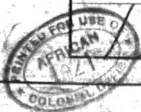

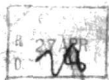

Sir,

In connection with the interview granted me on the 19th ultimo, I have the honour to submit for Your Excellency's consideration, the following suggestions relative to my undertaking entomological work on the coast of the British East African Protectorate.

I would propose to make cotton the main object of my inquiries and would suggest that my sojourn in East Africa should be divided according to circumstances between Zanzibar and the Mainland Coast.

I anticipate that the Government of the Protectorate would supply me with all transport and the requisite camping outfit (as supplied to other officials) and allow me introductions to the Officers in charge of the different districts visited.

The cotton industry in Jubaland is of such importance that in view of the reports received on the parasitised condition of the crops, I submit for Your Excellency's consideration that my inquiries and report could only tend to ameliorate the existing conditions.

Protectorate, as much valuable data could thereby be obtained, especially with regard to cotton pests in the districts of Malindi, Tanaland and Jubaland, while leaving Mr. Anderson free to devote his time to the requirements of the Highlands.

3. It is anticipated that the expenditure incurred for a period of six months would be approximately as follows:-

20 porters @ R ^s 10 each per mensem	Rs.1,200
Food for porters @ Rs.80 per mensem	480
Camp equipment	400
Subsistence allowance @ R ^s 4 per diem	720
Steamship and dhow fares	<u>300</u>
	Rs.3,100.

The expenditure on the last two items can be met from the departmental Travelling Vote, while the other three could with propriety be charged to the provision made for "Cotton Industry, Grants-in-aid".
