

# Brig. Ndolo takes command of Kenya's forces

President Kenyatta, in his capacity as Commander-in-Chief of the Kenya Armed Forces, yesterday announced the promotion of five senior army officers. The promotions will take effect from June 1 although the officers will immediately assume the responsibilities of their new ranks.

Top of the list is Brig. J. M. L. Ndolo who becomes Major-General and takes over as Chief of the Defence Staff from Maj-Gen. Penfold, who is leaving Kenya soon.

Col. J. K. Mulenga is promoted to Brigadier and Commander of the Army, a rank previously held by Brig. Ndolo. Lt-Col. R. Kakonyi is raised to the rank of Colonel and becomes Deputy Commander of the Kenya Army.

Lt-Col. M. M. Mwa is promoted to the rank of Colonel and Chief of Staff, while Lt-Col. J. K. Nzioka is promoted to Colonel. He becomes the new commander of the Armed Forces Training School.

President Kenyatta, who made the announcement at State House in front of the officers, the Minister for Defence, Dr. Mungai, and Maj-Gen. Penfold, first thanked Gen. Penfold and said had done very good work in teaching and training the defence staff. Mr. Kenyatta told him that his teaching had not been wasted and that he was proud of his work.

Your responsibility goes with you wherever you are and you must consider yourselves on duty at all times. You should always be of good behaviour as the people and your junior officers will be watching you.

"I have no doubt you will carry out the new responsibility well and I take this opportunity to congratulate you and to thank you for the good work you have done for our country."

The Minister for Defence, Dr. Mungai, paid tribute to the outgoing Chief of the Defence Staff, Maj-Gen. Penfold, who he said had done a good job especially by increasing co-operation between the Army, Navy and Air Force and bringing about the essential common services between the three branches which had resulted in improved efficiency and better working of all of them.

We are very grateful for this foundation which he has laid for us and we wish him well in his future work. It is our hope that he will be able to carry out his duties and responsibilities entrusted to him.

Gen. Penfold thanked the President and told him that he had enjoyed being in Kenya and working with the staff of the Defence Staff. Brig. Ndolo assured the President that they would carry out their responsibilities in the best manner possible.

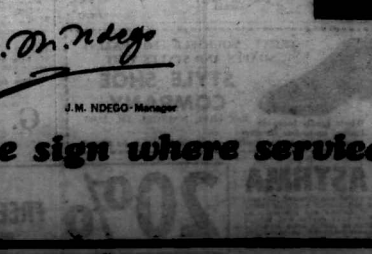

Amara, capital of the new state of Eritrea and second largest city of Ethiopia with a population of 150,000, flew delegates from many nations to the Moral Re-Armament conference sponsored by His Excellency, the Governor-General of Kenya.

**WILFRID HOPCRAFT**, a Kenya delegate to the M.R.A. conference held at Amara last week, writes about the conference and also describes a visit to the scene of the Battle of Keren, in which soldiers from East Africa helped to liberate Ethiopia during the Second World War.

not prepared to live by absolute moral standards." With a delegate from embattled Eastern Nigeria standing by her side, she pleaded for M.R.A. to "come and help Nigeria with the modern men and women we have heard have today."

Delegates were able to visit the famous battlefield and campsite at Keren where two divisions of British and Indian troops under Gen. Platt and Lord Weyell fought to attack the Italian forces under Gen. Lohmann, who was killed by a stray bomb. Many British and Indian troops lost their lives in the bloodiest battle of the campaign.

At the Amara Cemetery are the graves of many Kenya soldiers who were killed on the Gondar front. Kamba, Kipsigo, Nandi, Kikuyu and Luo lie side by side with British and Indian soldiers who gave their lives in this campaign.

Troops from Kenya sent by ship from Mombasa to Massawa, the original ancient capital of Eritrea, and travelled by ferry transport up the famous Massawa road which, built by the Italians, is reckoned to be one of the great engineering feats of the world. Then they continued through Amara to take over from the Indian Army at Wolchets on the road to Gondar. The rail and road link from Massawa to Amara run side by

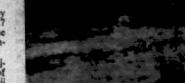
side. It takes four hours to go by rail, three hours by car and 17 minutes by air — over some of the most spectacular mountainous country in Africa.

Flying in to Amara with Rajmohan Gandhi came a full cast of Atlanta from India. Corlyon and Fiji to present *The Forgetter's Pastor* to the people of Amara. Atmospheric with this play was another, *I saw the Thief*, written and acted by Amara students and produced in Tigritiya, the local language.

Written by a student, this play deals with the corruption that infiltrates any nation that is not prepared to face the problems of greed and hatred, ambition and lust, which are ready to take over any country.

*The Ethiopian Herald*, published in Addis Ababa, gave headlines to the conference, urging Africa to solve its biting problems in the spirit of Moral Re-Armament.

Messages were sent to the conference by the Shah of Iran, ex-King Michael of Roumania, the president of the Haile Selassie I Foundation in Addis Ababa, the Archbishop of Jerusalem, the Bishop of Lagos, the secretary-general of the Arab League, Archbishop Makarios and the president of the Turkish community in Cyprus. The President of Sudan was represented by his Consul-General.

A leading Ethiopian businessman, speaking with his whole family on the theme of uniting young and old in a programme more radical than violent, said: "I have 11 treated my servants and my employees and there have been many misunderstandings. My decision is to meet all these people and rectify my mistakes. Starting from today my family and I have decided to fight for M.R.A."

His son, a student, speaking with 54 other students, declared: "If students here are a part of the cure instead of being the problem."

Shahk Surur, a leading Muslim and member of the M.R.A. Committee, said: "It was one of my greatest hopes to see a conference held in my country. Your presence has given me the power of God to go ahead to heal the hatred, fear and bitterness in my country."

A lecturer at the Teacher Training Institute spoke of the generation gap and its causes. "Before I met Moral Re-Armament I was full of hatred. I hated the White people because they were different and because of a personal fight with an American. The result of hatred is that you get hatred back and violence." I want to apologise to all the White people.

Mr. Pantaj Shaha from Bombay spoke of two Kenya students in India who had met M.R.A. in Bombay University and had done much to bring an answer and help the student leadership in India.

# The long history of catering for man's sweet tooth

**MR. ELIS HORNER**, factory manager at Mukha Tabacco, tells the story of sweet-making. The new factory of Mukha Tabacco in Nairobi goes into production this week and by the end of the year will be making five tons of sugar confectioneries a day. It represents a £200,000 investment by the Mukha Group, which already has interests in Uganda and Tanzania.

Today's vast toothsome array of goodies which puts children — and their elders too — through a delicious agony of choice, is a far cry from the honey-sweetened fittits that were the only confectionary of ancient times.

Before sugar was known, Egyptian confectioners were making and selling confections of honey mixed with chopped fruits and kneaded into pastes, and materials such as liqueur juice, gum arabic and gum tragacanth — still used in modern manufacturing — were known and used by the B.C. sweetmeaters.

In a Roman and Greek introduced manipulative and artistic skill into the trade. At Heracleopolis can be seen the complete equipment of a confectioner's workshop, preserved under the lava flow that engulfed the city.

By A.D. 500, white sugar had been introduced from China into Persia and Arabia — the Persian word for sugar was "kandish," hence "candy" — and reached the Mediterranean countries soon afterwards.

The earliest known record of sugar in England was in 1119 when a shipment was received in London in exchange for wool.

Still an expensive luxury (King John of France, imprisoned in England after Poitiers, possessed a silver gilt casket or bomboniere for sucre cotee vermeil) sugar was sold in increasing quantities towards the end of the century.

Medieval cookery books bear recipes for preserved Chinese ginger and candied orange peel.

In the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries continental confectioners developed many new sweetmeats. Cocoa, initially used as drinking chocolate, was imported into Europe and by the end of the sixteenth century, with the introduction of sweetened condensed milk, milk chocolate in solid form was evolved.

The end of the century also saw the development of toffee and caramels.

Today's more sophisticated sweets and toffees — the products of complicated processes and involved research — are as far removed from

the sweets of my childhood as the motor car is from the horse-drawn buggy.

My first job at the age of 15 was with a small manufacturing confectioner in the North of England — as an apprentice sugar boiler.

It was a hot and tiring job. The sugar syrup was boiled over gas or coke fires. Most processes were by hand and considerable skill — obtained by harsh word of mouth from tough Lancashire confectioners — was necessary to make the most common ingredients of sugar, corn syrup and flavoured into a toffee of the right flavour and consistency.

It had a viewless quality — popular in a large working class market — and had the desirable characteristic of "lasting a long time" in the most active mouths. With the addition of milk and butter a more satisfactory confection was achieved.

Making an attractive product, with the correct colour and flavour took a great deal of experience at the cost of many burns and a few mistakes — although the addition of unscheduled mixtures of flavours sometimes produced interesting if unsuitable results.

Most boiled sweets — at three ounces for a penny — were delivered unwrapped to shops in 4lb. bars. Quick sale was imperative.

Who of my generation does not remember a shopkeeper stabbing into the bottom of a bar to separate a gooey mass of mints or fruit drops? And at great risk to the glass.

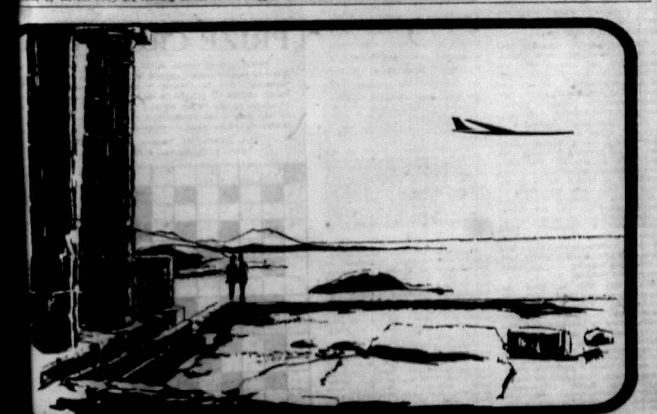
Wrapping of toffees was done by hand, and even at a piece-work rate of a farthing a pound this put them into the quality sales class. The introduction of steam-heated pans to cook ingredients in large quantities improved standards and control — with fewer variations in consistency caused by misjudgments of the heat applied.

Judging the readiness of toffee was still done by dipping a brass rod into the mixture and cracking the cool coating — much as the housewife tests taffeta made in the lichen.

Wrapping by machinery became more economic than employing piecework labour. But only the

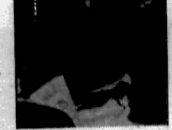

"I hope it's not after my eggs," cried Sally. She flew as quickly as she could towards her nest.

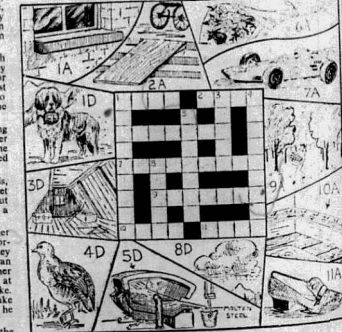

BOOK REVIEWS

Comprehensive guide to East African orchids

Fast African orchids have attracted a great deal of interest around the world recently and although they cannot be said to be as spectacular as many of the better-known species originating overseas, they include many unusual and attractive species that merit the attention of the keen orchid grower.

Dr. Frank Price has studied and cultivated East African orchids for the past 20 years and his knowledge on the subject is reflected in his first book on the subject in 1959 and only a limited number were on sale in Nairobi. This second edition is not a reprint but a new and more enlarged version containing descriptions of over 250 species of orchid, with 128 photographs, including two coloured plates.

The dedication with which author and the care taken to provide accurate and up-to-date information, and all things considered, I do not feel the publisher has done justice to this great work. Its cover, though attractive, should have been more durable. The paper jacket instead of the soft laminated one is another objection that the blue orchid shown on the front is not an East African one, and the beautiful illustration of the orchid (Ansellia) does not show the most interesting of the indigenous varieties, which would have been much more appropriate.

With hundreds of tourists passing through East Africa, at least half of whom are interested in East African flora as well as in the orchid, it would have been in the interest of the publishers to have included in the book, which could then have been sold in all the major airports, a list of all the orchid growers in East Africa, as well as bookshops of Nairobi. However, this is still a valuable book and one which all those interested in East African orchids should have in their libraries. It is a most comprehensive and up-to-date book on the subject of East African orchids.

ORCHIDS OF EAST AFRICA

by Frank Price, M.D., F.L.S. Published by Verlag Von J. Cramer 1969.

By Dr. Price in 1961 (unpublished) and Mrs. J. K. Burrows in May 1967. There is a fear, expressed in the author's preface that East African orchids are in danger of being their natural homes with the onslaught of development.

The indigenous forests are dwindling rapidly, and the epiphytic species that grow in trees disappear with them. Re-afforestation does not compensate for the loss as it replaces the destroyed hardwood forests with exotic softwoods.

These may eventually supply wood for paper, but they will never offer congenial homes to orchids. The need for increased agricultural production brings wide stretches of land under the plough, which eventually destroys the deserts of trees and shrubs and orchids.

As a consequence, many ground orchids also face extinction. Orchids, like "manx" ferns, are an integral part of Africa's wonderful natural heritage.

It is not unlikely that any safari operator will take an orchid in the preparation of rare plants, but can it be expected that the influence of the orchid societies devoted to the protection of wild life will ever come to their aid.

"Orchids are quiet and inoffensive — a lyrical rather than dramatic quality — but they are over-preserved, predatory animals they do not share the protection of sentimental or sensational literary treatment and have to survive on their own merits."

A new and imminent threat to the orchids of East Africa is the increasing number of collectors who are not only interested in the orchids but also in the plants that surround them, and some of the orchids are being almost wiped out.

Epiphytic orchids are usually found in trees in which they are lodged and seem to prefer to cling to the trunks of trees. Some varieties have marked idiosyncrasies regarding their hosts.

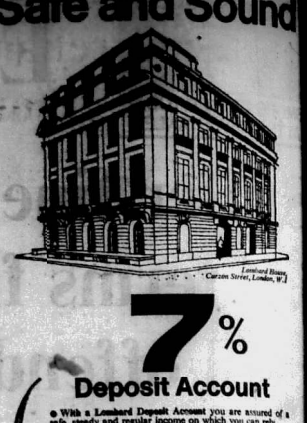

# Mr. Nixon's peace plan

President Nixon's eight-point plan for Vietnam was given a cool reception by the South Vietnamese National Liberation Front delegation at the Paris peace talks yesterday.

The delegation, which recalled that it had "already rejected" the plan, said in a statement that show goodwill after an overall session advanced by the NLF had won a favourable reaction from the public.

The statement referred only to the mutual withdrawal and not to other parts of the plan.

President Nixon's proposal for a staged withdrawal and an intermediate ceasefire were criticised in a television broadcast on Wednesday night.

His proposals also called for

internationally supervised free elections to determine the political future of South Vietnam, the most possible release of prisoners of war and a return to the Geneva accords which ended the Indochina war in 1954.

The President, making his first full report to the American people on the situation, made it clear that North Vietnamese troops were included in his definition of "non-Vietnamese forces" and that his troops in Laos and Cambodia must also be pulled out.

Mr. Nixon described the peace programme, which he introduced, as generous in its terms.

He declared that the terms were not offered on a take it or leave it basis but he hinted that he might be compelled to take other steps if the Communists spurned his peace efforts and permitted the war to continue.

The President's eight-point plan,

which has been endorsed by President Nguyen van Thieu of South Vietnam, was:

1. As soon as an agreement could be reached, all non-South Vietnamese troops would be withdrawn from South Vietnam.
2. Over a period of 12 months, by agreement, would be major portions of all U.S., Allied, and Communist non-Vietnamese forces would be withdrawn. At the end of the 12-month period, the remaining U.S., Allied and other non-Vietnamese forces would move into designated combat operations.
3. The remaining U.S. and Allied forces would move to complete their withdrawals as the remaining North Vietnamese forces were withdrawn and returned to North Vietnam.
4. An international supervisory body, acceptable to both sides, would be created for the purpose of verifying withdrawals and for agreed purposes agreed upon between the two sides.
5. This international body would begin operating in accordance with agreed timetable and would participate in arranging supervisory ceasefires.
6. As soon as possible after the international body was functioning, elections would be held under agreed procedures and under the supervision of the international body.
7. Arrangements would be made for the earliest possible release of prisoners of war on both sides.
8. All parties would agree to observe the Geneva accords of 1954 regarding Vietnam and Cambodia and the Laos accords of 1962.

# ITALY ON BRINK OF MAJOR CRISIS

All but one member of the Italian Socialist Party (P.S.I) leadership resigned on Wednesday leaving the nation on the brink of a crisis in its three-pronged coalition government.

The resignation was led by the extreme-left Riccardo Lombardi.

The resignation came as the P.S.I opened a 121-member central committee meeting in Rome today to examine discussions within the party.

They created a serious threat to the unity and stability of the Socialist, Christian Democrat and Republican Government.

This threat was underlined by the fact that representatives of the various factions showed no sign of yielding points to each other.

The resignation of Lombardi, the party leadership with the exception of Mr. Lombardi, was due daily to the press.

or not to accept overtures from the Italian Communist Party posing collaboration with the socialist government.

This was clear from the resignation statement by the secretary-general, Mr. Massimo Terzi, who told the committee that his own and his colleagues' resignation of the Communist's approach was not changing and that the approaches should be daily rejected.

The centre-left constituted the only viable governing formation.

Basically, the party leadership resigned as at threatened to earlier this week - in protest at attacks from the increasingly powerful right wing.

The resignation was led by the Deputy Premier, Mr. Giuseppe De Michelis, Minister of Public Works, Mr. Giuseppe Marini, and the former Budget Minister, Mr. Antonio Giolitti.

# Presidential race in France at its peak

Mr. Georges Pompidou and Mr. Alain Poher, men with widely different political styles but similar ambitions for ruling France at the head of a broad centrist coalition, have lined up at the top of a list of nine candidates for the Presidential elections on June 1.

In pre-campaign statements both men styled themselves "animators" who would initiate policy, but govern in close co-operation with Parliament.

The Presidential race, which also includes Socialist Gaston Deferre and Communist Jacques Duclos, major candidates on the left, gets under way officially today.

Mr. Poher, stated that his campaign "would not set forth a detailed programme of Government". Rather, he said, "the election necessarily raises some questions of overall outlook".

Mr. Pompidou said he hoped for a Government based on the "aspirations" of the people and "the broadest possible co-operation with Parliament, and most confident contact with the people".

Mr. Pompidou said a gathering of his backers in Paris that "the new President... will have to use persuasion, he is closer contact with the Deputies have a Government in liaison with the broadest possible co-operation with Parliament, so that the dialogue between Government and the two assemblies of Parliament will be a confidence and a co-operation".

Mr. Pompidou said he would be a spokesman for the Gaullist U.D.R. party, later said Deputies at the gathering "received a blue dossier drafted by the (father's) staff". But he sharply criticised afternoon Press reports that the dossier contained remarks about Mr. Poher.

Mr. Pompidou totally disavowed

the reports, just as he does all personal attacks, the spokesman said.

Discussing the Pompidou and Poher candidacies on Wednesday the Paris evening newspaper *Le Monde* said: "The two leading candidates in the Presidential race strive to show which can outdo the other and vie for the same electorate."

It was also reported that Mr. Poher, who, as President of the Senate, is serving as interim President of the Republic, has named a building belonging to a Paris dairy, for his campaign headquarters.

Expected support for Mr. Gaston Deferre's socialist candidacy appeared a certain certainty when it was announced the Marseilles Mayor would disclose the results of talks with former Premier Pierre Mendes-France while setting forth his campaign platform.

Mr. Mendes-France, widely tipped for the Prime Ministership should Mr. Deferre be elected, has indicated he would support the post only on his own terms. "A Premier Mr. Mendes-France said must answer only to Parliament for his behaviour and not to the President of the Republic."

A steady stream of tourists continued to visit the Harem Cove Hotel Parkville where Gen. De Gaulle is holding his 100-acre residence, though the hotel was believed to be trading and keeping tabs on the French political situation.

Sources close to him indicated the former President was receiving a daily report from France where his former Premier, Guy Poher, is locked in a tight battle for the Presidency with acting President Alain Poher. — AFP

# Heavy ground fighting continues in Vietnam

Vietcong gunners mortared 16 towns and military bases during Wednesday night, killing 31 people and injuring 31 in one centre alone, a military spokesman said in Saigon yesterday.

# More jobs at sea forecast by head of Industrial Court

A good industrial relation is a prerequisite for the employment of merchant seamen, the president of the Industrial Court, Mr. Sared Cocker, said today when he announced more jobs and allowances for seamen.

He was giving an award in a dispute between the National East African Seafarers' Union and the Shipping Agents' Group.

Mr. Cocker awarded a month's pay and a 10% a day increase from January 1, 1963, to be paid in three instalments. He also awarded the wages at present being paid to seamen had to be paid without bringing in question of payment of a bonus allowance.

# New company to import spirits in boot spirits SOLE RIGHTS

A new company, Kenya Wine Agencies Ltd. will from June 1 be the sole importers of wines and spirits into Kenya. This is provided for under an agreement signed yesterday by the executive officer of the Industrial and Commercial Development Corporation, Mr. V. M. Njiru, and Mr. R. V. R. Hoopburn, a director of Mackenzie and Dalgely (Kenya) Ltd. and Jordin Ltd.

Forty-nine per cent of the shares are held by I.C.D.C. and 51 per cent by the Mackenzie and Dalgely Group, including Jordin Ltd. and 251 per cent by Saccose and Speed (E.A.) Ltd.

The object of establishing the new company is to set up an efficient and experienced organisation to import and bottle wines and spirits. It is hoped that the formation of the company will ensure a smooth transition of the distributive network of the industry in Africa.

One effect will be that as from June 1 the sole importers of wholesalers of wines and spirits will cease trading.

The sole importers of spirits will be in the hands of the Kenya Wine Agencies Ltd. and Saccose and Speed (E.A.) Ltd. which will make suitable arrangements to satisfy the demands of the market. It is anticipated that the appointed distributors would establish retail outlets for direct sale to the public.

Supplies of the commodities were continued to be available on all licensed premises, including grocers, and a public house have no restriction or difficulty in obtaining supplies.

Previous importers allowed a lot of credit to their agents and dealers, but the new company would introduce cash terms.

Kenya Wine Agencies Ltd. has been formed as a result of close co-operation between the Ministry of Commerce and Industry and the I.C.D.C. on the one hand and the two shareholding companies on the other.

## Harry Ruddock meets the... Willing pupils at the school for Alsations

Every Saturday at 4 p.m. 50 Alsatian dog lovers meet at the East African Club grounds at the Jamburi Park to accompany their dogs through hour-long training sessions which is to turn out a perfect canine friend and mate.

The members who attend, along with their dogs, belong to the East African Alsatian League which uses the Club's facilities and is open to all.

It is the only Alsatian activity in Nairobi and is a great pleasure to act as a "seeing-eye" dog.

There is not a great demand for the blind in this city, but the Alsatian League's secretary, Mr. David Runyard, said: "It is a full-time job to train them and it would take quite a lot of time."

Runyard went on: "The League was founded in 1948 and we have about 150 members. This

involves about 200 dogs. These Saturday training sessions are broken up into various classes at different stages of a ten-week course."

The beginners' course includes those who come along for the first time and they can go right up to the last course which, if they pass, will allow them to go on to the most advanced forms of training for an Alsatian. This includes tracking.

As the dog moves through the early stages of its training it becomes, if all goes well, a tractable dog. This means that it will walk to heel; if it is told to stay it will stay; if you want it to stop barking visitors you can tell it to go away and wait and it will do so. Some animals will stay in one place if told to do so by the owner, even if the owner goes out of sight.

Is it possible to tell how a dog will shape up at such course at first sight? Mr. Runyard said this was not always possible, especially if the dog was under 12 months. If it is

over 12 months an expert can tell very quickly.

One of the reasons why puppies under 6 months are not taken to stages of having complex which may make it difficult to train. Another reason is that at six months a puppy is still a delicate animal and it is easy to hurt it, both physically and mentally.

Between six months and a year it gets a shell of toughness around it and it can stand up to being trained.

"If the trouble is that we have to teach the handlers or the owners — they are usually one and the same — how to teach their dogs. They make mistakes like everyone else and if the dog is too young they may spoil it," Mr. Runyard said.

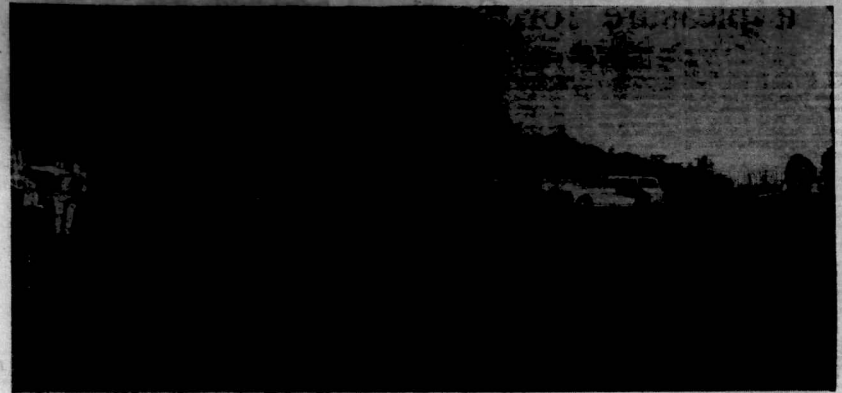
The police take an interest in the course and they have obtained a number of good dogs from members of the league. They judge league trials from time to time.

Police training methods are somewhat different from those employed by the league. They have a specialised line which is not duplicated to any great extent by the league although aspects of it are touched upon.

"A police dog," Mr. Runyard explained, "may be capable of going out at the age of eight months and catching a criminal whereas we would not expect any of our dogs to do that. It is quite a dangerous thing to send off a dog to bring down a criminal unless you are reasonably sure that you can handle it and can stop him if he goes for the wrong person."

One of the essentials of training a dog of an Alsatian's temperament is to get it familiar with the presence of other dogs. This is called socialisation and forms an important part of the course. Until they stop fighting or bickering among themselves the course cannot move along.

The key to all training is praise; praise for even a small and simple jump executed well. Dog handlers spend half their time saying "good boy" and patting the lively dogs on the neck. Coupled with words of praise is the choke chain which is another important training device. The slight and harmless tug given

an Alsatian, but for which no pedigree can be produced.

As long as these requirements are fulfilled there should be no trouble for would-be Alsatian League members.

The League has been doing very well in shows. The most recent one took place two weeks ago and was presided over by a German judge, Herr Alfred Hahn, who has been breeding Alsations since 1924. His work for the breed was finally recognised last year when his kennel won the Progeny Class at the German Sieger show, considered the highest award in the world for German shepherd dogs.

The Best of Breed at the last show went to a two-year-old dog bred in Ireland, Altonha's Hardian of Brittas, owned by Major and Mrs. J. E. Ludlow of Uganda.

The dogs compete in obedience tests, Kennel Club shows and the League's own events. In the last show there were 40 dogs in the ring. The League presents its own prizes, usually cups with a miniature. Other items are often donated as prizes by well-wishers and interested parties.

# Work in snake pits is a pleasure for Sanda

Flocking ticks off a python in all in a day's work for the new assistant curator at the Nairobi Snake Park. Miss Sanda Swain began her job as assistant to Mr. James Ashe, the Snake Park's curator, last month. At 24, she is already widely experienced in tending snakes.

A girl herpetologist? Sanda sees nothing odd in it at all. "I've always been interested in snakes, have worked with them for years — and it's something I can do that not too many other people can."

Her duties as assistant curator include administration, checking cages daily, seeing if the snakes have eaten and are in good health, and injecting them with vitamins if they are ill.

Knowing if a snake is contented or not comes only from long study of snakes' habits and appetites. Sanda has been studying them since she was a schoolgirl.

Born in Dar es Salaam, where her parents were civil servants, she first became aware of snakes when she was taken to the snake section of what was then the King George V Museum. Although her enthusiasm stretched to animals in general it gradually narrowed down to snakes. In her spare time she became a volunteer worker at the museum.

Meeting the late Mr. C. J. F. Lookes, the herpetologist, increased her fascination with snakes — and her knowledge of them.

"You can only learn about snakes from practical experience," she says. "There's no other way. Books and reference works give invaluable scientific information but it doesn't mean much without seeing how the experts work and observing their methods."

Five years ago the Swain family moved to Australia.

Refusing to let distance become a barrier, she corresponded regularly with the experts she admired.

One of them was Mr. James Ashe. Maintaining contact and exchanging information with herpetologists around the world is an important aspect of his work.

After three years of Australia Sanda felt she had to return to East Africa and applied to Mr. Ashe for a job. Though he badly wanted an assistant at the snake park the park's finances could not then support extra staff.

Sanda returned to Kenya anyway and found work at the Tigoni Primate Research Centre.

She brought a present for Mr. Ashe. Cleo, a gorgeously patterned carpet python indigenous to Australia she had had as a pet.

Cleo, says Mr. Ashe, "has a wonderful nature." Although snakes do not as a rule — and unlike mammals — show any interest or affection for humans, Cleo quite happily coils himself around Sanda's face and gently nuzzles her body.

Snakes are timid creatures unless provoked. The main pit at the museum's snake park is inhabited by numerous reptiles, several of them boomslangs whose bite can be fatal.

In this pit at the public "milking"

session each week (Wednesday, 7 p.m.) Sanda provides a headquarter with her back to the basket in which the snakes are hidden. She knows that snakes also hibernates during the snake pit but her husband Mr. Ashe tries their changes with various reptiles. With poisonous snakes they cannot afford to make a slight mistake.

Sanda has never been bitten by a poisonous snake and Mr. Ashe only a couple of times — and those bites fortunately were slight. He says, "and required no attention."

Now that he has a capable assistant, Mr. Ashe hopes to be able to give more time to scientific work — he is already the author of authoritative papers including one on a new Bush Viper he recently identified and named.

The Snake Park exists on its modest entry fees and the occasional private donation, but he has plans for enlarging the park and increasing the scope of its work.

Hopes of sending the handicapped Kenya archer Simon Mwangi to the Paralympic Games in Britain in July are mounting as more money is donated following my appeal in this column on Tuesday.

On that day I announced that £41 had been raised towards the cost of sending Simon, a patient at the Aman-Cheshire Home in Nairobi, to represent Kenya to Stoke Mandeville where the games are to be held from July 28 to August 2.

Yesterday the matron at the home, Mrs. Margaret Adlam, told me that Simon has since received a new bow and a quiver of 12 arrows from Mrs. Stanley Sprotman, a lecturer at University College, Nairobi, while Mrs. Dorothy Morrill has collected £10 12s. in the city. A further £10 has been donated by Mrs. H. Travis and an anonymous donor has given £5.

Mrs. Morrill struck on a unique collecting method, the matron told me. She went round Nairobi with a receipt book collecting small donations from waiters, street sweepers and others, who were happy to make their humble contribution to the fund.

The fund now stands at 866 12s. and Mrs. Morrill intends collecting a lot more by the same method while she and her husband, Col. P. H. Morrill, are in Mombasa.

## Safety the selling point

The steady increase in vehicles throughout the world has inevitably led to a growing number of accidents. Consequently designers are concentrating on the safety aspect of automobile engineering and publicity material lays more and more emphasis on safety features of cars.

In Britain a team of engineers and doctors, headed by Dr. David Foster, a consultant to the motor industry, has spent some three years investigating ways of making cars safer.

The major long-term development suggested by the team is a car with a separate capsule for the occupants which will be linked to the chassis by hydraulic shock absorbers.

Dr. Foster maintains that the increased use of foam padding in the passenger compartment of cars will reduce crash injuries substantially.

It is suggested that three-inch thick foam padding fixed at various vital points in a car would be heavily padded with paper for the driver to smash his head against and read the instruments.

The rear portion of the front seat should be mounted and padded in order to minimize the damage to rear seat passengers. The sides and roof of cars should be extensively padded and the heels of seats should have fixed head rears to support the necks of the occupants.

It is envisaged that the padding will be made of three layers. The outer layer will be water repellent, the middle layer will be somewhat firmer in order to spread the impact. The third layer is designed to absorb the main energy of the impact. As a result the padding will also serve as a sound deadener.

The new Jaguar XJ6 is reckoned to be one of the safest cars produced in Britain at the present time. During tests to determine the XJ6's ability to meet the American safety standards, this car won the Don Safety Trophy in 1969. This award is presented by the manufacturers of Don Safety Brake, disc brake pads, and clutch facings to the car which is judged to be the safest in Britain.

Part of the test subjected the Jaguar XJ6 to a head-on 30 m.p.h. crash into a concrete wall. On inspection it was found that the driver's seating and head rears had functionally even one inch (2.5 centimetres) above up to five inches.

All the windows remained intact and the doors did not fall apart. Subsequently it was shown that the doors could be opened and closed without any difficulty.

The Ford Capri has created a favourable impression in London since its introduction two months ago. The handbook which is prepared for this handbook which is prepared with a number of pictures and diagrams is now available in Kenya. It is a very useful guide for the Capri car owner.

# This fan club does more than listen

If you are one of the few people who take the trouble to go to the Mathari Valley and see the conditions of poverty and squalor there, you are likely to find a group of young people, who in their small way are doing something to improve matters.

These young people are members of the Rolling Stones Fan Club, a group that has expanded from small beginnings until it now covers almost everything that young people like — and ought — to do.

The inspiration behind this progressive body is a diminutive 18-year-old student at University College Nairobi, whose sheer politeness hides the fact that he is a veritable dynamo when it comes to organisation.

John Nienga told me something

about the history of the club which was started in 1963 by some Asians when the Rolling Stones were at the peak of their fame.

But musical fashions change, and as they did, so did the interests of the club, until like so many others it was swamped by the influence of Soul.

But the group also expanded to other activities outside the field of music, until today members are just as likely to be camping for the weekend at Longmont as organising concerts for local people in Nairobi and up-country. "We simply like to have fun, the way kids do," said John.

The group has a weekly meeting at the K.A.P. Labour Camp Hall at Eastleigh, and holds regular dances at Kanganji Social Hall, Kabete, and Kamiba Social Hall.

Members also take part in sports (John is a former Kenya cycling champion) such as football, basketball, tennis, boxing and swimming, and on some of their camping weekends, which may attract as many as 40 members, members who can play musical instruments will form an impromptu band to enter-

tain people living in the neighbourhood.

John is particularly proud of the way the club works, particularly in helping poor people and organising concerts. "People have said that we couldn't do it — but we are showing them they are wrong," he said.

The trips to Mathari Valley, where most of the charitable efforts have been concentrated so far, are particularly appreciated. Members have already built several substantial houses for the people there.

All this springs from a group of teenagers between the ages of 14 and 18, most of them still at school. The secretary, Mr. Mike Weverka, has just left Jamhuri School, and the treasurer, Miss Rosemary Wasijaku, attends Bahati Secondary School.

Membership of the club is 200, but it has a following of up to a thousand, particularly on gala occasions.

The group is expecting a record attendance at the Soul Beat contest. The last one was won by the Air Force, resident band at the Starlight Nightclub, but the next one has been organised so that

experienced bands will stand a better chance.

Entries have already been received from a band in Zambia, two from Dar es Salaam, three from Mombasa, three from Nakuru, two from Nyasa, one from Machakos and one from Limuru, as well as several entries from Nairobi. In addition, there will be the usual Miss Soul contest.

What do they plan to do about that name, which today has become inappropriate. "We intend to announce a change to The Musical Fan Club of East Africa on the night," said John.

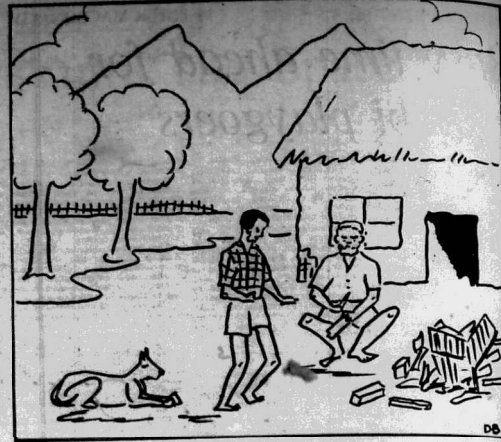

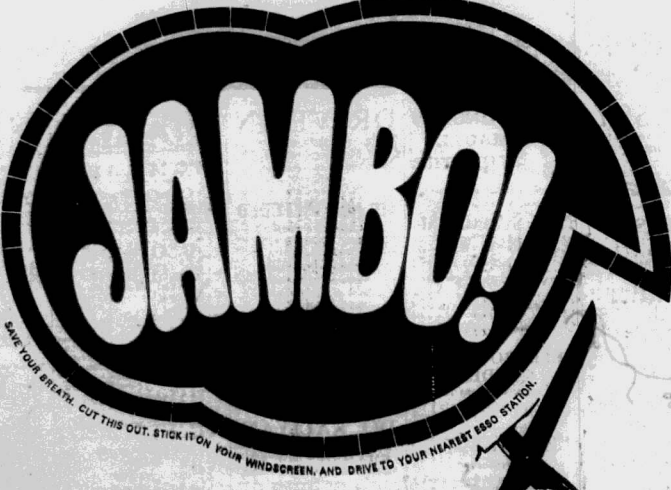

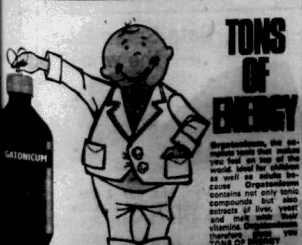

## African tea exports not to be curtailed

African tea exports and production programmes for which funds have already been allocated will not be curtailed under the proposed international agreement, according to trade representatives.

**Association of Rhodesian Industries** yesterday came out against the introduction of a new constitution "at this point of time."

In a statement on the Government's White Paper published on Wednesday, Mr. Alfred T. Owen, secretary, who said that the Rhodesian industrialists, who are not yet fully organized, shared the desire to ensure that Rhodesia has the best possible chance for economic growth.

"From such standpoint A.R.I. is unconvinced of the urgent necessity to introduce a new constitution at this point of time."

But he said A.R.I. would welcome the proposal, if they ensured the maintenance of stable government and the development of conditions in which the country's two main races could live in harmony—advantages which the Premier, Mr. Smith, had claimed for them.

"There was nothing to suggest that transition to a republic would significantly alter the stand taken by the United Nations, or the atti-

ties of various governments in the Rhodesian area."

Mr. Owen said he was confident that the Rhodesian industrialists would support a new constitution which would ensure that Rhodesia has the best possible chance for economic growth.

In an editorial the *Rhodesian Times* said that the proposed new constitution "is not a step as long as Africans are not given the right to vote in general elections when they are possible and when they will be possible."

Foreign reaction in Africa was welcomed but bitter. Zambia's Foreign Minister, Mr. Mulenga, called on Rhodesian liberation fighters to intensify their "struggle against the Zambian Government. The proposal came as no surprise to the Zambian Government, which had always considered Mr. Smith to be a racist, he said. Mr. Smith must be "absolutely naive if he thinks he can in any way succeed in stopping the Zambians from fighting for their freedom."

The National Union of Ghana Students called on the students and people of Rhodesia to rise up and overthrow the regime and pledge its support for action by Rhodesians.

### Biggest Saigon arms depot explodes

The largest ammunition depot in the Saigon area began to blow up yesterday, according to a Vietnamese military spokesman announced. The cause of the explosion was not clear, but the Go Vap depot six miles north of Saigon was not hit.

The Government forces appeared to have got the situation under control within half an hour of the first huge explosion, which threw debris and ammunition about a mile into the surrounding countryside.

Authorities were not excluding the possibility that the base was hit by a rocket. All the north-western part of the city, including the Hoc Mon village, north-west of Saigon, were fired from positions that put the attackers within range of the Go Vap depot.

The explosion was followed by lightning rocks and mortar bombs during the night, according to an American spokesman.

Ban Me Thuot air base, near the Central Highlands, was also hit by 40 mortar bombs, causing light casualties and slight damage to the base.

American sources reported that South Vietnamese Rangers killed 12 Vietcong in action to the south of Da Nang on Wednesday. A further 40 Vietcong were killed in a battle near Vinh Loc in both cases. South Vietnamese forces have been fighting since August 1965.

The Americans claimed to have killed 2,125 Vietcong in the area, who attempted to infiltrate their position to the north-east of Da Nang early on Wednesday. Dakotas, helicopters and artillery went into action during the three-hour battle.

American war planes also attacked North Vietnamese and Vietcong stepped up their war to mark the arrival on May 19 of North Vietnamese President, Ho Chi Minh.

The U.S. Military Command also said yesterday that 2,125 Vietcong were killed in the previous week ending May 17. This compared with 1,224 on the previous week.

South Vietnamese and Vietcong dead totalled 5,686, compared with 1,008 in the previous week.

Yesterday's fighting was described as the U.S. forces' most successful since they passed the 300,000 mark since the start of the war.

East African Airways has been under fire during the current meeting of the Legislative Assembly and, in turn, been defended against the various criticisms. The efficiency and profitability of the Corporation—a tri-national airline—are matters of prime concern to the participating countries, not only because internal and international communications are so important, but from the prestige point of view.

The Secretary-General of the East African Community, Mr. Bignirewsky, was right in pointing out that E.A.A. is one of the few air routes consistently making a profit. Also, it has the most profitable route in the world, from Nairobi to London.

As regards profitability, the cost of the recent inaugural flight to Hong Kong was criticised in the Legislative Assembly. Subsequently, the Director-General, Mr. Bignirewsky, said inaugural flights are a recognised commercial practice in the aviation industry and this particular one was not the first arranged by E.A.A.

This is correct, and it is equally true to say there is not much to be gained from opening up a new route unless the public is told about the service.

Where criticism seems to be directed at the cost of the party flown to Hong Kong and the cost of their hotel bills for seven days and nights, it is right that so large a group having been invited, recourse had to be made to seats in two Air-India aircraft to accommodate the overflow from the Super VC10?

Not a statement should be issued which will dispel rumours, if so, the outlay was obviously extravagant.

The total cost of this inaugural flight may be regarded as money well spent for publicity purposes. What generally pass unremarked, while instances of the opposite kind provoke annoyance and complaint in the E.A.A. are praised here and now for the excellent service maintained by all passengers.

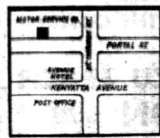

# the man who turns people on

The visit of Buddy Guy to Kenya was the first by a top singing artist for some time — should provide a welcome boost for local soul and blues enthusiasts, especially for those singers who have been so successful in interpreting soul numbers.

With this in mind, no doubt, one of Buddy Guy's first engagements will be a reception at which he will meet such well-known local exponents as the Blue Belugas of the Air Fiesta and Gregory of the Sombro.

They will be able to get some idea of the feeling and technique which has led some people to claim that he is the greatest of the new exponents of blues music.

Buddy, with his five-piece accompaniment, will be giving concerts in Nairobi and Mombasa, as announced in last Friday's John Elgon Column, before proceeding to Uganda to complete an African "pilgrimage" which has taken him to Kinshasa, Blantyre, Lusaka, Tananarive, Port Louis and Mauritius.

Whenever he has gone, he has had an enthusiastic reception, especially at Dar es Salaam where he was forced by audience demand to give a two-hour encore, and he is reported to be deeply moved by the experience.

The other members of Buddy Guy's ensemble, A. C. Reid and Bobby Fields, on sax, Glenn Martin on drums and Jack Myers on bass, are also accomplished musicians, and a feature of their style is the way they "turn people on" with their athletic movements on stage to match the music.

But anyone who thinks that because of this the music must be superficial is mistaken, according to reviews I have received from such influential publications as *Newsworld* and *Record World*.

*Newsworld* wrote: "He plays notes from his guitar in runs too fast to hear, and comes to a stop only in a sudden change of pace but he sustains one slow, ringing nerve end of a note after another."

Logic says that their rivals, Associated Television, would make far better use of the company, — very much to the Beatles' benefit — but there seem to be few rational explanations in business affairs.

No one knows just how rich these four young men are, but one thing is certain: their net worth (which has disappeared in tax and surtax raids, high earners have to find some way of converting income into capital, and some way of converting the capital into cash.)

The way this has been done in England up to now — and the Chancellor of the Exchequer has promised in his latest budget to put an end to it — has been for the artist to sell his services to a music company in return for some of a company's shares.

The only known exception of this type city of the design is the Beatles, who own Northern Songs.

The shares owned by John Lennon and Paul McCartney in Northern Songs are worth £1,200,000 and £1,000,000 and together represent nearly 29 per cent of the company — a rather good base for fighting a defensive takeover battle.

Acquiring control by buying shares at the market price does not bring them any financial gain and to the reason for wanting control must be found elsewhere. But where?

The company simply collects the royalties from the music, whenever it is played by the Beatles or anyone else, and from the sales of sheet music.

Artistic control does not enter into it: once the song has been written, it can be played and sung by anyone, and the money rolls into the Northern Songs kitty.

Perhaps the answer is simply that the Beatles would just like the money to roll into the Apple Corps kitty — and perhaps too they are enjoying the "free money" of the exploitation of Mary Hopkin by Apple, Apple could do a better job.

As the directors of Northern Songs are two of the oldest pros in the business, this appears unlikely.

The Apple Corporation is the heart of the matter. It was started because the Beatles felt they had been "robbed" of their money, and enough by their record companies, agents, accountants, and gray men from the city in grey flannel suits.

They wanted all their diverse sources of income under one roof under their own control, so that they could apply it to their own initiative and creative abilities.

The Apple headquarters is in a lovely building in Savile Row, near Piccadilly, and has a unique atmosphere, which has been called "controlled wordiness".

## Forsake town comforts to aid nation says teacher

Young African women graduates faced a great challenge in the task of nation building and should be ready to share the task with African male graduates, said Miss Joyce Mmenne, a graduate teacher on the staff of Kaimosi Girls' High School in the Kakamega District of Kenya's Western Province.

Women graduates should not avoid accepting work in the rural areas because they wanted an easier life in the towns.

Miss Mmenne said there was a certain amount of noise directed against educated African women in rural areas and such women, small in numbers though they are, should do everything they could to rebut allegations levelled against them.

While graduate men were serving the country in rural areas in different capacities, such as administrative officials, teachers, specialists and advisers, there was

no reason why African women graduates should not work side by side with them.

Miss Mmenne, a B.A. (General) of Nairobi's Victoria College, feels young women have a greater part to play in the development now taking place all over Kenya.

Educated women, she said, should not desert their people in the rural areas. They must regain the comforts of town life and concentrate on helping their unfortunate sisters and mothers who were not tried to create a society in which educated go one way and the illiterate another.

"In this manner we can achieve something that will lift the standard of living among our people to a level which will do more voluntary work at home. Each educated lady should volunteer herself as a social worker and help people during her spare time by offering to teach her illiterate sisters and mothers through established women clubs."

Miss Mmenne commented the work now being done by the Department of Community Development but added: "We shouldn't wait for Government officials to do such and every small job for us. We should start now to help out in the rural areas, though some of us have to do so in unsatisfactory conditions in the rural areas."

Asked about her life as a teacher, Miss Mmenne said: "It is very interesting because there is always some work while work to be done. Sometimes there are problems, especially when one is teaching mature girls as I do.

"There is always one major problem that is many of them always try to resist school rules and regulations. They are at the age which is dangerous and some do not value their studies. However, after time experiences give you the means to cope with them."

"I do enjoy teaching in the interior of the country because, I am totally out of touch with up-to-date social life in the big towns. However I do feel very proud because the part I am now playing is a great contribution to my country's advancement."

"At first I did not like teaching and I thought I would do it just for a short time, but I have now made up my mind to remain a teacher," she said.

Miss Mmenne will have to go back to University College in Nairobi for a year to specialize as a grade one teacher. She is starting her course in September.

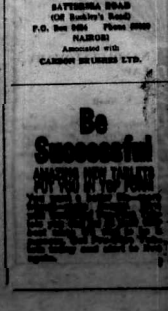

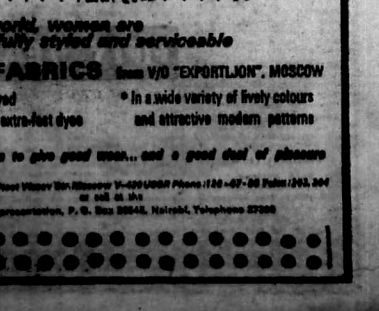
