### ANXIETY OVER OUTBREAKS IN THE SUDAN.

Native Troops Put Under Guard.

EX-KHEDIVE MEETS SECRET GERMAN AGENTS IN BRUSSELS.

British Army Strength in Egypt.

DEMONSTRATION ARMED WITH STICKS AND HAMMERS BROKEN UP BY POLICE AND BRITISH TROOPS.

[THROUGH BRITON'S AGENT.]

London, August 14.—The situation in the Sudan is the principal topic of all the London papers, and there is no exception regard the affair as a definite sign of the growing Egyptian assertiveness, whom they warn that Britain does not intend to be held responsible for her responsibilities to the Sudan.

The Daily Chronicle says it is difficult to conceive a compact more unlikely than that between the Sudanese and the British, and adds that additional troops are being drafted to Egypt.

One of the leaders of the Dervish rebels has been ordered to be in readiness to proceed to Egypt at any time.

The British Legation in Cairo has been sent to Egypt by the Foreign Office.

Exodus of Comptrollers.

Brussels, August 14.—Concurrently with the discussions in the Sudan, Lord Balfour, director-general of the Foreign Office, has issued a circular to all British diplomatic agents in Egypt, instructing them to make arrangements for the departure of their families from Egypt as soon as possible.

It is stated in official circles that an expedition is to be sent to Egypt to protect British interests.

This agent is reported to have been appointed by the Foreign Office with Egyptian political advisers who came into Britain by direct order of the Khedive.

London, Aug. 15.—The death is announced of Lord Knollys.

Lord Francis Knollys, 1st Viscount, created 1911, and 1st Baron Knollys, was born in 1888, son of Sir Francis Knollys, Private Secretary to King Edward VII, and Lady Knollys. He was afterwards Private Secretary to King George V, and has since been Private Secretary to Queen Alexandra since 1910.

As early as 1898 he was Gentleman Usher to Queen Victoria, and was in the same service when Sir Francis Knollys became Private Secretary to King Edward VII, and Lady Knollys.

## ALLIED AGREEMENT REACHED WITH GERMANY.

Three Nights: From Fears to Triumph.

TEXT OF TERMS AND DETAILS OF THEIR  
IMMEDIATE OPERATION.

"War Will Be Ended By Arbitration."

[FRANCIS BROWN'S OFFICES]

London, Aug. 16  
An Inter Allied Conference with Germany has been initiated.

London, Aug. 15  
It is understood that the agreed terms will be submitted to the League of Nations by the end of next month.

London, Aug. 15  
Germany has agreed to withdraw its troops from the Rhineland. It is stated that the Germans will give hope of a final peace if the Allies will provide for their withdrawal in kind.

The German reply has done nothing to allay the fears of the Allies as to the fate of the Rhineland. The reply was read this afternoon from Berlin, and it is now known that there were documents that the reply is of no definite value in constituting a further basis for the news.

Changled in a Month  
London, Aug. 15  
It is understood that an agreement between the French and the Germans will be reached during last night. The Germans will not be paid the indemnity of 100 million francs by the Ruhr occupation, but the Ruhr will remain until the restoration of the French frontier, and the payment of a sum for the 100,000,000 francs.

The restoration of the local administration will be left to the Germans to be completed by October 2, according to the statement. The main task of the restoration is to establish the establishment of banks and German currency, and the full settlement of debts.

The restoration of cultural and other understandings in the Ruhr to their owners, etc.

The German railway system is to be taken over by the British Daimler-Hawley Company by September 1, and the lines worked under the French-Belgian regime are to be taken over by the British Railways.

The final meeting of the Conference will be held at Berlin, and the Germans will probably return to Berlin to-morrow. The following is the Report of the Conference:

## Rail Road.

London, Aug. 15  
It is believed that the Inter-Allied Conference points to the conclusion of the war, and that they are very endeavouring to put firmly on record that Mr. Horatio to agree to the terms of the Conference, which have apparently decided to accept the Dawes plan, and have come to an agreement to carry out the Dawes plan, and that the Conference will still endeavour to obtain some concessions, including the reduction of the Rhine frontier and Dusseldorf, and rendering more difficult the entry of Germany by the reduction of numbers of French troops and their withdrawal from the Rhine.

The German delegation to the Conference has been reduced to 100 men, and the Germans will probably leave the Conference on August 17. The Agreements with the Germans will be submitted to the League of Nations, and will be transferred to the League of Nations.

After the final session in Berlin, the Conference will be adjourned with four sessions. They will meet again on the 21st, the 24th, and the 27th, and will have a final session on the 30th.
