Organisation at Muguga when his car was besieged by youths in red shirts.

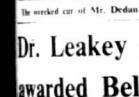

Mr. Solomon King'ona Manjethol told the East African Standard yesterday that although his name appeared in the list he was not standing for election.

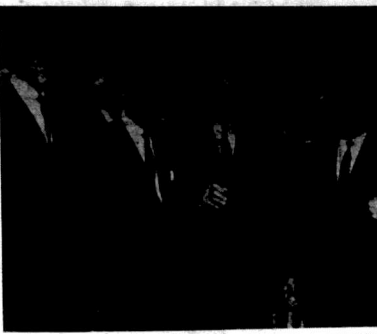
Two Assistant District Officers, Rurumbani (Housing), did not stand for election.

## Kabaka died from 'acute alcoholic poisoning'

Sir Frederick Mutesa, the exiled Kabaka of Buganda, died of acute alcoholic poisoning, the Southwark Coroner, Dr. A. Davies, said yesterday in London.

The Coroner had been told by Dr. Hugh Johnson, a pathologist, that in his bloodstream the Kabaka had 400 milligrams of alcohol per 100 millilitres of blood. Dr. Johnson said that 350 mg. was considered "potentially lethal".

Det. Sgt. Henry Downwell said he was called to the Kabaka's home, where he found him lying on the floor covered by bedclothes. He made a search but found no capsules or tablets or letters.

Mr. David Green on behalf of the Uganda Government expressed his sympathy with the Kabaka's family. While the disposal of the body was a matter for his widow, the Government of Uganda was taking the body back to his home country, Mr. Green said.

E.A. seeks associate membership with the Six

Standard Staff Reporter, London. A first meeting between the European Economic Community and the East African Community since the signing of the Associate Agreement with the Six at the Arusha ceremony has been held in Brussels. An interim E.E.C.-East African

Committee was established at the signing of the Association Agreement last September at Arusha. At its inaugural meeting the East African delegation was led by Kenya's Ambassador in Bonn, Mr. Daniel Owino, who is the head of the East African team in Brussels. The Brussels Commission of European Communities was represented

by senior officials. The Committee adopted procedures for its future deliberations. It was agreed that the interim committee would, in principle, meet at ambassadorial level and that representatives of the E.E.C. Commission and of the East African Community would take part in these meetings.

The chair will be taken alternately by a representative of the member State providing the president of the Council of the E.E.C. at that time, and by a representative of the partner States of the E.A.C.

The committee's secretariat will be provided jointly by the East African States and by the Six.

This first nuts-and-bolts meeting noted that the three East African countries had already started the process for parliamentary ratification of the Association Agreement.

The E.E.C. informed the Committee that it too was actively pursuing ratification. There was also an exchange of views on the procedural rules of the Association Council set up under the agreement.

The Committee agreed that the Six and the Three would transmit the text of their Association Agreement to O.A.F.T. simultaneously.

While no major dramatic emerged from the meeting, its importance lies in the fact that the E.A.C.-E.E.C. agreement cannot become meaningful until effective machinery for its enforcement is settled.

In this respect, much of the ground-work was completed at the Committee's inaugural meeting

COPPER FIRMS GET FAVOURABLE TERMS

Foreign copper mine groups in Zambia were reported in Lusaka at the weekend to have outwitted the Government in the recent negotiations on nationalisation of the mines.

The Times of Zambia newspaper reported that the Roan Selection Trust and the Anglo-American companies obtained terms greatly in their favour.

The report comes with the disclosure that the mine groups will be paid a management fee of one and a half per cent of total yearly copper sales regardless of whether the mines operate at a profit.

Zambian civil servants and businessmen are said to feel that this is "extraordinarily generous" and that the Government will pay out millions of pounds over the

next ten years in unnecessary expenses.

Civil servants, who say they wish to remain anonymous, reportedly said nothing could now be done to alter the terms of the agreement as it had been ratified by the Zambian Cabinet.

They said that the mine companies sent highly skilled financial advisers to the negotiations whereas the Government relied on local experts.

These local experts were allegedly outwitted in the talks. The critics said the companies should be paid a management fee based only on the 51 per cent share that the Government will have in the industry, instead of on the 49 per cent stake which the companies will continue to hold.

France may offer 'magic formula' at E.E.C. summit

French officials yesterday took a somewhat sceptical view of anticipation that President Georges Pompidou might pronounce some "magic formula" allowing renewed progress towards European political union at the Six-nation summit conference which opens today in The Hague.

Observers saw little inclination in French circles towards encouraging the hopes pegged on the two-day meeting of Heads of State and Government of the European Economic Community in this respect. These expectations have been based on predictions by some diplomats and other analysts that France could play in this respect.

However, French experts on European affairs are maintaining a very guarded position on all issues linked with political integration, including the question of "supranationality" and clearly "in a serious doubt about the prospects for major progress in this field in The Hague. Deeds, not words, are required in this domain, and the prospect of British entry into the E.E.C. have changed some of the basic facts of the problem, these sources say. French experts believe it would thus be illusory for any of the Six to unilaterally, say, the 1962 French-sponsored "Fouchet plan" for close co-ordination of the policies of the Six in the fields of foreign affairs, defence and economic until the question of a widening of the E.E.C. has been settled through a decision on whether or not Britain and other applicants should be allowed to join the community.

In any case, they say — and this does not reflect either a systematic opposition to "supranationality" or views inherited from former French President de Gaulle — the powers of any body set up to oversee the co-ordination of national policies would have to be defined very carefully.

As for France's position on the other issues expected to be discussed by the Six today and tomorrow, it is based on the already known views of the Paris government and will be firmly reaffirmed by M. Pompidou and his aides, officials

Firstly, France has lifted her former veto on British entry, but has posed two pre-conditions for opening negotiations with the applicant countries. One condition is completion of the common market before the end of the transitional phase next January — which mainly means agreement on a definitive arrangement for the financing of the E.E.C. common agricultural policy, in the sense that it can be amended in future only by unanimous agreement by member countries.

The second condition is that negotiations with the applicants must be conducted on behalf of the Six as a whole by joint representatives and according to an agreed procedure (that may possibly be laid down in The Hague).

Membership of the Kenya branch, which caters for business men in Nairobi generally and Karatina locally, continues to expand. The new office bearers are confident that the Chamber will be able to improve the services it offers to traders in the area.

S.A. economy worries big industrialist

South Africa's multimillionaire Mr. Harry Oppenheimer, said in Johannesburg he was very worried with being told that South Africa's economy was "seriously sound". "I don't think that the economy of a country which debilitated, sets out not to train and use 30 per cent of the potential of its working population can be called sound," he told the congress of the anti-apartheid Progressive Party in Johannesburg at the weekend.

Mr. Oppenheimer, chairman of the giant Anglo-American Corporation, was speaking on a resolution calling for economic progress for the non-White sector of South Africa's population. He is a founder member of the party. He said it was because the Government persisted in its policy that restrictions and controls would be found on all sides.

"As well as this, there is some intervention by the Government in what used to be called the private sector," he said.

A major economic problem facing South Africa was that of finding a replacement for gold as a foreign exchange earner, he said. If South Africa continued its current policies the problem would not be solved, he said.

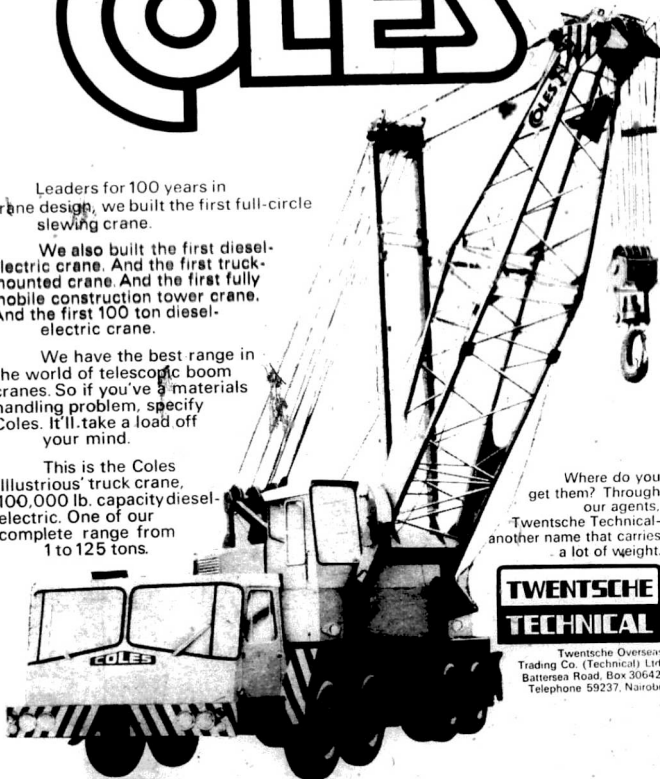

# 'Vietnam massacres for last five years' claim

Mr. Ralph Schoorman, the American Director of the Bertrand Russell Peace Foundation, has announced his intention to collect evidence to prove that atrocities like the "Son My Massacre" had been going on in Vietnam for the past five years with top-level approval.

His announcement coincided with the news that Lt. William Calley, who is to be court-martialed on charges of murdering 10 Vietnamese civilians at Son My, has been additionally charged with the murder of 11 Vietnamese in Quang Nam Province 11 months before the massacre.

An Army spokesman gave no further details of the new charges, but it appeared to follow statements to Army investigators by Calley's former subordinate, James Berghold, 22.

Berghold said that he had taken prisoner a Vietnamese civilian living in a hamlet near the middle of a field and handed him over to Calley to be interrogated.

When the man failed to talk, Calley drove him down a well and shot him in the head, Berghold alleged.

The Chicago Sun-Times has published two photographs showing a Vietnamese captive being dropped to his death from an American helicopter.

The pictures came as an ex-soldier testified in a court case, as reported in the Chicago Sun-Times, that he had seen many civilians being shot in the Chu Lai area, about 100 miles south of My Lai, since the end of an alleged massacre of more than 300.

The Sun-Times said its photographs had been reviewed by U.S. and British officials. The newspaper said that the prisoner — one of three in the helicopter — had been pushed out because he refused to talk to his interrogators.

One of the captives said in part: "Nguyen takes a look at the ground from 5,000 feet upside down. I would imagine he's a little up set about now — but not as upset as he'll be in a few minutes. . . . I could hear that guy weeping when John loosed his mine."

A South Vietnamese military court has sentenced four men to life imprisonment with hard labour for treason.

The sentences came at the end of the biggest spy trial in South Vietnam's history, in which 42 people, including 13 women, faced charges ranging from treason to acts harmful to public security.

The four sentenced to life imprisonment were Van Ngoc Nha, 39, Huynh Van Trong, 57, a former Special Assistant in President Nguyen Van Thieu's office, La Hoi Thuy, 43, a former Chief of Cabinet in the Open Army Ministry, and Nguyen Van Kinh, 46.

The 39 other defendants, who included 13 women, received sentences ranging from 20 years hard labour to three months' imprisonment. Two, both journalists, were temporarily released pending further investigations.

America's Apollo-12 astronauts arrived back in Houston, Texas at the weekend to a warm family welcome on a chilly Texas morning.

Sung in the mobile quarantine cabin after a jet flight from Hawaii, Navy Captains Alan Bean, Charles Conrad and Richard Gordon were welcomed by their families, neighbours and about 1,000 spectators at Ellington Air Force base.

"I understand it's 36 degrees out here", Conrad said through a loudspeaker. "It's great to be back. We had a lot of fun."

It was a real blast," Bean said. The three were taken on a lorry to the lunar receiving laboratory at the Manned Spacecraft Centre where they will remain in precautionary quarantine until about December 10.

It was the last leg in a journey which saw man's second lunar landing and a pinpoint splash-down on Monday.

The huge C-141 Starliner transport jet landed in the darkness at Ellington and rolled to a stop with its large tail door swung open.

The happy spacemen, who were waving and blowing kisses through the window finally spoke to their families on bright orange tele-phones.

Then Dr. Robert Gilruth, director of the Space Centre, welcomed them. "You did a great job. We're very, very proud," he said.

"That landing was great," Dr. Gilruth added. "Tell us about it." Laughter ensued.

## Pact broken says Vatican

The Vatican has said that the Italian Chamber of Deputies had gone against its understanding agreement with the Vatican by approving the Bill to grant divorce in Italy.

The claim was made by an authoritative newspaper editor in the Vatican newspaper L'Espresso.

The Bill to allow limited divorce in Italy for the first time, was passed with a 42-vote majority in the Chamber of Deputies against bitter opposition from the Vatican and the ruling Christian Democracy Party.

Now the Bill must be considered by the Upper House for approval.

## WALKOUT AT PEKING RECEPTION

Diplomats from the Soviet bloc countries staged a spectacular walkout from an Albanian National Day reception in Peking at the weekend after a violent attack on the Kengin-Bredhasi slogan.

It was the first such demonstration by the envoys of the bloc since the Chinese Premier visited Chou En-lai.

The incident occurred during a speech by the Albanian Ambassador, Mr. Dardaj Rober.

As Albanian and Chinese envoys gathered at the reception, Polish, Bulgarian, Czechoslovak, Hungarian and East German envoys marched from the hall.

The Soviet Union has indicated its relations with Albania are on a new footing.

The walkout occurred when Mr. Rober declared: "The Albanian Party and people have courageously waged against the Khrushchev line of Soviet revisionism and the Brezhnev-Kosygin clique of imperialists."

## Brazil airlines hijack

A passenger plane from Brazil and a cargo plane from Brazil were hijacked by a group of men in the Amazon region of Brazil. THE LIONS CONTROVERSY

Mr. Adamson replies to his critics

An alarming report on the future of public health in Nairobi has been made by the city's Medical Officer, Dr. Kabiru says standards are expected to start falling next year.

"Unless more money is provided, the trend will continue and become more pronounced in a few years' time," he warns. All along the line, the trouble seems to be over money. Funds for recurrent expenditure in 1970 have been held down to about the same level as for this year.

One of the worst restrictions on all public services is the question of recurrent expenditure. It is proving the bugbear with many self-help projects. Money is raised to build a school or dispensary. That is capital. What is going to pay for the upkeep year by year? This is a deficiency many local authorities have found out.

In Nairobi, they think before they leap. Dr. Kabiru says capital is available to provide health centres at Kahawa and Langata, where they are urgently needed. They cannot be built because nothing would be forthcoming to meet recurrent costs.

Unless more money can be found, there can be no expansion of the health services for Nairobi. And this in a fast growing city. If the standards are deteriorating now, how will the health services cope in, say, 20 years' time when it is estimated, Nairobi's population will reach 2,000,000?

Theoretically, a bigger population should result in more revenue from rate collections. But many of the new dwellings are of the shanty type, unratable. Moreover, Nairobi loses half its revenue from G.P.T. to the Government.

Part of the G.P.T. proceeds will go to pay for public services in rural areas. Next year the Government is to take over the responsibility for health services from the county councils, but not in the city and municipalities.

In order to maintain the city health services more money will have to be found. If it cannot be found, the city will be left only remedially to be raised the rates. No wonder the Public Health Committee noted Dr. Kabiru's report with deep concern.

Sentimental argument over 'Boy'

Sentimentalism blurs the argument over Boy, the problem lion. True, there is a genuine difference of opinion between wildlife experts. Onlookers among the general public are apt to be sentimentalists, having little or no real knowledge.

In his article published alongside, Mr. Adamson answers points raised by Mr. Theisler. Critical and contentious points. There the matter ought to rest since Boy cannot very well say what he would like to do.

What happened to his co-stars in 'Born Free'? They all seem to have lived happily ever after. Girl was successfully returned to wildlife at Meru and has had two litters. Eight others were successfully rehabilitated there. Two are living comfortably at Whipsnade, the zoo without bars. Only Boy is in trouble.

Even he was getting along pretty well, back on the old trail, until his encounter with a buffalo. Can human ties ever be broken? The affinity could work two ways. It could prevent the lion cager again becoming sufficiently capable of fending for itself in the law of the jungle. It could draw the lion back to human company but, "rehabilitation" having set in, there is the risk of taking fright and misbehaving, as Boy did.

He cannot be admitted to the Animal Orphanage for fear of disease. It is unlikely he will ever completely recover from his wound. One suggestion, therefore, is that he should be mercifully shot. Helms thought this seems to animal lovers, sometimes horses have to be destroyed, pets "put to sleep".

Boy is in his compound at Naivasha, with Mr. Adamson faithfully in attendance. But Mr. Adamson may be going off soon to Nepal, there to try returning his "humanised" tigers to wildlife.

The situation with tigers in the Indian sub-continent is far worse than with lions in Kenya, where conservation is so much more efficient. Because control has been lax, the number of tigers is estimated to have dropped from 25,000 to 30,000 in 1948 to no more than 2,000. Wildlife conservation and control over shooting matter most.

Ever since the shooting of "Born Free" the lions which took part in that picture have been the centre of controversy. Two recent articles in this newspaper have expressed views on returning the lions to the wild — by Wilfred Theisler (opinion) and Syd Downey (fact). In this article the man responsible for the whole exercise, GEORGE ADAMSON, replies to his critics.

It is clear that Mr. Theisler regards himself as an expert on lions, although most of his knowledge about these animals appears to have been acquired squinting over the sights of a television screen.

One wonders why it was necessary for Mr. Theisler to kill 70 lions in the short space of five years? Were these five animals doomed to death in the name of "sport" or was it some personal vendetta? During 23 years as game warden in charge of what is now known as the N.F.D., my duties did not comprise to kill any more lions than he claims to have shot in five years.

Mr. Theisler alleges that tame lions which have been rehabilitated are incompetent at fending for themselves, simply because one of them was injured by a buffalo. Most experienced game and park wardens will tell him that many lions are killed and injured by their prey. It is a normal hazard of a lion's life.

Mr. Theisler's contention carried to its logical conclusion would indicate that every human being should agree, by excluding Mr. Theisler, who admits being knocked down by a lion, who has been killed or injured by his quarry, as an incompetent hunter. Many wardens will tell him that a one-eyed lion is by no means an incompetent hunter, as it is the case with the lion "Ugas".

Mr. Theisler cannot see the point of returning tame lions to the wild. Well, the danger appears to be that those who look upon the wild creatures of the earth as something created by man, and especially for the benefit and entertainment of man, or who regard as a hostile a primitive mood-kill or boast a faltering ego, would agree. But there are others, and a growing number, who believe that lions are as much human as we have just as much right to live and enjoy as an incompetent hunter. Man, and who (unlike Mr. Theisler) ought to see them in their own right.

To my mind, the mentality which condones wild animals in life-long captivity is little removed from the mentality which condoned the slave trade 200 years ago. There were the same poor platitudes expressed to quieten conscience. Mr. Theisler: "A slave is a lazy creature, as anyone who knows about him will confirm. Keep in slavery, where he will get his food, without the bother of hunting for it, and provided he has company and adequate space, a slave is probably as content as he would ever be in his native land."

Unit William Witherford, no doubt thought in this way. He writes for his views. Perhaps, in a minor way, I am being to be the Witherford of lions and other wild animals.

Mr. Theisler questions the ability of tame lions to learn to hunt efficiently. It is a pity he never thought of the lion which camp in Meru Park and learnt at first hand about the capabilities of the lion. He suffers from the fallacy, common to many, that a lion should be taught by its mother how to hunt. A cub is born with an inherent knowledge of hunting. It merely requires the protection and encouragement of mother while developing and becoming a proficient hunter.

The same result can be achieved by a foster-parent, such as man. Mr. Theisler would like to see the trouble to read my book "Born Free" by Lawrence Sanders, which gives the lions the opportunity to become proficient hunters, as they are today.

Mr. Theisler implies that tame lions offend the public eye. I am not sure. My reply is that all lions are potential man-eaters. A lion is a carnivorous animal and his natural diet is probably just as acceptable as any, although meat is not his natural food. He is a wild animal, rehabilitated lions are less likely to eat human beings than their wild kind, simply because of their friendliness and trust towards human.

Mr. Theisler asks what proof is there that the rehabilitation of lions has been successful. The feeding of the lions had been much reduced by Lawrence Sanders. By the end of March it had been reduced to a near-sterilised condition. The lions to be returned to the wild, even he might agree that the rehabilitation has been successful. He refers to the unfortunate incident when a lion was shot. No one is more appreciative than myself of the fact that the lion was shot by a warden at the time. This was in contrast to the near-sterilised lion which was shot by a warden appearing in the Press from correspondence.

Mr. Theisler derides the value of the film "Born Free" and the particular exercise to the scene showing myself being taken to the lions. It would be interesting to know how many of the lions rehabilitated lions are less likely to eat human beings than their wild kind, simply because of their friendliness and trust towards human.

In spite of Mr. Theisler's strong opinion, I am sure that several countries saw and enjoyed the film, and judging by scores of letters received, proved a great interest in Kenya and its wildlife.

Mr. Theisler is chairman of the Senate Sub-committee on Indian Education, which recently published the results of a two-year investigation.

The sub-committee found that, among other things, the failure rate among Indians in higher education is twice that of the Government-run Indian schools in the same district.

The report also stated other grim facts — the average yearly income of Indians is 75 per cent below the national average, unemployment nearly 40 per cent above the Indian average, and a death rate of 44 and their infant mortality rate is twice the national average.

Discussing the report, Sen. Kennedy said that the Government's relations with the Indians on the reservations had been very broken promises and dashed hopes.

His sentiments were echoed by a delegation of Indians after a meeting with Vice-President Sir Sp. Agnew recently. "We do not know whether Agnew and the Government will keep their promises — for the Great White Father would become a man many times before, they said.

It is time the nation heard the Indian side of the story. The high national attention," he said. "The Government has a moral obligation to the Indian people under the rug."

Mr. Theisler's report, which was published in the "East African Standard" in an editorial recently that the bloody Indian side of the story, and life that began nearly 500 years ago has continued to the present day.

Mr. Theisler has an interview with a great on ash a subject has been given prominence, especially as the views stated are not only a matter of public interest, but also a matter of national importance.

The article "Born Free" lions should be penned" was a diatribe against the very commendable work that has been carried out by Mr. George Adamson, who has devoted his life to the conservation of wild life.

Not only has he given so much of his energy and time but he must not be overlooked, how much he has done for the public and Mr. Adamson for the well-being of the nation. He has done this article was ungracious, especially as it was only giving the views of one man who, obviously, has only a limited, second-hand knowledge of the subject.

Mr. Theisler stated that now the "Born Free" lions are being returned to the wild, it is inevitable that a disaster as these lions would become man-eaters. Did the lions Mr. George Adamson released at Serengeti National Park turn to man-eating after a few years? No, they did not. Perhaps Mr. Theisler did not know about these lions.

Does the shooting of 70 lions, an exploit which, surely, Mr. Theisler cannot be ignorant of, qualify him to make such dogmatic statements? He has done this article with a view to any danger as envisaged by Mr. Theisler, it is certain Mr. George Adamson, with his fresh, wide knowledge of lions and their ways, would never have attempted such a feat.

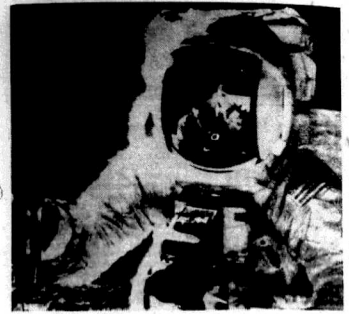

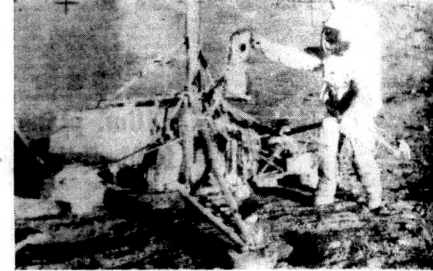

 Prof. Moro and Dr. Waldheim reached agreement on all important outstanding issues on an Italian proposal to meet the German-speaking minority's demands for equal rights.  
 In a communique the Minister said the foundations had been laid for measures which would end the dispute and introduce an era of constructive co-operation.  
 The talks were the culmination of eight years of tortuous negotiations between the two countries.  
 The dispute revolved round Austria's claim that a treaty signed in 1919 gave the German-speaking minority in the Alpine South Tyrol — which often flared into terrorism and violence — has been settled after talks in Copenhagen.  
 Austria now hopes that, as a result of the new agreement in talks between her Foreign Minister, Dr. Kurt Waldheim and Italy's Prof. Aldo Moro, Rome will support her request for special arrangements with the Communist East.

# Chinese plea to the world

The Chinese Premier, Mr. Chou En-lai, called on "the people of the world" to step up their vigilance against the war preparations of Russia and America which were directed against China.  
 Speaking at a meeting in Peking to discuss the recent controversy between officials and the foreign Diplomatic Corps, he made what observers in Hongkong called his strongest attack on Moscow since the Sino-Soviet border talks opened in the Chinese capital six weeks ago.  
 According to Peking Radio, Mr. Chou said the United States was continuing to push its policy of aggression and war in Asia, and was, in the opinion of the Chinese Government, making what he called a "stupid" attempt to bring the United States to the aid of the Japanese military alliance "to oppose China, to stamp out the way of resistance of the Vietnamese people against the U.S. and to undermine the unification of Korea," he charged.

# 'Green Beret' lawyer on stand-by

Capt. Ernest Medina, commander of the U.S. infantry company involved in the alleged Son My massacre in South Vietnam, has hired Mr. F. Lee Bailey as his defence lawyer although no charges have yet been brought against him.  
 Mr. Bailey said he would ask Capt. Medina to tell his version of what happened on March 16, 1968 — the day of the alleged massacre — in a television broadcast. Lt. Calley is to be court-martialed for murder of 109 South Vietnamese civilians.  
 Mr. Lee Bailey, like Lt. Calley's lawyer, Mr. George Lattimer, defended one of the eight "green berets" charged with the murder of a South Vietnamese double-agent in the recent abortive trial in South Vietnam.  
 Sen. Nguyen Gia Hien, leader of the Grand Union Front, a political party of Catholic refugees from North Vietnam residing in Saigon, called yesterday for a full investigation into the alleged massacre at Son My.  
 Sen. Hien, who is the third major South Vietnamese politician to make such a charge, said those guilty in the affair must be judged independently of their nationality.  
 The case, he said, was the most serious of the alleged massacres. In Saigon yesterday the South Vietnamese President, Mr. Nguyen Van Thieu, and the United States Ambassador, Mr. Ellsworth Bunker, met for nearly an hour in what observers thought was a discussion about the reported massacre.
