BELGIAN CONGO

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL ON ITS
FUTURE.

ENTHUSIASTIC SEND-OFF.

[THROUGH BRITON'S AGENCEY.]

The Governor-General of the Belgian Congo, General Louis Lippens, has left for the Congo amidst enthusiastic demonstrations, a large party of distinguished officials and their ladies accompanying him.

King Albert telegraphed him, wishing every success in his important mission to the interior of the Congo's sparsely Colonized.

Mr. M. G. V. Smith, in an interview, referred to the vital necessity of fostering economic development in the Belgian Congo, facilities in Equatorial Africa on the soundest modern methods and never ignoring them in reference to the former's economic aspects in the interest of Commerce.

He declared that certain events in the Congo would affect the 18 months of major interests that were working to make the reforms a failure had affected the British Pacific.

Lord Balfour appealed to both legislatures to continue to use their influence to guide the masses in the right direction.

LORD BALFOUR'S RETORT.

[THROUGH BRITON'S AGENCEY.]

Ankergaard, August 31. The Council of the League of Nations has adopted the report of the Permanent Commission, which has instructed the President to transmit the Commission's wishes to the Mandataries requesting favourable consideration.

The Commission's observations relate chiefly to the presence in the Pacific Islands of alien forces from outside the League.

COURT OF ENQUIRY AND THE
DISASTER.

THE COMPANY CRITICIZED.

[THROUGH BRITON'S AGENCEY.]

London, September 1. The Court of Enquiry into the cause of the sinking of the liner "Egypt" found that the disaster was due to the collision with the "Sparta," and loss of life was mainly due to default in the ship's safety equipment.

The Court found that the crew of the vessel through their officers and servants to take proper measures to prevent the ship's collision with the "Sparta," and to obtain good discipline.

The Court suspended the Master, Captain J. H. Moore, and ordered him to give up his command.

The Court found that there was failure to discharge the duty of making long drills for the crew.

Before the ship went to sea the watch was set to see that every member of the crew knew his station and duty.




