This is the first time that I have seen this file from a contents of which it appears that Sir James Hayes Radler wited the Secretary of State to order that the Officers grine in this Protectorate should be required to pay rates a taxes leviable in respect of the Coverement Cuarters edupled by them, netwithstanding that by the terms of their magament thay are to be except from the payment of such targets. In the Secretary of State's despatch 189 of April is the meaning of the term "free quarters" is correctly uplained, and the Secretary of State as one would suppose, tates that he has no intention of aspriving Officers of a ortion of the consideration offered to them as an inducent to accept survice in this Protectorate.

It seems that fir James Hayes Sadler's invitation was do and accepted under a misary rehension of the facts. It not the fact that Officers have considered that the term free quarters meant quarters free of rent, but not of rates taxes which may be imposed for funter; il on wider purposes. either have those who have ever considered the question or ir gained that they would be required to may such charges essed on Government Overters provided for their occupaon in accordance with the terms of their engagement. It true that Officers residing in Bairobi have or necessity then than sillingly paid to the Township Committee small a in respect of services rendered in doing conservancy It at the neugen complied by them, which service, would the here ine have been performed by newants employed by the feer. This payment has been made in accordance such an angement entered late some years back between Ur. Alnaworth then Sub-Commissioner of Suirebi as representing the ficial Community and the Town Committee.

Officers have also haid a small sum monthly to the Railway Department for mater supplied for their use at the quarters occupied by them. Cases have arises where Officers who have accepted these services have objected to paying for them on the ground that they by the terms of their engagement were entitled to free quarters and my epinion has been invited as to whether they were under an obligation to have for the survices remarkers. In these cases I have expressed the opinion that since they had accepted services for which, as they were aware, payment was expected of them in accordance with an arrangement made by Mr. Ainsworth, it was not open to them retise payment.

There is a very side distinction between the payment for service's rendered and accepted and the payment of rates and taxes leviable in respect of precises occupied by the Officer on the terminal his angagement. I repret that the mishinderstanding which has arisen should not have been corrected before, and I hope that the true facts may be laid before the Pooretary of State in order that an injustice may not be done to the Officers of the Protectorate.
