Sir,

I have the honour to report, with great regret, that Mr. Hiley, Assistant Collector died at 1.15 a.m. on the 18th instant.

He was suddenly taken ill in the middle of the night of the 14th instant, when the unmistakable symptoms of black-water fever became evident. The next morning and during the whole of that day he was seized with frequent and violent fits of vomiting which continued also on the 16th instant. On the morning of the 17th instant he became delirious and about noon entered into a state of semi-consciousness.

At this stage it appeared probable that he would not be able to pass the night, and I therefore sent for Reverend G. Kani, of the German Mission at Mulango who arrived here in the morning. Mr. Hiley had now become unconscious and continued to sink till life became extinct at 1.15 a.m. on the 18th instant. As he drew his last breath the Reverend G. Kani uttered a short simple prayer at the bed-side.

The body was then attended to in the customary manner, and at 10 a.m. the funeral procession left the town preceded by the Reverend G. Kani. A funeral party of District Police marched on either side and I followed the Sub-Commissioner,

the bier which was covered by a Protectorate flag and
was carried on the shoulders of six members of the District
Police Force. A large crowd of Ghanese, Arabs and
Swahilis from the local bazaar followed the procession
to the grave where the Church of England burial service was
read by the Reverend G. Kanig. During his short illness,
which lasted only about seventy-two hours, Mr. Hiley was
attended by Hospital Commander Ahmed Din who was
incessantly at the bed-side and who tried every remedy
that had any chance of being effective.

Medical Officers, although requisitioned both at
Nairobi and at Fort Hall as soon as the first symptoms
of black-water fever appeared, could not possibly have
reached Kitui in time, the disease having run its course
in so rapid and fatal a manner.

Mr. Hiley's effects have been packed and the inventory
thereof sent to the Administrator General.
