Struggles on pitch as Springboks play in Scotland

Police and anti-apartheid demonstrators struggled on the pitch during the South African Rugby team's match at Aberdeen yesterday. The game was held up for seven minutes after an invasion by about 30 demonstrators who ran on to the field and sat on the pitch. Two demonstrators climbed on to the scrum. They stood there for five minutes defying police and giving the Nazi salute.



Five people were injured and were rushed to Kenyatta National Hospital early yesterday when this crowd bused on Tom Mboya Street suddenly collapsed. The stand was opposite National and Grillways Bank. Apart from the five who were badly injured others received minor injuries. There were few people waiting for the bus at the time.

Call for ban on massacre news refused

A military court in Washington has declined to order an immediate halt to newspaper reports bearing on the alleged My Lai massacre in South Vietnam. The injunction would bar all news media from publishing potential evidence in the court martial of Lt. William L. Calley, on charges of murdering 109 Vietnamese civilians at My Lai in March, 1968. Lt. Calley's military defence counsel, Maj. Kenneth A. Rabby, told the three-man court: "The integrity of our military system in the United States is at stake."

to prepare talks with Britain

On the subject of the completion of the Common Market, a communiqué said the summit leaders have reaffirmed their Governments' wish to move from the period of transition to the final stage of the Common Market and therefore draw up the agricultural financial settlement by the end of 1969. President Pompidou presented a document scheme to promote strengthening and consolidation of the Community at the morning session, making it clear that the country would not object to negotiations — if its partners agreed to the French plan. As regards institutional problems like enlarging the powers of the assembly, M. Pompidou thought they could only be usefully tackled at the time of enlarging of the Common Market.

Struggles on pitch as Springboks play in Scotland

Before the match police warned that anyone who invaded the field would be arrested and charged in the sheriff's court. Scores of police grappled with squatting demonstrators who earlier had congregated on the terraces. A special squad of police stripped off their tunics and ties and ran on to the field after the first few demonstrators had scrambled on to the pitch soon after the start of the Springboks' match against the North of Scotland.

The crowd applauded as police headed long-haired students off the field towards waiting police vans. Earlier several hundred students marched through the streets of Aberdeen to protest against the Springboks' visit. The students, many carrying anti-apartheid banners, were accompanied by 20 policemen and a van bearing a huge Nazi sign. They converged on Linkfield Stadium, venue for the match. About 200 demonstrators claimed to have bought tickets.

Japan faces election

After three days of Parliamentary sessions, the 27th session of the House of Representatives was presented to the House on December 27. Under a Ministry of Finance spokesman, the Prime Minister, Mr. Eisaku Satō, said the opposition leaders' agreement in Washington to return to formal peace talks with the United States.

ISRAELI JETS HIT CANAL AGAIN

Israeli jets made two separate attacks on Egyptian targets along the Suez Canal yesterday, their fifth raid in 36 hours. They also hit Arab guerrillas in Jordan. In both raids, on the southern sector of the Canal, all Israeli planes returned safely to base, a military spokesman said in Tel Aviv. In the attack on Jordan earlier in the day, Israeli jets struck at Arab guerrillas lying in ambush in an orange grove near the deserted Jordanian village of Adashi. The strike was launched after an Israeli patrol came under fire south of the Sea of Galilee.

India's Test win

India beat Australia by seven wickets in the third cricket Test at New Delhi yesterday to level the series. This was India's third win over Australia in 23 Test matches. [Match report: Page 19]

Ghana aliens given last-minute reprieve

Many aliens due to be expelled last night were given a last-minute reprieve when the External Affairs Minister, Mr. Victor Osei, said African ambassador of new, less stringent rules. Under a Ministry of Interior directive that aliens without residence permits should leave the country by yesterday, an estimated 2,000-600 Africans would have been liable to prosecution for violating the order. But Mr. Osei told envoys of Nigeria, Upper Volta, Niger, Mali, Ivory Coast, Liberia and Sierra Leone that the Government was only aimed at reducing the number of undesirable aliens in the country over a few weeks.

Britain pays her debts in advance

Britain's gold and dollar reserves did so well in November that the Government was able to repay some overseas debts before payment became due, the British Treasury announced yesterday. Even after this and repayment of other debts, the reserve still increased by £190,000,000 during the month and now stand at £1,043,000,000, the highest they have been for a year. Some advance repayments were £180,000,000 to the International Monetary Fund towards the end of this month for settlement of charges on a loan made in 1969. Another £131,000,000 was paid to the Bank for International Settlements before it was repaid. Money was part of the assistance made before the late arrangements of June 1966 when Sterling was coming under severe pressure. "Both these items have been repaid in advance of the due date at Britain's initiative," said a Ministry spokesman yesterday. — Reuters

Greek regime 'a danger to free Europe'

Europe would be unwise to ignore the threat to democracy represented by the continuation of the present Greek regime, a manifesto signed by 55 top Greek personalities said yesterday. The text, released to the Foreign Press in Athens, was signed by opponents of the regime including three former Ministers, dismissed naval officers, artists and writers, etc., and a former Greek Ambassador. The position of democracy by force in Greece has brought about a tragic reversal in national life and created dangers for the future whose gravity grows increasingly apparent. Greece had gone against its traditions to uphold democracy and freedom, made after 1945 in the European Convention on Human Rights, the Council of Europe Treaty, the Treaty of Association with the Congo, and the Convention on the North Atlantic Treaty, the text said. The text went on: "Greece is thus cutting itself off from the community of its friends and associates and going down the road of moral and political isolation." "The reappearance of totalitarianism does not concern Greece alone. It is a danger for democratic Europe. The Congress would be unable to ignore." The manifesto warned that the title of Greece would be used involuntarily in an explosive situation. The signatories included: C. Karamanlis, former Minister and former Prime Minister; Mr. A. C. Minister opens Seven-day Adventist church

The Minister for Power and Communications, Mr. James Nyanjira, has told Christians that the Kenya Government upheld the Constitution, which guaranteed freedom of worship. The Minister was speaking to church members when he opened Church of the Day Adventist Church in Nyandarua Location, Kiisi District, Nyanja Province.

The church was built on a self-help basis by the people of the area at a cost of £10,000. Mr. Nyanjira urged Christians of all Churches to pray for the stability of the country and the long life of President Kenyatta.

Mr. Nyanjira, who was accompanied by Pastor Peter and other Church leaders, praised the community for their dedicated efforts in building the church and encouraged them to maintain the spirit of barabaras.

At a fund-raising campaign for the church the Minister gave a 200-gallon water tank and his wife four archbats.

Speaking to elders and children at Kerera Primary School, the Minister emphasized the need to respect elders, who were the leaders in a community, because without respect there was no progress.

He explained the importance of girls' education and asked parents to send their children to school, "for they are the future leaders of the country."

We have achieved political independence and what is needed is economic independence. The wealth of our country must remain in the hands of our people," the Minister said.

Take care of Government funds plea to magistrates

Adequate supervision of accounting operations was one of the best safeguards against irregularities and losses of Government funds, the Tanzania Controller and Auditor-General, Mr. M. Aboud, said in Dar es Salaam yesterday.

Opening a five-day accounting course for ten resident magistrates at the Luther House, Mr. Aboud told them that they should always be as careful with Government money as they would be with their own.

He said that in the last Audit Report, mention was made of the high losses in the judiciary which illustrated the need for closer control over revenue collections and for the observation of all the usual safeguards.

"Adequate supervision of accounting operations is one of the best safeguards against irregularities and losses of Government funds and above all, remember that you should be at least as careful with Government's money as you would be of your own," he said.

Uganda to tighten up on schools

Standard Staff Reporter, Kampala.
A new Education Bill to fit in with changes taking place in Uganda's school system, and to tighten up the controls on private schools, has been published by the Uganda Minister for Education, Dr. S. J. L. Zake.

In a memorandum to the Bill, which is to be presented to the National Assembly, the Minister says its purpose was to take into account the new circumstances of school management and administration, to make teachers public officers, and to give effect to the recommendations of the 1967 committee which examined private schools in Uganda.

The Bill continues some of the existing provisions relating to the control and management of schools. Provision is made for the registration of qualified teachers, and for a Teaching Service Commission which will have powers to discipline teachers employed in public schools.

Qualified teachers employed in private schools will be disciplined by the Chief Education Officer. There is also provision for unqualified people to be licensed to teach.

Further clauses in the Bill provide for tighter control and management of private schools. The Chief Education Officer would be empowered to close any private school which is not properly managed, or if the ownership of a school is transferred without his approval.

The Minister for Education will have power to re-open a private school which has been closed by the Chief Education Officer, if it is in the national interest to do so, and he may appoint a statutory manager to run, manage and control such a school in place of its owner.

Provision is made for an Appeals Tribunal, to which qualified teachers employed in private schools, and all licensed teachers, may appeal against decisions of the Chief Education Officer.

£175,000 BUILDING FOR ARUSHA CO-OP

Standard Staff Reporter, Arusha.
The Arusha Region Co-operative Union is to build a four-storey headquarters in Arusha at a cost of £175,000.

Work on the project, along the town's busiest street — Uhuru Road, opposite the Labour Office and the Central Library, is to start early next year, the General Manager of the union, Mr. F. K. Kem, said.

The building, when completed will house offices of the union, which are now temporarily situated at Da River, a branch of the National Co-operative Bank, which will serve Northern Tanzania, a large conference hall, offices and shops.

The plan of the building was drawn by a Dar es Salaam architect, Mr. B. J. Amali. Mr. Amali has drawn plans for buildings of co-operative societies in other regions.

Mr. Kem said that arrangements for the building site in their final stages and construction work is expected to start in four months' time. A period of grace given by the Town Council for the work to start on the plot expires in June.

The building is to be partly financed by the National Insurance Corporation and the rest will be met from the union's resources. There's no business like show business says Vicky Udall

Nowadays more and more lines of business are opening their doors to women and allowing them to make their own careers. But let us not kid ourselves, the majority of women still end up as secretaries or housewives, or both. However women, earn their living, there are times when the routine of their job gets them down and they yearn to fulfil the romantic side of their nature. Then their thoughts turn to the unconventional lives led by people such as models, artists and actresses.

But are these professions really as glamorous as we make them out to be?

I posed this question to Kenya-born Miss Vicky Udall, who has made a name for herself as a professional dancer and actress.

"Glamorous? In a word — no! If you go to a first night with all the champagne, yes, it's super. But all the hard slog that goes on backstage certainly isn't."

Vicky, wearing slacks and an old sweater, was slumped across chair making a well-deserved break during rehearsal for her next show, *June of Green Gables*, which will play

at the Donovan Maude Theatre over Christmas.

The two of us were seated on a deserted stage. Rows of empty seats loomed on one side of the footlights and on the other side was a form-looking stage set. In the dim electric light the props had definitely lost their sparkle. I began to see just what Vicky, an attractive brunette, meant.

She was warming up to her subject and continued with an account of why her job was probably less glamorous than that of the ordinary secretary.

"When I was in *Italian Girl* I was carried on stage and laid on the floor after I had drowned. In order to look the part I had to cover myself from head to foot with petroleum jelly. Try getting that off every night plus all the dirt you've collected from the stage floor. And all for a 25-second appearance."

Vicky, whose real love is dancing and whose acting parts resulted from this, first decided she was going to be a dancer at the age of six. However, unlike other small girls, it was more than a passing fancy. Her ambition increased along with her aptitude and when she was 11, she was sent to the Pembury Ballet School in England to study professionally. Elizabeth, whose studio centre on the theatre, has had many famous graduates — among them Maylie Mills.

While there Vicky practised two hours a day in between her normal classes, and in her final year danced from nine in the morning until six at night.

"We never had time for anything else," Vicky recalled. "We were always rushing between classroom and the dancing studio — and my

system still hasn't recovered from all the hurried meals I wolfed down. I still can't break myself of the habit of gobbling my food, and you'll find that most other theatrical people are the same."

"What did all the rush, hard work hours of practice bring? At 17, Vicky made her stage debut at Worthing, England, in *Goldilocks and the Three Bears*."

"In the back row of the chorus, of course. I also understudied the Mother Bear because I was too big to fit in with the other costume glamorous, can you?"

From there Vicky moved to London where she danced for seven years in West End musicals. She also managed to get a part in the occasional TV commercial, and for two years she danced in the TV show *Sunday Night at the London Palladium*.

She was appearing in a musical at the same time so this meant that she was working seven nights a week as well as rehearsing from nine every morning until 5.30 for the evening. Then there was just time to gulp down a steak — no more-boasting drink was allowed before the curtain went up — before rushing to the dressing room to make up for the evening's performance.

Like every other actress or dancer Vicky has a long and strenuous life. "You have to be up a little time for other things her life centres round her job."

"You have to have an actress isn't good. Lots of men think it's great to have an actress for a girlfriend until they actually do. Then most of them change their minds and go home quickly. We don't get off work until 11.30 at night. Then we're just beginning to wake up

and are ready to go on until four in the morning. But the average business man isn't. Who wants to wait around until midnight before he can take his girlfriend out to dinner?"

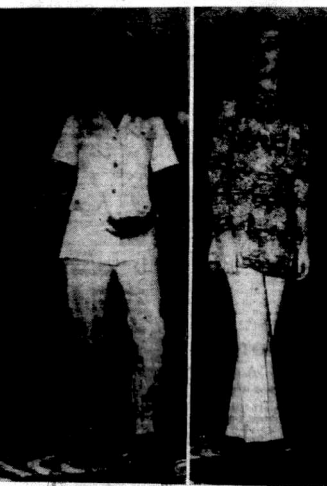
Holidays are not much better according to Vicky. "After appearing for a year in a musical you're entitled to one week's holiday. Otherwise being on holiday just means that you're out of work. Then you're so busy trailing round all the agents you don't think about actually relaxing."

"This brought Vicky to another point. "We've got to have very strong convictions just to stand up to the strain. We survive on nervous energy. A friend of mine who is a secretary said she couldn't remember the last time she was nervous. Well, I remember only too well! I'm a bundle of nerves every time I go for an audition and before each musical opens."

"I've also distorted my hip and had thousands of twisted ankles, slipped discs and pulled hamstring. Once, when I did a clumsy movement, two of my ribs crossed over each other. But nothing has ever put me out of action. No matter how sore the injury I've always gone on that night and danced."

So far the picture Vicky had painted of theatre life was convincingly unglamorous. But when I asked her why she went through all this to be a dancer, she didn't hesitate. "I've got the calling. It's because I love dancing. But don't think I'm a bit vain."

"You'd be nuts to stay on if you don't love it. There's too much drudgery involved. But if you love it, you'll never want to be anything else."

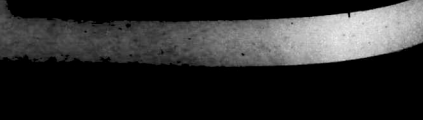

Greece faces expulsion from Europe's council

Greece is threatened with expulsion from the Council of Europe. Membership is regarded in the hallmarks of respectability. Greece's credentials can be admitted. This week Britain's Foreign Secretary discusses the problem of the colonels.

The days of grace are running out for the military junta led by Col. Papadopoulos, which has held Greece under its dictatorial rule since April, 1967.

Greece is one of the 18 member States of the Council of Europe. She is now threatened with expulsion. And if she is expelled the colonels, for all their devil-

may-care brigadocks, will not like it.

The Council of Europe, now in its 21st year, may not be one of the world's driving forces. Its Assembly is purely consultative; it can only make recommendations to the Committee of Ministers, who are not obliged to accept them.

But membership of the Council is regarded in Europe as the hallmark of democratic respectability; the Council's Statute lays it down that only democracies can be admitted.

For this reason France's Spain and Italy's Yugoslavia are excluded. And so is 'corruptive' Portugal, although she is considered good enough to be a member of Nato.

Greece was the cradle of democracy. That high distinction, however, has been tarnished by her falling under dictatorships in modern as well as ancient times.

In her more democratic days she always claimed popular backing. In the Mediterranean 'Papa Doc' has had to be more circumspect. For the junta he felt obliged to justify his seizure of power by claiming that he only acted as a last resort to forestall a Communist coup d'etat.

It has also an assigned that parliamentary rule was not being established but merely suspended, that nothing endures so long as the Communist danger has been evaded.

But the French have a saying that nothing endures so long as the provisional, and the truth of this has once again been exemplified in Greece.

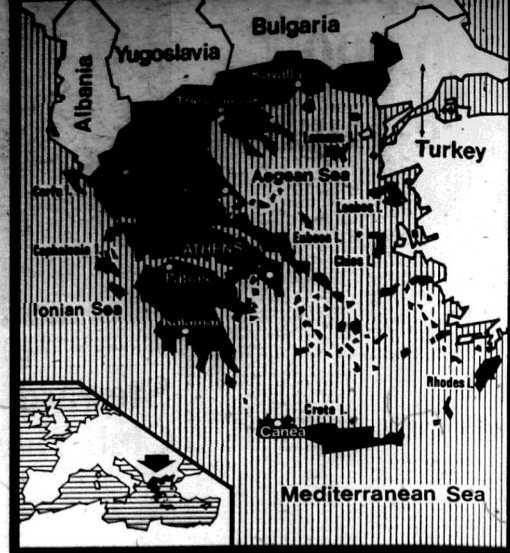
After young King Constantine had failed in his bid to oust the junta, as, month after month, the Council of Europe's Assembly began to agitate for the expulsion of Greece; and early this year the Assembly recommended the Committee of Ministers to take that drastic step.

The Ministers met in May, but in spite of strong pressure from the Scandinavians and the Dutch they agreed to postpone their decision until December, hoping that in the meantime the Greek junta would take steps to restore democratic freedoms and basic human rights.

The people is nearly over and freedom has not been restored to Greece. If the junta's international standing was shaky six months ago today it is even worse.

In July the Greek trade union federation was expelled from the International Federation of Free Trade Unions. In September Mr Karamanlis, the leading Greek Conservative, broke a long silence with a strong denunciation of the junta's dictatorship.

And in November King Constantine began a personal campaign, making a round of visits to political leaders in Europe, with



the aim of getting Greece expelled from the Council of Europe.

British Government, both Labour and Conservative, have always had a warm regard for the Greek Royal Family and it is hardly surprising to find Mr. Stewart, the British Foreign Secretary, announcing that Britain will vote for the expulsion of Greece 'unless there are indications of a speedy return to democracy' — which at the moment, there certainly are not.

The two-thirds majority which will be required for the expulsion now seems assured. Since the Ministers met in May, West Germany has got a Social Democrat as Chancellor and can be expected to vote against the junta.

In the same period France has dropped Gen. de Gaulle, but with her eye on lucrative Greek orders for nuclear reactors, and frigates she is expected to cast her vote against expulsion.

The junta's most powerful backer in the world today is, of course, the United States.

But the Americans have nothing to do with the Council of Europe. Where they do have a say is in Nato, and as long as Greece remains in that body why should the Americans worry?

The junta, however, will have good cause to worry if Greece is expelled from the Council of Europe.

For the Greek democrats who are resisting their dictatorship would take the Council's vote as a justification of all their efforts in the past and an encouragement to greater efforts in the future.

Sir Edward to have soldier's funeral

The Queen is to be represented by Lt-Col. Peter Prescott, the C.O. of the 1st Bn the Grenadier Guards, at today's military funeral for the ex-Kabaka of Buganda at the Guards' Chapel, Wellington Barracks.

Sir Edward was commissioned in 1947 into the battalion, which is providing pallbearers. The Grenadier's band will also provide funeral music at the chapel.

The burial, however, will be purely private and troops will not accompany the bearers. The ex-Kabaka's coffin will be covered by his personal standard.

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office is reluctant to state whether the British Government will be formally represented. A spokesman said yesterday that no decision had been made. But the F.O. is closely following events and quietly sent an observer to the inquest and will also have someone at the funeral service.

Whichever prefers to remain uninvolved but, whatever official unse- there is, a full congregation is expected at the chapel. It is just the kind of fashionable send off that Sir Edward would have wished.

The Uganda Government fully understands that the disposal of the body is a matter for his widow and immediate relatives or their appointed executors to decide. However, the Government will not be disturbed in any way by the decision of the widow and close relatives to have the body buried in London or in any other place outside Uganda, for that matter.

Greece is threatened with expulsion from the Council of Europe. Membership is regarded in the hallmarks of respectability. Only desecration can be abolished. The week William Forrest discusses the problem of the colonists.

The days of grace are running out for the military junta led by Col. Papadopoulos, which has held Greece under its dictatorial rule since April, 1967.

Greece is one of the 18 member States of the Council of Europe. She is now threatened with expulsion. And if she is expelled the colonel, for all their devil-

may-care brigadoos, will not like it.

The Council of Europe, now in its 21st year, may not be one of the world's diva forces. Its Assembly is purely consultative; it can only make recommendations to the Committee of Ministers, who are not obliged to accept them.

But membership of the Council is regarded in Europe as the hallmark of democratic respectability. The Council's Statute lays it down that only democracies can be admitted. For this reason, Franco's Spain and Tito's Yugoslavia are excluded. And so is "cooperative" Portugal, although she is considered good enough to be a member of Nato.

Greece was the cradle of democracy. That high distinction, however, has not prevented her from falling under dictatorships in modern as well as ancient times. But her modern dictators have always claimed popular backing.

In the Caribbean a dictator like Papa Doc can get away with the murder of democracy in the Mediterranean "Papa Doc" has to be more circumspect. For one thing he felt obliged to justify his seizure of power by claiming that he only acted as he did in order to forestall a Communist coup d'état.

He also gave an assurance that parliamentary rule was not being abolished but merely suspended; that the junta would hand back power to the people once the Communist danger had been eradicated.

But the French have a saying that nothing endures so long as the provisional, and the truth of this has once again been exemplified in Greece.

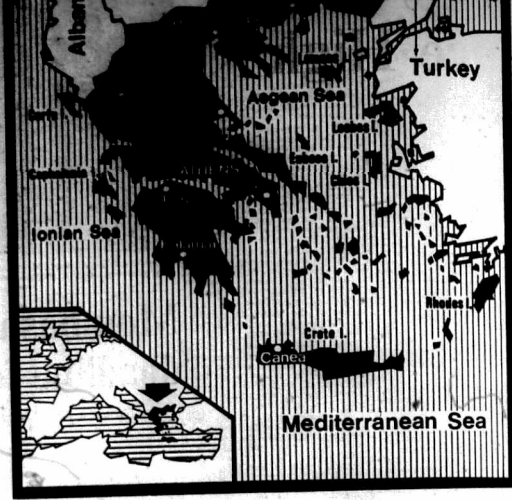
After young King Constantine had failed in his bid to oust the junta, and a month after a month passed with no set-up in martial law, the Council of Europe's Assembly began to agitate for the expulsion of Greece and early this year the Assembly recommended the Committee of Ministers to take that drastic step.

The Ministers met in May, but in spite of strong pressure from the Scandinavians and the Dutch they agreed to postpone their decision until December, hoping that in the meantime the Greek junta would take steps to restore democratic freedoms and basic human rights.

The respite is nearly over and freedom has not been restored in Greece. If the junta's international standing was shaky six months ago today it is even worse.

In July the Greek trade union federation was expelled from the International Federation of Free Trade Unions. In September Mr. Karamanlis, the leading Greek Conservative, broke a long silence with a strong denunciation of the junta's dictatorship.

And in November King Constantine began a personal diplomatic campaign, making a round of visits to political leaders in Europe with

However, the Government will not be disturbed in any way by the decision of the widow and close relatives to have the body buried in London or in any other place outside Uganda for that matter.

SWISS CAUTIOUS ON MEDIATION

The Swiss Government will make a move on the subject of mediation in the Nigerian crisis only if it is convinced that all relevant information, "final action and in Berlin on Monday night. Women held for murders

One of the women was arrested on Monday in Mobile, Alabama, while the other is still at large. A 24-year-old Texas man, now in jail in his native State, was accused of one murder at Mr. Polanski's home high in the canyons of the exclusive Hollywood residential area. Police said they expected to implicate four or five other suspects in the killings of Mr. Polanski's pregnant wife, the actress, Miss Sharon Tate, a hairdresser, Miss Jay Sebring, a coffee waitress, Miss Abigail Folger, a Polish cinema photographer, a Polish cinema friend of the estate's caretaker. Police Chief Edward M. Davis told a Press conference that arrest warrants were out for Linda Louise Kasabian, who is still being sought and is believed to be in New Mexico. Patricia Keweenaw, 21, was arrested in Alabama and Charles D. Watson, 24, is in a Texas jail.

Protest over diplomat by Nigeria

Nigeria has protested to the British Government about what it calls the "unjustified and unlawful" treatment of a Nigerian diplomat, Mr. Clement Gromwell, by the police when he was arrested in Britain on November 15. A note delivered to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in London on Monday night by Mr. B. A. T. Balawa, the Deputy High Commissioner, said Mr. Gromwell was "handcuffed and beaten up" in a police car. Mr. Gromwell and his wife and children were left in near hysteria at the place he was arrested. The note said Mr. Gromwell, 33, First Secretary at the Nigeria High Commission, had gone shopping and as he was about to drive away was challenged by a policeman about ownership of the vehicle. He said the car, a Mercedes imported from Germany, belonged to him and offered to produce "documentary evidence."

"He was not given a chance by the police," said the note. "Instead he was grabbed and dragged out of his car into a waiting police car by four policemen including a sergeant." The Home Secretary, Mr. Callaghan, said subsequently in the Commons that diplomats in London had a responsibility in conduct themselves in the manner expected of ordinary citizens while they were in Britain. But the protest note said that Mr. Callaghan's statement on the affair was based on a police report and was "a negation of British law" which condemned Mr. Gromwell "without hearing his version of the incident." It added that British diplomats in Nigeria would continue to enjoy diplomatic privileges and immunities. — A.P.P.

Rhodesia's forgotten men count the years

Rhodesia's 220,000 Whites have been celebrating four full years of U.D.I. But there is no joy for the "forgotten men", the political leaders of 5,000,000 Rhodesian Africans. Since well before U.D.I. they have been held without trial in jails or restriction camps. For most there is scant hope of freedom.

One man has been held without trial for almost ten years and has eye trouble. He is Daniel Madimbani. Appeals to Ian Smith's Government have had Madimbani released have proved unavailing.

Many of these political prisoners are former teachers. Joshua Nkomo, president of the banned Zimbabwe African People's Union, is a graduate first married in 1962, jailed in 1963, and since then held continuously for nearly six years at the remote and unhealthy Gwomatuzwa camp.

Rhodesia has its "forgotten women" as well. Typical is Mrs. Jane Ngevu, separated from her two children since 1964 and in poor health. Mrs. Ngevu is held at Wha Wha, where she breeds the camp welfare committee.

According to the latest official figures, there are 211 African held in restriction in Rhodesia and 140 in detention. Many, like Mrs. Ngevu, have been given "three-year orders" — fixing the minimum period for which they will be held without recourse to normal judicial procedure.

A slow process of screening can bring release, either for health reasons, or when a detainee has seemed so long politically dormant that there may be some arrest.

While Ian Smith's "U.D.I. Republic" many of the banned leaders of Rhodesia's Black majority have been detained without trial for five years. Here MUSAFA KAZAMBE tells of one who has been given his freedom.

or some other form of surveillance. One man who has endured the life of Rhodesia's political prisons and remarkably gained his freedom is Shakespear Makoni. He was flown to London at the expense of the British Government and has joined York University to study for a doctorate.

He passed his examinations for a B.Sc. degree after studying in the corrugated iron hut he shared with 24 other detainees. "All the noise made it more difficult," he admits.

Mr. Makoni had been publicity secretary of the Southern Rhodesia African Students' Union. He was arrested three and a half years ago, comparatively recently — while a student at the University College in Salisbury.

He was taken to Gwelo in January, 1966, and charged with 14 counts of arson and eight of malicious injury to property. Police alleged that he had burned down farms, cattle dip tanks, bridges and Government buildings. He was held in Salisbury for a month of charges were dismissed.

Immediately the authorities ordered him to be detained at Gwomatuzwa. Moves by the University for him to be detained on the campus came to nothing. But in a compromise the Smith regime agreed to let him go on studying in detention.

He had just seen his daughter, Pepuka, when she was six months old at the time of his arrest. She was four when he was freed — and did not know him.

Back to the land

Brig. Akwasi Afrifa, chairman of Ghana's Presidential Commission, went back to work on Monday — as a tractor driver.

The chairman has been spending a holiday living with the people of Krobue, just outside his home town of Mampoma in Ashanti, building houses and repairing the ravages of last year's floods.

According to eye-witnesses, the 33-year-old Head of State seemed to be enjoying driving a tractor and shaping the life of a village while encouraging the villagers in their community project.

His absence from the public scene had caused a swirl of rumors that he was ill and had gone abroad for medical treatment, but he pronounced himself sound and fit.

"Tell them I am stronger and finer than when I was chairman of the National Liberation Council," he told a reporter.

The N.L.C. resigned last October to make way for a civilian administration after ruling Ghana for more than three years.

It drove several detainees to madness and they have been moved to mental hospitals.

From time to time his money was sent by Christian Care, a movement launched by religious organizations to help stranded families of detainees. "But many times the money just did not arrive. It is anybody's guess what happened to it. The authorities said they did not know."

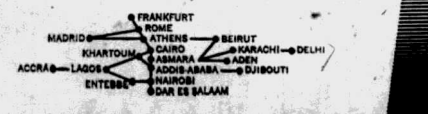
Mr. Makoni escaped in 1967 in a bid to reach Zambia and freedom. He was recaptured 150 miles from the camp and sentenced to six months' jail plus a fine of £10.

After that the authorities took no chance. They ordered him to be detained in Gwelo Prison, where he shared a cell measuring 12ft x 12ft with six other detainees.

In this cell he lived for two years. He passed a post-graduate examination and qualified to enter York University.

To relax detainees played Monopoly and draughts — only introduced after strict improvements to the regime by the Red Cross. It was at Gwelo that his wife was finally informed about his being allowed to go to the U.K. "I almost cried with joy," he recalls.

The town that is gradually dying

A sign on the highway leading to a picturesque little coastal community in Morocco announces "Essaouira: Town for sale."

Dashed in white paint on the mottled surface of the sign is probably the work of local boys who feel their township is doomed to die if no outside entrepreneur can be persuaded to breathe fresh life into it.

Essaouira, formerly known as Mogador, is rapidly becoming a ghost town, and indeed already looks like a ghost town. It is located on a highway almost like a mirage.

It stands on a rocky plateau with the Atlantic Ocean pounding against it. A visitor could imagine Spanish galleons anchored in the bay and swashbuckling heroes striding along its medieval ramparts.

From its monumental gateways and wide battlements portside rows of bronze cannon, of Spanish and Portuguese origin, aimed seaward at long-ago enemies or corsairs.

Probably the cleanest and most intact town in Morocco, it was founded in 1769 by Sultan Mohammed bin Abdallah, who commissioned a French architect, Coran of Avignon, to design it.

As a result, unlike the labyrinthine layout of most Moroccan towns, Essaouira was given a rectangular plan with wide, straight streets enclosed by imposing fortifications.

The Sultan founded it as an important outlet for the caravan trade from Timbuktu, far to the south across the Sahara Desert. In those days it had a prosperous merchant community, including many English agents who introduced the Moroccans to tea — today a national drink.

They also started the fashion for indigo blue cloth, still used in Southern Morocco by the "Blue People" whose skin turns blue when the cheap dye runs.

Such trading activities are today only a memory. The merchants who traded textiles for tea, gold and ivory have gone. Consulates have been turned into shops, and only sardine fishing boats frequent the harbour.

In this century the phenomenal rise of ports like Casablanca (with 10,000,000 tons of traffic annually), Rabat, Tangier and Agadir have soured the land for Essaouira.

Activity is reduced to a little fishing and trading in farm produce from the hinterland, including cereals and the fruit of the argan, a stunted and thorny tree on whose branches the black goats of the region sometimes perch.

Despite the little town's undoubted charm and beauty, even tourists tend to neglect it. In any case there are only two hotels, with accommodation for a maximum of 92 visitors.

Since Morocco's independence in 1956, nearly all the 3,500 Jewish

and European residents have left. Many of the younger generation of Moroccans too have deserted the town for the bright lights of Casablanca or Rabat, leaving a depleted population of about 25,000.

Within the town a few craftsmen make marjari tables and boxes of hard thuya wood inlaid with lemon wood, ebony, silver, ivory and mother of pearl.

Europeans used to call the town Mogador, after the name of a 14th-century Portuguese settlement on the site. This in turn became Sidi Magadal, the name of a local saint whose shrine stands nearby.

One legend says Sidi Magadal was actually a Scottish seaman cast away on the thuya shores whose real name was MacGouldal, but he is probably as impractical as the other Scotsman, Macraes, whom some people claim founded the Moroccan city of Meknes.

Essaouira dignitaries lament the business gaily that has died but warn their town is dying and even the Government's economic development plan seems to pass it by.

Some say that like the 19th-century comorian city of Niua-doma to the east, Essaouira will soon be buried beneath the sand dunes, with only a mound of sand marking up the tombstones.

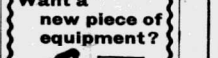

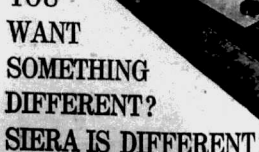

Indira Gandhi, India's Prime Minister, has survived on the sufferance of Communists, Independents and the D.M.K. (Dr. M. Karunanidhi) party of Tamil Nadu.

She often said that she was hampered by the old guard who did not allow her to fulfil the Congress manifesto. Now the scapegoat is sitting in opposition.

If Mrs. Gandhi fails to solve the massive unemployment problem or the land problem the young people backing her today and organising rallies in her support will desert her. So will the Communists and Socialists.

Sixth Formers at sea for Christmas

They sail from Southampton at the beginning of December for the East Caribbean - Barbados, Trinidad, St. Lucia and Antigua - for four weeks.

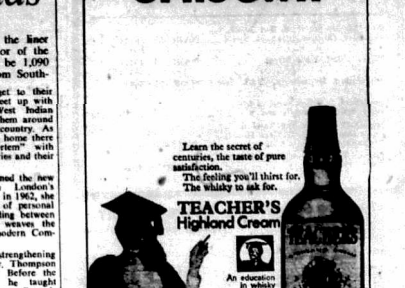
It is the second educational cruise to be organised by the Institute in collaboration with the British India Steam Navigation Company. The first was in 1968, when 1,000 sixth formers and 200 teachers went to West Africa, accompanied by the former Director, Sir Kenneth Bradley, who retired last May.

Between 1949 and 1952 he was Colonial Attaché at the British Embassy in Washington. He also acted as a Caribbean Commissioner, which meant frequent visits to the West Caribbean sea area. Already there are 630 firm bookings and 200 tentative applications. Mr. Thompson says the only limit to continuing the programme is finance. The students contribute £90 each to the cruise.

If the cruise is the best way to bring about contact between students from the Commonwealth countries, Mr. Thompson says, "we shall continue with them, provided we have sufficient financial capabilities."

The present weakness of the cruise is that it is only for students from Britain. Mr. Thompson looks to the time when students from other Commonwealth countries can take part in the cruise. On the outward voyage to Nevasa the students will be briefed by British and West Indian lecturers.



New Parliament may be 40 per cent new faces

Standard Staff Reporter
Kenya's new Parliament may have "about 35 to 40 per cent new faces", two Ministers forecast in Nairobi yesterday.

The Minister for Defence, Dr. Mungai, who is overseer of the Kani primary elections, and the Minister for Commerce and Industry, Mr. Kibaki, were answering a questioner at the weekly Press conference on the elections.

Dr. Mungai forecast this percentage turnover after Mr. Kibaki had given an estimate that 60 seats might have new Members.

Mr. Kibaki said there was a danger of losing a number of very good Parliamentarians who were closely tied with national issues. This is because the elections were being fought on local issues, and they might be thought to be out of touch with these.

Kenya, Dr. Mungai had emphasised that Kani was not sponsoring any official candidates for the primaries. He said it was a question on a statement by the Kani vice-president, Mr. Njiru Njiru, that the party was sponsoring candidates "to avoid appointing any people who did not even possess constituency offices for more than five years".

Dr. Mungai said this was not an official party line. A local party committee had been formed to support a candidate but it could not prevent other candidates who had been nominated, from fighting the primaries.

He said Mr. Kibaki estimated that the turnout at polling stations would be up to 80 per cent. There had been a lot of interest shown during the campaign and that he would attend and everybody, everywhere, talking about the elections.

Dr. Mungai thought the voting might not be as high as it was in 1968. He did not expect there to be any boycott at Nyarua, where a lot of activity was going on.

He thought only a few people would be unable to vote by reason of being away from their constituencies on day of due to being in hospital. Others, even policemen on duty should be able to go to vote and then return to duty.

Although polling day would not be a holiday, the Minister appealed to employers to allow their employees time off to go and vote and to provide transport for those who had long distances to travel, if they could afford it.

In a comment on the result of the intention of the number of former K.P.U. supporters, which had been permitted by the ruling party, Dr. Mungai said that, because of this integration, the Government was prepared for the possibility of more sharply defined Left and Right wings of Kani after the elections.

He also faced the situation before Kani had Right and Left wings some years ago and we hoped, we did not worry by the development of a similar situation.

On election eve, Dr. Mungai told overseas journalists that stores which were not facing might scare away tourists, but added that there had been no reports of cancellations; he thanked correspondents for the interest expressed as completely untrue a report in a Nairobi newspaper (not the East African Standard) that a petrol bomb had exploded in a car at a meeting in Limuru. Nothing of the kind had happened and he did not know if anyone should have used such a story.

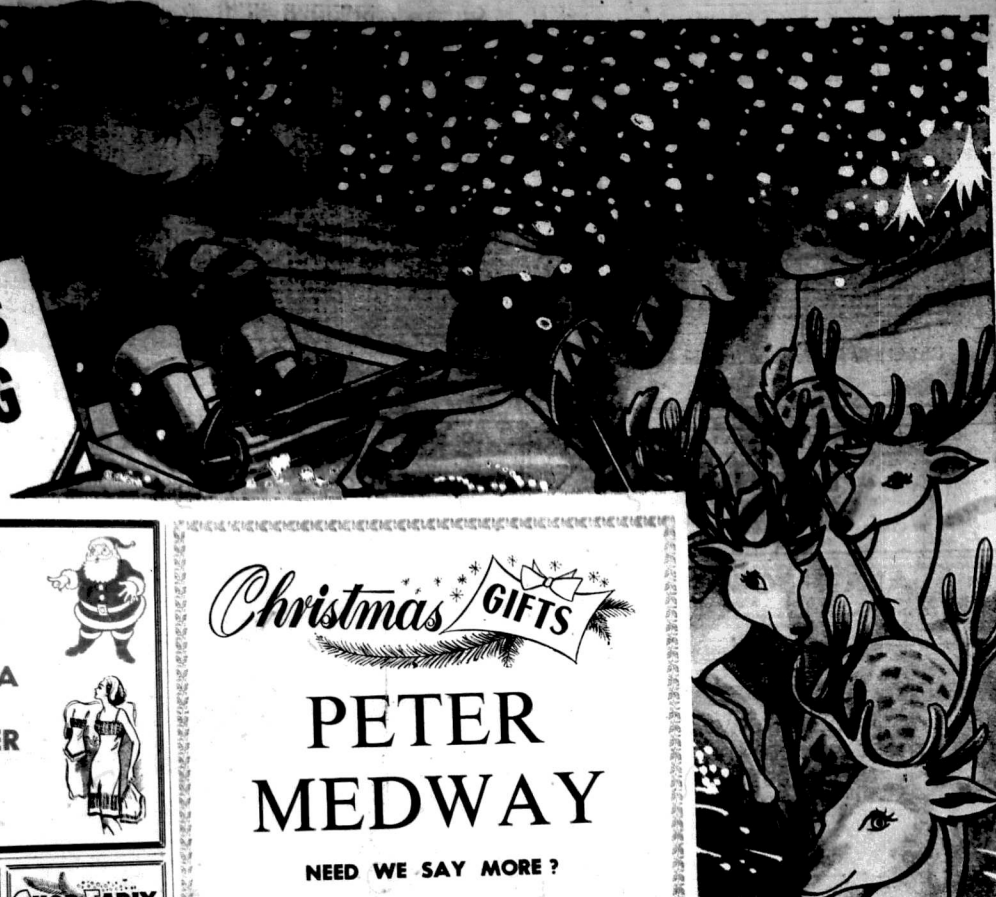

ELECTION ROUND UP Law-breakers warned of harsh penalties

A warning that the Government would not hesitate to bring to justice any person, or group of persons, violating the law of the country during the election period has been made by the Chief Provincial Commissioner, Mr. I. M. Mathenge.

Addressing a series of public barazas at Kisumu, Wandegaya and Mbagwe in Taita/Tavea district, Mr. Mathenge said that the police had been instructed to ensure that law and order was maintained and any offenders would be severely punished.

"It is disappointing to note that some people have been misleading innocent voter winners by instruct-

ing them to fight for reasons they do not understand," Mr. Mathenge said. He added that the Government was determined to bring to justice any person who was expected to be a participant in any other disturbance that occurred in Kenya as a whole.

The P.C. commended the Taita people who he said were only 100,000 in strength but had produced high-level management in all fields of development. They were also progressive and prepared to cope with new ideas.

There were about 70,000 families occupying an average of only one acre and half acres. Such people could not work on the land by settling themselves on the vast tract lying idle in the lowland plains, the P.C. said.

Mr. Mathenge said that the Government was fully aware of the water problem confronting the people in the lower areas of the district and disclosed that a water reclamation tank would soon be established.

Plans were under way to settle the landless on ranching schemes. This would help the farmers to increase their agricultural productivity.

The land had a good potential and horticultural crops such as beans and potatoes could increase their earning power.

The P.C. said the need to send children to school was not a new idea and, because of this, the Government was building Mwatia Secondary School at a cost of \$95,000 to cater for all the children in the district and neighbouring areas.

He said the President would be asked to formally open the school when it is ready. — K.N.A.

Ministers given mixed reception in Nyanza

Standard Correspondent

Electioneering reached a high peak in Nyanza Province on Tuesday when more than five rallies were held in South Nyanza District alone.

The Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr. Ayodo, was jeered and heckled by a huge crowd. At another meeting the Assistant Minister in the President's Office, Mr. Elijah Omolo Agar, was given an enthusiastic reception and cheered.

Mr. Ayodo, who was addressing the election rally at Kadungu Market in Kabondo Location only a mile from his home, had a rough time when a crowd estimated to be more than 5,000 received him with shouts like "We want some changes in this constituency."

There was a confrontation between Mr. Ayodo and his hecklers, who were mainly youths and women. The heckling began when Mr. Ayodo's opponent, Mr. James Mbori Yogo, had already spoken and left the platform. Before his speech could be heard, however, the shouting and heckling began.

Mr. Mbori Yogo, a former school master, earlier told the crowd that the Minister had been in Parliament since the year 1959. He felt this was a long period.

One could only represent a constituency for a limited period and, if one's work was unfruitful, then the room should be left vacant for someone who could provide the people with effective representation.

Mr. Mbori Yogo claimed that certain M.P.s from South Nyanza were deserting their people and taking refuge in Nairobi, but when they heard about the election, they came home.

Mr. Ayodo opened his speech by outlining some of the self-help projects which have been success-

ful because of his personal initiative.

He told the crowd that side-by-side with the late Tom Mboya he took an active part in liberating Kenya from the colonialists. Immediately after independence, he brought the Kabondo Film Scheme.

Mr. Ayodo strongly condemned his opponent for misleading the people.

At this point, some people shouted: "You were only serving the interest of the late Tom Mboya and not the interest of your constituents." The Minister replied to his hecklers: "You are spoiled."

When Mr. Ayodo told the crowd that it was high time for the Luo to think of some changes — after all their good leaders were no longer living or were locked up — he was told: "Release them now."

Mr. Omolo Agar was cheered when he shared a platform with four other candidates who are contesting the election in Karachuonyo constituency.

The electioneering meeting was held at Omongo Market in Karachuonyo.

Mr. Omolo Agar, who is leaving a wheelchair following injuries he received three years ago following a motor accident, had his wheelchair dismantled and addressed the rally while seated in his car.

He told a cheerful crowd that, according to Luo custom, no one should inherit his brother's wife when the brother left sick but was still alive.

He had been sick some time, but was now able to represent his people very efficiently and effectively. Some people wanted to inherit his seat while he was still alive and going strong he claimed.

Another candidate, Mr. David Okiia Amayo, caused laughter when he outlined all that he had done for the people of Karachuonyo while he was a member of the Nyanza Regional Assembly — and as the chairman of the Nyanza Provincial Community Development Committee. He assured the crowd that, if elected, he would work hard for Luo unity.

Challenge to Minister's opponent

Part of the crowd gathered in Nyanza District on Tuesday to vote of the members of G. Ochieng and Mr. I. M. Mathenge.

The Minister for Housing and Local Government, Mr. M. N. Nyanza, has challenged his opponent for the Nyanza constituency for an open debate on public affairs. The debate will take place after 2 p.m.

"I am a member of the Luo value of competition, and I will see that my opponent has an opportunity to outline his views in an open debate before me."

Mr. Nyanza said a similar exercise took place in the National Assembly in the case of Mr. Mbatia's fratch, the Minister for Lands and Survey.

Mr. Nyanza said that the women's organisation, the Nyanza Club Association, had agreed to support him in his bid to have a general election.

"I hope my opponent will accept my challenge. He will not be able to open an open debate on public affairs."

USE YOUR VOTE PEOPLE TOLD

The forthcoming election will have far-reaching effects on the country's development and the rights of its citizens.

This advice was given to the Western Provincial Community M.P. P. K. B. Mboya at a fund-raising meeting for the District Hospital.

Two rival election meetings were staged in Kangemi constituency yesterday — one at Kibumbu Primary School, addressed by top of the candidates containing the seat, Mr. E. N. Kuria and Mr. G. G. Gichuhi, and the other at the Nairobi Hospital, addressed by the former Minister for Defence, Dr. Mungai.

Strong security precautions were taken at the Kangemi meeting where the two contestants addressed a calm but receptive audience.

A number of other candidates, as far as they were concerned, this was the only election meeting known to them in the constituency.

When he spoke at the Mungai meeting, he was the only election meeting to share the platform with the candidates faded away, the

meeting got off to a late start and ended at about 6.30 p.m.

During the meeting Dr. Mungai's supporters drove around the meeting place in Land-Rovers, singing at the end of the meeting. Dr. Mungai's supporters pulled in again chanting songs and displaying his poster.

It was at that stage that it was learned from one of the youth-wingers that a meeting had been held at the Nairobi Hospital.

The meeting was said to have ended after 6 p.m.

Earlier, Mr. Kuria said that they had held two meetings and that was the third one. Dr.

Mungai had not turned up to share the platform with them and instead had held separate meetings, one at Kawangware and the other at Matieni.

Mr. Kuria said: "Dr. Mungai has boycotted our meetings and he is afraid of sharing a platform with us. We just wonder why he cannot do so as other members are doing."

He said they hoped he would turn up to the last meeting due to be held at Kilimani today.

Speaking at the meeting, Mr. Gichuhi said that those candidates who gave voters bribes should understand that polling would be by secret ballot.

Mr. Kuria said that all that had been done in the constituency had been brought about by the Nairobi City Council, and not by a Member of Parliament. He listed things like schools, hospitals and water.

One of the candidates contesting the Kangemi constituency was Mr. Daniel Ogutu, said yesterday that a political rally that he had decided to stand down.

Announcing his decision, Mr. Ogutu said he was not a political crowd as some people might think to be. He went on to say that, for the good of Kenya, and for the good of the nation, he is standing down in favour of Mr. Mwa Kibaki.

Two Coast meetings called off due to lack of support

Two meetings which were to have been addressed yesterday afternoon by two candidates working for election in Mombasa — Mr. K. S. Mwavumo (Mombasa South) and Mr. Ibrahim Abdalla (Mombasa North) — did not take place due to lack of support.

Police men who had arrived at both meeting places to stand by in case of trouble left after being told that the candidates had decided to abandon the meetings.

The failure of the meetings was blamed on wrong timing, that they were scheduled to take place during working hours or when people had not returned from work.

Mr. Mwavumo, a former Mombasa councillor, was to have addressed a meeting at Mombasa Tayari at 3 p.m., according to the notice issued to him by the District Commissioner. Apart from his youth-wingers, no one had turned up for the meeting by 4 p.m.

Mr. Abdalla was scheduled to address a public rally at Kisumu at 4.30 p.m. but he also had to abandon the arrangements that it became evident that no one would be there. A number of police men set to guard the meeting left shortly after 4.30 when they were told the meeting had been called off.

Elsewhere in Mombasa there was some heated campaigning with a number of Parliamentary candidates criticised while others counter-attacked opponents. They showed of campaigning tribally or on a religious basis.

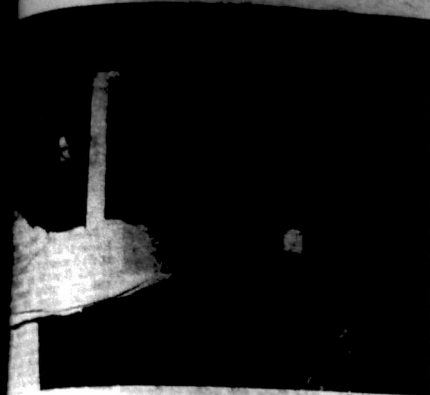

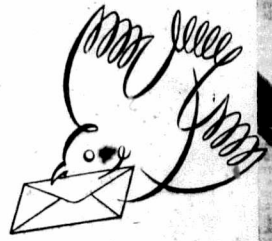

Dar man dies after attack by robbers

His elder brother, Mr. Hashim Ahmed, later identified the body at the Mchumbi Hospital where it had been taken. His two sons flew to Zanbar for his funeral. Mr. Ahmed worked as a driver and his brother said that he was sure the robbers did not manage to take anything from him. The police had given him his brother's personal belongings which he had at the time of his death, including the watch.

Before the month was out three hospitals received money from the Government to cover their debts and have been able to carry on since.

Recently the Protestant Churches' Medical Association and the Catholic Secretariat furnished the Government with a list of the financial position of other hospitals which are in a similar position. The undertakings had been given that steps would be taken to ensure that the hospitals would not have to close.

The extra money has been granted so far, and several hospitals are now finding it virtually impossible to make any plans for the future.

Kenya policy to broaden secondary school outlook

The Kenya Government's policy to diversify the secondary curriculum generation to give greater emphasis to science, agriculture, industry, arts and sports, Mr. Kyalongo, Secretary of Education, said at a meeting of the Kenya Secondary Schools' Western Province Association.

It is necessary that when a student completes secondary education he possesses more meaningful knowledge and skills for both employment and self-employment.

Examination results are only a guide of the students' achievements in school. These achievements are also an indication of their potential. The important test is when you are required to apply the knowledge received in school to a practical situation in life.

Mr. Mwendwa said progress made in industry and commerce would depend on the students' hard, year willingness to work knowledge.

An erroneous belief developed that technical education was for the less bright students should be removed from the people's minds. Technicians and craftsmen must not be put to the necessary skills but must also possess the necessary positive attitudes and other mental qualities to make their skills useful and effective.

This fact had been the main consideration and justification in transforming the Sigalala Farm Technical School into a secondary technical school, where technical education was given.

A certain amount of general education was also offered, which was intended to facilitate the development of such important qualities as honesty, reliability, the ability to co-operate with others and readiness to accept responsibility.

Kenya had many technicians and skilled workers, but more were needed. This was why the Ministry of Education had expanded the technical education a great deal. Extensions in the province for which nearly 3,000 students would be admitted.

The District Commissioner, Kakamega, Mr. E. Nyirangi, told parents and students of the new village rural polytechnic that they must learn to use their hands to produce local materials meeting the requirements of the people in the area, which would earn them money for the school and the students.

The chairman of the project, Mr. O. Kisa explained that the primary aim of the new polytechnic was to train the young C.P.E. leavers who could not get places in secondary schools in leather work, tailoring and carpentry.

He told the people that the school was partly aided by the Christian Council of Kenya, but the responsibility would be mainly on the people of South Maragoi to run and maintain it for their own benefit.

The District Community Development Officer, Mrs. D. M. Muku, opening the school, presented two sewing machines to the people who attended the ceremony contributed several hundred shillings for the project.

The Western Provincial Commissioner, Mr. P. K. Boli, his assistant, Mr. K. M. Mwangi, and the counting of votes for the primary elections will be done on Saturday evening.

Big Four prospects for Middle East peace

Russia, the United States, Britain and France have boosted Middle East peace hopes by agreeing to work out a settlement to the Arab-Israeli crisis as swiftly as possible.

After four-hour talks the U.N. representatives of the Big Four Powers also declared their hope of working out a "package deal" settlement based on a British-authored Security Council resolution of November 22, 1967.

This resolution, worked out after the six-day Arab-Israeli war in June the same year, established the guidelines as: Israeli withdrawal from territories occupied by her forces, an end to Arab belligerency, solution of the refugee problem, and the reopening of international waterways to ships.

The Big Four decision on Tuesday night was announced in a communiqué issued at the end of their meeting — their first since July and the 16th of a series begun earlier this year at the initiative of then French President de Gaulle.

Though no details of the talks were made public, some observers drew encouragement from the communiqué. This was issued without warning and was longer and in more positive language than any such statement issued since the negotiations first started in April.

In the communiqué, said to have been worked out very quickly and with little argument, the Four said they regarded the Middle East situation as "increasingly serious and urgent" and pledged to work "with all possible speed" for a settlement.

U.N. may discuss seabed laws

The U.N. General Assembly's main Political Committee has decided in favour of asking the Secretary-General, U. Thant, to sound out member States on the desirability of calling a conference on the law of the sea. By 48 votes to 13, with 40 abstentions, the committee adopted a Maltese resolution, amended by India, that might lead to a review of how the high seas, including "living resources", and the riches of the seabed should be controlled. The resolution, which must be approved by the full Assembly, originally concerned only an international conference which would review the 1958 Geneva Conference on Maritime Rights, now considered outdated. The amended resolution was supported by the developing countries, that is, those by the Communist States, the United States, and several European countries, including Britain, Pakistan, Britain and the United States were undecided in connection with the possible calling of a conference of the present location of countries to exploit the sea living resources. Malta, whose Ambassador, M. Arvid Pardo, raised the whole question of the seabed two years ago, voted against the Indian amendment, which was tabled with 13 other African, Asian and Latin American nations. Malta, in its original resolution, would have had the conference arrive at a definition of the seabed beyond national jurisdiction. But the amendment, now adopted, would have the conference on the law of the sea "review the regimes of the high seas, the continental shelf, the territorial sea, and contiguous zone, fishing and conservation of the living resources of the sea". This was in order to "arrive at a clear, precise and internationally accepted definition of the area of the seabed and ocean floor which has beyond national jurisdiction. The committee, however, had believed it should be the original issue before the committee. By 52 votes to 27, with 35 abstentions, the committee approved a joint Mexican-Brazilian resolution which would have all States refrain from exploiting the seabed resources beyond territorial limits until an international regime of the seabed had been established. This was opposed by the United States. American companies are already extracting oil well beyond national territorial limits. The resolution also states no present claim to any part of the area, or its resources, would be recognised. The United States is believed to consider this an "important question" requiring a two-thirds majority in the General Assembly to pass it. — *Reuter*

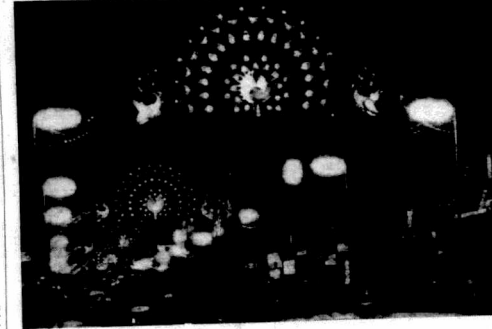

The standards are to be used for the Commonwealth Games in Jamaica and the Olympic Games in Mexico. They are not as high as the Olympic standards and athletes reaching them would have found themselves placed fourth or fifth in the Jamaican Games. Mr. Anani said that out of 25 athletes in the country who are capable of reaching Olympic standards, only five are maintaining consistent form. They are Kiphuso Keino (200 metres), Charles Anani (400 and 200 metres), Julius Sang (200 metres), Huzakili Nyman (400 metres) and Thomas Saiti (800 metres). Patrick Chinyere (triple jump) and Amos Biwott (stephance), who were not included in the list, are also capable of reaching Olympic standards.

A plan for water development in Kenya's rural areas which will cost 330,000,000 over the next 30 years is to be made known.

Negotiations are under way to begin the financing of the programme by the beginning of the next year.

It was disclosed at a press conference in Nairobi yesterday by Mr. M. M. Kibaki, Minister for Water, that he had been unable to reach the rural areas to inspect the foreign supplies which he had requested. Plans were being worked out to be sent to Mombasa.

Mr. M. M. Kibaki also mentioned the proposals for the collection and diversification of water in the rural areas. He gave details of a national office, which would be the Kenya Development Planning Commission, which will be set up in Mombasa.

Mr. McKenzie remarked that in some marginal areas growers were pulling out their coffee trees because they had found the industry to be uneconomic.

To bring the coffee industry to ground and stable economic condition the average yield of coffee must be raised, but if this were to be achieved over the whole of the present coffee area there would be a significant surplus.

The general strategy would be to raise the productivity of coffee already planted in the areas for which it was best suited while

slightly reducing the total area of land devoted to the crop.

The aim would be to raise the average annual yield of the estate sector to 1,000 kg a hectare while reducing the area by 5,700 hectares to 25,000. It was hoped to raise the average yield of the small holder sector by 700 kg while encouraging a slight area reduction of 3,800 to have 5,000 hectares by July 1971.

The cost of production per unit of coffee would be reduced. The agricultural sector was well diversified and of the staple foods, only sugar and edible oils were imported. Within three years Kenya should be self-sufficient in sugar and edible oils offered the only important opportunities for the local development of an import substitution programme.

The plan deals with the potential of crops like potato, and maize, livestock and milk for both internal consumption and export.

The development of bulk handling and storage facilities was essential so that maize could be exported economically. By 1974 the annual exports of maize were expected to be 250,000 tons worth £8,700,000, which would make maize the third most important export in the next Parliament. Ev-odd.

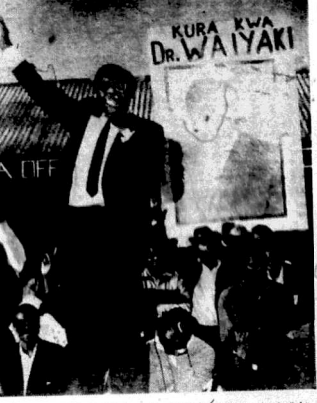

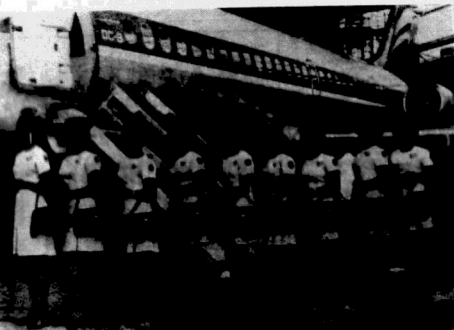

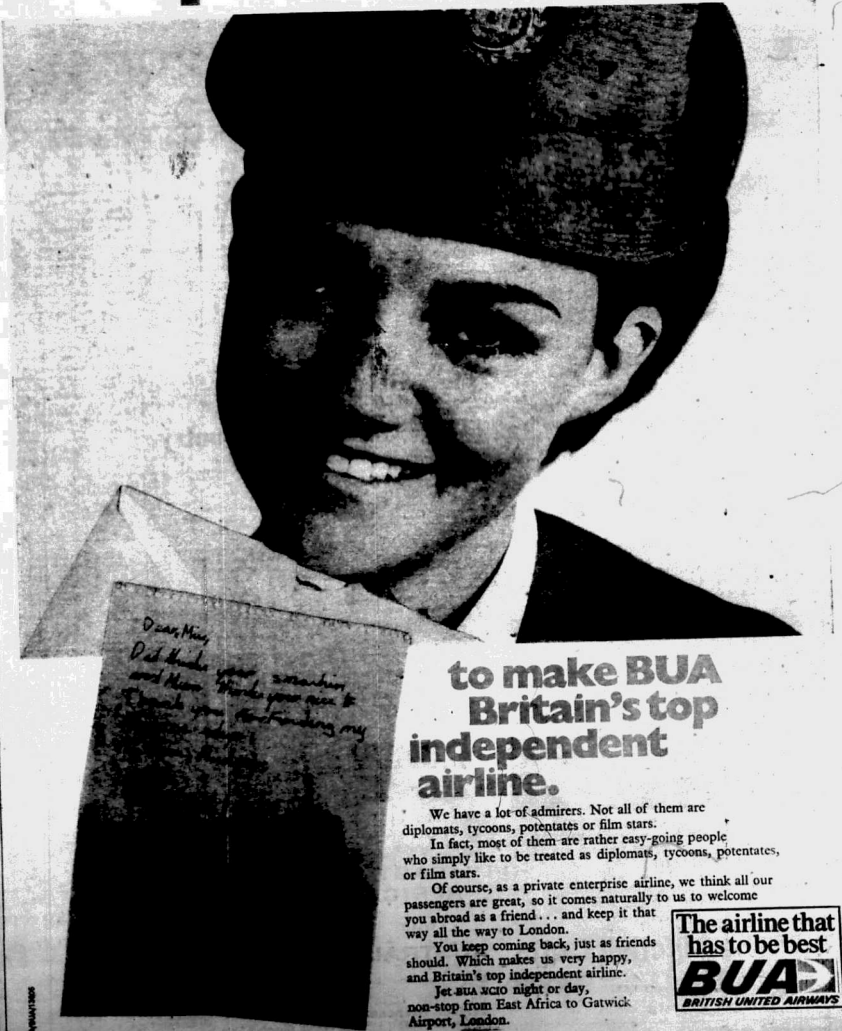

Coast candidates ready for the final push

Campaigning in Coast Province has now reached a climax with candidates addressing a series of meetings in Mombasa, Kilifi, Kwale, Lamu, Tana River and Taita Taveta districts.

Nine candidates are fighting for three seats in the Taita Taveta district where there are 30,237 voters, who will cast their votes at 17 polling stations.

Lamu district, with the lowest list of voters, 10,668, will be served by 22 polling stations with five candidates contesting the two seats.

Six candidates are contesting the two seats in Tana River district, which has 18,517 voters who will cast their votes at 22 polling stations.

One of his opponents, Mr. Gabriel Nsubu Nyagah, a graduate of London University, said he would send his message to try and influence the Government to channel more money to Embu to assist development. He added he would press for the start of industries in the district.

Another candidate for the seat, Mr. Francis Ngari Mwangi, said he would "fight" for a market for the produce of the area and added he would relentlessly encourage the establishment of technical institutions in Embu.

FARMING REVIEW

Role of the A.D.C. in Kenya's farm revolution

In the farming revolution that has been taking place in Kenya since independence, and particularly where the land transfer programme has been concerned, the Agricultural Development Corporation with headquarters at Development House in Government Road, Nairobi, has played a central and sometimes controversial role.

Apart from land transfer and consequent farming activities, the Corporation, which was set up in 1963, acts as agents for Government investment in certain areas of development such as providing quality resources for use in agriculture, processing raw materials and developing an export market. It has also operated in conjunction with other commercial interests to stimulate development in specific areas of the agricultural sector.

In other words the A.D.C. has managed farming activities in the national interest which, it was felt, a viable commercial concern could handle better than the Government. Because of its constitution and objectives it has also been able to move into enterprises which were considered to be in the national interest but where the risk element was believed to be too great for the private sector.

This is the first of two articles on the work of the Agricultural Development Corporation.

An example of this is the Kenya Poultry Development Co. at Athi River, about which I wrote in the *East African Standard* of November 14. The A.D.C. is also an agent through which the Ministry of Agriculture can act, an example, in this respect, being the Corporation's participation in the Chemelli Sugar Co. and the East African Sugar Industries.

Total assets of the A.D.C. are estimated to be in the region of £6,000,000, among the main commitments being the Stamp land transfer programme estimated in September, 1969, at £2,600,000 and the buy-out of "compassionate" farms, estimated at £300,000.

Pointing out that for the passing on of loans the A.D.C. acts merely as a point office but holds the Government's equity, Mr. W. W. Hutton, the general manager, explains that the Corporation has received loans from the Ministry of £400,000 and from the Agricultural Finance Corporation of £500,000. These particular loans went towards the need for working and development capital and the purchase of national farms and ranching areas.

The land that the A.D.C. pur-

chased from the A.F.C. loans was not, however, adequate for carrying out the longer term role of safeguarding pedigree livestock and seed and Ministry approval has now been given for the retention of some of the Stamp farms which have been taken over.

Mr. Hutton adds that he is trying to get away from the term "national farm" because the Ministry has agreed that the A.D.C. should retain certain land holdings to allow it to undertake its proper role of safeguarding various breeds of livestock and for the production of seed wheat and, to a lesser extent, seed maize and therefore all the land retained is in the national interest.

The general manager says: "An even more compelling reason why we need more land is that the Corporation has never been put on a firm financial footing and we must, therefore, be allowed to generate our own working capital. Ultimately, because of the shortage of development capital, our object would be to generate this internally as well."

"Every penny that we have is borrowed and you can't really run an agricultural enterprise on that basis," he says, adding that a blueprint for financial reconstruction of the Corporation has been put up to the Government.

In fact, the financial position is

encouraging at the present time. Compared with a loss of £300,000 in 1967, the A.D.C. is almost breaking even over the 15-month period from January 1, 1968, to March 31, 1969. The Corporation's view is that this break-even position leaves no room for complacency as long as the present financial structure remains. The future burden of interest payments on loans will be so great that only the most efficient agricultural operation can viably service them.

As the corporation is forced by Government policy and the continued land transfer programme to incur, at least temporarily, initial losses, the financial reconstruction of A.D.C. is essential if it is to succeed to provide its full contribution towards the growth and economic development of Kenya.

It is this situation which the Government is considering and, as Mr. Hutton points out, although over the 15 months the A.D.C. made a profit on the farming side of its operation, by the time that head office expenses are applied to this the Corporation has failed to break even by a few thousand pounds.

Mr. Hutton goes on: "In the current year of the farming operation we conservatively expect to make a trading surplus in the region of £150,000, which should be more than enough to cover the net cost of the head office operation. Our total recurrent expenditure on farms is in excess of £1,000,000. We are operating something in the region of 63 farms at the moment divided into some 18 complexes and about 17 individual farms."

Although the A.D.C. had more than doubled its operations since 1967, he explains, the total staff complement had been reduced. Numbers had come down at head office from 45 in 1967 to 19 today. Field staff had been increased by only one (56 to 57) over the same period, although they were dealing with double the number of farms. These statistics apply to executive officers in head office and management level down to assistant managers in the field.

The introduction of the complex system, as distinct from individual farms, in the field had also led to the formation of what could be described as a training pyramid. At the top of the complex covering a group of, say, two or three farms and involving 5,000 acres or so, there is a manager who is responsible for all activities. Under him are sectional managers and assistant managers responsible for the operation of the particular land unit or farm.

This system under which a farm plan grows to cover a complete area has been operating since February, 1969.

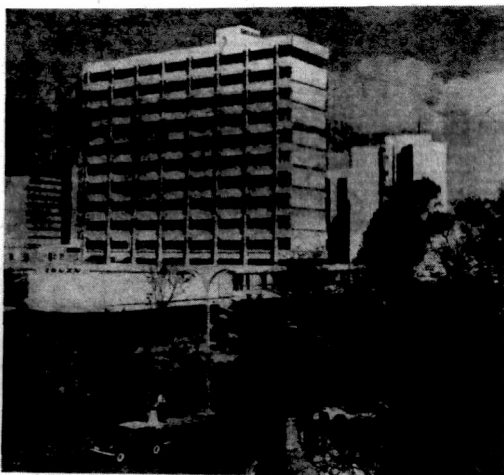

BLUE RIBBAND SHOW IN HEART OF LONDON

Royal Smithfield Show Agricultural Machinery Exhibition to be held in London from December 8-12. The show is the best livestock show in the world and a very long way since those first tentative steps in 1796, when a small group of farmers banded together to offer prize money for just four classes the following year. Their aim — the improvement of stock and the establishment of the principle of early maturity continues to hold good, but although the show has grown in size, new ideas, both in the animal and machinery fields, are constantly being introduced to ensure that the

farm machinery industry, which is considered by many to be the largest and most efficient in the world. With more than 140 classes for livestock alone, the show has covered a very long way since those first tentative steps in 1796, when a small group of farmers banded together to offer prize money for just four classes the following year. Their aim — the improvement of stock and the establishment of the principle of early maturity continues to hold good, but although the show has grown in size, new ideas, both in the animal and machinery fields, are constantly being introduced to ensure that the

skill of the butcher can be viewed in a suitably cool hall. Competition in this section is fierce, for a Smithfield award can bring long-lasting recognition. This year cattle, sheep and pig carcasses will be competing in no fewer than 17 classes. In all some 2,000 animals and carcasses will be on display — the live breeds awaiting the moment when they are pitted against each other for the championship. Once again the show will provide a platform for several ambitious displays. The sheep demonstration will include old and rare breeds only recently developed. Another demonstration, by the Meat and Livestock Commission of live and carcass cattle, will show the diversity of requirements in the meat trade. In addition there will be a special display for children on the final day of the show, Friday, December 12. With live lambs, wool-knitted garments, chops and other by-products on display, the idea of this demonstration is to tell the story of sheep to the younger generation. This year all the major manu-

facturers will be exhibiting in the farm machinery section. Although a greater proportion of the equipment on show can be described as additions to existing ranges, there are several fresh developments in the combine harvester category. A large amount of new cultivation equipment will also be on display for the first time. Needless to say, manufacturers invariably time their new product announcements to coincide with the Royal Smithfield Show. With the widespread adoption of hydraulic controls, particularly in the tractor field, greater attention is being paid to operator convenience, to make driving easier and more comfortable. As farm machinery becomes more and more sophisticated, there is a general emphasis on labour saving. One may be sure that the most sophisticated labour-saving devices in the world will be on view. In recent years the agricultural industry has been overtaken by automation. The fact that automation has now spread to grass conservation and feeding equipment is explained to a certain extent by the drift of workers from the land. To meet this situation manu-

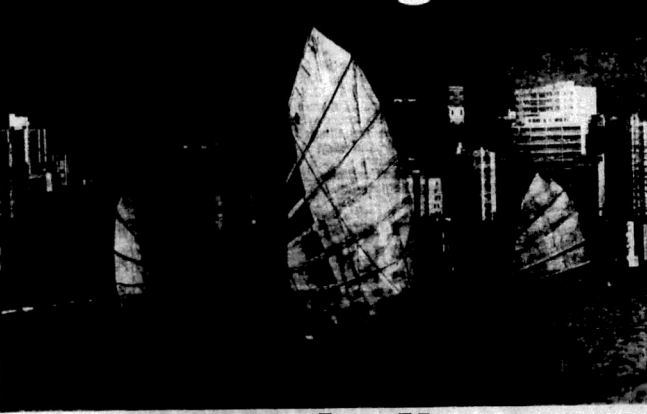

There was so much interest in Germany about Africa that it had been decided to establish in Nairobi a permanent television film studio and news bureau...

We hope to make the correspondent on the spot — in this case, myself — a familiar figure to audiences. While we will be sending detailed news and documentary reports we expect to concentrate on material of a political nature.

Most of the material sent from Nairobi would be in colour and by 1971 West German Television would be screening nothing else.

One of the team's first stories which has already been dispatched was an eight-minute item about George Adomson and his lion, Roy. That would probably go into a magazine-type programme in the early evening when people arrive home and want something light to watch.

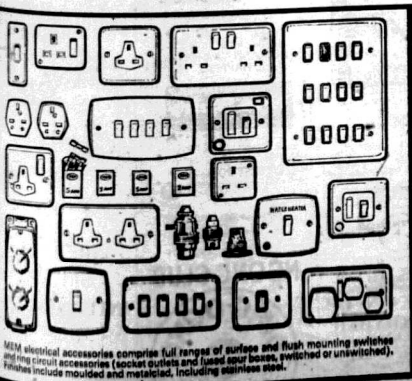
