Officers travelling via Marseilles
One day allowed for journey

Captain Robinson.
Mr. Butler.

I understand that it is now the practice in the case of civil appointments to allow one day only for the journey to Marseilles, and I presume that the rule should be extended to F.A.R. appointments. In the case of officers whose selection has been completed, and who have accordingly received the Conditions of Service and Regulations in which two days are allowed for the journey, I take it that the old rule should still apply.

For future appointments the necessary alteration in the Regulations (para 180) and Conditions of Service (end of section III) could be made by hand.

I am not sure how the list should then stand. Since I have had nothing to do with the F.A.R., officers have only been sent via Marseilles.

We have had an understanding with the C.C. for some time past to this effect, and I would suggest that it should now be made the standing rule for all East African & K.A.R. officers.
