

2 In the reference to your para 6 I
note that I stated apply to the Comon
wealth for the leave for my return
passage to Australia, if the remainder
of the validity of leave.

3 I thank you for the information
that a war bonus has been granted to
local East African officers of £3 per
month, from 1/10/17, but I have as this
applies to the unusual measure of
going to the Army, this nothing to do
with the question of leave.

4 I must confess to a feeling of
oppressive when you state that local
East African forces are not eligible

leave pay or demobilization, as are
the King African Rifles. It seems to
me very invidious distinction that
all men who volunteered as the earliest
hostilities, have therefore had one
or other hospital service, should be
entitled no leave at all, while others re-
turning with the R.A.R. in the same com-

In view of all these facts, I appeal to you to at least grant me the leave that was promised me by a duly authorized representative of His Majesty the King, viz., that needs I trust you will give this matter your earliest consideration, and forgive that an examination of the facts will cause you to doubt favorably on this application.

While on this subject, I beg to apply the retention of my honorary rank (Lieutenant), as has already been granted other members of the Royal Canadian Forces. Will you kindly inform me what forms, if any, are necessary to be filled up for the matter to be put in order.

I trust to receive a favorable reply, apologizing for the length of this epistle.

Sir,

I thank you for your memo No. S.T. 400/451/3 d/26/2/19 and quite understand that the question of free passages for ex-soldiers is at present hung up owing to lack of shipping facilities.

At the same time I respectfully beg to point out that you have made no mention of the question of leave, so beg to return my original letter on this subject herewith.

Having been released from Military service I presume it is impossible for me to be granted leave in the ordinary way, but in view of the fact that cash in lieu of leave is being granted to various officers and men (notably K. A. R.), and also that this question has been brought to the notice of H. E. the Governor (Maj-Gen. Northey) who is sympathetic in the matter, I should be extremely obliged if you would be good enough to forward me a letter stating:-

- (1) That I have had no leave during my period of four years and five months service;
- (2) That I was recommended for leave in September 1918 by my then C. O. (A. D. R. S.);
- (3) That it was only owing to the temporary shortage of Supply personnel in G. E. A. that I was not then granted leave;
- (4) That had the war not ended so soon after, I should have been granted leave;
- (5) That I was definitely promised that the question of my leave would not be forgotten or shelved.

I regret troubling you in this matter, but in view of the number of men with much less service than mine who have had trips to South Africa and elsewhere during the war, I do think I have a claim for consideration in regard to this question of leave.

With a letter similar to the one I have asked for in my possession, I consider I should have a strong case for presentation to the senior military authority here, and trust that you will see yourself clear to accede to my request.
