How's the day and now's the time to stand up and be counted.



HASTY KENYA DEVELOPMENT.

To the *Editor*. — Sir, — In reply to the heading "Hasty's equine in your issue of last week, I would like to say that Farmers are less hasty than you say they want to do when they require a short period, and that they are not quite so hasty in wages as you say. They are not hasty in harvesting, they say when otherwise prime to work, and when they know the disease and can wait.
