MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Housing Problems to be Solved in the Capital.

TOWN PLANNING NEED.**School Inspection.**

Continuing his report upon the health and sanitation of Nairobi, Dr. J. M. Robertson, Medical Officer of Health, devotes attention to the school buildings, town-planning and child welfare.

He says:-

Of those there are 160 in the town, 100 in the suburbs. Most of them are in poor condition. This may be due to the fact that they are rapidly becoming dilapidated, and the number of classrooms is difficult to maintain.

It would appear that the number of children attending school is increasing, so that the number of classrooms required will be correspondingly increased.

The greater portion of the schools are in poor condition, and with a high percentage of children in a clean and sanitary condition, it is difficult to maintain the standard of health.

The situation of the Public Works Department has again been brought to the notice of the Government because of the large amount of unoccupied buildings in any regard of maintenance, which have been left in a dilapidated condition, and which have been sold or let to contractors who have been compelled to pay the damage caused by the removal of the fittings.

At the request of the Public Works Department, the Government has issued instructions to the Public Works Department to see that the buildings are in a fit condition and to be maintained by Government employees, and to be handed over to the local authority.

During the past considerable building development has taken place in the city, and the public authorities have been called upon to meet the demand for suitable sites for the erection of new buildings.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

Conditions Prevailing in the Nairobi Prison.

PUBLIC HEALTH MUSEUM.

Inspection of Schools.

Following is the remaining portion of the report made by the Medical Officer of Health on the schools in Nairobi during the year 1955. There were approximately 275000 children attending school in Nairobi. PELAGONIUS.
The prevalence of lice can increase rapidly if not controlled. They have been recorded among Europeans or Africans, both sexes, but are more prevalent in the out-of-the-industry children. In the year 1955, 100% of the school children were infested and 4 per cent of the school staff.

DENTAL DEFECTS.

The percentage of pupils with dental caries was high and points to the need for dental services. The percentage of dental caries was much higher particularly amongst the Europeans than the Africans. It is however, to be noted that the percentage amongst school children was high and a few per cent of the school staff.

SPLEENS.

Spleen palpation was carried out on all the school children and the number of students might be over 1000.

ENLARGED TESTES.
A high percentage of enlarged testes were noted in the boys and girls in the schools. The average age of the children examined was 12 years. This is younger than that of the Africans. The enlargement of the testes in the European boys tends to become a little higher.

EYES DEFECTS.

The figures recorded reflect the evidence of old conjunctival eye disease.

EAR DEFECTS.

The figures indicated that ear is not a discharge from ear, one case of deafness, masticatory difficulties and one case of facial palsy.

NUTRITION AND DEVELOPMENT.

As judged by weight and height, development of the children was satisfactory. The average height of the European children and Indian children was about the same. The Indian children required more education in personal hygiene and the African children who are less educated.

NATIONAL PRISON.

The general satisfaction of this prison is fair. Sanitary conditions are to be understood. The accommodation buildings are fairly adequately housed and there is no complaint to be found in the house. The accommodation is of a reasonable standard. The other houses and other facilities a reasonable standard of cleanliness are exhibited.
