Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that, with the advice of my Executive Council, I have, subject to your sanction, approved the imposition of a fine of Rs. 400/- under the Collective Punishment Ordinance 1909, upon the villages adjacent to the camp of Headman Muruambeni, in the Embu District of Kenya Province.

2. The circumstances of the case are as follows:-

On May 23rd 1917, a Somali trader named Hadji Farah left Shuka, proceeding along the main road from Shuka to Embu with a number of goats. He arrived at the camp of Headman Muruambeni in the evening of May 24th and pitched his tent there. A young native lent him a hut for his goats near his tent and the animals, numbering 76 in all, were placed in it for the night. In the morning Hadji Farah discovered that


that only 72 goats remained. He examined the hut and found that some poles had been cut away from the wall: he also saw the tracks of goats proceeding from this outlet. Though these tracks were followed to a native hut close by, there was nothing in the evidence tending to implicate two native women residing in this hut.

3. The locality where the incident took place is closely populated, and, if the goats had strayed, it is impossible that their presence would not at once become known to the inhabitants. The elders of the vicinity, however, deny all knowledge of the goats. The Attorney General considers that this case is one where the provisions of the Collective Punishment Ordinance may properly be applied, and I have therefore the honour to ask your formal sanction to the imposition of the fine referred to in the first paragraph of this despatch. I consider it highly desirable that thefts of this nature should be severely punished, as if trade is to be encouraged the first essential is to ensure the safety and protection of travellers on the main roads.
