

## MUNICIPAL NOTES

The following Committee was formed at a recent meeting of the Municipal Council on Friday :—Councillors East-King (in the chair), Mr. G. H. H. Biddle, Mr. M. C. Green, Mr. E. Riddell, Mr. Morris, Mr. H. T. Clark (Mr. J. A. Watson), the M.H.O. (Dr. Guineau) and Mr. W. D. Jackson. Mr. D'Addario was also present.

The report of the Water Committee was adopted, but the report of the Acting Town Engineer on the question of water supply in the station was not adopted. The motion stand up in Birthington Road, was laid over till the next meeting.

A letter was circulated from the P.W.D. giving the cost of maintenance as proposed for 1914. The letter was also addressed to the Municipal Council, and it was decided that the Municipality take over the roads by January 1, 1914.

Following a report by the Acting Town Engineer, the Committee resolved that the motor parking site near the Victoria Hotel be given to the Municipality. The Town Engineer, in consultation with the Acting Town Clerk, suggested that the best way to do this was to lay down alternative roads.

Colonel G. H. Biddle joined the committee of the legatees, and after consultation with the major, at length, the committee decided that the alternative roads of most meeting, when the
