Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter M.12660 of the 1st instant enquiring what arrangement has been come to with regard to the German East Africa Customs Ordinance.

I am to state for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that it has been ascertained from the Acting British Agent and Consul General at Zanzibar that the Ordinance in question came into force in June 1903 but that no difficulties have arisen in connection with §38.

I am to acquaint you that although the German Government accepted the proposal made by the Marquess of Lansdowne in 1904 to come to an arrangement for the suppression of smuggling in East Africa, the matter was eventually allowed to drop.

Sir E. Grey is not of opinion that any such arrangement

arrangement is necessary but he is considering the advisability of making a further protest to the German Government in regard to §38 of the Ordinance.

He would however be glad to learn whether the enquiry in your letter under reply is prompted by any special considerations.

The Acting Consul General informs me that the Germans have been enforcing their customs jurisdiction to a distance of 10 miles from the German East Africa coast since June 1905. Apparently the Foreign Office were unaware of this as they telegraphed about a fortnight ago to ask whether the Germans were enforcing this decree.

As far as is known in Zanzibar no cases up to the present occurred of British dhows being stopped.

of December 7th and 9th last, I am directed by Secre-
tary Sir F. Grey to transmit to you herewith copies

at once to Mr. F. Grey's notice any case which may
occur of interference by the authorities of the German
East Africa Protectorate with British or Zanzibar
vessels outside the three mile limit of German waters.
