Paris, Sept. 21.

In France, his attitude at Geneva has largely been that of a champion of the rights of workmen pure and simple, excepting that he has sought to defend himself by his record and by his knowledge of the law. He is separated, however, from the majority of the French people, and despite their differences of opinion, is as much a friend of the Right as of the Left.

He remains only to serve as a model of the man who has been cast aside, and it is hoped that the French will be able to do their best work along these lines. There has been a very large turnout of spectators at the trials in Paris.

The discourse pronounced at the opening of the Congress by the French Minister of Justice was received with interest, those who still doubted the intentions of the Right having seen very clearly to what great lengths the Right would go to in order to reach its ends.

The speech was well received, and the audience was unanimous in its expression of approval and admiration, though the speaker did not seem to have given much thought to the thoughts of his hearers.
