On a resumption Captain Hamm, Peninsular Line's Superintendent, said that the crew had their places in the boats but it was probable, owing to the sudden list, the men were unable to get to their proper boats as much as white.

Ship's Captain's Evidence.

Captain Collier, who has been in from the collision, was asked to state the "Scine" moved by him when she was 200 feet distant. At the time of the impact the "Egypt" was making 10 knots.

New Kenya Tariff and the Customs Union

FORMATION OF NEW ADVISORY BODY

DR. HOLM AND WHEAT PRODUCTION

At a meeting of the E.A. Section of the London Chamber of Commerce last month, discussion took place on the new Kenya Customs duties, tax, shipping, etc. Major Newland and Mr. A. Holm were present.

At the meeting of the E.A. Section of the London Chamber of Commerce held on June 28 (Major Sir Humphrey Leggett, D.S.O., in the chair) the following matters were discussed:

The Customs Duties. The Chairman, on behalf of the Section welcomed to the meeting the Hon. Mr. Alex. Holm, Director of Agriculture for Kenya; Major Victor Newland, President of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of East Africa, and the representatives of the Shipping Lines.

Item No. 1 on the Agenda re Customs Import Duties, was dealt with first. The Chairman said that he had received mail advice from East Africa as to the increased Custom Import duties imposed by the Kenya Colony Government.

He (the Chairman) had made enquiries at the Colon Office, and understood that with the exception of the proposed increases on wheat and flour the increased duties had already come into operation. The increased duties on wheat and flour had not received the approval of the Secretary of State.

On consideration of Item No. 5, with regard to the tax industry, the Chairman read a letter from Mr. Campbell B. Hisselburg, to the effect that he fully supported any representations which might be made for the retention of the tax graders in East Africa.

The Hon. Mr. A. Holm explained that in 1920 the Flax Association was formed, which included every flax interest, and a grading scheme was evolved and put into operation twelve months ago. The scheme was carried out by the Department of Agriculture. One of the steps taken by the Government to reduce expenditure was to abolish the posts of two of the flax graders, which would have ruined the original scheme of flax grading. A new scheme had been suggested which was that a number of men in the country with a knowledge of flax should be licensed as graders, and were to work under a supervisor who would be an official of the Department of Agriculture. The original proposal would be dispensed with, and another brand substituted. A Flax Board was to be created to generally supervise the scheme, which was to be put into operation on the 1st July, 1922.

Mr. Wigwirth said that the scheme of flax grading had been carried out by those who had helped to build up the flax industry of East Africa. The decision of the Government to do away with the posts of two graders would have the effect of abolishing a system which was essential to the life of the industry, and he therefore moved:

"That a strong letter be sent to the Colonial Office to the effect that the Kenya Government's proposal to abolish the posts of two of the official flax graders, was a retrograde step, which would not fail to do great harm to the important flax industry in that it would mean the abandonment of the present scheme."

Major Hisselburg moved the motion, which was carried unanimously. Major Hisselburg was seconded.

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

A NARROW ESCAPE

Further details can now be given of the incident on the Kampala road, which took place in Parisani on Wednesday evening, the bare report having appeared in yesterday's issue of the Standard.

The wounded lady, with the assistance of her companion, bravely struggled on towards the nearest house, but after a short distance, collapsed on the ground, her only blessing profusely. Other help was obtained and the Police were informed and investigations were immediately instituted.

The Inspector, it is understood, thoroughly searched the district in the hope that with the aid of little information he had obtained, he could straighten away by the thief by the heels, and an inspection of likely quarters in the surrounding district was carried on until a late hour that night, but without success.

An inspiring incident, and one that may probably explain the motive of the attack arises from the remarks that were exchanged at a distance between the ladies and their husband. After parting at the house of Ewing and Ewing, the ladies and their husbands proceeded in their respective directions a short distance, one of the men called out to the ladies: "Have you the bag all right?"

From this it may be easily supposed that the valuable contents of the bag were consigned to the native, who, most probably, was listening in the vicinity.

It has since been learned that the Police had made a capture, but upon an identification parade being held the lady who had been a witness of the assault was unable to identify the native.

During the past month two assaults of a very similar character have occurred, and in no a cross have been made, the Police are inclined to conclude that the same native is concerned in each.

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RACE HORSE IMPAIRED

Distressing Accident to "Sundial"

RUNS INTO FENCE.

A most distressing accident occurred at the Nairobi Race Course yesterday, when terrible injuries were received by the well-known horse "Sundial," owned by that extremely popular, but unlucky sportsman, Major B. F. Webb.

It is reported that the accident occurred at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, when the horse was taken out alone for exercise and was being ridden round the course at half speed by the jockey, Daniels. When proceeding along the far stretch the rider reached a place where there is a gap in the fence to allow horses to enter the course after crossing the grass, near the seven furlong starting post. From what can be gathered, it would seem that the fence preceding the gap had a distinct lean towards the grass and away from the course, whereas the fence immediately following the gap was vertical.

For some unknown reason, but most probably owing to the horse seeing the gap in the fence towards his stable, it suddenly swerved in and the rider instinctively pulled it back into the course.

Whatever the cause may have been, the horse met the upright end of the fence full on.

The end of the fence—a six by four plank—was splintered so as to fly in its continuation, and was nailed to the support with a number of long nails. It was this that the horse ran into. The sharp point struck the horse in the chest of the side. It entered the flesh along with the nails and deeply lacerating the unfortunate beast's side, ran round to the other side, where it was still splintered, and made doing terrible damage, and re-entered the flank further down.

The rider was of course thrown, but escaped serious injuries.

The owner and one or two others were on the scene, and were dismayed to see the scene, when the magnitude of the injuries was at once apparent. Veterinary aid was summoned and came to the assistance of the animal within a very short space of time.

The fact of the horse still being able to move the horse, and a bet was brought over and erected near the scene of the accident, and the horse was placed therein.

The horse, it is understood, is suffering badly, but the Veterinary authorities express the opinion that there is a possible chance of saving the life.

The sincere sympathy of everyone, whether owner or not, will go out to the owner, Major Webb, who, while being one of Kenya's best sportsmen, has not altogether been blessed with the best of fortune on the turf.

It is particularly unfortunate in regard to "Sundial," as it is understood that the horse has up till lately not been fully trained and was only being brought out into the form at this meeting. He was only a very excellent race horse, and a division of the Open Dividend Handicap, on the previous day, in the best of company, and in view of the fact that he was running over 12 miles to-day he was being given an extra run round so as to improve his wind, as it is to be hoped, the life of the animal is saved, it is more than probable that "Sundial" will never be seen on the course again.

"THE NEW BOY"

A GREAT SUCCESS AT THE THEATRE ROYAL.

AN EXCELLENT CAST.

If you are superior or futurist or very, very precocious, you will smile at the thin plot, the archaic language and the dominant accent of invader that makes the "New Boy," presented at the Theatre Royal on Thursday; if you are merely a critic you will smile at the complete identity with the parts they play to which the actors attain, and if you are merely the "common man"—or woman—you will smile away with a sense of entire satisfaction at the re-discovery of your ability to laugh heartily, and a pride in the possession by the community to which you belong, of a group of amateurs, so gifted as those who have amused you wondrously during their two hours' traffic of the stage. But—conclusion to the more superior of us follows—the plot of the play is a little thin, and its humor is more than a trifle conventional, and is covered over with too thick a carpet of explanatory conversation; and you never feel that the artists are wholly extended, and always know that they are capable of much more than this. But such, as it is, or repeated this, you can and must be amazed at the naturalness of every set, and every word, and gesture.

The story—based in the days of long ago, a lady, whose a subordinate lived, had married, imprudently, but death removed the unwelcome husband. The lady married again, and financial disaster followed. She remembered the visit to her husband, and went on the visit to him, taking with her the second husband. Arrived, she is met with by her original and faithful lover, with the demonstration of the affection that ignorance of the past had justly, and accordingly, the situation can be over her husband's belief, she becomes the widow her new lover imagines her to be, takes the part of mistress to the school, and her husband, who is impelled by poverty, fosters the illusion by accepting the position of her son, and goes to school. The consequences—in "the new boy"—are the essential feature of the play, and are an abundant reward for all the lengthy explanations that precede and follow them. All the possibilities of a new boy's life are seen from the angle of an involuntary impostor of something over 80; the sweet contact with, and the enthralling overtures of, so fair a flapper as Miss Mabel Blackwell, the terrible brutality of Mr. Schwartz, "Bullwhip" Major, the kind love, the fury of Mr. Dooley, a perfectly appropriately dressed squire—with a "dam" and a stick—whose apple have been purified, the clash with the somewhat extravagant demonstrations of the French Master, Mr. Thomas; all.

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COFFEE PLANTERS

President's Review of Past Year's Work

QUESTIONS OF FREIGHTS AND NEW MARKETS

THE NEED OF CO-OPERATION.

The Annual General Meeting of the Coffee Planters' Union of Kenya was held in the New Stanley Hotel commencing at 10 p.m. on Friday.

A letter from Mr. C. K. Archer, Vice-President of the Union was read expressing regret that owing to the outbreak of the war it was not possible to hold the meeting. An appreciation of the zeal and energy of the Secretary was contained in the letter and a hope expressed that the Union would become an increasingly useful body to coffee planters.

The President's Report.

After the minutes of the last annual meeting had been read and adopted, the President, Mr. McCallan Wilson, read his annual report as follows:

In presenting a report of the work of the Coffee Planters' Union during the previous year, it is but my purpose to make a brief and concise statement.

The period under review will be remembered as one during which the most stringent economy has been maintained. This has proceeded along three distinct lines, personal, estate, and marketing economy, having reference particularly to freight rates and handling charges.

The first, personal economy, is outside the purview of this Union. Estate economy has involved itself into an adjustment of native wages on the old basis relative to existing value. The enquiry into, and the action taken in connection with this matter, has exposed various anomalies in rates paid for the same class of work, which has served to bring us more into line.

The period of stress has also led to a conservation of labour, with the introduction of better methods in the utilisation of machinery, which should put us into a stronger position to compete in the world's markets.

The second item, to which I have referred shortly, has been more of an individual matter and much of it has been effected by District Associations of which we are all probably members.

In the question of marketing economy, your Executive has been most indefatigable in its efforts to secure the best possible terms. As a concrete body in being, your Union has actually been approached by firms ready to consider the reduction in "handling charges."

Correspondence has ensued with these, and you will remember that our members are now being notified by a circular, of favourable terms from a certain firm at Mombasa, through which it was thought advisable that members should ship. Since that date, however, correspondence with other Coast firms has resulted in still further reduced charges and I am now in a position to inform you that Messrs. Smith Mackintosh and Co. will undertake all handling of your coffee including two weeks' free storage for the small amount of Shillings 15 cents 40 per cwt. B/E of Lading ton. Two other firms at the Coast are willing to undertake the work at Shillings 15 per ton. I would remind you that our only hope of obtaining the very lowest quotations for work done, handling, freight and other charges, can be secured if bulk is forthcoming. This could be dealt with by a co-operative scheme.

Freight Rates.

The recent reduction of steamship freight rates has been due mainly to competition by a line of steamers outside the Conference. It has been the purpose of your Executive to consolidate the position and ensure for the immediate future, that our coffee will be shipped at reasonable charges. We can

these are faced triumphantly; and the occasional temptations to talk as man to man to the schoolmaster, and to a cousin, whom he recognizes as a Director of the Dry Champagne Company, into whose "dry" lips the savings of himself and his wife had flowed—there are met with just that element of risk of danger of discovery, that marks the real actor. "That" is not too innocuous in his residence of the "down", and he never once makes the emphasis so great that the success of his imposture is imperilled. "That" is an actor.

A Genuinely Good
So, as we are delighted to see in Mr. Hamilton's schoolmaster is a delight. His voice is as sonorous or sonorous as the occasion demands, his careful enunciation is exact, and his gestures, save only on one of his visits, are controlled as a somewhat heavy collection of school day interviews suggests to be so appropriate. Polit the cousin has a character to portray that demands for more energy and dexterity and heavy punches than Sheridan's villain needs, and is able, in the person of Mr. Hamilton, to moderate some of the slightly overdone villainy and hypocrisy of the part into plausibility and power. Mr. Smith plays the housekeeper—the part into which, most of all, drama enters with the distinction, elegance and delicateness that we have come to regard as the essential and infinitely valuable characteristics of her acting.

Mr. Tompkins is the French Master, in love and sport and varied emotions. His broken English is good, his mannerisms and postures good, but taken a time lower would be better.

Miss Blackwell, as we have said, is irresistible, and in her anger with the perfect beauty, she is a more Schwartz (could she be a more Major than that) she is no less desirable, we feel more than in her more melting moods. We welcome Mr. Doory and Miss W. Lema to the stage and look forward to other productions of an early date by this excellent theatre and adaptable combination of talent that Nairobi has just seen.

Meanwhile, the last opportunity to watch at this excellent performance is, to our sorrow, announced for tonight.

Motor Notes
 Last Sunday I went for a try in the Solar Valley, which, just at present, is beautifully green, and is a great contrast to the red of the district, which is badly parched and dried up. What struck me very forcibly were two roads which have recently been built, and are now to me as new as the day.
 The old road from Elementeita Station to Nakuru was always in a very bad condition, irrespective of the season of the year. It certainly had a good many turns in it, but one could average thirty miles per hour. The new road runs parallel to the old one on the other side of the valley, and is really a very different piece of work, as the new one is good, and it is well cambered and drained. The question, however, arises, why was this road built at present? I think it is about a mile long, and must have cost a lot of money, and in the present state of Kenya, it seems unnecessary, though of course very nice to have.
 The other road, which is new to me, runs up with the road already mentioned and runs out to Soloi district. It is made for about 40 to 50 feet with a really a very good overgrown with vegetation at every one uses only the middle portion. My own opinion about these roads is that they are unnecessary wide, and therefore unnecessary expensive in the cost of labour.
 The Uganda roads are splendid as everyone knows, and they are nearly all only 15 feet wide. I am positively sure that if we had narrower roads in Kenya, we would save a great deal of money in initial cost and upkeep, which would go towards making more roads and better roads.
 Taking now the case of roads parallel to the Solar trunk road, there runs a motor road, which by
