## MARIA THERESA DOLLARS

Mr. Read,

The Governor is mistaken in thinking that an international agreement has been arrived at by which the British, French, and German authorities in West Africa have undertaken to discourage as far as possible the importation and use of Maria Theresa dollars. It will be seen on reference to F.O. 13570/08 N. Nigeria that the German Government have prohibited the importation of the dollars into the Cameroons, but that the French Government, while anxious to substitute French coin for the dollar in territories under their control, were not prepared to prohibit the importation of the dollar. In these circumstances it was decided that no concerted action on the part of the three Governments was practical and that all that could be done by the Governments of Northern Nigeria and the Cameroons was to make the existing prohibition of importation as effective as their resources would allow,

importation of the dollars into the East Africa Protectorate, and enquire to what extent such a prohibition could be made effective and what loss of import duty would result; and add that this information is needed for as a preliminary to consulting the Foreign Office and the Treasury if it should seem clear on the receipt of your reply that some measure of prohibition is desirable.

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My Lord,

I have the honour to enquire whether it is, possible to take any steps to discourage the importation and circulation of the Maria Thereza dollar.

2. This coin is extensively and in fact almost exclusively used in Abyssinia and Somaliland and in the adjacent territories. It is cumbersome and unwieldy and so long as it remains the sole medium of exchange it hampers the expansion of our rupee coinage.

3. In West Africa an International agreement has been arrived at by which the British, French and German authorities have undertaken to discourage as far as possible the importation and use of these dollars. I consider that if similar steps could be taken here it would be of great advantage.
