In continuation of my Confidential despatch No. 63rd of the 17th of April regarding the situation in the Tarehan Country, I have the honour to confirm herewith the following telegrams sent to you since that date:-

"April 20th. Following telegram has been received from Graham; begins - Fifteenth report from Soames from Garribahare dated eleventh says on eight encountered Ali Dera village and killed in action four, wounded two, captured one rifle and bandolier, 115 camels, 97 cattle, 630 goats and sheep, all which subsequently killed. Purpose leaving on twelfth for Hariboli. Ali Dera now come in and Soames has

softly of Somalis and his S.O.C.
which I approach with great care
as to the reinforcements mentioned
in the opening pages of his report.
Their presence even in Southern
Jubaland would have and doubtless
has had a great effect.

With regard to para. 3, the constant
war of Somalis with our territory is
likely to cause us considerable
embarrassment in the future as
it has already in the past. We
have little power to prevent it &
the Italians are only too glad to
accelerate their progress through
territory. It provides an effective
adversary who is substituted the
one side to the other. This cannot
be backed by a suitable force.

As to para. 14, the Italians have been
consistently helped & hind in all their
actions & operations by some services
of the British & I hope that
published press can be induced to
publicise what is done - with
particular reference to the
former time. I should not feel so
much faith in their good will with
regard to larger issues. They

would, unfortunately, like all
the trouble to be on one side of
the river.

The operations seem to be
proceeding a fairly satisfactory course
with as satisfactory as we can
expect in such a difficult
country with such treacherous people.

Sir,

I have the honour to report that there has been further fighting between the Mahomed Zubeir and the Abud Wak.

I communicate this news direct to avoid delay and last, in the event of your receiving possibly exaggerated rumours from Tanaland, you should attach more importance to the affair than, in this case, I think it deserves.

Subsequent to the report on this subject sent you by the P.C. Jubaian, the Mahomed Zubeir here, reinforced by 300 men from Tana, about 500 in all, attacked the Abud Wak at Shambala, about 3 days from here in the direction of the Tana. It appears that the Abud Wak offered very little resistance, and after ~~one or two~~ small encounters retired beyond the Tana, pursued by the Mahomed Zubeir as far as Sankur, and leaving the greater part of their stock in the hands of the latter. The Abud Wak lost 30 men killed, the Mahomed Zubeir 3 only, 3 died of thirst. The Mahomed Zubeir have now all returned here bringing with them
