We know from other papers (steamer service on Lake Victoria) that there was an available balance about £109,000 on the 1st of April last, instead of £30647 anticipated in the Estimates for this year. There should, therefore, be no difficulty about meeting this expenditure of £50,000 temporarily from the balance. We shall have to consider later how much of the balance shall be ~~set aside~~ applied, in satisfaction of a condition made by the Treasury on this year's

Estimates, in diminution of the
grant, in aid for the current year. The
question of remitting some part of the
balance to this country will then arise.
It will be convenient to deal simul-
taneously with the payment of this
£30,000 from balances of time permits.

TREASURY CHAMBERS.



Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Fiddes' letter of the 4th instant (25502/1911), relative to the meeting of an expenditure of about £30,000 on permanent way material for the proposed Thika Tramway out of the loan of £250,000 to be made from Imperial Funds to the East Africa Protectorate, and in reply I am directed to state, for the information of Mr. Secretary Harcourt, that as it is not now anticipated that the Finance Bill will become law before the Parliamentary recess, My Lords will not at present be in a position to make an issue in respect of the proposed loan. Such expenditure therefore as it may be absolutely necessary to incur should for the time being be met as far as possible from Protectorate balances.

If those balances should be insufficient, My Lords will be prepared to make advances from the Civil Contingencies Fund in anticipation of the passing of the Bill to a total aggregate amount not exceeding £30,000 upon the request of your Department as and when the money is actually required.
