Your letter of the 14th inst., ref. 63269/1919.

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter as above and note remarks re Discharge also option of free passage back to East Africa before July 1920 for which I thank you.

With regard to your third paragraph I cannot understand the inability of your office to grant me ration allowance. Were I a young conscript on home service that would be forthcoming without asking for. Surely the Colonial Office can do better than this or do they expect me to live on the charity of my friends?

I should also be glad to know if I am entitled to go to an Imperial Detail Camp and draw clothing etc., and my position with regard to medical treatment as I have had to take private medical advice this past fortnight owing to having taken a cold.

I am directed to ask the receipt of your letter of the 25th of 11 months and to inform you that it is the rule that non-combat members of the P.O. Local Troops receive half P.O. rates of pay only while in the country, and that they are not granted rates all round. It is regretted that no exception can be made in your case.

2. Up to the date of your discharge from the P.O. Local Troops, i.e. the 1st of January 1920, you are at liberty to go to a military hospital for medical treatment. After that date you should apply to the H.M.P.
