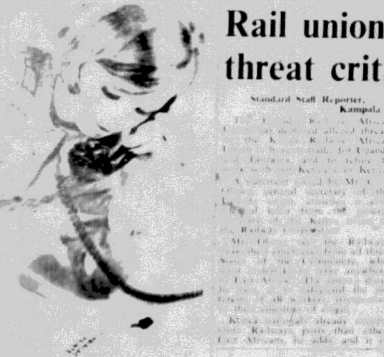

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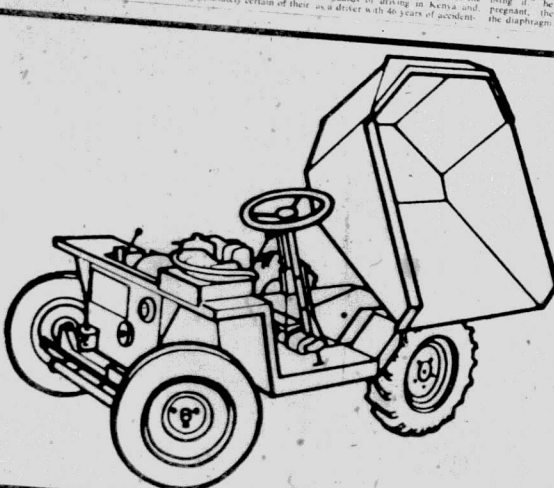

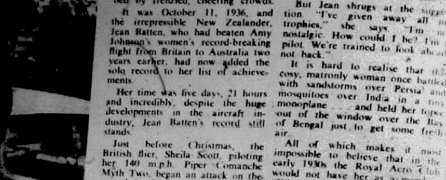
Her time was five days, 21 hours and incredibly despite the huge developments in the aircraft industry, Jean Batten's record still stands.

Just before Christmas, the British flier, Sheila Scott, piloting her 140 mph Piper Comanche III, had broken Batten's record in the gruelling London to Sydney air race. But though she won the £2,500 prize for being the first woman to complete the race, she was struck by a series of snags and failed to better Jean Batten's time.

Ironically Miss Batten made a special trip to London to take part in the satiating ceremony of that record flight, the most famous of which was the solo record by making flight from England to Australia in 1936 on her way to New Zealand. The Boeing 747 will be put into operation on the airline's Bombay-New York route from the summer of 1971. There will be four services a week to London, three of which will be extended to New York.

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India's airways

Mr. Jhanganir Tata was born in Paris on July 29, 1904. Educated in India, France and Japan, he was the first pilot to qualify in India, holding a private licence from 1929 to 1936 and a transport licence rating from 1932 to 1949. He was the first Indian to fly from India to London.

Founder of Tata Airlines, he flew as pilot the first scheduled commercial air service in India — from Karachi to Bombay in October, 1932.

Mr. Tata became chairman of Air-India Limited in 1946 when Tata Airlines became a public company. Later that year Air-India Limited became Air-India International Limited.

On nationalisation of Indian air transport in August 1953 he was appointed chairman of

the airline, now re-named Air-India, and a member of the board of Indian Airlines Corporation.

Aside from aviation, Mr. Tata is one of India's foremost industrialists.

Taken as an assistant into the Tata organisation at the age of 18, at the age of 34 he became, as chairman of Tata Sons Limited, the head of India's largest industrial complex, which ranges from steel to cotton textiles, from electric power to motor vehicles, and from hotels to soap.

In 1955 Mr. Tata was awarded the "Padma Vibhushan" by the Government of India in recognition of his services to the country. He holds the honorary commission as Air Commodore in the Indian Air Force and is a Doctor of Science of the Allahabad University.

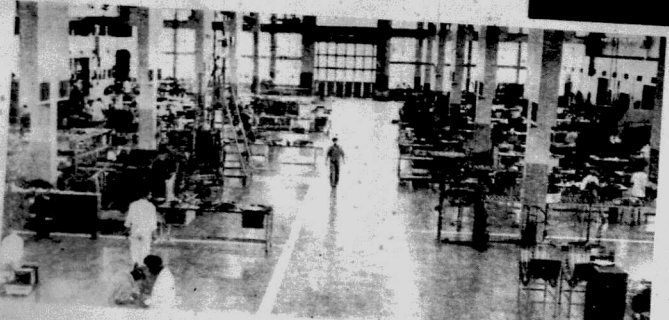

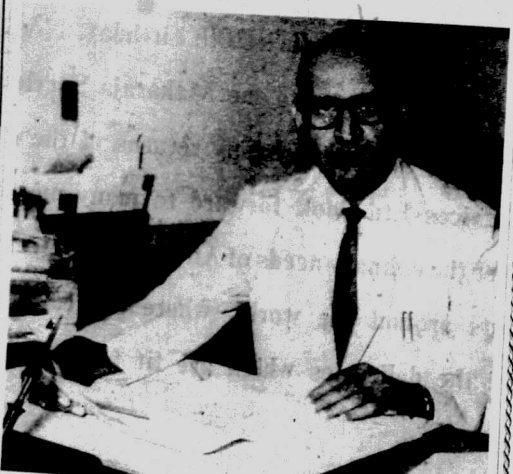

Mr. Aiyax was testifying in a libel suit he has brought against Prof. D. A. Ogot, head of the History Department at University College Nairobi, and the Deputy University Press officer, who published in a book entitled "A Year in Hell" a study of the 'African' in Kenya, written by the Rev. J. H. Webhook and Prof. Ogot.

The book was published in November 1966. On page 18 in part of the book Prof. Ogot is alleged to have maliciously and falsely wrote and published words concerning Mr. Aiyax which said: "Men and women who, for various reasons, had been severely defeated in life were born there west of the Indian schools although some have since fallen by the wayside, some held responsible jobs in many ways of life in Kenya. One was..."

U.K. aid for research may be cut

Standard Staff Reporter
About 40 per cent of the aid to the research centres in East Africa has now been provided by the British Government and it is likely that it will reduce considerably the amount of financial aid available to the research centres and give it on a project basis rather than as a global grant to the East African Community.

This was said by the Secretary General of the Community, Mr. Z. Njugala, in his speech to the directors of the East African Research Institutes, who met at Nairobi yesterday. The directors had been asked by the Research and Social Council to submit their cost and technical requirements for the next five years.

Mr. Njugala told the directors they had read all their submissions and found that most of the requests were for more equipment. He said that the Government had already had included on the list of equipment to be provided. We in the Community are looking for ways of collecting information on our own research of developing countries of research finance.

FEELS REBORN

The Minister for Education, Mr. Towell, yesterday said he could not promise that country's primary education would be better in the future, but he hoped there would be a move towards greater remission of school fees in the immediate future.

The Minister did not agree with those who said that people should not build more barrabas, high school fees should be raised, and money to run them. He held the view that the Government should create a problem which would call for a solution.

He said that there had been a lot of talk about free primary education in recent years. At present, he said, there were not enough schools to accommodate all children who would want to go to school, there were not enough teachers, there was not enough equipment, and there was not enough money for teachers' salaries.

The Minister would continue to recruit teachers from abroad until there were a sufficient number locally. He suggested a compulsory national teaching certificate, which all Forms IV and V leavers should have to teach for a set number of years before moving to other fields of employment.

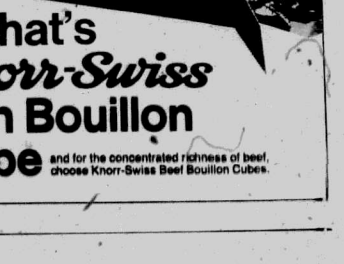

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Police figures for traffic accidents on Nairobi's roads last year disclose the apparent paradox that there has been a significant reduction in accidents but an increase in deaths. The fatal accidents attract more publicity and thus the false impression is created that the general situation on the roads is worsening.

In fact the report on the year gives cause for satisfaction, but not for complacency. The high death rate must also be taken into account. It is, it seems, less in the hands of drivers.

Better traffic control and police action has led to a reduction of the number of unroadworthy or worn-out vehicles and helped to cut the road toll. At the same time the fact that there are faster and higher-powered cars travelling at higher speeds has resulted in more fatal crashes.

General standards of driving in Kenya, and especially Nairobi, are still bad. There can be few, if any, other cities in the world whose main thoroughfares are so liberally sprinkled with shattered headlamp fragments, so often the cause of a large number of accidents — half the total are blamed on bad driving.

Records are kept only of those accidents which cause injury. There are probably more which do not — but which often cause serious disruption by holding up lines of traffic while the drivers involved argue over their damaged cars.

It is surprising to see that pedestrians were at fault in nearly 27 per cent of accidents, though inattention to traffic — often with tragic results.

With Nairobi's population, and its number of licensed drivers, rising all the time, urgent steps are being taken to combat against a higher accident rate. The Government's National Road Safety is understood to be re-examining the traffic laws with a view to major reforms.

The Ministry of Works is busy planning better roads and a more comprehensive system of road signs. In Nairobi the City Council and the Police consult regularly on road problems designed to ease the traffic flow and prevent accidents. Their decisions do not always meet with general approval; only a week ago traders in the bazaar area complained that the partial one-way traffic experiment was causing them loss of trade.

When a general one-way system was introduced in the capital several years ago it led to confusion and bitter complaints from drivers, pedestrians and shopkeepers alike, and in those pre-Uhuru days the volume of traffic was much smaller.

As Nairobi's roads and streets were not built for the heavy traffic flow expected in the next few years, and there is little hope of major roadworks in the city centre, some gradual and after consideration of parking and shipping problems it may be more successful next time.

Other action is being taken to improve road safety. Nairobi Police are concentrating more on pursuing offenders — normally law-abiding drivers for minor traffic "persecuting". With other police forces in Kenya they are continuing their purge against overloaded and unserviceable vehicles.

The Police have also begun a series of lectures to schools in the aim of educating tomorrow's drivers and pedestrians to road safety. These have met with a very good response and are expected to be extended throughout the country. More use should be made of television to promote this worthwhile type of propaganda.

But, coming back to driving error as the biggest single cause of accidents, it is hard to escape the conclusion that many people are behind the wheels of cars, lorries and buses which are not fully qualified to be in charge of such potentially lethal weapons.

Doubts have often been expressed about the efficiency and fairness of the present system of driving tests. Strange passes without the slightest difficulty while others take it as many as four or five times.

Now that the Police have taken more direct control for driving tests perhaps any weakness in the procedure itself will be sorted out. They will have to be, because Kenya cannot expect to keep down its accident figures if it allows any but fully competent drivers loose on its roads.

- The main method of family planning was abstinence. This was very much facilitated by the practice of polygamy which was widespread in many African communities. The aim would have been many children per total number.

'SIX' AGREEMENT LIKELY BY MARCH

The six European Common Market countries indicated nearer agreement on a variety of political and agricultural problems in Brussels on Tuesday night, but failed actually to clinch anything after two days of discussion.

The Belgian Foreign Minister, Tuesday, told newsmen after the Council of Ministers' sessions on Tuesday that progress towards however that progress would not be negligible.

The six Finance, Agriculture and Foreign Ministers (minus West Germany's Herr Walter Scheel and the Netherlands) had spent two days of discussion on agricultural finance, covering important details left open in the December 22 general agreement on agricultural finance, Common Market regulations for oil powers to be delegated to the European Parliament.

Mr Harmel said that thanks to work put in by the Common Market executive commission, permanent representatives and the points discussed should be finally settled in March, and possibly even next month.

The question of a Common Market policy for tobacco, which Italy has made a condition for its approval of the overall agricultural finance proposals, has been referred to the permanent Common Market delegates at Brussels, who have been authorized to draw up concrete proposals for the February meeting of Foreign Ministers.

The final working out of regulations for a common wine market has been referred to the February 2 meeting of Agricultural Ministers, and most points of difference were cleared up last week.

The same Ministers gathering will also discuss questions relating to agricultural surpluses in certain sectors - notably dairy products - which have plagued the Community for some time.

Finally, the Foreign Ministers' meeting on February 20 will discuss what promises to be the most tricky problem of all those treated this week - the extent of the European Parliament's power.

French believe that the European assembly should not be given the power to increase European budgetary expenditure unilaterally. Her partners, led by the Netherlands, on the other hand, believe that the Parliament should have greater budgetary powers.

A Belgian compromise plan, outlined yesterday but not discussed, suggested that the European assembly should be permitted to extend its budgetary expenditure in proportion to the increase in Parliament's national budgets. The six's national budgets, the Netherlands should not be able to interfere with Community expenditure in agriculture, for example, authorized by the Council of Ministers.

West Germany and Luxembourg, according to sources, reacted favourably to this plan but Italy and the Netherlands opposed it with France remaining neutral.

Foreign Ministers held a private session yesterday to discuss steps towards political union, against a background of a widening of the Community.

More than 100 journalists flew into the area on Saturday.

European Common Market Ministers have agreed to give Nigeria £250,000 in food aid.

Nigerian Government, the Belgian Foreign Minister, M. Harmel, said.

The Swiss Protestant Inter-Aid Organization has agreed to spend £35,000 towards the relief of war victims and the reconstruction of agricultural and technical schools in the war zone.

The Canadian Government, has donated a further £80,000 to the shipment Red Cross for medical supplies and supplies for Nigeria. The Foreign Minister, Mr. Sharp, said the money was sent to Nigeria in the next few days by commercial air.

Nigerian refugees in Ghana are posing a serious problem for the Government, the Ghanaian chargé d'affaires, Joseph Hasford Sackee, said in Rome yesterday.

The Ghanaian Government, he told a Press conference, had some time ago decided to solve the problem of refugees by expelling all persons not possessing residence permits.

Such a decision was not aimed at creating problems for Nigerian refugees who had left their own country during the civil war. It was "a necessary administrative measure" since Ghana had about 600,000 unemployed and a large number of foreigners, many of whom were engaged in illegal diamond and metal smuggling.

Merchants' activities in Biafra were to have been given in forged £100,000,000 counterfeiting company, the OMI Supply Criminal Court in London was told. Seven of the charges related to the forgery.

Mr. John Mallet, prosecuting, said one of the notes was supposed to dispose of the notes was to give a bounty of £30,000 to an African intermediary who was to be paid with it.

Defence chiefs may testify in My Lai case

The preliminary hearing into the case of U.S. Army Lieutenant William Calley, charged with the premeditated murder of 102 South Vietnamese civilians at My Lai, was adjourned to February 3.

Calley's lawyer called for testimony to be given at the hearing by the U.S. Defence Secretary, Edwin Laird, the Army Secretary, Mr. Stanley Resor, and the Army Chief of Staff, Gen. William Westmoreland, who all made public statements about the incident before the defence claims, could prejudice Calley's trial.

Calley's chief defence lawyer, Mr. George Laitimer, told the court that, according to Press reports, Mr. Laird himself had asked President Nixon for charges to be brought against Calley after the defence's request, had instructed Mr. Resor to start proceedings.

In adjourning the hearing the judge, Col. Red Kennedy, instructed the prosecutor to inform the court by February 3 of the substance of reported statements by the defence concerning what might have had on the case.

If the chief defence chiefs do appear in court, it is expected they will do so in camera for reasons.

New call for release of Miss Hess

A British Conservative Member of Parliament has called for a joint approach by Britain, France and the United States to obtain the release of Hitler's one-time deputy Rudolf Hess.

Members of Parliament representing all three of Britain's major political parties have signed a motion in this effect tabled in the House of Commons by Mr. Airey Neave.

Mr. Neave, who was Assistant Secretary at the Warrenton trials in 1945 and 1946, has for some time been waging a campaign on behalf of the ailing Hess.

He wrote to the Foreign Secretary, Mr. Michael Stewart, suggesting Britain should propose to the three Western powers that they should agree to release Hess on Union on the imprisonment of Hess.

Mr. Neave also said after a visit to London by Hess's son, that he believed Britain should take a decision to liberate the former Nazi.

Rhodesia to have new Secrets Act

Rhodesia is to have a new Official Secrets Act, and the penalties for espionage are to be increased.

The Minister for Justice and Law and Order, Mr. Desmond Lardner-Burke, said that a Bill to amend the present Act, which was passed in the 1914 British Act, would be presented to Parliament next week.

The maximum penalty was being tried to stage a 25 years' term, but in case of espionage, he said. This would be for such offences as giving plans to an enemy in times of war.

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

Mr. BROWN'S TOUR 'HIS OWN'

The British Prime Minister, Mr. Harold Wilson, said yesterday the recent visit to the Middle East by Mr. George Brown, Deputy Leader of the Labour Party, was undertaken on his own.

It was held at the request of the Government, Mr. Wilson told Parliamentary correspondents at a lunch in his honour.

He said he read accounts of the visit, during which Mr. Brown is alleged to have made remarks regarded by some of his hosts as insulting.

"No doubt I shall be having a report from him on his conclusions in due course," the Prime Minister added.

Mr. Brown himself said that he had already notified Mr. Wilson and the Foreign Secretary, Mr. Stewart, that he was ready to discuss with them the "important information of value to Britain which he obtained during his visit of the Middle East."

The party's assistant secretary, general, Mr. Owen Morgan, who accompanied Mr. Brown on his visit, has already submitted a personal report to Mr. Stewart.

PRESIDENTS MEET TO HEAL CONGO BREACH

Borders and river traffic may re-open

The Presidents of the two Congo States — Kinshasa and Brazzaville — were due to meet yesterday on a boat in the middle of the mile-wide Congo River to try to end a 15-month-old dispute between the two countries.

The meeting could lead to the reopening of borders and the resumption of river traffic and telecommunications between the two States.

Mr. Wilson discusses leaders' conference

The Secretary-General of the Commonwealth Secretariat, Mr. Arnold Smith, has met the British Prime Minister, Mr. Wilson, in an effort to set a date and venue for the next Commonwealth Prime Ministers' Conference.

Mr. Wilson and the Secretary-General discussed the matter on Wednesday afternoon. No announcement was made after the meeting.

It is speculated in London that the conference could be held in early autumn, with Nairobi as a possible meeting place. A year ago, after the last conference, Mr. Wilson suggested a change from London and invitations were received from Kenya and Barbados.

The man responsible for the reconciliation attempt is the Central African Republic's President Bokassa, who has been shuffling between the two Congos in an attempt to bring their Heads of State together.

President Bokassa's C.A.R. was itself only recently reconciled with Congo (Kinshasa) after more than a year of discussion.

The Kinshasa-Brazzaville dispute began on October 2, 1968. Brazzaville broke off diplomatic relations when Pierre Mulele, a former Congolese rebel leader, was executed in Kinshasa.

The meeting between the Congo (Kinshasa) President, Gen. Mobutu, and the Congo (Brazzaville) President, Capt. Ngoussou, was being held on President Mobutu's official yacht.

The vessel has air-conditioned cabins, a bar and restaurant, and also a helicopter landing deck.

It was due to leave Kinshasa with President Mobutu and Bokassa aboard and cross the river to Brazzaville to pick up President Ngoussou.

The meeting was the latest milestone in a chain of events among the States of Central Africa in recent weeks.

On New Year's Eve a one-party possible meeting place. A year ago, after the last conference, Mr. Wilson suggested a change from London and invitations were received from Kenya and Barbados.

Observers in Kinshasa were cautious in interpreting what was happening on the opposite bank, but most agreed that the decision to establish a people's republic seemed taken under pro-Chinese influence.

They held as significant the fact that the first secretary of the new Congolese Labour Party, was Mr. Claude-Ernest Ntwa, a known Chinese sympathiser, until now Ambassador in Peking.

Whether related or not to the setting up of a pro-Communist regime in Brazzaville, political observers in Kinshasa noted an intense

diplomatic activity among Brazzaville's neighbours in Central Africa. President Mobutu, whose relations with Cameroon had not been specially warm, suddenly decided to attend Cameroon's tenth anniversary independence celebrations on January 10 and to exchange ambassadors.

In Yaounde also, Gen. Mobutu and C.A.R.'s President Bokassa were reconciled in a spectacular way after more than a year of quarrelling. Diplomatic relations had been severed since December, 1968, when President Bokassa withdrew his republic from the Union of Central African States, formed earlier that year with Kinshasa and Chad.

The Presidents of Congo (Kinshasa), C.A.R., Chad and Gabon met to study problems of Central Africa.

It was later announced that for the first time President Mobutu would visit Gabon at the end of January, on President Biogo's invitation.

Though ideological differences, State rivalries and wars of mistrust could not easily be ironed out in a single meeting, observers believed yesterday's encounter on the river was likely to have deep effects on future political alignments in Central Africa.

Four British lifeboatmen drowned in the North Sea off Scotland while going to the aid of a Danish trader, Copenhagen rescue centre reported.

Their bodies and one other lifeboatman were on a Soviet trawler which took the Danish vessel in tow. A sixth lifeboatman was missing.

the basis of a wine industry which has paralleled the infant 'chateau' vineyards of Laikipia.

However, vine cultivation is being taken seriously in Kenya not only for table fruit and especially for wine but also for the production of raisins at the Horticultural Research Station at Thika.

The vines being grown are of the bunching type, a European wine grape, and Vitis labrusca, which is an American variety. According to Professor Busser, Vitis vinifera seeds require sowing hours than the bunching Vitis labrusca is sown and does well outdoors.

There are four varieties of the V. labrusca obtained from the vineyards of Golden Mile, Kawana (white), Isabella (black), Kawana (red), and the Ferdinand (black).

The best place for the European variety is on the house wall where it would shelter against the rain and the varieties are Prof. Busser's



black seedling and Waltham Cross which is white.

Nearly all the vines on the Laikipia shamba have been developed from seedlings. Professor Busser has been dealing with grapes and other horticultural produce since he was Director of the Swiss Winter School of Agriculture at Zermatt in the early years of this century.

A regular visitor to Zermatt at the time was King Albert of Belgium who persuaded the professor to take his green fingers to the country where he had directed experimental stations in Katanga and Kivu, as well as being for a time in North Angola. He came to Laikipia in 1952, and established his shamba on five acres there.

As well as grapes he has specialised in avocados, avo beans, various types of fruit trees as well as Madagascar Butter Beans. The latter he believes, with their high protein content, have considerable possibilities in Kenya. They are similar to a normal butter bean, appearing in a shell which is a green and but somewhat thinner and, in the opinion of those who have eaten them, tastier.

The Professor's horticultural interests are widespread and he believes that something could be done in Kenya to promote the best use of the fruits of a number of many food synthetics these days.

Although the Kenya daylight hours are generally considered to be too short for this crop the Professor has grown avo beans successfully at Laikipia.

Another interest is the bombo tree which grows at Laikipia but which, in his view, could do well in an area like the Laikipia River and provide the basis of a kapok industry.

Laikipia, like the remainder of the Nakuru area, is good for tomatoes and vegetable on the Laikipia shamba yielded 200 tons this year despite the lack of rain. It now stands nearly four feet high there were only three-quarters of an inch at Laikipia in December compared with normal rainfall for this month of four inches.

This is no particular problem on the shamba where there is a horticultural exposure of producing 4,500 gallons an hour.

This is good for the vines which need plenty of humidity and water (as distinct from rain) and for the avocados, a variety of these which Prof. Busser recommends for Kenya being Cambridge Fantasia.

The avocados beds at Laikipia are now four years old, the plant bearing after about three years from seed. If some plants are strong seedling you can, however, be receiving good avocados in a season.

With the production of avocados, pineapples and apples going on near the lake Nakuru shamba, the Professor is a big customer for hard lime.

You just read it in a magazine, he says. "The other day we went around and released them the following morning. You don't have to kill them, they have been stuck on the bird fence they won't come back again."

Tea countries agree on export restrictions

The London Tea Market has reacted favourably to the recent tea export quota scheme — a non-international tea agreement. The world's tea producing countries have now pledged themselves to withdraw 4,000,000lb of exports from world markets in 1970.

In practice, all the export cuts will fall on the three Asian producers: India, Ceylon and Indonesia. The African countries can resist because they have not been called upon to reduce their crops. Their extensive development plans in tea have all been allowed for. The world quota is set at 1,111,000,000lb.

The agreed quotas were almost identical to figures forecast a week before the meeting of the P.A.D. consultative committee on tea in Rome.

Even Tanzania originally given too low a quota, managed to get it revised upwards.

But despite the agreement, the effect on world tea prices, which have been on the decline through out the crisis, is still limited.

With world production rising by 3 per cent a year and world consumption at less than 1 per cent a year the pressure on the tea price is always downwards.

Even after taking into account the growing tea consumption in India, world exports might jump by 300,000,000lb over the next decade.

In 1974-75 they rose by about 150,000,000lb, but at the present rate of development the African continent alone could expand their production by 150,000,000lb during the twenties.

The immediate effect of the Bonn agreement is to steady prices and bring the downward. But the London stock market has still to get the message and tea shares remain depressed.

Before Rome, the African countries remained reluctant to reach any quota agreement.

Apart from Africa's well-known climatic and transport advantages,

As forecast exclusively by German News Service a few weeks ago, the tea countries have agreed on export restrictions for 1970. This will remove 40,000,000lb of tea from world markets, but will do little more than maintain tea prices at steady levels. Alan Hale reports.

African tea is now increasingly replacing the power North American. The African tea is of a higher quality than the better quality Assams. While the average tea price is down, the price for Kenyan tea has been remarkably well sustained.

Missing here is plenty of evidence of higher prices for Africans by the end of the first quarter of the year.

But African producers understand the long-term implications. They saw that today's sustained demand and population at Laikipia is not enough. In the long run, all tea goes down the same way and African prices will also be affected as production rises.

The world production is now limited and though there are many doubts in avoiding quota agreement, they will probably be generally adhered to. Thus the future price of tea depends mostly on consumption.

Here the greatest hope is that Indian consumption will present about half of its 1960 production. This will continue to rise at the present rate of 3,000,000lb a year.

The British are switching from tea to coffee. According to the annual abstract of statistics, British tea consumption fell 500,000lb in 1968 compared with 9,200,000 in 1967. But this trend is modified by the growing British population, keeping the overall volume of tea drunk at a steady level.

There is also the hope that eventually America and Europe will discover tea as an alternative to their usual coffee. And the East African tea-producing nations may also begin to drink a little more tea.

In 1968 East Africans only drank 25,000,000lb of tea. Today this has risen to 150,000,000lb. Tea is now said to be the most common drink in East Africa after plain water.

Kenya and Uganda have both recently had tea weeks with the brush promotional stunts which might make the familiar taste the tea which do help to sell more tea. There were competitions, tea dance rallies, and even Miss Tea — one was called their striptease.

It has been a bad week for Kenya's tourist industry, with serious allegations of malpractice...

...and fill up with petrol and water.

We arrived at Mokowe at 5 p.m. and began looking for a boat to take us across to Lamu Island. As we were waiting for a boat, the Kenyan fish shop lorry arrived at the pier.

After a month of waiting he was going to try to get through to Lamu the following day. My few bags and I would easily fit on top, so we agreed to give me a lift up to Lamu, near the Somalia border.

After a night's sleep in Lamu at a cheap, but clean hotel called Marthes, I left the hotel room, leaving Mark to take my car back to Lamu.

An overcrowded ferry took us across to Mokowe again where the fish lorry was due to arrive at 7 a.m. Three hours later we were on our way. Apart from the very heavy sand the track was fairly good as we brushed trees, dodging in and out of the scrub forest, but then we hit the swampy areas, where water had been sitting for weeks in the black cotton soil.

Sometimes we were able to take long detours, but as fast there was one way: straight through the middle of knee-deep mud. Everyone tramped down off the track, cut tracks, dug away the mud and pushed the lorry. We got badly bogged five times but each time we dugly ground through until there was only one obstacle left, the Dedori River, where the bridge had been washed away. Some work had been done on the crossing, but I took on an hour of laying tree trunks, shovelling sand before the truck got across.

In the little village of Kungu the fish lorry was unloaded. I began unloading my four bags of boat parts, pulling out odd pieces of wood which fit together like a jigsaw to form the frame of the canoe. Rolling out the rubberised cover, the two end drains slipped inside and I slipped together, after which the cockpit, console and rudder were fitted to form the boat.

When half an hour everything was assembled, the mast stepped and the sail slipped on, all ready for an early morning start. I crawled into my home for the next few days. Lying on the buoyancy spread over the bottom of the boat, covered by the spray cover, while a weathering hole was protected by a mosquito net.

The sun was peeping over the horizon as I hoisted the sails. I packed everything inside in space available. Slightly apprehensive I waved goodbye to the helpful villagers, let the breeze fill the sails, gently until the water was deep enough to lower the ladders and the lost rudder and make myself comfortable. Ahead lay the sea.

Making use of the breeze, it was a glorious feeling to plane over the ocean's surface with only black birds and a few sails in sight. Once out beyond the reef the sails were set, but the rudder had to be continually adjusted to ride the waves, humming as the little craft zoomed down the crest of a wave.

Using Admiralty charts, it was not very difficult to decide on the best route, as my aim was to continue distance with sightseeing, although distance regrettably took priority due to the time available.

Initially I kept the boat within sight of shore, gaining confidence and the feel of the boat.

Just opposite Simambira Island the breeze dropped. A lovely golden beach backed by sand dunes beckoned, so I answered the call. The canoe went for a swim, then sorted out some of the gear, making sure all the plastic tubing was properly sealed.

Lunch was taken in the shade of a cave, followed by a short dip, a stroll along the shoreline, the breeze wafted slowly through the air, the sails were hoisted once again and the power pointed seaward.

Gradually the wind increased, lifting the waves higher and higher, increasing the pounding upon the lovely shoreline of golden beaches, rocky crags and tiny inlets. Keeping well offshore the sailing was fast. Soon I was approaching the Wa Tano Channel. As I moved closer a beautiful half-moon bay slowly revealed itself, first the sand hills, then the palm trees waving in the breeze broken by little thatched huts dotted here and there all around a horseshoe bay. The turquoise sea flecked with breaking waves.

Once in the lee of the island the sea calmed, but a good breeze continued carrying a faint perfume. Its crew cried to me: "Come for a cup of tea, so I followed in their wake along the lovely channel, past golden beaches, interspersed with patches of scrub and mangroves.

Both boats rode gently at anchor while we climbed up the steep sandy slope to the top plateau, then along the ridge to a small village nestled in the sandhills, protected from the wind. In a few minutes I was able to look down at the lovely beaches of Kiwaya Bay.

With a flooding tide, a good clear night, and a post from the local fishermen, I decided to carry on across Kiwaya Bay, avoiding all the reefs of a low tide the following morning.

Warily I reefed in the main sail, then set out, watching the sun cast its last rays upon the sea, while the land gradually disappeared from view. It was rather eerie without the sun or moon, only stars above, a compass and map below and the sea around, rolling all the time, then sailing when the water got shallow.

With a kayak every single wave has to be ridden with care when sailing, there is never a moment to relax, worsened by the gloom as one peers into the darkness hoping to catch the shape and size of a wave before it hits you. Without sails there was no problem, but with full sails it is rather harrowing to sail at night.

Eventually the Moon rose behind me, casting a silvery glow on the crest of the waves. Then a mucky haze developed on the skyline, turning into a shoreline, followed by the odd flickering of a light, lighted between the rise and fall of the waves. The little light drew me towards Kizirigini, where many other boats were anchored for the night in a little bay. Weaving in and out of these fishing boats, the grinding of the loachard, announced shallow water, the shores of Pate Island and the end of the first day covering 45 miles.

First priority was a meal then I made my bed beside the boat using the buoyancy as mattresses, paddles as poles, a mosquito net as the tent, with an aluminium sheet as a blanket.

Braying donkeys heralded the dawn next morning, so there was no option but to get up, brew some coffee, then out on to the water again. There were ever-hopeful villagers to launch the canoe and wave goodbye.

Taking the inshore route was

Touching a surfeit of islands

side, the breeze stilled, the waves rolled long and slowly, making sailing a pleasure. Everything was peaceful, the waves at 45 degrees from direction of travel, so that it was possible to surf along the coast for a while catching the full force of the wind, which slackened a little down in the trough only to gather momentum once again on the coast.

Nearby was everywhere and waves even managed to creep under the spray cover, but it was not exhilarating as the same, skinned up and down the waves, sometimes heading over at a precarious angle. Now I knew what people meant when they talked about the thrill of sailing. Light, such perfect conditions. I only took 2 1/2 hours to cover the 14 miles from Tenere to Zwaio Island.

Zwaio Island is a barren, rocky island lying off in the ocean with a small fishermen's shelter on it, which I intended to use as a last stoppage post before the long trek across Liganga Bay.

The skippers were in luck as I made a little leeward near some rocks away from the cabin, leeward and amid that seem to find sufficient to eat.

At 2 pm I started off again. A few breeze blows, bringing with it a few clouds, which occasionally covered the Moon and stars, setting

every few minutes. Having gone too far, there were a few last raising masts balancing precariously on rotting and rotting wood until the reef offered sanctuary.

Once behind the reef the waters were comparatively calm so the headland was rounded and the canoe headed on Silver Sands Beach. Being a Saturday night, there was no accommodation available, so I made a bed in the boat once again, but shared a good meal with my friend Mark and his family, who met me there.

The following day I pursued the fishing boats out to Leopard Rock. Only a gentle breeze blew as I turned by Sail Rock, keeping just in the reef, admiring the coral, plant and foliage, easily visible as the boat only just broke the surface of the translucent waters within the reef. I sailed in to Watani through the water skiers and dinghy boats to land stretch. For a while I kept to the inside of the reef, but it got too shallow and the ocean looked inviting with only a gentle breeze rippling the surface. I was able to enjoy an escort of fresh fish, porpoises, leaping out of the air with a squeal, then came leaping humpback followed by a chorus of flying fish as a fin.

I sailed into Kilifi as the sun set on the rippling ocean.

Villagers on Kiwayu Island were kind and helpful. The children were most interested in the strangers.

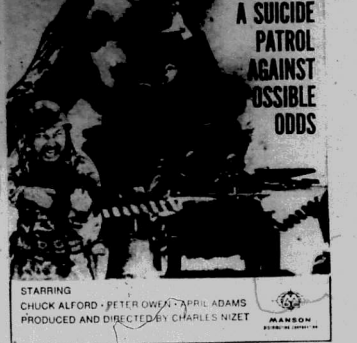

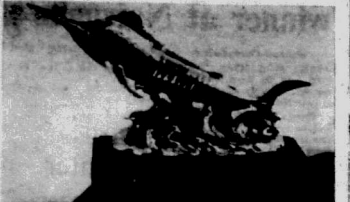

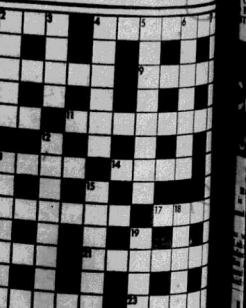

He said their immediate execution was ordered because these were dangerous men who could lead to a civil war.

We also carried out the execution as a lesson to anyone tempted to follow their example.

Altogether 29 military men have been executed, as well as eight civilians, and 17 other people sentenced last month have also been executed during the past few days.

Gen. Abdi Ghanu Al-Rawi and a student, Mohamed Mohamed Ibrahim, were sentenced to death.

These soldiers were sentenced to hard labour for life and were to be kept in a prison for the next 10 years. Twelve soldiers and six civilians were acquitted.

Gen. Ibrahim said the plotters were "frantically opposed to our oil policy, which is running counter to the interests of imperialism and capitalism."

He said that in preventing the plot, they were fulfilling their duty in relation to the liberation of the province, and that the revolution had helped the peasants.

Still no sign of talks on Congo

The reconciliation meeting between the Heads of State of the two quarrelling Congos looked unlikely in Libreville when the Gabonese President, Mr. Albert Bongo, returned to the capital alone.

Authoritative sources said Maj. Maurice Nguabi, the President of the People's Republic of the Congo Brazzaville, would go to Libreville with Mr. Bongo. The two have been having three days of talks on matters of mutual interest in the Gabonese town of Port Gantoise.

The President of Congo-Kinshasa, Gen. Joseph Mobutu, was due to join them on Saturday for a 48-hour visit and it had been hoped that the two Congolese leaders would get together.

NAMIBIA ON U.N. AGENDA

The U.N. Security Council will meet in New York this week to consider once again South Africa's refusal to withdraw from South-West Africa in defiance of U.N. demands. The U.N. Secretary-General, Mr. U Thant, is expected to announce that he will be visiting South Africa in the next few days.

The Security Council last met on November 24, 1967, when it warned South Africa to withdraw its administration from the territory by October 4, or face unspecified measures.

But South Africa has rejected the Council's decision.

Pretoria administrators the former German territory under a League of Nations mandate. The mandate was revoked by the General Assembly in 1966 but South Africa has termed the decision illegal, and refused to comply.

The most delicate stage of a mission to Africa by the American Secretary of State, Mr. Rogers, will be his visit to Lagos, observed a Nigerian diplomat in Washington.

The other countries on his schedule are all known to have good relations with Washington and the ground for the trip was successfully laid by the recent African tour of Mr. David Newsome, Mr. Rogers's assistant for African affairs.

The Secretary of State will be in Africa from February 7 to February 22, and Washington officials were confident that he would receive in the Nigerian capital. The situation is considered particularly delicate because of some Nigerian comment on American policy during and after the civil war.

A State Department spokesman showed a certain optimism when he announced that Lagos had once again assured Washington that Mr. Rogers would be welcome in the Federal capital on February 19.

However, the Lagos Government-owned Morning Post gave a different impression when it stated: "It is not easy to understand why Mr. Rogers wants to be in this country. He saw no good in it and spoke so ill of it only a few days ago."

On the American side as well the Press has put forward questions as to why the State Department has allowed relief deliveries through strict compliance with Nigerian Government demands.

To this the State Department spokesman replied that "to provide relief in a manner inconsistent with Nigerian sovereignty does not represent, in our judgment, a realistic alternative."

Government officials considered that the latest Nigerian demand for relief aid as well as the manner in which President Nixon replied to the request — would

be a setback.

The two Congos, separated by the Congo River, have been in conflict for several years. Relations further deteriorated last year when Brazzaville charged Kinshasa with complicity in an abortive coup. A plan for a summit conference aboard a boat in the middle of the Congo River earlier last week failed to materialise when Kinshasa cancelled its part to send a delegation.

Both Gabon's Mr. Bongo and the Central African Republic's President, Gen. Jean-Bedel Bokassa, have been trying to mediate in the dispute.

President Mobutu is on his first 11-day tour of five African countries. He is spending three days in Libreville as the guest of President Bongo. Mr. Libreville, the Congo-Kinshasa President, a member of the O.A.U. Consultative Committee on Nigeria, will fly to Lagos.

He will be the first Head of State to visit Nigeria since the end of fighting there. President Mobutu today.

He will be in Yaounde, Cameroons, for the O.A.U. Summit Conference and will visit Fort Lamy, Chad, on his way back home.

In an airport statement, President Mobutu said that an view of Congo Brazzaville's reaction to the latest mediation attempt between the two Congos, he felt there would be no point in further talks before November 24.

November 24 will be the fifth anniversary of his Government and will be followed in December by Presidential elections. — Agencies

Marshal Tito in Dar today

The Yugoslav President, Marshal Tito, arrives in Dar es Salaam today to attend a month-long African tour during which he is expected to discuss plans for a third non-aligned summit.

The 77-year-old Yugoslav leader is reported to be setting high personal hopes on such a meeting, which has been proposed for Dar es Salaam in April, and is likely to throw the full weight of his personal prestige behind the proposal.

The two earlier summits of non-aligned States — now numbering about 50, mostly from Africa and Asia — were held in Belgrade in 1961 and in Cairo in 1964.

Also high on President Tito's list of priorities is expansion of trade relations with the States and Yugoslavia which is embarking on missions to several African capitals to try to develop sales of both consumer and capital goods in a market estimated to contain more than 30,000,000 buyers. — Reuters

Temper high after boy's shooting

Freetown, the capital of Sierra Leone, was tense yesterday after the shooting of a boy outside an Opposition newspaper office on Saturday.

An angry crowd carrying the body of the boy stormed the car of the Prime Minister, Mr. Siaka Stevens, as he drove through the capital.

Mr. Stevens said in a nationwide broadcast later that a person or persons in a vehicle were responsible for shooting the boy outside the office of the opposition newspaper *Freedom*.

He appealed for people to remain calm and not to encourage hostile feelings against political elements in the community.

The Prime Minister said shots were fired when the vehicle stopped outside the newspaper office. A boy was killed and an adult injured, he added.

He said propaganda by certain political elements with an axe to grind alleged the shooting was politically inspired by supporters of the ruling All People's Congress.

But he said his Government regretted the incident deeply and stressed that no members or sections of the community were at liberty to take the law into their own hands in a bid for vengeance.

The newspaper *Freedom* belongs to supporters of the Sierra Leone People's Party.

Football for the small man

Many promises were given on Saturday morning to improve the administration of football in Kenya after the national meeting of the Football Association of Kenya at Parliament Buildings.

The man most likely to be selected as president is Mr. Martin Shikuku, the Assistant Minister for Home Affairs, and that he promises that football will be given back to the small man.

Mr. Shikuku is almost assured of getting the president's post when the Kenya Minister for Co-operation and Social Services, whose portfolio includes sport, Mr. Masinde Muliro, today appoints three persons to fill the major three posts on the association's executive committee - presidency, secretary and treasurer.

Mr. Shikuku is one of three men whose names are now with the Minister for the vital position. The other two in with a chance are Mr. John Kavuya, the former F.A. president, and Mr. Dixon Odaba, of Nairobi.

The Assistant Minister, an outspoken Member of Parliament for the past that the big man, the man with position and money, has dominated the football scene. He is the man who forces his way to the football stadium without paying at the gate. He is the man who looks down at the smaller man, who spends 30 minutes shouting in support of his team.

"It is the smaller man, who spends some of his meagre savings to support football and his team, that we want to encourage. We want the smaller man to show for his side and the smaller man will get the support of his team."

Mr. Shikuku asked new members of the committee elected to posts to find out what work he has to do and do the work he is appointed to.

He also warned that the new committee would enforce more discipline on clubs, players and officials and he promised that the Kenya referees would have to be severely knocked down to ensure they were on the field for the rest of the year.

"I have found that if two players are brought on the carpet for disciplinary action, one case is treated differently to the other, resulting in two completely different punishments. This is a fair game to stop."

The new vice-president, elected Mr. Mbaraka Said, of Mbaraka, promised that the new F.A. would work harder, stronger and more co-operatively to improve the standard of football in Kenya.

He said that there will be no further cases of the Kenya Government stepping in to dissolve another F.A. committee.

I promise everybody that the new F.A. will work under the new constitution, but give on time and I appeal for the provincial associations to co-operate with us.

He is the Kenya national athletics coach and is a committee member of a number of national associations.

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Summit talks in Khartoum

In Khartoum today and tomorrow Heads of State — or their representatives — of 14 independent nations of East and Central Africa meet for "summit" talks on urgent problems facing the region. They will be joined by delegates from liberation movements from South Africa, Rhodesia, Namibia and Mozambique.

From this it is clear that the old and bitter dispute over how to free Southern Africa from minority rule will dominate the meeting. This was foreshadowed in preparatory talks between Foreign Ministers in Lusaka last month.

There are likely to be some stormy passages during this debate, in view of the divergence of opinion on the strength of action needed to overthrow the minority régimes. It is still not clear whether Malawi, which follows a policy of open cooperation with South Africa, will have its delegation admitted.

A previous meeting of African leaders produced the Lusaka Manifesto, which proposed progress by peaceful means where possible, with resort to force only as a last resort. This policy is not to the liking of some of the more militant States, or of the liberation movements.

Its advantages are that it puts the onus on South Africa to make moves to a more liberal and civilised policy, and it demonstrates to the world that Africa is willing to listen to reasonable proposals. Since there is little hope at present of pursuing a policy of force in Namibia or South Africa, even on the world powers, whose actions aid the minority rulers.

The situation in Rhodesia and Mozambique is different. There is little hope in either case of the ruling régimes making concessions without resort to force. So there is no alternative but to give support to the freedom fighters and, in the case of Rhodesia, continue to exhort Britain to renounce its authority.

But the meeting in the Sudanese capital will not be exclusively concerned with liberating Southern Africa. Its other major purpose is to discuss the promotion of trade between the nations of East and Central Africa. So the talks must be allowed to founder on political rocks.

The Sudan, as host to the meeting, is showing a welcome sign of its awareness of its dual role in Africa and the Middle East. Since the military coup last July its preoccupation has been mainly with demonstrating solidarity with the united Arab front against Israel.

If one accepts that the Sudan is one nation, as its neighbours do, it is as much a part of Africa as of the Arab world. Contacts with leading statesmen from East and Central African States will be valuable for the new Sudanese rulers.

The military rulers of Somalia, whose access to power has been even more recent, will also be represented at a summit meeting for the first time. And Emperor Haile Selassie, whose nation by contrast boasts the longest continuous régime of all, will meet face to face with the young officers who control the two States with which he has border problems.

The conference is also significant for Kenya, which now has a fully fledged Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr. Mungai. This should make Kenya's voice stronger. Dr. Mungai is backed by a strong negotiating team including his Assistant Minister, Mr. Nabwera, whose long experience at the U.N. will be invaluable.

Although the meeting is one of East and Central African States, there is a move to admit the U.A.R. as an observer. This should not be allowed to develop into a full-scale debate demanding African backing for the Arab States' war with Israel. Two days is little enough to solve Africa's own problems.

CHARGE OF RACIALISM

Arabs in the Middle East are facing what Africans were facing in South Africa, Rhodesia, Angola, and Mozambique — inaction and colonisation by foreigners who exercised racial policies against the natives. The U.A.R. President Attache, Mr. S. T. El-Zaki, said:

He added: "We are faced with enemies bent on aggression and domination in complete disregard for the United Nations and world public opinion. We are being invaded by the Zionists. If the Arabs resolved to take up arms and besiege Israel they would not solve the problem raised by their approach. Israel with a 'clear mind' aimed at formulating reasonable solutions to the Arab problem."

He added that Israel was always ready to negotiate with the neighbouring Arab countries. Israel, he pointed out, is the only country which retains its indigenous language among the Middle East countries. It has 73 per cent Arab and African origin and the rest are of European origin.

He said that the Arab population in Israel is given equal chance in the economic scope of the country, adding that 75 per cent of the responsible posts in the Armed Forces and the Police are held by Arabs.

Refuting the accusations that Israel practices apartheid, he said that Arab scholars attend the same universities as the Israelis.

None of this is to suggest however that our interest and relations with the independent States of Africa are overworked. Our diplomatic links with the continent have grown rapidly in recent years and afford a solid basis upon which a wide diversity of relationships is growing.

Our links with Kenya — both bilateral and multilateral strengthen year by year — one of these being the fact that I think useful programme of technological training in Kenya. We have so far received Australian scholarships for training in Australia in fields including agriculture, engineering, forestry and public administration.

Our economic, political and military links tend likewise to be most extensive in the same area.

...the cost advantage in labour-intensive lines of production, the industrial economies are increasingly willing to vacate certain areas of production, like light engineering and even some of the heavy engineering industries including electrical industries, textiles, metal manufacturers, chemicals and a wide range of consumer goods.

The realisation of this fact has come to be proved as advantageous to both the parties for, while India will secure orders, the recipients would spare their energies for more sophisticated processes of production.

Based on this broad philosophy, India has already entered into several joint ventures with not only the developing but also the developed countries. Presently, there are about 80 joint industrial ventures, that have been approved by the Indian Government for installation abroad with Indian collaboration.

Of these, 32 ventures are in Africa (16 in Ghana, one in Kenya, two in Libya, one in Mauritius, six in Nigeria, three in Zambia, two in Uganda and one each in Tanzania and Togo). In Ethiopia, the ventures are for manufacturing textiles, soap, wooden, plastic processing and

clock assembly. India has also subscribed to the share-capital of a firm producing concern in Ethiopia.

In Ghana, Indian collaboration is already proving useful in the manufacture of small-wheel type agricultural tractors.

Among the products being manufactured with Indian collaboration in Kenya are textiles, grip-water, pharmaceuticals, printing inks and allied products, woollen textiles, fluorescent fixtures and accessories, light engineering products, coils, paper and pulp.

Pipes and asbestos cement products are two categories of manufacture in Libya, while in Mauritius, the products are mosaic tiles and rolling shutters.

Technical knowledge from India is being made available for the manufacture of engineering goods, textiles, razor blades and pencils as well as solvent extraction and palm kernel crushing in Nigeria. A sugar mill is being set up in Uganda by a consortium of Indian manufacturers while a leading Indian firm is helping in setting up a juice mill.

Zambia has sought help from India for setting up a construction company, an enamulsion factory and a refinery of lubricants. Pharmaceutical and radio assembly plants are to be set up in Tanzania and Togo respectively.

In South Asia, Ceylon is making use of India's technical expertise in setting up industrial units through joint ventures for manufacture of sewing machines, leaf separators, glass, PVC, leather goods, slippers, music-making, room coolers and air conditioners, pharmaceuticals, ACCU/CSR conductors, and leather.

Afghanistan has welcomed India's participation in the manufacture of sewing thread balls and bicycles. In East Asia, Malaysia has sought assistance in the manufacture of steel furniture, zinc oxide,

cotton textiles, glass bottles, insulated conductors, precision tools, electric fans, sewing machines, confectionery, cosmetics, electric motors, pumps and diesel engines.

A welding electrode plant in Singapore and steel mill, a synthetic fibre plant and a newsprint mill in Thailand are coming up. Indonesia is seeking knowledge for producing rubber goods.

In Iran, India has already set up plants for manufacturing non-ferrous semi and automotive components while another plant for electric motor and transformers is on the anvil.

As far as West Asia is concerned, the Indian Government has approved proposals for a soft drink plant in Iraq, a pesticial formulation unit in Lebanon and factories for refrigerators and air-conditioners, asbestos cement products and varnishes in Saudi Arabia.

What is more significant is that in advanced countries, too, India has joint ventures. In Ireland there are two units that will soon go on production with Indian participation for manufacturing nylon berles and tufted carpet yarn.

Northern Ireland is seeking knowledge for an asbestos cement product plant and a light engineering goods factory. In Britain there is an asbestos cement plant functioning with India's co-operation. In the U.S. there is a hardware project, and in Canada, a hardware factory is already in operation, while a commercial plant for producing starch and liquid glucose will soon come into existence.

In South America, there is a proposal for setting up a project in Colombia for manufacturing twist drills. A new chapter in economic co-operation began in October 1966, when India, the U.A.R. and Yugoslavia decided to start on a unique venture in intercontinental economic collaboration.

The Tripartite Agreement envisages far-reaching measures for strengthening and widening the scope of mutual economic assistance. Expansion and Economic Co-operation Agreement, which took effect on April 1, 1968.

The main object of the Agreement is to provide for Tariff Preferences on the exchange of specified goods between the three countries. The preference was to

the extent of 40 per cent of the most-favoured-nation rate, rising to 50 per cent from April 1, 1969. The products cover a wide field, particularly in the non-traditional range.

The Agreement has a special feature in that there are no individual lists of goods in respect of which each country extends tariff preferences to the others.

But there is a Common List of goods and each of the three countries has agreed to accord preferential treatment to the goods covered by the Common List which are manufactured in the other two.

Perhaps, the Common List approach is a unique feature, reflecting the non-restrictive and non-discriminatory approach of the three countries.

In the field of industrial co-operation the three member countries have already identified potential areas of collaboration. These areas include wheeled tractor,

crawler tractor, T.V. glass bulbs, T.V. picture tubes, passenger car and components, auto ancillaries, scooter, small engines for bicycles and other uses and switchgears.

Supply of electrical equipment with power plant to fourth countries is another area that has been identified.

The three countries recently met in Cairo and have agreed to extend facilities to each other including customs duty exemption, assistance in obtaining industrial licences and raw materials and marketing products in respect of joint products.

It was felt that scientific and technical co-operation should be encouraged by encouraging closer contacts. It has also been agreed that within a time limit of six months, practical proposals should be evolved by them on joint shipping services. It is to be hoped that this Tripartite Agreement will open up new vistas of co-operation among the three parties.

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India's atomic power for peace only

In the wake of Independence India launched significant efforts to promote nuclear research for peaceful purposes.

The Atomic Energy Commission was constituted in August 1948 with the objective of prospecting and exploring atomic minerals and building up a core of trained personnel to undertake advanced research in the field.

Since setting up the commission, remarkable developments have taken place. The progress of research enabled the development of many basic facilities including the APSARA, a one-megawatt pool-type reactor, CIRCEIS of 40 megawatt reactor, and ZEEKINA.

APSARA and Circes are used for research as well as for production of radio isotopes. ZeeKina is used as a zero energy experimental unit, in the experiments relating to the physics of reactor case as well as for examining different types of nuclear fuel.

In January, 1957, the Trombay establishment was inaugurated by Jawaharlal Nehru and the Atomic Research Centre for the Bhabha memory of Dr. Homi Bhabha.

BARC has made rapid progress in the development of new equipment for research and for use in industry and agriculture. These included radiography, cameras, gamma-chambers, an isotope dispersing plant, nuclear data processing equipment.

Molecular, centrifugal and fractional distillation, so on, related to technical physics, chemistry, engineering, food processing, electronics, biology, food enrichment and processing, air-monitoring reactor for engineering, atomic minerals and so on.

A far-reaching development was

the commissioning of the plutonium plant at Trombay in 1964 following which India joined the select small group of nations possessing an advanced nuclear technology.

A further development has been the recent commissioning of the first atomic power station at Tarapur in Maharashtra State with assistance from the U.S. at two other atomic power stations in the country. One of them, a 500 MW station, is being built at Rana Pratap Sagar in Rajasthan State with the assistance of Canada. The other one is a 200 MW station at Kalpakkam which is being designed and built entirely with local technical knowledge.

Once these power stations become a reality the power generation that will be made possible will be able to meet the domestic requirements of electricity.

The operation and maintenance responsibility of Indian scientists and engineers. The experience gained by the Indian personnel will be available for completion of the two other nuclear power generation projects on hand.

In fact, it is anticipated that India's increasing capability to manufacture essential equipment will be reflected in the foreign exchange element in the cost of the plant in Rana Pratap Sagar, Kalpakkam.

The two reactors at Tarapur are of the boiling water type and the fuel used to enrich uranium made

available by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

But India has large deposits of uranium and also particularly rich deposits of thorium which can be increasingly processed for use in reactors. Research in thorium technology is now in progress and it is expected to result in evolution of processes that will make the country increasingly self-reliant for its nuclear resources.

With the establishment of the infrastructure of the programme, the nuclear effort thus entered a major phase; the generation of electricity and the use of radio isotopes and radiation sources and medicine, industry, agriculture, biology and other fields.

Trombay produces over 350 radio isotopes and labelled compounds. During 1962-69 the nuclear effort thus entered a major phase and services rendered by the amount to Rs. 14 million.

Radio isotopes were exported to countries such as the U.S., Australia, Thailand and Sweden. The supplied several new radio pharmaceuticals to medical users.

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inhabitation of areas, specification of insects, etc. in which have resulted in the development of high yielding mutants of groundnuts, rice and barley.

The Medical Division conducts research in clinical application of radio isotopes which are being used for the study of disease, control of malaria, protein malnutrition, tropical sprue, functional relationship between the liver and the thyroid.

In 1962 India ventured into the field of space research in a modest way and the responsibility for the new subject was entrusted to the Department of Atomic Energy.

A beginning was made with the setting up of the Indian National Committee for Space Research (INCOSPAR). An Equatorial Rocket Launching Station was set up at Thumba near Trivandrum with the assistance of the Central National DYNASPACE of France. NASA of the United States and the Hydro-meteorological services of the U.S.S.R.

Being near the magnetic equator, Thumba offers unique facilities for study of atmospheric and space conditions peculiar to the magnetic equatorial region.

In December 1965 the United Nations accorded sponsorship to station an international facility for space research activities in February 1968 the station was formally dedicated to the United Nations by the Prime Minister Shri Indira Gandhi.

A programme for launching sounding rockets was inaugurated on November 21, 1963, in collaboration with France and the U.S. Since then several rockets have been launched and experiments carried out for investigating various properties of the atmosphere.

While under an agreement with France, Centaure rockets are being

Every facet for fair visitors

A cradle of many an ancient civilisation, a land which gave birth to different facets of philosophy and religion, India has today blossomed into the age of modern science and technology.

The world's largest furnishing industry, throwing under the impact of the process of industrialisation and mechanisation, lives in harmony with the progress achieved in previous millennia against the background of its long traditions and history.

The Indian exhibit in Expo '68 projects the rich cultural heritage and rapid economic transformation of the country, its message of family, tolerance and co-operation, the stupendous efforts it is making in the technical knowledge and diversifying its industrial base.

The 75-foot-high Pavilion is in the form of a large cut cone with a truncated roof admitting continuous subdued light. It shows a happy mingling of old and traditional design. The visitor approaches the Pavilion entrance between two series of stepped terraces flanked by mud walls, a mirror image of the semi-traditional structures which create a typical rural atmosphere.

The first level is of a typical Indian village scene. Passing by the village cover, visitors to the higher level which typifies the historical period using red sandstone, the material most intimately associated with late medieval buildings, and small pleasure pavilions. Water is also a major part of the whole landscape approach, as a universal design element, both in place and time.

Thus a visitor is taken, through a rich sprinkling of village and folk arts by a slow and interesting passage, to a raised entrance, to the top floor where the traditions of Indian arts and crafts, independent in their colours, richness and variety, show the orientation of skills of the artisans to meet the requirements of modern complex age.

Progress through the Pavilion also follows the progress of India in time. The floor exhibit textiles and traditional handicrafts, arts and religions, Buddhist culture and its link with Japan and other South-east Asian countries, drama and the dances.

The middle floor projects the emergence and impact of Buddhism, harmonising of religions, influence of one of the other, and the renaissance of arts in the country. Selected sculptures, paintings, art pieces and crafts build an atmosphere of beauty and grandeur.

A model of the Taj Mahal, with glories of its atmosphere, occupies an important place on the middle floor which comprises a circular area with a large elliptical circular overlooking the ground floor. India built the ground floor. It is still building. It has built giant dams, power houses, bridges, roads and factories which are changing the skyline of the land and the face of the countryside.

On the ground level the visitor gets a glimpse of the country as it strides Indian people have made in harnessing the mountain, the sea and of their struggle in rebuilding the ancient land, developing steel, power, machinery and goods for the welfare of the people.

Faith and festivals constitute a significant aspect. Music, dancing and art enrich the nation's life. All these are eminently featured in the Pavilion through display on the top floor and middle floor as well through live performances by artists.

The ground floor houses the auditorium where performances of an informal nature can take place against a background of machines and components.

The Pavilion restaurant offers a wide variety of delicacies served amidst typically Indian decor and atmosphere. The Pavilion also aims at showing to visitors the close ties of friendship and cultural heritage with the countries of South-east Asia and the expanding

areas of collaboration between India and Japan. The structure of the Pavilion is itself highly sophisticated. Raised on an elliptical drum of tapered concrete, the roof, which also acts as the walls for the upper floors, consists of a structural grid of steel sheets lined internally with timber. The two wings of the roof are separated by a strip of acrylic glass which acts as the filter of subdued natural light during the day and which at night causes a glow of light to emanate from the roof.

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The State Trading Corporation of India enjoys, by now, a world-wide reputation as an institution in a democratic framework which supplements, but not supplants, private trade. More and more countries are coming forward for trading through this organisation. It has made a vast and varied contribution to the development of the Indian economy through its growing activities not only in the field of exports and imports but also in the allied spheres of internal trade which have a bearing on exports. During the decade it has developed to a size and commercial success that has qualified it for a further leap forward by way of participation in the onerous task of the expansion of the country's exports in the Fourth Plan period. Since the opening of the Office of S.T.C. in Nairobi only four years back the existing trade links between Eastern and Central Africa have been further strengthened.

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
