He renewed his appeal to all candidates and their supporters to see that the elections were conducted peacefully and in a spirit of friendliness, without recriminations between the winners and losers.

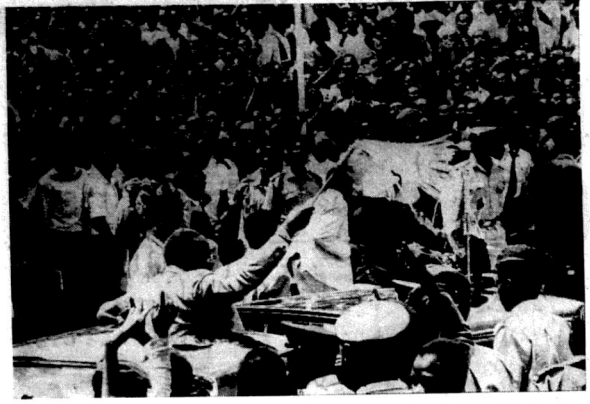
Candidates must stick to the Kanu manifesto and should not promise free things to the people to catch votes. People must work hard to get what they wanted.

MINISTERS SING AS PRESIDENT LISTENS IN

for their mandate to carry out the objectives of the Kanu manifesto.

On Saturday a large crowd of supporters flocked to the Attorney-General's office to see President Kenyatta's nomination papers for the Presidency handed in.

No challenger came forward for the post and he is the only nominee. To fulfil the qualifications for the Presidency he will have to stand for election as an M.P., but no rival has appeared in his Gatundu constituency and it is expected that he will be unopposed when Parliamentary nominations are handed in Wednesday.

It will be his second term as President. He became Kenya's first President on December 12, 1964—the first anniversary of independence.

A jubilant smiling Mr. Kenyatta joked with thousands of multi-racial people who thronged the flag-bedecked park to listen to him.

The high-spirited crowd roared back in approval throughout his hour-long address.

He thanked the people for having chosen him for a second term in office, and the crowd applauded him and assured him of their mandate to him and to Kanu as the party that will rule in the country.

Presidential motorcade arrived at the park at 11:40 a.m. to a standing ovation, wild cheers and singing from the happy crowd.

Some shouting "Kenyatta will exterminate the country," others "Huzee" and some "Thoma... Moto... Moto..."—Kanu slogans.

Mr. Kenyatta, his famous fly whisk at hand and with Mrs. Ngina Kenyatta next to him, acknowledged their rousing welcome.

They walked to the dais where the President took the salute as the members of the Administrative Council and the dais were the Mayor, Coun. Lagotto, the Ministers for Foreign Affairs (Mr. Kibaki), who is also Nairobi district Kani vice-president), Defence (Dr. Mungai), civil servants, former M.P.s and prospective candidates.

Mr. Kenyatta's Nairobi branch secretary, Mr. Sammi Charles Kubiya, expressed the branch's pride at being the first in the country to be addressed by the President at the start of his new term of office.

A forest of hands greeted the President, supporting his nomination.

Six die as tourist plane crashes in hills

Six people died when a Cherokee aircraft crashed in bad weather on Taveta National Park on Saturday. The pilot was Mr. Peter Jonathan 'Johnny' Candler, of Nairobi.

His five passengers, all of whom died instantly, were European tourists—three German men and an American man and his wife. Mr. Candler, who was thrown 30 yards clear of the wreckage, died soon afterwards.

The Cherokee was travelling from Malindi for Wilken Air Coast on route to Amboseli. The tragedy happened around 8 a.m. when the aircraft was flying below heavy cloud which was about 500 feet off the ground. It was raining.

The crash occurred on the Ngulia Hills, about three miles north-west of the new Ngulia airstrip.

Mr. Candler had been with Wilken Air for about three years. Before operating for the firm from its coast branch he had been an assistant flying instructor in Nairobi. He had more than 1,000 hours experience and held a full commercial pilot's licence. He had also worked with B.O.A.C.

He was in his mid-thirties and unmarried. He was the son of Dr. Peter Candler and Mrs. Candler of Karen.

Police said yesterday that the names of the tourists would be released once next of kin had been informed.

It is understood that the wife of one of the German men returned to Nairobi before the party took off for Amboseli—and missed a similar fate. She called off the

safari because she was feeling unwell.

The alarm was raised when smoke was seen coming from the Ngulia Hills by a driver from the Ngulia Lodge. He drove to the Ngulia airstrip and mentioned it to another Wilken Air pilot who had landed on schedule without incident. The two travelled to the scene of the tragedy. An aircraft from the Flying Doctor Service at Nairobi went to the spot and another Flying Doctor aircraft, travelling from Tanzania, was

Man held after two more house raids in Kitale

Within 48 hours of the murder of Miss Diana Hill at her home near Kitale, two other householders in the town were threatened by intruders.

One was told by a man who broke into his home: "I am a killer. If you want to see your wife and family again, keep quiet."

This happened at the home of the medical officer in charge of Kitale District Hospital, Dr. P. F. O'Callaghan, on Friday night.

Dr. O'Callaghan, who was alone in the house, went to investigate a noise. A man burst into the house, brandishing a knife and stole some cash and car keys. Dr. O'Callaghan was not injured.

Later the car was found, overturned and badly damaged, about seven miles from Kitale on the Kakamega road.

On Saturday night a man broke into the home of the manager of Hughes' Fish & Kiale branch, Mr. Hearing, also apparently looking for car keys. He made off when Mr. Hearing and his dog set up a row

which alerted people in the neighbourhood.

Later a man was accused in connection with the break-in at Mr. Hearing's home. Investigations continue into the other two cases.

After Miss Hill was found with her throat cut and her home ransacked, teams of detectives were sent to Kitale from Nairobi and Rift Valley Provincial Headquarters at Nakuru.

President Kenyatta said there were not going to be free things, and everyone must work hard to get what they wanted. The Government was doing all it could to help the womanhood to settle on the lands formerly occupied by White men and to find jobs with responsibility and high salaries that in the past were occupied only by foreigners.

Mr. Kenyatta then reviewed briefly what Kanu had done for the country and what it intended to do in the future. Kanu would work to expand medical and educational services, because the country needed healthy and educated men and women.

He said Africans ruled the country and must respect their culture if they were to be respected by the world. But it was regrettable that some Africans even went to the extent of blaming God for having created them black and used drugs to change their colour. This was a great shame.

Africans must respect themselves for what they were and realise they ruled themselves. Foreigners who did not accept that fact would be kicked out of the country to be *become makubwa* elsewhere.

He urged womanhood to work hard with their hands, reminding them that the foreigners who held the strings of the country's wealth came to Kenya with little money, but by working hard had achieved wealth.

Hard work is the only solution to our economic independence, the President said. This is stressed by all religious teachings, which demand that man must work and toil for his livelihood.

"Even to gain what religion terms as life in Heaven, man must

work unto death, which is the highest sacrifice, so that he can enjoy life everlasting. You should not be deceived by anyone that there will be free things, because even God does not provide such."

Mr. Kenyatta recalled Kanu's achievements in its first Government. It was the ultimate aim to provide free education when finances were available. More schools had been built since independence, giving more educational facilities for the younger generation.

A striking feature of yesterday's gathering was the pronounced "redness" of the occasion. Coun Luguzuzo was in his red robes, all the Ministers and some prospective candidates wore red shirts, and the President's haircoat was also red. As though this was insufficient, hundreds of Kanu youth were also in their party colour — red shirts.

Traditional dances performed at the occasion and the President and his party joined everybody in applauding them.

The meeting closed with everybody singing *Kanu Yajiraga* Nth led by Dr. Mutiga.

E.A.P. and T. worker denies theft

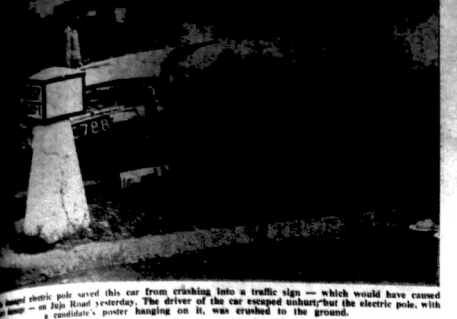

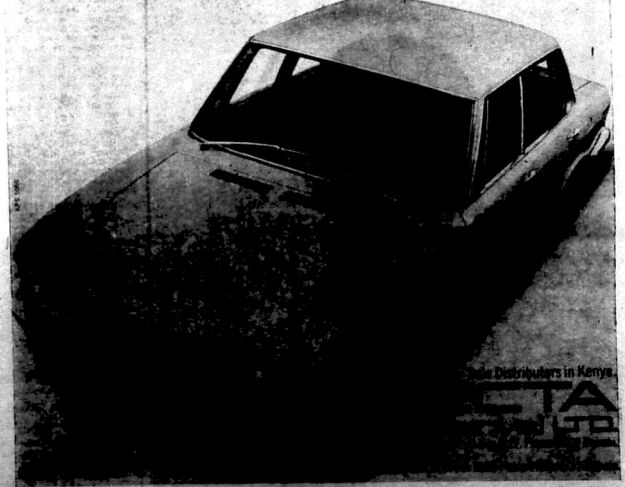

election, national treasurer of Kanu and District Kanu chairman.

Mr. Kotir has been a member of the Kisumu County Council since 1953.

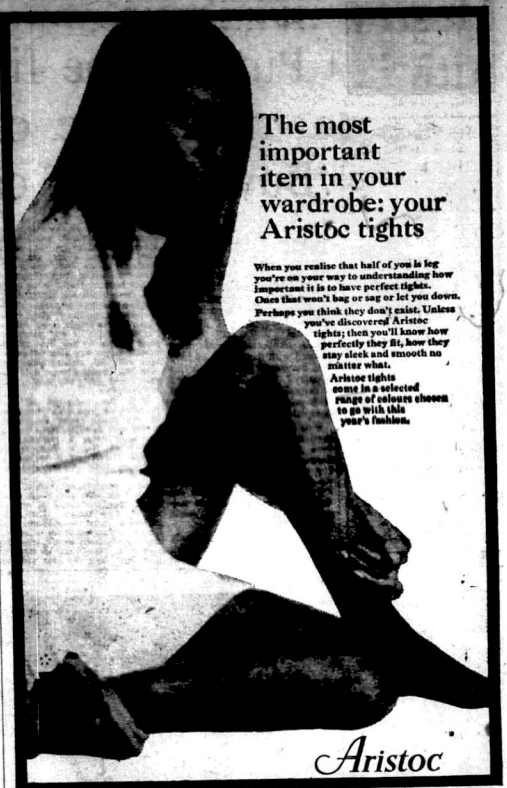


Mr. Munyi unopposed in Embu East

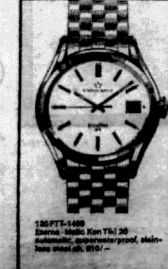

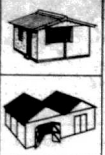

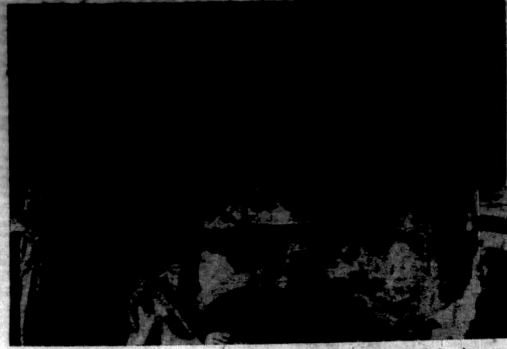

Dr. Banda reshuffles Malawi cabinet

Malawi's President Banda has brought four new Ministers into his Government in a major cabinet reshuffle. An announcement from his office said the changes followed the resignation last week of Mr. Gomik Kumbumani, the Minister of Education and Local Government. Under the changes, Mr. E. Ndema, at present parliamentary secretary for Agriculture, becomes Minister of Local Government and the education portfolio goes to a backbencher, Mr. M. N. Lungu. Another backbencher, Mr. K. J. Sembeka, becomes Minister of Labour in succession to Mr. John Msonthi, who retains his other portfolio of Minister of Transport and Communications. The other new minister is Mr. Alfred Chiwanda who returns to the cabinet as Minister of State in the President's office. Mr. Chiwanda was Minister of Labour until a year ago when he resigned. Until the new ministers are sworn in within the next few days their portfolios will be held by President Banda. Dr. Banda is also temporarily responsible for trade and industry, and for transport and communication, during the absence in Portugal of the two ministers, Mr. Msonthi and Mr. John Tembo. The announcement also said that the country's three regional ministers will from now on have cabinet rank. The three new ministers with departmental responsibilities, none of who have previously served in the government, are the first new blood brought into the cabinet for more than three years. — Reuter

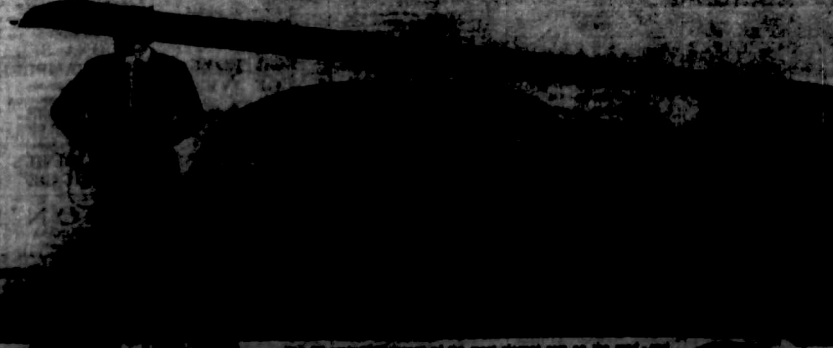
Cripple held on golf course by police

E.A. tea win better deal for crops in Europe

Standard Staff Reporter, Kampala.

The negotiations, which were held in London, resulted in a new agreement between the East African Community and the European Economic Community.

The new agreement was broadly similar to the last one, confirming the agreement allowed East African products to enter the E.E.C. countries without Customs duties or quantitative restrictions.

The exceptions to the rule were coffee, cloves and tinned pineapples. These were restricted quantitatively to 56,000 metric tons of coffee, 800 metric tons of tinned pineapples and 120 metric tons of cloves.

Members were aware, said the Minister, these products were very important to the East African Community. During negotiations East Africa had argued strongly against these restrictions.

After protracted negotiations the E.A.C. secured an undertaking

that the quotas would be imposed only if there were serious disturbances in their traditional trade flows, after consultation with the E.A.C.

Regarding other agricultural products, the E.E.C. had agreed to give them more favourable treatment than to similar products originating in other third countries, the arrangements being fixed, case by case, after consultation with the E.A.C. in the Association Council.

To return the corporate States have agreed to give tariff concessions on 38 products originating from E.E.C. countries. The concessions ranged from two to nine per cent.

Under a new provision in the agreement the E.A.C. States were free to set up customs unions or free trade areas or to conclude economic co-operation agreements with African third countries at a comparable stage of development.

The most important institution established by the agreement was the Association Council. This would consist of members of the E.E.C. member Governments.

It would be assisted in its activities by a committee of experts which would be asked to play a vital role in the implementation of the agreement, and of other trade agreements.

The agreement also provides for a parliamentary committee composed of members of the European Parliament and that of the member States of the E.A.C. to meet once a year to discuss matters concerning the agreement.

This was an improvement on the previous agreement which provided for contacts between the E.A.C. and the E.E.C. for five years, expiring on January 31, 1975.

Ex-soldier shocks U.S. with account of massacre

An American who says he took part in the Pinkville massacre in Vietnam has given his own account of the horrific killing.

Paul Maddio from West, Texas, Indiana, made his statement on television only hours after the army dropped its offer to pardon more than 100 Vietnamese villagers.

Maddio, who was a private in the army, said he and his fellow soldiers were ordered to go to the village of Pinkville and kill all the people there.

"I think I was the first to go in," he said. "I saw many women and children. I saw a man who was ordered to stand at the time he felt he was doing the right thing."

"It was a damn good thing," he said. "I had a damn good feel he had suffered his punishment."

"I suppose he is dead now. I have been punished."

These latest revelations about Pinkville came after the army had announced that First Lieutenant William L. Calley (24) would go on court martial in about a month on charges of premeditated murder in the village massacre. It is considered that he could face death by hanging.

The court martial will be closed to the public but will be open to military personnel. It will be held at Fort Benning, Georgia, where Calley is still serving his term.

Charges of assault with intent to commit murder were also laid against the soldiers. The army has brought against Staff Sergeant David H. H. Mitchell (21) who is stationed at Fort Meade, Texas.

But a Defence Department spokesman, Mr. Richard Capen, said it was not known when a decision would be made whether to bring Sgt. Mitchell before a court martial.

The charges against Lieut. Calley include six individual counts of killing "oriental human beings" by means of shooting them with a rifle.

The spokesman said the phrasing meant Lieut. Calley could have shot the victims personally or ordered them to be shot.

One victim was identified as "approximately two years old, whose name and sex are unknown."

The army's announcement came less than a year after another announcement naming a three-star General investigation of the alleged massacre a month after it occurred.

The new investigation, the army said, will determine whether the first investigation — which found nothing to warrant official army action — was adequate.

Sen. Charles Percy has called for a thorough and honest Defence Department review of the efforts which he called "cover-up" of the alleged massacre.

The Republican Senator, in calling for disclosure by the Defence Department, said that while atrocities by Hanoi and the Vietcong are commonplace, they did not justify even a single U.S. atrocity.

Sen. Stephen Young, a Democrat, told the Senate that alleged mass shooting evoked memories of Nazi storm troopers leading women and children into gas chambers.

The army said that, in addition to Lieut. Calley and Sgt. Mitchell, about 24 other soldiers of experience are under investigation in connection with the Pinkville massacre. — Reuter

RED INDIANS REFUSE TO LEAVE

A Red Indian invasion force yesterday rejected an appeal from the U.S. Interior Secretary, Mr. Walter H. Reuther, to return to the Alcatraz Island, the abandoned prison fortress in the middle of San Francisco Bay which they seized seven days ago.

Through Red Indians on the mainland, the 100-strong invasion party issued a statement making clear they are only interested in negotiating on their own terms.

Militant warriors from 20 tribes across the United States arrived at the island on Thursday and proclaimed it Indian property. They wanted the Alcatraz as symbolic reparation for all the land the White man stole from them.

In a message from Washington, the Government said it would hold talks with the Red Indians as long as they did not set conditions — such as their request for ownership of the island be transferred to them — from the Government within two weeks.

"I am available at any time to meet their representatives to discuss their views on what should be done with the property, but with out any conditions in advance of those discussions."

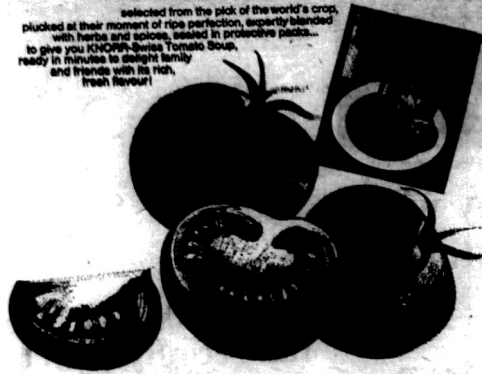
Back came a terse reply from the Red Indians. "The pre-conditions still stand."

The Government has made no attempt to dislodge them by force but has told them to leave and has intermittently called on the Coast Guard to blockade the most 12-acre rock. At present food and supplies are still being brought by occasional boats.

Trading, however, has been slow. Some signs that the island is settling near the official Red Indian rate of 1934, but the islanders could be selling as much as 100 times the price.

Dealers reported last night that the islanders were still holding out for a price of \$100 a pound for their goods. — Reuter

Illness gives Hess glimpse of freedom

Rudolf Hess (75), Adolf Hitler's former deputy, was resting in a British military hospital room in West Berlin yesterday — with a four-power military guard outside his door.

Hess, taken to the hospital on Monday from the huge Spandau Jail with stomach pains, was to undergo a thorough medical examination yesterday.

He had been complaining of stomach pain for several weeks, but particularly in the last few days, a British military spokesman said. A bulletin on the nature and seriousness of his complaint was expected later yesterday.

Hess, the last Nazi war criminal still held in Spandau, left the prison on Monday for the first time since 1946.

He has actually been in detention for more than 24 years — since his arrest in May, 1945, after flying a plane to Scotland personally to try to negotiate peace with Britain.

He was sentenced to life imprisonment at the Nuremberg trials for preparing an aggressive war.

All attempts to free him from Spandau or have him transferred to a more comfortable place have been blocked by the Russians.

On Monday, with him from Spandau went a four-man guard — one Russian, one American, one British and one French soldier, to be placed outside his hospital room.

Ghana's new opposition leader in Parliament

Ghana's newly-elected Parliament met for the first time yesterday with a new leader of the 28-strong opposition National Alliance of Liberals (N.A.L.) Party.

Dr. Godfrey Nnamah, an economics lecturer.

Dr. Nnamah was elected leader by the party executive after the Supreme Court barred Mr. Kwasi Gbedemah from taking his seat.

At one time it was thought that the opposition would boycott Parliament.

The Supreme Court injunction against Mr. Gbedemah, former Minister under the ousted ex-President, Dr. Nkrumah, had been sought by Mr. Gbedemah's Progressive Party opponent at the election, Mr. E. Awonorfi Williams.

He based his case on Clause 71 of the Constitution, which states that those against whom a commission of inquiry has found adversely cannot hold public office or in Parliament for five years.

The N.A.L. executive, after electing Dr. Nnamah as leader, decided to provide an effective opposition to Prime Minister Dr. Kwame Nkrumah's Progressive Party, which has 105 Members in the National Assembly. There are six other opposition members.

On September 3, after general elections, Dr. Busia was sworn in as Prime Minister. This step took the country back to civilian rule after three and a half years of Government by a military Police.

Old enemies to bury past

West Germany yesterday formally proposed Poland with a note proposing talks on improving relations embittered for a quarter of a century by the horrors of World War Two.

The note is a reply to a Polish proposal for a treaty recognizing former German territory in Poland.

It is an important step in the new German government's peace offensive towards Eastern Europe.

It comes about a fortnight after Bonn's Ambassador in Moscow delivered a note accepting the Soviet offer to negotiate a mutual non-aggression pact.

Dr. Heinrich Lübke, head of the West German trade mission in Warsaw, delivered the note to the Polish Foreign Minister, Mr. Jozef Winiewicz, at the Polish Foreign Ministry in Warsaw.

Afterwards he told reporters that Mr. Winiewicz assured him that Poland would reply swiftly to the West German proposals. — Reuter

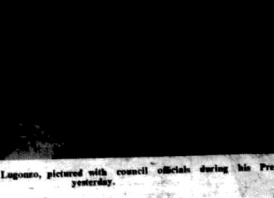

An American who says he took part in the Pleiade massacres in Vietnam has given his own account of the horrific killing.

Paul Meadlo from West Texas was seen in television only hours after the army charged an officer with the murder of more than 100 Vietnamese villagers.

Meadlo, who was a private in the army unit that was interviewed on C.B.I. television that the South Vietnamese were rounded up and an officer ordered them killed.

When he and other soldiers did not comply, the officer asked them why they had not killed them, and Meadlo said: "I want them dead."

The officer then went back about 15 feet and started shooting. Mr.

Meadlo said he himself fired four times from his M-16 rifle, and that he carried about 17 rounds. He had been killed about 10 or 12 feet from him. "They were men, women and children," Meadlo said. "I was ordered to stand at the time he felt he was doing the right thing."

"It was horrible. I lost buddies," he added. "I lost a same good buddy."

Meadlo, married with two children, said there was an air of helplessness of going to wipe out the village. "It was just one of those things."

The company commander, he added, was present and could have put a stop to it at any time. Meadlo said that the massacre had been on his conscience, but he

felt he had suffered his punishment. "I stayed on a land mine. I have been punished."

These latest revelations about Pleiade come after the army announced that Pvt Lieutenant William L. Calley (26) would go on court martial in about a month on charges of premeditated murder in the village massacre. If convicted, he could face death by hanging.

Backing for new U.N. move on Namibia

The U.N. Trusteeship Commission has given wide support to the resolution calling on the Security Council to take measures to end South Africa's administration of South West Africa (Namibia).

The resolution was adopted by 14 abstentions, 10 in favour, and 10 against. The Western powers, the United States and South Africa, and Portugal, all voted against the resolution, which also calls for a "no-conditions Pretoria" and "no-conditions Pretoria" to withdraw from the territory.

The Council for Namibia was set up by the General Assembly after a cancelled South Africa's territorial integrity of Namibia.

Many delegations which abstained - including the Scandinavian countries, always strong supporters of the anti-South Africa drive at the U.N. - objected to a paragraph of the resolution which would open the door to the republic's expulsion from U.N. specialised agencies.

Under this paragraph the General Assembly would recommend the Security Council and the U.N. Council on South Africa and the U.N. Commission on South Africa to take such steps as may be necessary to ensure the withdrawal of South Africa from the territory.

The Council for Namibia was set up by the General Assembly after a cancelled South Africa's territorial integrity of Namibia.

DELEGATES PASS MOTION ON NAZIS

The UN Social Committee has passed a resolution which demands that all States take effective measures to prevent the recruitment of human beings for military service in the armed forces of any State.

Nigerians are war weary

PETER AJAYI reports that war weariness has overtaken Nigeria. As the rains end, renewed fighting could be on the way. Yet, he says, each side needs only to adjust its position a little to reach agreement. In Lagos, for example, talks of a cease-fire is not the first it has seen since 1967.

Most Nigerians are weary of the 18-month-old civil war. They would be happy to see its end now. Everybody has suffered enough.

Most fail to understand why there is no solution. "Can't the Federal troops take the small parcel of land," they ask. Or again: "If the soldiers know they cannot fight any more, then let's negotiate with the rebels."

The Government, in the military history and in industrial commercial circles, the "doers" are not, however, in possession of the situation. And the "haves" are so, mainly because they derive direct or indirect profits from Africa's extraction have made fortunes.

FRANCE PIDONS INHERITS A HEADACHE IN CHAD

The situation in Chad is deteriorating fast. Gradually France is losing more and more ground. It is in a dilemma as to how to protect its vast province in the middle of Africa, but can it afford to be dragged into another racial conflict? GHERBERT COMTE in Paris looks at the situation.

In a written question put to M. Michel Delebarre, Minister of Foreign Affairs, by M. Robert Lecourt, Minister of the Government, on August 14, 1969, he said that France was engaged in a fighting operation in Chad. He said that the situation in Chad was very serious and that the French Government was doing its utmost to bring about a settlement.

Mr. Fabre makes a grave error when he compares the guerrilla fighting in Chad with the beginning of the Indo-Chinese and Algerian troubles. The battles of Tonkin and the Aures in 1945 and 1954 were led to national independence while the Chad rebels are fighting in an already independent State.

BACKGROUND TO WORLD NEWS

India seeks stronger ties with the Arabs

When the Indian envoys to Morocco and Jordan were recalled to Delhi, after the Indian delegation's exclusion from the Islamic summit conference in Rabat, the episode represented a defeat for India and the Arab world, which both sides are still evaluating.

It was a defeat for India because it underestimated the force of religion that had reached boiling point because of the fire in the mosque in Jerusalem.

Her attempt to gatecrash the summit was ill-conceived and embarrassing to her Arab friends.

It was a defeat for the Arabs because it unnecessarily humiliated a friendly country that has always stood by them in times of crisis. The Arabs can ill afford the alienation of a friendly India. They need the support and sympathy of others today more than others need theirs.

To put the episode in perspective, it is important to look briefly into history. India, always enjoyed a soft corner in the Arab heart because of cultural, religious and economic affinities. When both areas fell under foreign domination, and were guided by European masters, each gradually turned to the West for inspiration.

At the turn of this century, the Arab States were engaged in liberating themselves from the Ottoman yoke and India was also busy fighting for independence.

At independence, in 1947, India was not the same. "All Hind" the Arabs had always known because of the emergence of Pakistan. The new nation was at once more appealing to the Arab world than the India that had been born with a clear religious distinction for modern statehood.

For two main reasons:

- (1) The emergence of a theoretical Islamic State, labeled the "largest Muslim nation on earth" was seen as a rebirth of the Western-Christian concept of secularism for modern statehood.
- (2) The birth of Pakistan. Arabs believed Islam had stolen a march on Christianity for the eventual domination of Afro-Asia. The present secular outlook of many Arab States emerged only in the late 1950s.
- (3) The birth of a large Islamic nation when the Arabs were starting to confront the Zionists in Palestine was reassuring because "Thus, the old India became a

convicted Mr. Nehru of the correctness of his view.

Pakistan, on the other hand, did not accept a non-alignment policy. It was the former President Ayub Khan, aided by the young and aggressive Foreign Minister, Mr. Z. A. Bhutto, dissociated himself from the politics of the moment and had ousted a decade a reconciliation with Cairo.

Neither side has consolidated economic and industrial relations. If the chips are down, neither will hesitate to forget the other without much harming itself.

India's political influence in the area is certainly declining in recent years. The void left by Mr. Nehru is being filled by a general decline in vigour among the Third World countries, poverty and economic difficulties at home. Voters sign up for Pakistan poll

Press, radio and television advertisements urged adult Pakistanis "have yourselves as voters". More than 46,000 enumerators fan out to enlist voters for the country-wide general elections promised by President Yahya Khan.

The first list of about 80,000,000 voters is expected to be ready in about two months. The final list will be published by mid-1970.

The Election Commissioner, Mr. Justice Abdus Salam, is satisfied with progress. An election, he says, can be held by the end of the year.

He hopes that a constitutional basis will be provided before the middle of the year, so that the Commission can go ahead with the delimitation of constituencies. This refers to the principle of parity between the two major religious equal representation.

2,300 YEARS ON THE SEA BED

Andreas Cariolou was diving 900 metres about three-quarters of a mile off Kyrenia, Northern Cyprus, when he came across a wreck.

In the dim, blue-green depths he could see that the hull was very old. It was almost completely covered by sea urchins and barnacles — it measured 600 long by 300, said he estimated. It had made an important discovery.

An underwater archaeological expedition from the University of Pennsylvania was surveying wrecks nearby. The team diverged every-thing to investigate.

The hull turned out to be one of the most exciting finds in the Mediterranean. It is the best preserved vessel, dating from the time of Alexander the Great, ever discovered. Andreas Cariolou had been the first man to set eyes on the wreck since it sank around 300 B.C.

Since then experts working for two years from an offshore barge have brought up 400 jars, some filled with almonds, part of a cargo loaded 2,300 years ago.

It was only a small merchant ship carrying nuts, oil and wine. But for all the humble contents, it carried a wealth of information for historians and archaeologists.

Until now little has been known of the construction of Greek merchant ships of that period. No wrecks have been discovered earlier than the Fourth Century B.C.

In those days, Greece was the centre of trade and civilization and one of the few nations with a fleet of its own. The discovery gives among other things a fascinating insight into the early phases of the Mediterranean wine trade.

Historians believe the ship was loaded at Samos, in the Aegean, where she took on her amphorae (pottery jars for storing food and liquids). She stopped at an island in the northern Dodecanese for some millets and then called at Rhodes for most of her cargo.

She may have offloaded some of it at another Cyprus port on her last voyage, before heading for Kyrenia. This was probably her home port, and the captain and crew were, perhaps, due to stock up their wages when they landed.

Whether the ship was wrecked safely or drowned in the storm that wrecked the ship will never be known. No skeletons were in the wreck. The cargo has been painstakingly removed over two summers, with as little publicity as possible.

It was feared that amateur treasure hunters might have the depths and guard was set up by the Department of Antiquities.

The excavating team was sponsored by several foundations and

by the University Museum of Pennsylvania, the Cyprus (Copper) Mines Corporation and the National Geographic Magazine.

Underwater photographers, geographers and archaeologists worked with surgical precision to raise the cargo's fragile remains. Two-way telephone communications and a television transmitter helped the divers.

A grid was put over the wreck and a water jet removed layers of sand. Later an air lift and underwater crane came into action. Every day the team began work at dawn — 5 a.m. — and carried on until darkness.

Every item has been recovered. Thousands of almonds looking like small black olives after centuries of immersion float in glass jars at Kyrenia Castle. Their shells are perfectly preserved but the nuts inside have disintegrated.

About 400 pottery jars are stacked on shelves in one of the castle's ancient halls, along with millets and anchors.

Uganda may send team to Germany next year

Uganda's intending football visit to Germany next year has been set for the melting pot. Uganda football officials have written to the German authorities in reply to the invitation that Uganda visit them next year in April to play five matches in various centres in South Germany.

The invitation came from the Swiss German F.A. and among the centres mentioned where Uganda would play are Konstanz, Lindau, Schwyz, Dillingen, Stuttgart and Tübingen.

If the invitation is accepted by F.U.F.A. and Uganda are willing to reciprocate by visiting Uganda at a later date.

The invitation by the German asks how much Uganda is prepared to pay towards cost of air fares for a maximum party of 22 players and officials. It is estimated that, including discount on return air tickets for a squad of 22, Uganda would have to pay out

something like 100,000. The Germans are willing to pay part of the cost. Accommodation in Germany will be paid for by the hosts as will travel travelling expenses.

Uganda's 1970 calendar has not yet been worked out but one major event is the participation of players who have some Uganda players in the Africa Club championship the date of which has not been announced.

Mr. Burkhard Pappe, the national coach, commenting on the German invitation said: "I hope it is something for one thing. For another Uganda should benefit from the experience and this could help Uganda football tremendously."

Nothing more has been heard about the invitation for Uganda to visit Ethiopia to play matches early next year. The invitation was extended to Uganda by Ethiopia's Assistant Minister for Sport, Mr. Tessema, when the Ethiopians

visited Uganda last month. January was the month mentioned by the Ethiopian official as most suitable for Uganda to visit his country. Ethiopia were beaten 4-0 by Uganda in an international match and the visitors went down 3-1 to Northern Region, the Motivani Cup champions.

Kenya has been invited to visit Ethiopia and all costs, including air fares and accommodation for the Kenya team, has been provided by Ethiopia.

Sport 'important to national health'

The contribution sport made to national health could not be over-emphasised and every citizen should be encouraged to take part in sports, whether at village, locational, divisional, district or provincial level, the Provincial Football Association Western Province, Mr. P. K. Bolt said when he addressed a meeting in Kakamega of all District Sports Officers in the province. Community Development staff and representatives of secondary schools.

Mr. Bolt said that a healthy body constituted a healthy mind and sports was one way to achieve this. He said that much depended on officers in the field who had a duty to teach people how to play and enjoy sport.

Mr. Bolt went on to say that lack of organised administration and coordination, general inactivity and lack of funds had thwarted the promotion of sport in the province. Every effort must be made to overcome this. He recalled how the province had been in the lead during the past in sport and he said this should be re-activated.

The main topic of discussion at the meeting was the formation of a Western Provincial Football Association. Mr. Bolt, speaking in capacity as the chairman of the Western Provincial Sports Association, said that football had become Kenya's national sport. Because football had been organised on a sectional or tribal basis in the past the Kenya Government had taken steps to end this trend and appoint a Caretaker Committee which had, among other things, recommended the setting up of a football association in each province to co-ordinate the activities of existing football societies within its borders.

The Provincial Community Development Officer, Mrs. P. Abwao, who also addressed the meeting, said that her department was keen to get everyone involved in sport. She believed there were great possibilities of producing national and world champions in the province if the young people in the provinces were encouraged to take part in sport.

Mrs. Abwao, however, warned that sport should be regarded as a voluntary activity and not for winning prizes.

The meeting later appointed an interim committee, with a representative from each district and each

secondary school and teacher training college, under the chairmanship of the Provincial Sports Officer, Mr. S. D. Gopa. The committee was requested to make recommendations for the setting up of the provincial football association before the end of the year.

The meeting also discussed the promotion of athletics and sport in general, sport activities for sport, and how to raise funds for sport. — K.N.A.

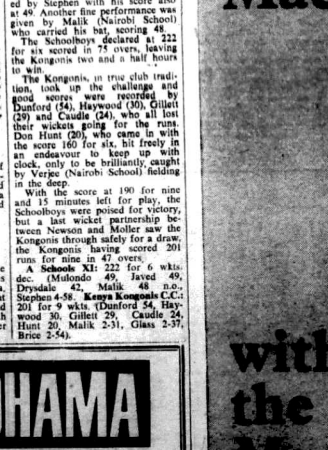
