HOW TO VISIT LAMU IN JUNE

Application of Coal-tar Law Asked.

TANZANIA TOPICS

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT

Lamu, May 8.—At present we are unable to determine whether or not a change to maritime conditions will affect the shipping services from Mombasa to Lamu. In fact one steamer has arrived at Lamu so far this year, though it was expected to arrive at the little instant—30 days or thereabouts—since last year when the steamer to Lamu had to wait to meet the steamer to Mombasa, and to this end he had to wait 35 days. It is now intended to employ the steamer to Lamu in connecting with steamer services to the port of Mombasa, or back, on the opening of the S.E.C.R. line between Mombasa and the Coast Province.

The local port trust has made arrangements for steamer services to Lamu.

The customer service reported to Italian Steamship Company, who last year showed a loss of £11,000 in connection with their operations in the port of Lamu, has fairly engaged in trading with Lamu again, so far as the port of Mombasa is concerned. The local Government steam train has been fairly busy engaged in bringing coal to Lamu, and the port trust have arranged to bring the bar to a point where they can easily break out their cable at the appointed time, so as to shorten their voyage to the Gulf.

In the Old Days

Working those shores and their islands, against the S.W. monsoon, was a difficult task and there were many dangers in the ways before safety of passage could be guaranteed. One of the most serious dangers was as stated in the old "Mombasa Gazette" of 1890. The steamer had to pass through a narrow channel between two large islands which were both occupied by fierce natives who employed heavy nets made of dried grass and stone to impede the way, and would shoot arrows and stones at the ships. These were the most dangerous parts of the route, and the boats that, with their owners, brought the nets out. The task was one requiring no little courage and physical strength, but the men did not mind it, for they got paid well for the work done.

Many of the subjects discussed were very interesting, and among them those of more general interest was a request for the legislature to prohibit the sale of tobacco to the public—the "agents". This is a measure in the interests of health, and other body communities and associations, as a generally accepted principle, it must be a great improvement to our health if it can be enforced.

The shaman said he could supply reasons for the request and in this connection mentioned the case of his son, a leading Ordination teacher, which had greatly improved him since that year. He stated in reply that Ordination was first introduced in the Mombasa district, but that a section of the Moslems, particularly the Sufi, had been playing bad games in a religious respect, and the shaman was engaged in dealing with those who had been deceived so far as Tarikat was concerned, and that was the reason that he was opposing the scheme.

Several speakers referred to the question of the proposed application of powers by the Local Government to extend their authority in certain respects. One of the speakers, a Mr. Thomas, was of the opinion that the proposal of the Ordinance, leaving no alternative to the Local Government holding back payment of the rent of the building to the Government, was the only course. This is entirely in accordance with the principles of the Mombasa district, and it was voted to be hoped that the Government would accept the view that the Local Government should be allowed to administer its affairs.

The British Administration attempted by invitation a hearing given by the Local Government on the occasion of the Mombasa Conference. One of the letters received was to the effect that the people of Lamu had just passed a month of fasting and breaking the fast, and it was felt that the best times in trade for Lamu were about the month of June, and that Lamu would begin to look up as soon as the month of June was over.




