



Kenya achieves its growth target

Kenya can take pride in the fact that she has managed to achieve an average growth rate of 6.3 per cent, as set out in the current Development Plan, in the period 1964-67 as the Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Mr. Mboya, said yesterday.

The economy in 1968 had been "significantly better than forecast" and the rate of growth of 6.6 per cent had been above average.

Mr. Mboya, who was introducing the annual Economic Survey to the National Assembly, announced that the Government had been successful in creating job opportunities in the urban areas that had been "a long time in coming".

While a great deal of investment funds were being directed towards large off-shore projects in the oil fields, the Government had hoped that some of the funds essentially tied in the banking system would be mobilised to increase production capacity.

Tourism earned £16,400,000 — or 18 per cent of all export income, Colfax which was considerably reduced by Colfax Dairy Disease, earned £12,800,000.

Mr. Mboya said it was apparent from the survey that the Government had been successful in creating job opportunities in the urban areas that had been "a long time in coming".

1968 better than expected for economy

Mr. Mboya said: "I have pleasure in introducing, once again, the annual Economic Survey. As you know, my Ministry prepares a short quarterly Economic Report for publication in September, December and March. For each year, in June, we undertake a detailed annual review of the economy as a whole, and this is presented to Parliament as the Minister for Finance on June 19.

"This annual work-backing of the economy as a whole is important because it not only does it put the Budget Statement in the right economic perspective, but it affords also an opportunity to assess objectively the successes and the failures of the economy in the previous year and to provide a forecast of trends in the coming year."

The Minister said he would comment personally on the substance of the Survey, but before doing so stressed this year's Economic Survey.

"However, because of falls in a number of export prices, gross domestic product at current prices increased by a lesser amount of 5.7 per cent. The consequence of this improved performance in 1967 is that we have met our target in some price in the fact that over the period 1964-67 we achieved the average rate of growth set out in the Development Plan 1964-70 — 6.3 per cent."

"But, while we can take pride in this achievement, it is my view that we can improve on it yet and, in fact, we have done so."

The new Development Plan moving into its final drafting stages would aim at a faster rate of growth than that achieved in the period 1964-67.

The Minister said the forecast for 1968 was that the overall rate of growth might be nearly as good as in 1967, but that there would be uncertainties, particularly with regard to the food and draft animals trade, and the level of world prices for the main export commodities.

"The level of world trade in 1968 had held up better than expected, and, in fact, it was 10 per cent above the target."

Kenya extends sea limits to 12 miles

President Kenyatta has issued a proclamation declaring that Kenya's territorial waters will extend for 12 miles from the coast.

The proclamation, published in the Kenya Gazette, also declares that the waters of Kenya's territorial waters will be half-way between the coast and the 12-mile limit.

The President pointed out that international law on the question of territorial waters and so it had become necessary to make the proclamation.

Special arrangements are made for the Puma Channel so that the limit will be half-way between Kenya and Tanzania territory in places where the channel is less than 24 miles across.

In recent years several countries have extended the limits of their territorial waters from three to 12 miles.

Kenya expects to spend £5.6m. more this year

Kenya expects to spend £67,000,800 in the year 1969/70, an increase of £5,600,000 over the estimate for the previous year. The development estimates provide for expenditure of about £29,300,000, a rise of just over £2,000,000.

These figures were disclosed when the Minister of Education, Mr. J. M. Kenyatta, was speaking at the National Assembly yesterday.

The biggest item in the additional expenditure is for the Ministry of Local Government, whose estimate rises by more than £1,400,000 to £15,600,000.

Another big increase is in the Ministry of Education, which rises by £700,000 to £8,743,700. The main factor in this rise is £14,000,000 to be allocated to the opening of 15 secondary forms.

Two parts-Communist parties — those of Spain and Switzerland — have joined the Italian and Australian parties in a new criticism of the Warsaw Pact intervention in Czechoslovakia.

This was disclosed yesterday in the official account of the last three sessions of the summit.

At the same time the Russian party organ Pravda yesterday praised the Czechoslovakian leader, Dr. Gustav Husak, for his proposal that the summit should be held in Prague.

The last Prague declaration has already suggested the summit pass a resolution condemning Peking for its stand and abuse of the Soviet Union and other Communist countries.

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90,000 domestic workers to strike

Nearly 90,000 workers in hotels, restaurants, schools, hospitals and private homes in Kenya are to be called out on strike on Monday.

The down-trodden order is being called by the Domestic and Allied Workers' Union with the full support of COTU.

At a Press conference in Nairobi yesterday, the deputy general secretary of Cots. Mr. James Chagya, while giving the organization's support, voiced the hope that the Ministry of Labour would take steps to avert it.

The strike is being called by the union to support the cause of 60 members employed in six schools who were on strike when the Ministry of Education refused to negotiate with the union.

Mr. Mboya said that the Ministry of Labour had been informed of the intention to call out 90,000 domestic workers in support of the 60 school teachers.

Mr. Chagya, in a prepared statement, which had apparently been written by him, said that Kenya has had a number of strikes and threats of strikes over the past few months which had been caused by fairly minor disputes.

"We are facing a situation where employers are becoming very tough and unyielding," he said. "The minor disputes in industries which have not been settled, having been referred to the Ministry, we just do not know why this is happening."

Mr. Chagya said that the Ministry of Labour would be called on to support the 60 school teachers.

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Surplus of maize last year in Machakos District

The District Commissioner for Machakos, Mr. W. Mwangi, said that there were more than 1,190 tons of maize in the district in 1968 — more than had been cultivated. Of these, 116,000 tons were of Katumani maize.

The D.C., who was addressing a farmers' field day at Kambi ya Mawo research station, said the response the people in the district gave to advice from Government agricultural experts was so encouraging that the chronic famine which used to be in the district had been alleviated.

Field days were important, he said, because they gave farmers a chance to see the results of the Government's research and to learn from the experience of other farmers.

Mr. Mwangi said that the Government was now planning to increase the production of maize in the district by 25 per cent in 1969.

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Wright to settle in grazing area says Mr. Mahihu

The Eastern P.C., Mr. E. M. Mahihu, told a meeting of Meru County Council that there were many disadvantages in the use of the northern grazing area as a settlement scheme.

He recalled that in 1964, when he was District Commissioner for Meru, the technical advisers of the Ministry of Agriculture had advised against any settlement in the area. The Meru District Agricultural Committee had also opposed the move, as it was considered that the

land was not suitable for cultivation. Mr. Mahihu said other problems which made the area unsuitable for living were a lack of water, health facilities and schools, and poor communications.

He warned that people who settled in the area would be faced with a certain amount of risk and, sooner or later, might approach the authorities for famine relief measures if they failed to produce enough food to keep them going.

His role, and that of other civil servants, was to advise or seek expert advice that would be necessary to guide the council on its deliberations. If this was ignored no blame would be accepted by the provincial administration or the Department of Agriculture if anything went wrong later.

Mr. Mahihu said artificial insemination was also not economic since it was not possible to produce high-grade cattle.

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Emergency in Segega averts strike threat

A state of emergency declared in Segega by President Leopold Senghor, has averted a general strike which was due to start at midnight on Wednesday.

The Minister of the Interior, Mr. Mamadou Diaw, said that under the terms of the emergency all gatherings and processions in the streets were forbidden as well as public or private meetings, both morning and evening at strike pickets.

The President's action brought about a temporary stalemate in the bog and bitter struggle between workers, students and officials in the West African state.

The National Union of Segega Workers called the strike on Tuesday night after Government sanctions against striking teachers.

The union declared there was an serious proposal of negotiations with the Government and decided on a 48-hour general strike throughout the country.

A general strike order was followed by a radio broadcast by the President.

Mr. Diaw said the situation brought about by the state of emergency and the impossibility of holding regular union proceedings, had prompted the proclamation.

Another union, the Segega Progressives' Union, led by the National Assembly, called for a general strike against "imperialist and neo-colonialist."

It attacked politically motivated union leaders and claimed they were creating an atmosphere of permanent agitation in the country.

British M.P.s debate Bill on Tanzanians

A British Minister, Mr. Maurice Foley, praised President Nyerere as one of the most outstanding leaders in Africa and the Commonwealth.

He also claimed there had been a warming of relations between Tanzania and Britain in the last few months and paid tribute to Tanzania's Arusha Declaration of 1967 on social and economic development as a fine example to other states in Africa.

Mr. Foley, Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, was speaking in a House of Commons debate on a Bill giving Tanzanians the status of British subjects and Commonwealth citizens.

The Bill, which will bring Tanzania into line with other Commonwealth nations on this citizenship issue, amends a previous law which related to Tanganyika and Zanzibar, now merged into the United Kingdom.

The Bill was approved in principle without a vote and must pass through other parliamentary stages before becoming law.

Earlier a Conservative, Mr. E. Griffiths, had recalled that Tanzania had resumed diplomatic relations with Britain last year after a break of nearly three years over Rhodesia.

He hoped Africa would all Dr. Nyerere and his Government that

the advantage of remaining in the Commonwealth could not be lost for nothing and that citizens ought to be some broad umbrella of attitude between member countries.

Mr. Griffiths claimed that in recent years Tanzania had voted British property, had also been criticised by Britain and the U.N. and allegedly mistreated British nationals.

He said should indicate to Tanzanians that Commonwealth membership was a divided concept, treatment of one another's citizens and property.

Another Conservative, Mr. Bernard Braine, requested relations between the two nations had been strained over Rhodesia. He also asked whether the British Government considered compensation terms offered by Tanzania to nationalised British firms, mainly banks, were adequate.

The Minister assured M.P.s that so far as the British Government knew there was no evidence that any British protected or British citizens were in prison in Tanzania.

Speaking from the Arusha Declaration banks were nationalised but he was pleased to say that compensation agreements had been concluded to everyone's satisfaction. There were still some outstanding matters relating to the steel industries and insurance.

M. POHER CHANGES TACTICS AND GAINS

France's two Presidential candidates entered the last phase of their campaign yesterday, with Gaullist M. Georges Pompidou maintaining a strong lead over his Centrist rival, M. Alain Poher.

With only two more days of the campaign ahead, the interim President, M. Poher, was continuing his lightning cross-country tour in an effort to make up a 10 per cent gap in the latest popularity poll.

His switch of tactics from portraying an image of calm and reassuring statesman to making more personal attacks on the former Premier appeared to be having some effect.

Wednesday's poll showed that support for M. Poher had risen slightly and M. Pompidou had lost 5 per cent.

But observers feel the gap is too wide, barring any unforeseen last minute twist, for M. Poher to have much chance of winning Sunday's election.

Observers saw his only hope was to make last-minute inroads into the 31 per cent of undecided voters or those who have said they will abstain.

Many of these are Communists, whose party decisions to back neither of the two candidates appeared to hand the election victory to M. Pompidou.

After his disappointing 23 per cent slice of the first-round voting, M. Poher must rally the Left and bid him to counterbalance his rival's massive Gaullist support.

Further encouragement for M. Poher was a call by M. Jacques Duclos, the Communist candidate who automatically dropped out of the running after first-round voting for party militants to supervise Sunday's voting.

This would deter any party members from ignoring the party discipline not to vote.

M. Pompidou is also casting anxious glances at the rising abstention forecasts. He is hoping for a massive turn-out to avoid criticism that he was elected a minority President.

New Vietcong Government lists its programme

The Vietcong's newly proclaimed revolutionary government has pledged to lead the South Vietnamese in defeating the U.S. and make preparations for formation of a coalition government.

Hanoi Radio reported yesterday. It broadcast a 12-point political programme of the provisional revolutionary government reported to have been set up at a congress somewhere in South Vietnam between June 4 and 8.

The programme is dated "South Vietnam, June 10, 1969" and carries the signature of "President" Huynh Tan Phat.

The points are: 1-The Armed Forces and entire population must be directed to unite as one mass in the military and political struggle must be stepped up, the war must be fought to engage in talks on the basis of the National Liberation Front's overall solution and the total and unconditional withdrawal of American troops and foreign troops demanded.

2-The "disgraced colonial regime" set up in South Vietnam by the "U.S. imperialism" must be abolished and the whole structure of the puppet administration overthrown.

3-The Government is prepared to enter into consultation with political forces representing different sections of the population and various tendencies favouring peace, independence, freedom, living abroad, with a view to forming a Provisional Coalition Government that would organise elections for a Constituent Assembly.

4-The people's potential for resistance in all areas must be increased.

5-Broad democratic liberties must be achieved, all acts of repression and racial forbidden, freedom of belief and religion respected.

6-There must be an improvement in the conditions of the workers.

7-Production must be stepped up to supply the N.L.F., increase the people's potential and an agrarian policy must be applied that was in conformity with the concrete conditions of Vietnam.

8-"Slavery and depravity" in the culture and education in the American style must be fought and national and democratic culture and education built up.

9-Army officers and men and police of the Saigon regime who joined the people's ranks after "meritorious acts" must be encouraged and recompensed.

10-The problems faced by the "war of aggression" and the "puppet regime" must be actively resolved.

11-Normal relations between the North and South must be re-established and freedom of movement, correspondence and residence guaranteed—renunciation being carried out step by step on the basis of discussions and agreement between the two zones.

12-A foreign policy of peace and neutrality must be set on foot, good-neighbourly and friendly relations conducted with Cambodia and Laos, diplomatic relations established with all countries regardless of their Government, including the U.S., following the five principles of peaceful co-existence. There must be no participation in any military alliance with foreign countries.

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Three jailed 20 years for brutal assault on couple

Three men were sentenced to 20 years imprisonment and 24 strokes each yesterday when a Mombasa municipal councillor was convicted of a "brutal assault" on a woman and her husband.

The men were Joseph Mutunga, Job Joseph Njoroge and Labol Mwangi, who were arrested between 21 and 25, had been convicted of taking part in an armed robbery at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Porter in Tigoni in January.

They were found guilty of robbing Mr. Porter of £150 and other property worth £311 and of using a panga and a pistol in the attack on the elderly couple.

Mutunga and Mwangi were first offenders. Njoroge had two relevant previous convictions.

Mr. Mira, passing sentence, said that although two of the men were first offenders, "it is the total gravity of their crime that must be considered in assessing their sentences."

Such violent attacks were prevalent in the district and were connected with curbing them. The punishment for robbery with violence had already been announced and the introduction of the death penalty was being considered.

"In this case a husband and wife, both of advanced age, who were practically defenceless against a group of three armed and dangerous panga and pistols were brutally assaulted. I see no justification whatever in any sentence for such criminals."

"They should be removed from a society of law-abiding persons for a sufficient period. This will teach you a lesson and serve as an example to other such criminals."

Insp. F. R. Mugo, who had presided over the trial, told Mr. Mira that the three had taken part in the robbery in a "ruthless and daring manner."

"They had beaten up the couple, stolen their belongings, tied them up and thrown them on a bed, where blankets and carpets were tossed on top of them. I heard these facts, should sentence the accused persons equally ruthlessly."

All three maintained they were innocent although Njoroge admitted receiving the goods, and were reminded of their right of appeal within a fortnight.

"I have no land... now I can only hand over my family to the State," he said.

Mr. Mira said he was satisfied the three had been involved in the robbery and were not just receivers of stolen property from the Porters' home.

increased poaching of leopard. The price of leopard skins has risen sharply in the past few years, evidence of an increasing demand and an encouragement to illegal trading.

Obtaining people in certain countries outside East Africa will, for a small consideration, produce an "official" stamp for poached skins, thus returning to reputable, but he is estimated that several hundred skins travel from East Africa each year in this way, some even returning to reputable, but unsuspecting dealers.

Poaching is becoming a highly

organized business. The gin trap is still probably the most common weapon, although snares and poisons are also used. Game warden responsible for large areas cannot spread their small staffs widely enough to effect satisfactory control.

When they do succeed in laying out poachers by the book, they are often frustrated to find them let off lightly by the courts.

Pressure is building up on African governments to revise and tighten up the movement of cat skins, and to co-operate more fully in smuggling across the borders. Some governments are already

planning legislation on these lines. Abroad, wildlife bodies are trying to bring pressure to bear on the fashion houses. This has been fruit last year in America when two leading houses decided to do no more dealing in spotted cat skins.

Other fashion houses in America and Europe are making closer checks on the sources of their supply.

Many furriers, however, believe that the trade is being blamed for what is not its fault — that it is not for the trade to shut up shop, but for the authorities in the supplying countries to ensure that the supply is controlled.

A leading Nairobi furrier, making its own leopard-skin coats, is a member of the East African Wildlife Society and a supporter of conservation.

A spokesman emphasised that all skins used are legally killed and certified by the Game Department of the country of origin. Most of them came from East Africa or Ethiopia.

"If there is a doubtful skin we never touch it," the spokesman said. The fur trade in Nairobi was a tourist attraction, bringing

in considerable sums in foreign exchange. Local trade was small.

Trying to stop the sale of furs would only be effective if it was done internationally, and there was the serious risk of driving it underground, making poaching even more lucrative than it was at present. The real answer was stricter control.

One of East Africa's largest furriers said that Kenya's laws were sufficiently strict if fully enforced. He dealt only in legitimate skins, brought mainly at Government auctions, and had to make full and complicated returns of the disposal of all skins.

Two things are very much against the leopard. One is that it has always — because of its solitary, nocturnal habits and its adaptability to harsh or changing situations — been regarded as an animal that could look after itself. So it takes time for it to be considered seriously as a candidate for the danger list.

The other is that the ranks of rich and fashionable women are increasing more rapidly than the leopard. It takes five or six skins to make a normal leopard coat — and many more may be rejected in the process — and one international socialite is reputed to have ordered a coat to be made from pieces of 50 different skins.

A preliminary survey of the leopard in Kenya has already been made, and a more detailed survey which it is hoped will give a more exact picture of the relationship between population and killing is expected to be made soon.

at Kenya's most remarkable women is the Kariti Primary Secondary School in the Kavirato Division of Central Province, 17 miles from Thika. It was opened in 1964 and its buildings were simple, constructed on top of a hill. These buildings were erected during the emergency in 1955 as a youth centre, immediately after independence the people of the area, Mr. Taidoo Mwaure, had to convert them into a primary school in order to provide two more secondary places for the area.

lack of funds and other reasons the school was approached in 1966. It was essential to have a committee in running the school, recalls the present principal, Mr. M. M. Adam, who took over at the end of 1966.

"Although the school had opened the third form there were only 14 students in the whole school and there was not even a chair for the principal. The table I was given had such long legs that it was impossible for me to write on it until I had the legs shortened".

The school has now attained a different image and every possibility of making the school a better institution is being carefully studied.

Kariti Harambee Secondary School has already gone a long way towards making itself self-reliant. It experienced many difficulties during its first three years but now has 212 students, 150 of whom are boarders.

It has a double stream in forms one and two and its first students will sit for the East African School Certificate at the end of the year. The principal says that the target is to have three streams throughout, beginning with form one next year.

Mr. Mwaure assured me that the people of the area and himself would give all assistance that I might require.

"At that time, the place looked quite different from what it is today. None of the walls in the classrooms was plastered or washed and the rooms had no ceilings. A teacher teaching in one of the classes was always a distraction to the next one."

He adds that people have shown him the meaning of harambee and have proved to him that where there is a will, there is a way.

"Others who have helped include not have been possible without the assistance of the M.P. and the local people."

Members of the staff have always given outstanding service since, from time to time I have had to go to the school while I went to Nairobi looking for assistance from firms and individuals.

While in Nairobi, he was introduced to Mr. Basit Mauludji who agreed to help by collecting some donations from the Muslim Community, while he himself personally has so far made a contribution of more than \$500.

Others who have helped include Mr. Lakhmani Bharama, Mr. Midhand Khimata, Sir Eboe Pithai and Alibhai Shariq.

The Pakistan High Commissioner, Mr. R. E. Noore, has given support and helped in getting 500 library books as well as trained teachers from Pakistan.

On the idea of getting teachers from Europe because they were expensive and had to look for them from Pakistan and India, adding that the Immigration Department had always helped by issuing work permits.

The school managed to buy its own generator and water pump from Nairobi firm on favourable terms. This the school has succeeded in providing its students with all the necessities.

At the bottom of the hill are the boarders' dormitories. Each child pays \$100 per term for all facilities. Form one students have a separate dormitory but all the students share the dining hall.

Students take their dinner at 6.30 p.m. and after lunch at 7.15 p.m. on that occasion set at 7.15 p.m., they rush to their classrooms in the top of the hill for evening studies up to 9.30 p.m. Thereafter have their quarters ready.

The school is different from any school I have ever seen. Mr. Adam and the English master, Mr. R. E. Noore, have written the English book. An approach to the Government was made by Mr. M. M. Adam, the Vice-Chancellor, Mr. M. M. Adam and the school to speed up its development.

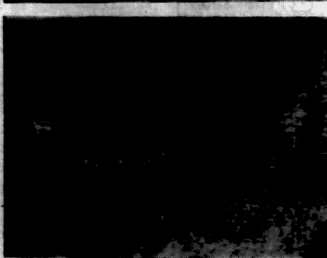

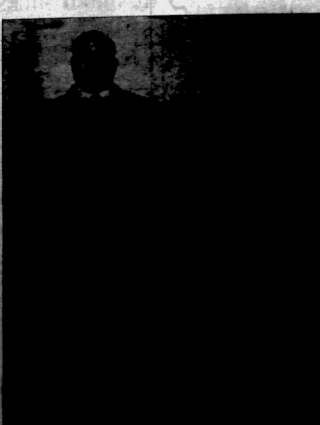

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NARO MORU RIVER LODGE

1-YEARS OF GROWTH

The completion of full-board chalets at the Naro Moru River Lodge, half way between Nanyuki and Nyuri, gives it a full range of accommodation for tourists and rustics of East Africa. This four-page supplement describes how the lodge offers something different in the way of recreation in Kenya.

Mountain gives purpose to a peaceful retreat

The immediate impression of Naro Moru River Lodge is green lawns and rustic timber buildings encompassed by a gurgling trout stream shaded by tall trees.

It is not obvious that there may be something missing until you get up and see Mt. Kenya towering in the distance. It is a scene of peace into which nature has dominantly and peacefully.

The overriding impact of the mountain is appropriate, for it is Kenya, somehow looking so large and impressive from the main road, that provides the main reason for the lodge.

At the foot of the Naro Moru, which is the main road to the Taita Valley and the beyond, the lodge is a complete and well-organized starting point for the climb as well as a peaceful resting place after the climb.

The lodge added five self-help chalets to its full-board accommodation, although there is still more to go before its full potential

is realized, brings it into line with the most modern tourist accommodation in Kenya.

The history of Naro Moru River Lodge starts with a man whose name is perpetuated in Kenya with a lake and two huts on the mountain, Mr. Victor "Rufus" Klarwill.

It was he who in 1950 built the first of the wooden buildings on the site, which is now one of the self-service bandas, and started organizing foot safaris up the mountain.

During this time he also built two huts on the mountain which today bear his name.

When Mr. Klarwill left the country (he is today running a post office in Sussex) the lodge was put up for sale and eventually bought by a Nairobi businessman and a well-known Kenya mountaineer and a former D.O. at Mwea Tabera, Mr. Robert Chambers. Mr. Chambers is now lecturing in political science at Glasgow University, but will pay many visits to Kenya.

The large timber building which

now houses the dining room, bar and office was acquired shortly afterwards along with the plot on which it lies, bringing the total acreage up to 40.

The company, which runs the lodge, was extended in 1967 with the addition of two more directors, Mr. William Curry and Mr. Ronald Nelson, who farms in the Nanyuki area.

Some extensions were added to the wooden buildings on the second plot in 1963 and the scene was set for the building of the five wooden chalets which now comprise the full board accommodation. The ten rooms in these chalets have twin beds and a third bed for children, with baths or showers and toilets.

A short distance downstream are the original bandas, laid out in haphazard but attractive style, which are run on a self-service basis. They are all named after peaks on Mount Kenya.

The largest of these, called Segleya, is the original Klarwill house and has three large double bedrooms and a lounge. Nelson has

two double bedrooms and a lounge, and the two smaller self-help chalets, Lassans and Baitan have a double bedroom and a verandah.

All the self-help bandas have bathrooms, toilets and a kitchen with gas cooker.

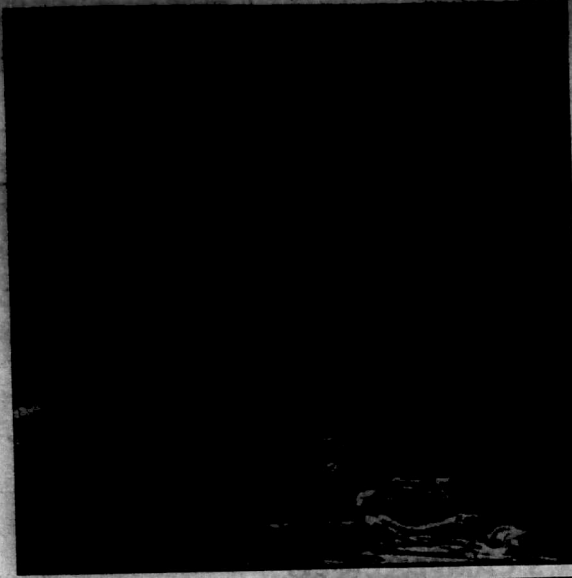
A new generator was installed in February this year and now supplies electricity to all the lodge, including the self-service area.

Full-board accommodation at the lodge costs 70/- a night, and accommodation in the self-service bandas 20/- a night, except at weekends and public holidays when the two larger units, Sandevy and Nelson, cost 180/- and 120/- a day for the whole unit irrespective of how many people use them. For children the price is half.

People staying in the self-help area can use the restaurant for meals at extra cost, and there is a 5/- hire fee for bedding and a 5/- club membership fee to use the bar.

In addition camping is allowed at a fee of 5/- a night.

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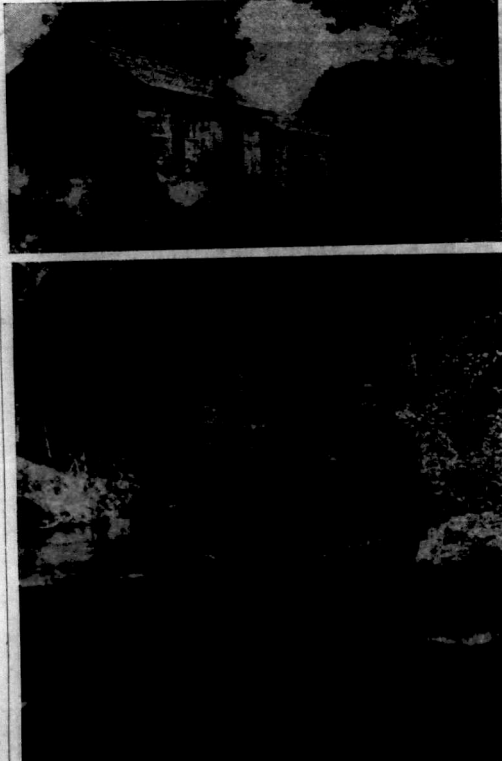
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Mr. Curry arrived as a child in East Africa to join his father who was a District Commissioner in Tanganyika.

Soon afterwards, Mrs. Curry set out for Kenya and worked in the Attorney-General's Chambers for 31 years.

During that time she met her husband-to-be, Mr. Curry, at Parklands Sports Club in Nairobi. They were married in February this year and since then Mrs. Curry has been helping to run the lodge.

The mountain—and more

August 16 will be a red letter day for the Naro Moru River Lodge, for it marks the start of a two-week stay in Kenya by the Ramblers' Association of Britain, all of it booked through the lodge, and most of the time spent on Mt. Kenya.

This is just another indication of the growing recognition the mountain is gaining overseas, and the hope of the lodge proprietors is that the mountain will share increasingly a new type of tourist—the drop-out from the package tour who would rather climb a mountain than go to a game park.

The tours organised by the lodge are of four types. The standard one comprises reaching the head of the Naro Moru track and climbing to the lodge's settled camp at the top of the Teluki Valley, and then on to Lengaa the following day before returning to the head of the track. This can be done in a weekend.

A more leisurely trip involves taking three days for the climb, instead of returning to the lodge on the same day as climbing Lengaa, and there is a one-day trip which just involves going to the mountain.

The best trip of all, however, which the lodge is trying to popularise, takes in a tour of the peaks and lasts three days.

The price varies according to the size of the party (see page 4) but always includes two nights at the lodge as well as all accommodation, food, guides and porters on the mountain.

At the moment the lodge uses Mountain Club of Kenya huts (mainly Kenia and Kiawili) but hopes to build a modern lodge when approval is given (see page 3).

In addition, the lodge maintains a tented camp at the head of the Teluki Valley consisting of six two-man tents for climbers and nine quick pitches for the porters and guides.

The visit by the Ramblers' Association is the first large overseas organisation which has come entirely through the lodge, but a follow-up on the same lines has already been organised for a large party from Mountain Travel U.S.A.

The Naro Moru River Lodge only organises walks up the mountain, not rock climbs, but the lodge has made food and transport arrangements for rock-climbing parties, including the French and German Alpine Clubs.

It also arranges guides and porters for climbers who want to climb the mountain under their own steam.

The reward for people climbing the mountain to Point Lengaa is a tot of Mt. Kenya liqueur, and climbers over the age of 60 get a whole bottle.

Two Austrians, one aged 60 and the other aged 64, have already reached Lengaa.

Another distinguished climber is the former French Ambassador, the Baron de Beauvillain, who must surely be the first man to reach Pt. Lengaa wearing a pin-stripe suit.

When he arrived at the lodge, he had not brought his climbing gear with him, but decided to do the climb anyway.

At the moment the Mt. Kenya climb through the lodge is attracting local people and overseas visitors in the ratio of 50:50. But with the increasing popularity of tours to East Africa it is hoped that more visitors will take advantage of the chance to see what is the most accessible of the East African mountains.

One of the advantages of the Naro Moru River Lodge is that you can climb the mountain and leave the wife and children at the lodge in the sure knowledge they will have plenty to do. And there

is always the chance that climbers too will want to return to take advantage of the other amenities the lodge offers.

There's riding can be done through a next-door neighbour, Mrs. Kenesly, who charges 10/- an hour for her horses which include ponies for the young children.

There is plenty of excellent riding country in the forest near the lodge and on the plain below. Although not fully developed yet, fisherman can be almost certain to catch a trout, even if it is a small one, in the Naro Moru River which runs at the bottom of the garden.

Since fishing also means walking, this is a good way to see the beauty of the tree-lined riverine scene.

The water in the river, by the

way, comes straight off the Glacier, and although it is quite deep enough to swim in, it isn't as bad as the Christmas Day swimming under those tins is a pastime which has adherents.

Other activities include and-bird-watching. The birdlife round the lodge is abundant and has attracted the attention of the well-known Kenya bird expert, John Williams to say the least.

During the winter months, amateur enthusiasts listed as active, we must not forget another category of people, those who simply like to relax. And there is no more pleasant place than the Naro Moru River Lodge, than to sit at

— and do nothing.

The second largest of the self-service bandas, Nelson, can hold four people and more. The bandas, four in number, have an attractive setting about 100 yards down-river from the main lodge, by the riverside amongst willow trees. Although the bandas have cooking facilities and running water, meals can be taken in the main lodge if desired.

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3 - THE FUTURE

Living in comfort —at 14,000 feet

A fully-equipped mountain chalet, something between a game lodge and a luxury resort in the Teleki Valley, is the next aim of the directors of the Naro Moru River Lodge.

Anybody who has shivered through the night in the present lodge, however well compensated he might have been by the view of the peaks in the morning, will know how welcome a log fire and a "centrally heated" lodge would be.

The design for such a lodge has already been prepared by Mr. Jim Simons, who used to head the parties up Mt. Kenya, and only awaits approval from the National Parks.

The lodge will be made of timber insulated from the cold with double glazing and a sort of central heating system operated from the log fire in the main lounge.

On either side of the lounge there will be dormitories with bunk-type beds to sleep 24 people. And to make sure the porters and guides are not left "out in the cold", a hut on similar lines will be built on a smaller scale for them nearby.

Cooking will be done by gas and the stream which runs near-

by will be used for water-hoisting as well as from spring. Another major plan is to build bungalows on a site above the main building of the lodge which will provide cheap accommodation for hikers and local youths who cannot afford to stay in the lodge itself.

Each bungalow is designed to hold between 40 and 50 people. For the lodge itself, this is a time of consolidation. The new chalet, provide accommodation of a modern standard and although they are often full at weekends with local people who find it a pleasant retreat the next phase is to boost the overseas usage.

The literary set out for the Rambles Club points the way to how the lodge hopes to lure these people.

As well as climbing Mt. Kenya,

the party will also visit Longonot, the Aberdares and the caves of Mt. Kenya, all through arrangements made through the lodge.

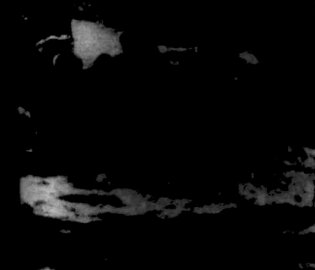
Mrs. Didi Curry has already worked out similar combined group tours which take in game parks and the coast — although the emphasis will always be on Mt. Kenya.

Whatever happens in the future promises to be a far cry from the day, not so long ago, that the makeshift kitchen which used to serve the self-service area was swept away when the river flooded and was found next day — up a tree.

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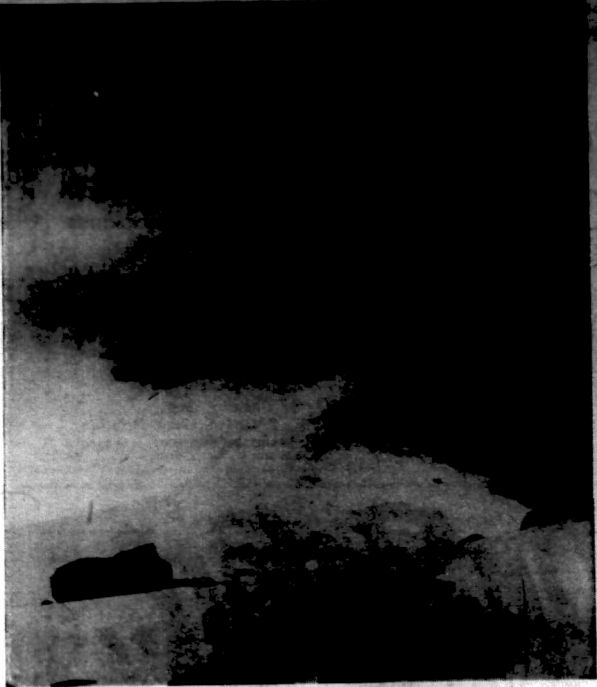

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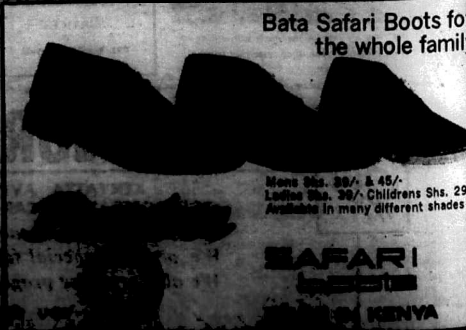

FOOD FORWARD

The long search for the Great Australian Dish

Many years Australians suffered the chiding of Northern Hemisphere for their culinary taste. After 30 years of settlement the Australian's love of steak and eggs has not become typically Australian. A stigma of a country, with the climate and its produce some of the best foods and eggs, but without claim national dish except steak and eggs was too much for the Franks.

Managing director of one Australia's major food marketing companies, he used that with the abundance of ingredients at hand, kitchen chefs and housewives only the opportunity to prove their ability. He initiated "the search for Great Australian Dish."

Over 15 recipes were sent to chefs in ten countries. They were further tested, ranked before being submitted to a panel of three of the world's recognized culinary experts.

Three gathered in Sydney personally directed the nation of each of the 15 recipes for the final judging. One is one of the winning

BLACK-EYED BEEF AND HUSK SALAD
 Ingredients: 2 1/2 lb. Eye fillet of beef (in one piece), 4 oz. Butter, 1/2 oz. Plain Flour, 4 oz. Bacon, 1 oz. Parsley, 1 dot. Prunes, 1 dot. Parsley, 1 dot. Prunes (washed and chopped), 1 Egg yolk (for glazing), Beef stock (cube), Salt and pepper to taste.

Method: Set oven temperature at 400 deg. F. Insert a long, thin carving knife in the centre of the fillet, making a tunnel from one end to the other (the carving knife should be as penetrative as possible). Combine bacon and prunes and place into the tunnel of the meat. Combine flour, salt and pepper and rub fillet well into this. Dot freely with lumps of butter.

Place into baking dish and cook in hot oven (400 deg.) until the fillet has browned well. All over, approx. 10 minutes. Add wine and cook for a further 3 minutes. Allow to cool. Save the pan juices.

When fillet has cooled sufficiently, toasting in a sheet of puff pastry about 1" thick, glaze with egg yolk.

Place the fillet into a clean serving dish and with a little butter, cook in a moderate oven (350 deg.) for approx. 20-25 minutes, until the pastry shell has turned light golden brown.

When cooked, place meat onto serving dish, cut into 1" pieces and send freely with butter sauce.

Butter sauce: To the pan juices which have been reserved, add (2 1/2 T.S.P.) of oil, beat stock (made from stock cube) cooking, stirring constantly until sauce begins to thicken. Serve immediately. Note:

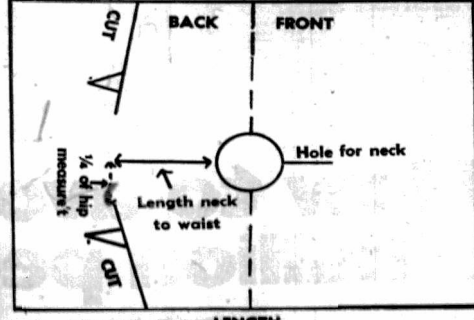

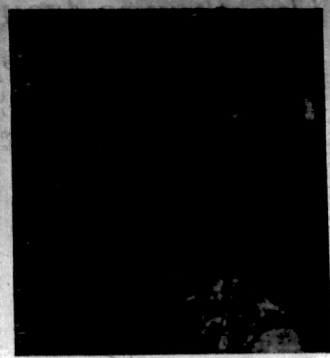
UPPER PICTURE: THE FINISHED KITENGE. LOWER: THE WORKING PATTERN

Australia replies to Malaysia

Australia has replied sharply and firmly to criticism from Malaysia and Singapore about the movement of American space projects.

Mr. Gorton was replying directly to statements made by the Singapore Prime Minister, Mr. Lee Kuan Yew, and Malaysia's Deputy Prime Minister, Tun Abdul Razak, on their arrival in Canberra.

He again stressed that Australia's decision to keep forces in the area after December, 1971, was evidence of a genuine practical wish to keep the area secure and assist Australia's neighbours.

"Complete unity" is the operational theme for 1971 in which Malaysia, Singapore, Britain, Australia and New Zealand will participate jointly.

Although the conference is being held behind closed doors, it is learned officially that Britain wishes to prove with this exercise that it could by a considerable force quickly from Britain to a trouble spot in Asia affecting Malaysia and Singapore.

There will be a few days of acclimatization but Britain has explained that by the time any emergency arises there will be sufficient British troops in Britain trained in jungle warfare and able to operate in the Asian climate.

U.S. rocket expert looks to future on the Moon

American astronauts could be driving small jets to the Moon within the next two or three years, and crews of up to 100 men could be gravitating permanently around the Earth within the next two or three years.

The first American space tourist will probably enjoy an extraordinary view of the cosmos from a hotel gravitating around the Earth in the year 2001.

The man who will be largely responsible for these fantastic developments, the designer of the German rockets, used in the Second World War, Dr. Werner von Braun, was discussing American space projects.

The 57-year-old designer of the mammoth Saturn-5 rockets, and director of the Huntsville Space Centre, has already dreamed space whitewashes. He hopes to be able to go on a space flight before the Americans fly to Mars.

Tom Stafford, who commanded the Apollo-10 flight around the Moon last month, is convinced that only five pounds of fuel are needed to fly from the Moon to the Earth, Dr. Von Braun said.

Behind Dr. Von Braun's armchair stood models of the rockets which NASA has used for its space research, dwarfed by a model of the giant Saturn-5.

This extraordinary fuel economy could enable astronauts to stay longer on the Moon, Dr. Von Braun said. He added, "The eye is a better position today to carry out a more thorough lunar exploration of the Moon."

After our first Apollo-11 Moon landing this summer, we will still have nine Saturn-5 rockets, all designed to take men to the Moon. We will visit various parts of the satellite, send craters to improve our technical knowledge.

around in a small jeep and carry out geological excavations.

The astronauts will carry out bio-medical tests in their space "laboratory", with emphasis on the most favourable living conditions for future interplanetary flights.

The Earth-Mars return flight will probably last more than a year. The orbital platforms could be transformed into space stations; with a reserve of "space ferries" shuttling specialised personnel to and from the Earth, for periods which could be extended up to three or six months.

The stations would also specialise in photographic designation of the resources of the Earth. Dr. Von Braun hoped he would be accepted to work on one such orbital station before 1982, he will be 70.

He has already undergone training in weightlessness inside a replica of the huge cylindrical modules the size of a five-room house built in the Huntsville Space Centre in Alabama.

The model is filled with brightly lit bluish water. After donning a space suit, Dr. Von Braun was able to experience near weightlessness.

The World Communist Conference main document, unlikely to stand out as a doctrinal landmark in Communist history, observers said in Moscow.

The document, 10,000 words of text repeating arguments that the Soviet party membership grows has nothing sensational and is filled with generalities.

The excitement it lacks was plentiful during the conference, contradictory debates. For observers, the real and powerful Moscow document consists of the session reports and the issues of events from June 6.

The document, in familiar pattern of anti-imperialist accusations and pleas for the Communist bloc, was long and gloomy text is not an easy one to grasp.

It did not only achieve its full meaning in comparison with two years ago. Its content, which has not been made public, and the final document of the last world party conference, held in 1960.

The conference unanimously approved an appeal to all Communists, all fighters for socialist change in society and all champions of peace and progress to mark the centenary of Lenin's birth "in a worthy manner".

Lenin, the appeal said, had come to symbolize the triumph of the great October Revolution and achievements which have made basic changes in the world revolutionary struggle and have marked mankind's turn toward Socialism and Communism."

Talks may settle labour troubles

The past week has seen considerable unrest among trade unions in Kenya with an unusually high number of grievances being aired publicly, often accompanied by strikes or strikes accompanied by the conference table.

A nation-wide strike of domestic and local workers, called in support of about 60 workers employed by the Via Cabaret Community, was averted at the weekend after the Ministry of Labour stepped in and brought the parties together round the conference table.

This, and a threatened strike among employees of the East Africa Community, seemed to be taken by a number of trade unions as the cue to start talking of industrial action on their own account.

Oil workers, leather workers, local government employees, motor engineering workers, docks, speaking in milder or stronger terms of alleged abuses in their various jobs.

This has given rise to suggestions that it is an appropriate time to reconvene a meeting of Government, employer and unions similar to that which some years ago led to the production of the Industrial Charter.

There have also been suggestions, however, that much of the present unrest has been caused by some unions, watching militant action among their colleagues, merely trying to take advantage of the situation to bring added pressure to bear on the Government and employers.

Kanu has also been having its troubles, especially in Mombasa where the strike between the two party factions has been fanned into flame again, accompanied by the threat of violence.

Police stood by at the Kanu office after reports that the ousted faction was intending some sort of physical protest against the present office-holders. It did not materialise.

The next day the Mayor, Coun. M. Kimbo, who is a supporter of the ruling faction led by Coun. Maslin, Juma, said his group might be forced to retaliate as it was receiving inadequate protection from the police.

Keino, who still hopes to attend the games, said that he was not fit enough to undertake the full tour. His reasons have been accepted, after some dispute by the Kenya Amateur Athletics Association, and by some of the host countries overseas.

Kenya has reached agreement with two of its neighbours, Ethiopia and Somalia, for co-operation in the development of arid areas along the borders.

Projects to be devised include water and range development which it is hoped will encourage nomadic peoples to settle down so that other developments can be undertaken for them.

The idea has the support of the United States Agency for International Development which has agreed to give financial backing to approved projects.

A development in another field was forebodingly noted this week when the Principal of University College, Nairobi, Dr. A. T. Porter, announced that the college would become an autonomous university in July 1970. He said this offered a unique challenge to Kenya for the creation of a new university.

Although generally avoiding attacks on personalities, Mr. Binaisa appears to have been little impressed with the character of the leaders of the 1968 revolt in the U.L.C., Mr. Eliabu Kibuka, general secretary of the Uganda Public Employees' Union, and organising secretary of the U.L.C., who, Mr. Binaisa concluded, "had done very little organising."

The report recommends that

there should be a new method of choosing leaders within the U.L.C. and that there should be closer Government supervision of trade unions.

Another recommendation is that the number of unions should be reduced with some of the smaller ones amalgamating.

He suggests the U.L.C. should not be cut off from outside bodies, but it would be wiser if it were associated with the British Trade Union Congress (B.T.U.C.) and for a study to be made of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions (I.C.F.T.U.) and the World Federation of Trade Unions (W.F.T.U.).

Mr. Binaisa blames the whole crisis on the U.L.C. leaders who had failed to agree and cooperate. The U.L.C. faced problems on factionalism within its own ranks, he concluded.

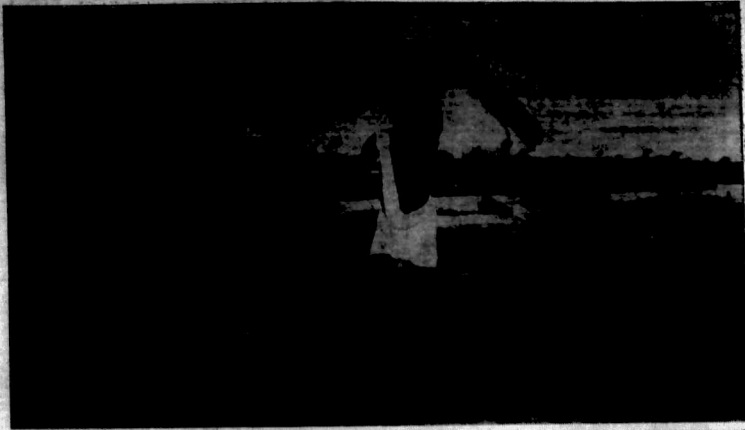

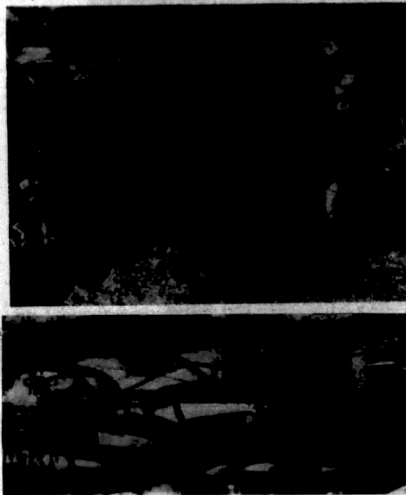

Nairobi's newest nightclub, Le Chateau, which comprises the rooftop bar and restaurant of the recently opened Hotel Inter-Continental, has now been open for about a month and has been doing good business despite the fact that this is the off-season for tourists.

The hotel management has adopted the policy of adaptation and is in the process of finding out what customers want.

This policy has already led to the first innovation — the set seven-course dinner will probably be abandoned by the middle of next month, and a comprehensive à la carte menu will be substituted.

This will bring it into line with established practice in super clubs in Nairobi, a practice which, according to the resident manager, Mr. Walter Keller, hotel manager (who has been among the biggest customers) seem to prefer.

It was the set dinner eating job, which I sampled when I visited Le Chateau the week of the guest of Mr. Keller, and I definitely enjoyed eating any thing during the dinner.

This was my big mistake — I shouldn't have eaten for at least two days before. Both in quality and quantity the food was up to the standard of haute cuisine cooked by the management.

After avocado pear with a delicious jelly sauce and chicken and turkey soup, there was a course (three large fillets), what looked like a whole duck prepared immaculately in orange sauce, and strawberry tart and coffee.

For 50, (which is probably below the average for an equivalent eating place in Europe) you can have a very merry evening and probably end up spending no more than when ordering pie and beer from a canteen in a restaurant of this standing.

The décor of Le Chateau is in Louis XVI style and is approached by a sunken bar which provides an intimate retreat even if you do not want a meal. The restaurant gives a panoramic view of the city, which unfortunately is obscured by the trees.

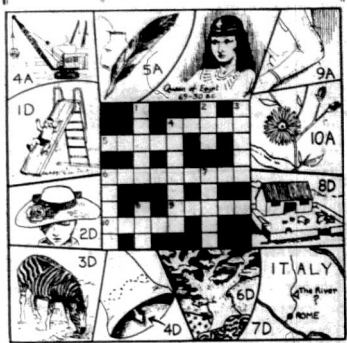

Business as usual as Kenya banks strike postponed

Commercial banks throughout Kenya were functioning normally yesterday after the seventh-hour postponement of a threatened strike by employees. Workers representatives decided to postpone industrial action in view of a lack of support from union officials. The union, the Kenya Industrial Workers' Union, issued a statement on Wednesday — the eve of the proposed strike — dissociating itself from the threat.

The statement was an unexpected development. The strikers' organisers and, after a late meeting on Wednesday, the Nairobi Commercial Bank, it was decided to postpone the strike. The chairman of the staff committee at National and Grindlays Bank in Nairobi, Mr. D. N. Paul, said employees would be asking union leaders to give the required 21 days' notice of strike action. The strike threat followed a proposal by National and Grindlays Bank in connection with contributions to the President Fund and the National Social Security Fund. The general secretary of the Common Services African Civil Servants' Union, Mr. N. G. Gichoya, said yesterday that a consultation with the bank's representatives from Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania and the East African Community is to be held on July 21 at Arusha. This followed the return to work of Wednesday's two-day strike. Mr. Gichoya said the Community Minister for Finance and Administration, Mr. Odera-Jowi, had informed him yesterday that the administration would go to the meeting prepared to make a conciliatory offer to the unions, which have demanded a 40 per cent pay increase for all graded employees and £18 a month for subordinate staff.
