Dear Sir. I am in receipt of your communication of the 9<sup>th</sup> February stating that you begin wished for further information regarding my occupation between the years 1892 & 1897. When I left school towards the end of 1892 my health was not particularly good and I spent the next two years travelling. At the end of 1894 I accepted an offer made to me by the Rev. W.R. Macrae, M.A. to assist him at his school - The Abbey School, North Berwick, — and I accepted the offer, more because I was recommended the climate of North Berwick than with any intention of adopting the profession of schoolmaster.

I did not think it necessary to obtain a testimonial from Mr Macrae, who was a personal friend of mine, and am not aware of his address at the present moment. He gave up the abbey School to take a living in England. It was, I think, about six months after leaving North Berwick that I went out to Leyton.
