## IMPORTANT STATEMENT.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.)

London, July 13.

In the House of Commons, it was decided to postpone the debate on the wireless chain bill introduced by Mr. Wood. The Government had further considered the question of an Imperial Wireless Chain and had decided to refer to England a similar scheme to that proposed by the expert committee instead of the present nomination instead of the power at first proposed.

Capetown, July 17.

The Premier in the Legislative Assembly accepted the offer of the Marconi Company with the condition that a long distance wireless station.

The precise details are not yet available for publication.

## BRITISH FINANCE

REASSURING STATEMENT BY  
CHANCELLOR.

PAYING AMERICA.

(THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY.)

London, July 13.

An important statement on Great Britain's financial position was made by Sir Montagu Roberts in the House of Commons in reply to Mr. Asquith (Lab. Party). He said the British debt to America at the present rate of exchange was £1,000,000,000, and that the amount reduced since July last by £400,000. The internal debt in 1922-1923 was £1,000,000,000, and by November 1923 it would be £44,000,000.

The Government were constantly giving attention to the debt to America which was a heavy liability upon the nation.

The recent request by the United States to consider the funding of the debt would naturally make the situation more serious to-day than at any time since the Armistice.

The Chancellor believed that would be forced to give up the idea of a general reduction of the debts of the rest of the world and that Great Britain would play a very great part in this matter.

Firstly, the Royal Household, 100; secondly, members elected directly or indirectly from outside; thirdly, hereditary peers appointed by their lords; and fourthly, members elected by the Crown.

The last three categories are of limited tenure.

The right to veto money bills will not be withdrawn from the Lords, but a Joint Committee of the two Houses will replace the Speaker of the House of Commons.

The Commons' present power to enforce bills in certain cases will remain.

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
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
