I am arranging for the applicants to meet together this weekend when it will be decided the particular district in which the farms are desired, and I will then write you as to the district and farm numbers.

I shall be in town on Wednesday when I could call upon you or arrange with your agent, Messrs Newland & Tarlton & Co. for any further particulars required.

With reference to my letters of the 9th and 11th inst., and my interviews of yesterday with

1). MR. WOOD at The Land Settlement Scheme Board's offices, 59 Victoria Street, and

2). MAJOR PARKINSON at the Colonial Offices, in the absence of the Head of the Department, Mr. Bottomley,

I was informed by the former that they were entirely under the Colonial Office, to carry out any instructions received from there.

Major Parkinson kindly took up the case, and made enquiries, informing me on my second call in the afternoon that owing to the receipt of a Cable (or instructions), from the Governor in Nairobi, "The Colonial Office were unable to make any more special grants of allotments under paragraph fourteen of the Land Settlement Scheme".

On my expressing dis-satisfaction, having regard to the expressions made in the House and in public, of the Government's desire to do all they possible could to help demobilised men to secure grants of land situated together, and so work co-operatively with a view to much quicker development, which obviously is in the interests of the Colony to encourage, Major Parkinson agreed on my pressing, to put up the case again to one of the Heads for a decision.

I am informed this morning that the case has been placed before the proper Authorities, and my application on behalf of these discharge officers and men has been refused.

I desire to again bring my case up for your special consideration, inasmuch as I am of the opinion that the particular point of my application has been over-looked, and whereas the Governor has declined to allot any more reserved land which is not

shown on the Official List of Farms available, he has not refused to allot official farms numbered in the Official List.

These seven applicants having met together and arranged for the erection of one central factory to treat their produce. I desire to make special application to you that:- "The seven farms stated in my previous letter may be withdrawn from the public drawing and allotted to these applicants" - otherwise if each of the seven applicants have to take their chance, and probably obtain farms in seven different districts, it will be absolutely impossible for them to co-operate together, and the development in consequence will be much slower, and a loss to the State.

Although the applications close to-day, the drawing will not take place for another week, and there is therefore time, in the event of a favourable decision by you, for the farms to be withdrawn - as others have already been for men now in Nairobi - without detriment or loss to any other applicants.



Dear Sir,

With reference to my telephone conversation with your private secretary this afternoon, I enclose you copy of my friend's letter, namely, Mr. Sydney H. Chambers of Waltham Grove, Mr. Grimsby, which you will observe has already been submitted to the Secretary of State and had the special consideration of Major Parkinson.

Mr. Chambers is co-operating with us in increasing the area under cultivation of flax in British East Africa and we do not need to emphasize the importance of a supply of flax material being produced within the Empire to take the place of supplies formerly coming from Russia.

The Group under which Mr. Chambers is applying is ~~not~~ relations and friends of his who are known to us personally and you will judge by the letter that the scheme is for these men to work co-operatively so that one central factory may be established for preparing the flax produced by the seven men. If therefore properties are allotted to them which are far apart the scheme falls to the ground and the experience and capital which these men are willing to supply will be lost as far as the production of flax is concerned.

We are approaching you on short notice because the drawings for the lottery take place on August 19th and it will therefore be essential that steps be taken immediately.
