TELEGRAM from the Officer Administering the Government
of Kenya to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Dated 16th August.

(Received Colonial Office 6.20 a.m. 26 August, 1921).

August 16th. Secret. With reference to
personnel and secret telegrams in your Office regarding
policy, information received in flight, etc., that
organised暴乱由Native and Indian, and other
elements fail and as a last resource in event of Indian
demands being granted will ~~not~~ ^{endeavour to} seize military
and government buildings. Arms awaiting issue to the
defence forces have to have been seized. Rebellions
have however failed to prevent this. African
police and King's African Rifles are the only armed
forces at disposal of Government to disperse unlawful
assembly of Europeans intaking to overthrow Government and
to prevent destruction of property both Government and
Indian.

The use of Africans against Europeans must have
most serious immediate and far-reaching results including
permanent depreciation of European prestige and consequently
lowering of security of European life and property in
the future. If disorder arise looting of farms by
natives not improbable.
