This paper has been waiting since 14 Aug. for the previous papers, including the petition itself, & these have only just been ~~not~~ discovered.

After several pages of generalisation on the position & treatment of Indians in the P.C., seven requests are made.

(i) Present 10 yrs. leases to be made into freehold.

The Land Bd. & Col. Montgomery are against this, & I think we need not consider such an ~~not~~ request.

(ii) Present leases if not freehold, be converted into 99 year leases.

Again the Land Bd. is against this, as they seem to have a principle that Indians are to have small plots on short leases.

ground on which the memorial demands consideration is the statement in para 5
(the memorial is with Govt. 1950) that the memorialists were induced or encouraged to take up^{the} land by "the officers and the authorities" and were led to believe that they would get better concessions and easy terms when the question of the distribution of land at Nairobi and elsewhere was taken up.

I would simply tell the Govt. that, unless there is any substance in this allegation, he should inform the President of the Indian Association that the S. of S. has carefully considered the memorial, and can only confirm the reply made to it by the Govt. of the G.G.P. to the letter dated the 15th

M I N U T E .

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I am sorry that the Indians' Memorial has not been dealt with for so long. I wished to obtain the Land Board's opinion on it, and this was furnished last month.

The petitioners are lessees of plots in the Nairobi Swamp. They hold under 10 years leases. Their requests are as follows:-

(1) That the 10 years' leases should be converted into freeholds. The Land Board is against this request and so am I. There is no reason why these valuable market garden plots should be freeholded.

(2) The next request is that if freehold cannot be given the leases may be extended to 99 years. In this also I am in agreement with the Land Board that the request should not be sanctioned.

We have decided that Asiatics are not to get agricultural land in the highlands except in small plots on short leases.

(3) It is stated that the present rents are very high and should be reduced.

The rents are not too high. It has not been shown that the memorialists are losing money by paying them. Indeed I believe that if the leases were put to auction we should realise much higher rates.

(4) It is asked that the land may be utilised for residential plots. This has been objected to and rightly. The conditions are that the land is let for agricultural purposes.

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(5) It is requested that the irrigation from Nairobi River should be controlled by the Government. This is reasonable, and I have asked the Honourable Commissioner of Public Works to assist us in drawing out a scheme.

(6) It is asked that an Indian may be appointed to the Land Board, and another to the Sites Board of Nairobi. The Sites Board has ceased to exist.

I do not recommend the appointment of an Indian on the Land Board at the present time. If we ever have local Land Boards one might be appointed for the Coast Board.

(7) Reference is made to agricultural advances (takavi) as made in India to help farmers to make improvements. I do not think such advances are necessary or desirable in this country. We expect persons taking up land to have sufficient means to develop it.
