As noted under "Ports of Entry", travellers using this route incur the risk of detention at Mahagi.

#### Restrictions.

Natives of Uganda engaged for journeys to the Congo must be registered under the Masters and Servants Ordinance, 1913. (Uganda Official Gazette, 1913, page 533). A fee of one Rupee per head is chargeable for registration, and employers are required to enter into a bond, with approved sureties, to guarantee the payment of the porters' wages and their return to the place of engagement.

The revision of the Regulations affecting the engagement of porters for the Congo is under consideration. Natives of the Uganda Protectorate are not permitted to enter the Uele District of the Congo.

The importation of Arms into Uganda is regulated by the Uganda Arms Ordinance, 1906 (Laws of the Uganda Protectorate, 1910 Edition, page 152). Arms may be exported to the Congo or passed in transit, provided evidence is produced that the necessary permission has been obtained from the Congo Authorities. This is usually done by obtaining a permit or "porte d'armes", which can be procured through the Belgian Consul in Entebbe or one of the Agencies dealing with the



extended to a point 25 miles nearer Fort Portal.

From Kibale, transport to Fort Portal is by porters or carts, and the road is passable in dry weather for light Motor cars.

Arrangements should be made before leaving Kampala for porters to meet safaris at Kibale. This can be done through one of the firms acting as Forwarding and Safari Agents in Uganda. A list of Camps from Kibale to Fort Portal and beyond is appended.

From Fort Portal, the journey to Boga takes three days, that to Kasindi seven days. Tsetse fly exist on both routes and are numerous on the Fort Portal-Kasindi Road. Delays are encountered at times on this road when the rivers are in flood, and food is extremely scarce along the greater part of it. The rates for porters' wages are approximately:-

Fort Portal to Kibale,	Rs.2.50.
Fort Portal to Boga,	" 3.00.

#### ROUTE II.

A train leaves Jinja every Thursday for Namasagali connecting with the steamer leaving that port for Masindi Port, which arrives at the latter on Fridays. From Masindi Port to Masindi (29 miles) there is a daily Motor service, details of which are given on pages 8 and 9 of the accompanying pamphlet.

A Motor road runs from Masindi to Butiaba (about 45 miles), but, pending the completion of the road, the journey is made with porters.

MEMORANDUMON THE JOURNEY FROM UGANDA TO THE CONGO.

There are two main routes.

- I. From Entebbe or Kampala by road to Fort Portal, and from there to Boga or Kasindi.
- II. From Jinja by rail and steamer to Masindi Port, (on the Victoria Nile), and from there, via Masindi, to Butiaba on Lake Albert; from Butiaba by steamer to Mahagi.

Notice was received from the Command Supérieur of the Ituri Zone, dated the 21st June, 1912, that entry to that zone for travellers was restricted to the post of Boga, and travellers entering by Mahagi are liable to be turned back. Travellers wishing to enter by Mahagi should make enquiries as to the feasibility of doing so from the Belgian Consul in Uganda, who resides at Entebbe. The most convenient route, and the one generally adopted, is that by Fort Portal, and Boga or Kasindi, as transport from Mahagi onwards is difficult to obtain.

Route I.

There is a daily Motor service from Entebbe to Kampala. From Kampala Motor vans leave once a week, or oftener if required, for Kibale, on the Kampala-Fort Portal Road. Fares and freight rates can be ascertained at Entebbe. The Motor service will shortly be

### Export of Trophies.

Game trophies are exported free of duty on production at the Customs House of a certificate signed by the Game Warden, Provincial Commissioner or any other authorised officer.

A sportsman on return to Nairobi usually places his trophies in the hands of one of the outfitting firms or forwarding agents. The trophies are then inspected by one of the officers of the Game Department and packed. A continuous wire is placed round the case and secured with a lead seal which is stamped by the Game Warden. The cases are then forwarded to Mombasa together with the certificate mentioned above.

Ivory, when shot legally, is exported with a permit signed by the Game Warden or other duly authorised officer.

Ivory which is underweight or has been confiscated can only be bought at the regular Customs Sales of Ivory and is exported under permit from the Chief of Customs. Duty is charged on ivory.

No game trophies may be exported for sale with the exception of Elephant and Hippopotamus ivory which has been obtained legally.

registration of arms and ammunition.

Government Officials are permitted to import into the country, one rifle, one shot gun, one revolver and 300 rounds ammunition free of Customs duty, the one revolver being also free of registration.

If on arrival in Uganda the importer of any arms takes out a game licence in that Protectorate he is entitled to a refund of Rs.3/- in respect of each fire-arm registered in Mombasa. The holder of Bird Licence in Uganda is entitled to a refund of Rs.3/- in respect of any one smooth bore shot gun.

ARMS AND AMMUNITION.

The importation of arms and ammunition into the East Africa Protectorate is regulated by the East Africa Arms Ordinance 1906. By Proclamation dated the 11th of December 1913 the importation of all "automatic" and "silenced" rifles is prohibited.

Customs duty at the rate of 10% ad valorem is levied at Mombasa on all goods, arms, ammunition and equipment imported.

On the arrival of the owner at Mombasa, his arms and ammunition are handed over to the Customs Officials for the collection of duty, and on payment of import duty on both arms and ammunition the Customs Official certifies accordingly on the withdrawal permit, original and duplicate, and attaches his signature. The permits are then sent to the District Commissioner's Office, Mombasa, who collects from the owner a Gun Tax of Rs. 3/- in respect of each firearm and cents 50 on each separate consignment of ammunition. The original withdrawal form is retained in the District Commissioner's Office while the duplicate is returned to the Customs when the arms and ammunition may be withdrawn. The importer of a large consignment of ammunition, who does not wish to take out a Game licence in Mombasa, may be ordered, if the District Commissioner thinks necessary, to consign the whole amount direct to any Administrative Officer of the Protectorate to whose District the importer is going.

Passengers arriving at Kilindini are not required to bring their arms and ammunition to the District Commissioner's Office as the Gun Registration clerk attends at the Kilindini Customs for all incoming passenger boats either from Europe or from the South for the registration

The issue of licences to kill game in the British East Africa Protectorate is regulated by the Game Ordinance 1909.

Licences are issued by District Officers.

The licence duties payable in respect of game licences are as follows :-

For a Sportsman's licence	Rs.750 or £50
For a Resident's licence	" 150 or £10
For a Traveller's licence	" 15 or £1 available for one month.
For a Resident's (14 days)	" 30 or £2
For a Landholder's licence	" 45 or £3
For a Bird licence	" 5 or 6s.8d.

As regards Elephants, those having tusks weighing less than 60 lbs. are absolutely protected by law. As regards those having tusks weighing more than 60 lbs. the holder of a Sportsman's licence can hunt and kill not more than two such, provided that he takes out a Special licence, the additional fees for which are:-

To hunt, kill or capture one Elephant Rs.150 or £10

To hunt, kill or capture two Elephants " 450 or £30

Provided that should a Sportsman pay £30 and kill only one Elephant or none, then £20 is returned to him.

As regards Giraffe, one Bull may be killed by the holder of a Sportsman's or Resident's licence on payment of a fee of Rs.150 or £10.

The importer of a large consignment of ammunition, who does not wish to take out a Game licence in Mombasa, may be ordered, if the District Commissioner thinks necessary, to consign the whole amount direct to any Administrative Officer of the Protectorate to whose District the importer is going.

Passengers arriving at Kilindini are not required to bring their arms and ammunition to the District Commissioner's Office for Gun Registration at the Kilindini Customs for all incoming passenger boats either from Europe or from the south for the registration

GAME LICENCES.

The issue of licences to kill game in the British East Africa Protectorate is regulated by the Game Ordinance 1908.

Licences are issued by District Officers.

The licence duties payable in respect of game licences are as follows :-

For a Sportsman's licence	Rs. 750 or £50
For a Resident's licence	" 150 or £10
For a Traveller's licence	" 15 or £1 available for one month.
For a Resident's (14 days)	" 50 or £2
For a Landholder's licence	" 40 or £2
For a Bird licence	" 5 or 6s. 8d.

As regards Elephants, those having tusks weighing less than 60 lbs. are absolutely protected by law. As regards those having tusks weighing more than 60 lbs. the holder of a Sportsman's licence can hunt and kill not more than two such, provided that he takes out a Special licence, the additional fees for which are:-

To hunt, kill or capture one Elephant Rs. 150 or £10

To hunt, kill or capture two Elephants " 450 or £30

Provided that should a Sportsman pay £30 and kill only one Elephant or none, then £20 is returned to him.

As regards Giraffe, one Bull may be killed by the holder of a Sportsman's or Resident's licence on payment of a fee of Rs. 150 or £10.
