LOADAGE ACCOMMODATION. One of the most important points about any motor vehicle is the load capacity of the chassis. In the case of the East African Territories, the largest carrying capacity is required for the passengers, who can be conveyed. In discussion of the merits of any chassis, the load capacity is usually mentioned which can be understood when the parts are mentioned. These parts are often the carriages or trailers of that third or fourth car, their load capacity is not so much concerned as the load capacity of the chassis itself, which is different according to the following. The average car as sold in Kenya is of the five-passenger type, which has a load capacity of 1,000 lbs. This is the limit of the load carrying capacity — five passengers. Of course, the carriages or trailers may be packed quite enough to extract the maximum utility of his car, but this is an omission in equipment. Moreover as the fitting of a carriage or trailer to a car is a heavy extra weight plate and load, simply it would be better to make a separate trailer for the same needless expense. But even then there are many who do not like the idea of a separate trailer, and this is on a heavy grid as there is always the question of its being safe after being pulled by his car. It is proved over a short time. 

Three Years' Tours.

LEAVE TAKEN AT OPTION OF THE CIVIL SERVANT.

Annual Medical Examination.

PROPOSALS MADE BY ELECTED COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL

FORWARDED TO LOCAL LEADS.

The Select Committee appointed by the Legislative Council to suggest general leave system for European civil servants, and also to consider the question of leave and holidays for the Legislative Council on Wednesdays, has submitted its report.

The committee consisted of Mr. O.E.C. Gurney, Manager of Railways; Mr. L. D. M. Mowat, P.M.C.; Mr. J. H. Harvey, Secretary, Conway & Sons, Ltd.

The committee agreed that leave should no longer be necessarily restricted to three years' tour members. It further considered that there was no longer any need for any leave system for the men of life in East Africa, to indicate the period of service, and for the expiry of 21 years of service.

Appointments were to be for a longer time. Except in the case of short tours, the men should not be liable to be compelled to leave if they had not been provided that adequate leave is taken as a reasonable rate of pay does not guarantee a man's right to leave after any reasonable length of time out of the Colony after 21 years.

It was agreed that a period of service should only arise after a period of vacation for Government service, and that the leave is to be recognized. The Committee recommended that the Government should be in a position to know when they have left their posts, so that they can be sent home again. They therefore recommended that at the end of each tour the Government should be entitled to 1/3 of the leave of the post holder.

As far as the services of the men concerned are concerned, it was agreed that a period of return passage to the port of disembarkation should be granted and back for each month of service, and that the men should be entitled to 1/3 of the leave of the post holder.

It was also agreed that each month of service should be counted as a month of leave.

It was also agreed that a period of 6 months should be allowed to extend their terms of service, and that the men should be entitled to 1/3 of the leave of the post holder.

It was also agreed that the men should be allowed to accumulate the cost of passages for his wife and (or) dependents, and that he should be allowed to accumulate more than 12 months' leave.
