My Lord,

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I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of Your Lordship's despatch No. 556 of the 24th ultimo on the subject of courses of instruction.

- 2. My despatch of the same date had not of course then reached Your Lordship and I am therefore taking no immediate action in the hope that my proposal that officers should be encouraged but not compelled to take the course during their leave will meet with Your Lordship's approval.
- S. I would venture to add that the Frincipal Medical Officer is strongly opposed to the course being made obligatory as he is of opinion that officers require a complete change and rest from all work after a tour of service in tropical Africa. In this connection I would invite a reference to my despatch No.398 of the 15th instant drawing attention to the strain on the nervous system entailed by continuous residence even in the reputadly healthy districts of this Proteotorate.
