HOME AND LOCAL PRICES

We wish to inform Mr. P. G. Purchaser, whose communication will be found under Correspondence, that we have received his question of the apparent discrepancy between the selling price of motor vehicles in Kenya and those in this Colony. At first glance it certainly does seem a little large profit at the expense of the unfortunate buyer, but the reason which he paid more than £100 for a car in Kenya is that he paid £100 for a car in Kenya.

Purchaser and others interested in this subject to understand a little better.

First of all those who are offering up to the public in the Colonial market are not necessarily the best price, otherwise in view of the particularly heavy charges connected with the importation of motor vehicles, there is no room for profit.

The figures which are given below are based on the cost of a vehicle which can be bought out but they are in proportion to the actual cost of the vehicle, and give some idea of what charge can be made before the Nairobi selling price can be arrived at.

Suppose a purchaser is going to buy a vehicle in England at £100. It would be sold out here for about £77, made up as follows:

The importing agents, who are all the small profits and quick returns. Under these circumstances, a profit of £77 is not a bad one, but it is not necessarily distributing agents accordingly.

But the cost of the vehicle must be added to the £77, which is £100, £10, and only leaves the

agent of £10, over his actual cost of £100, plus his profit.

When consideration is given to the length of time that the agent's services are outstanding and having the motor vehicles in stock, the hands the profit is really not excessive.

It will be noted that

£27 is mentioned as a profit.

The price in England is taken at £100.


