The U.N. Security Council at the weekend voted by 13 to nil with two abstentions a resolution calling on all States to break off deals with the South African Government which concerned South West Africa (Namibia).

## WITCH HUNT COMMITTEE FOR CZECHS

A new "prosecution" of the role and responsibility of the former Czechoslovakia Communist party leader, Alexander Dubcek in efforts before and after January 1968 will be presented soon to a Communist Party central committee session, a senior party official said in Prague at the weekend.

Mr. Josef Havlicek, alternate member of the central committee, told a news conference such a report was now being drawn up alongside a report by a commission in charge of determining responsibilities for the trials staged during the purges of party leaders in the 1950s.

Mr. Havlicek said the party first Secretary, Dr. Gustav Husak, had told the final sitting of the three-day plenary session that these studies must be carried out very carefully and calmly and that the committee president and the party committee members for the time being.

Mr. Husak, who was succeeded by Dr. Husak last April took up his new post as Ambassador to Turkey a few days ago. — AFP.

## U.S. WARNED OF RECESSION DANGER

President Nixon warned at the weekend that there was a danger of an economic recession in the United States if the monetary restrictions of the past year were not relaxed.

He said his Government had now demonstrated its fiscal responsibility and that the Federal Reserve Board could now ease its tight money policies in order to bring down interest rates.

He expressed confidence that the rate of inflation would continue to decline.

Speaking at the first Press conference of the year, the President said he was ready to use the "flexible" approach to deal with any major escalation in Vietnam if he found that U.S. efforts to de-escalate the war were being jeopardized by the North Vietnamese.

But in the meantime, he said, increased economic inflation had not been enough to justify any similar situation.

The North Vietnamese had nothing to gain by waiting for something to happen in the United States, Mr. Nixon said, and his Government's plan remained the complete withdrawal of U.S. combat forces from Vietnam while giving South Vietnamese forces all the support they needed to face their enemy.

The "Vietnamisation" policy was irreversible, he said, but he stressed that its success would depend on various well-known criteria, including progress in the Paris peace talks, progress in the rate of training of South Vietnamese forces and the level of enemy activity on the battlefield.

He predicted that he would have more announcements on troops withdrawals as the Vietnamisation programme went ahead.

His goal was still to beat the timetable recommended by the former Defence Secretary, Mr. Clark Clifford, of having 200,000 U.S. troops withdrawn from Vietnam by the end of this year.

On Nigeria, President Nixon mentioned reports of hundreds of thousands of people starving in former Biafra but said no relief could be sent to them without the consent of the Nigerian authorities.

But the United States would continue to press Lagos to facilitate relief operations in the former war zone, without getting involved in the politics of sending aid to blame for the suffering.

Mr. Nixon said that, although U.S.-French relations had considerably improved since last year, the French sale of military planes to

The Kenya Government's proposal to establish a new secondary school mainly for children of expatriates will be announced soon, a Government official said yesterday.

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# Aliens breaching trade laws Minister

Minister for Trade Licensing, Mr. A. P. Achening, has announced that he will be taking steps to ensure that their businesses are not made to close them down because of their failure to comply with the provisions of the 1967 Trade Licensing Act and must not be handled by non-citizens with effect from January 1, 1970.

He added "It has been brought to my notice that quite a number of non-citizens are still trading in specified goods in spite of the wide publicity given to these legal notices last year. I would like to warn such traders that they should cease to trade in these items with immediate effect."

The Minister recalled the non-citizen traders were given an adequate period during which to clear the stocks specified. Instead of doing so, he alleged, some had continued to re-stock these items in contravention of the provisions of the Trade Licensing Act.

Some are still trading in items such as milk bread, tea and coffee, which they have continued to purchase daily from the suppliers.

Mr. Changufu, who was previously Kenya's Minister for Information and Broadcasting, took over the Department from the late Mr. A. P. Achening as a result of the Government's resignation from the East African Community in January 1969.

On January 2, he received a letter from the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry to discuss the trade licensing provisions, but those affected by the law were given four to six months to wind up their businesses.

A spokesman for the chamber said the Minister had explained the reasons for the delay in dealing with licence applications and had said that no traders would be evicted to quit their businesses.

It was disclosed on January 8 that about 400 traders in Nairobi had been given notice by the Government to wind up their businesses within either four months or six months.

He told the delegation that the original list of 21 specified goods reserved for sale by citizens only was published at the beginning of 1969. It included such commodities as sugar, maize and macaroni, charcoal, rice, all types of fresh vegetables, biscuits, glycerine, kiosk drill, soap, cigarettes and matches, sweets, salt, various types of beans, cement, herring, tea and milk.

From January 1 of this year the list was extended to include the following goods: onions, millet, wheat and maize, edible oil, fresh meat, groundnuts, coffee in tins, bottles of packets, and tea, soft drinks, mineral waters, jaggery, detriments of all type, dry cells, charcoal, iron, sulphur, second-hand gunny bags, blankets, building lime, galvanised plate, fencing wire, bicycles and their spare parts, brass and galvanised hinges, wood screws, metal beads, shovels and spades, jembes, boots and foot axes, pangas, padlocks, lanterns, torches, shoes and sandals.

# Masai will move out in plan to expand Amboseli

**Standard Correspondent.**  
Kajiado County Council is to meet to discuss a Government plan under which 170 square miles will be taken from the Amboseli Game Reserve to 200 square miles.

The letter is one of seven separate proposals for the expansion of the reserve. Speaking at an informal meeting between the Ministry and County Council officials and local M.P.s, he said wildlife needed more protection now than at any time in the past, and it must be given to safeguard the country's booming tourism industry.

The Ministry plan would make Amboseli a unique wildlife sanctuary which would play an important part in tourism, Kenya's leading earner of foreign exchange.

The chairman of Kajiado County Council, Mr. Stephen Laken, and an Assistant Minister for Health and M.P. for Kajiado South, Mr. Oloppitip, agreed to convene a meeting of the council as soon as possible to consider the proposal. They said they saw no difficulty in setting the area aside provided that water and dips were provided in other areas for the Masai who lived there.

The Permanent Secretary to the Ministry, Mr. A. P. Acheng, who accompanied Mr. Shako, outlined the steps which must be taken by the council before the area could be set aside and gazetted as a wildlife sanctuary and said one of the most important was for the council to pass a resolution stating that it agreed to the plan.

Mr. Laken and Mr. Oloppitip indicated that as the venture would benefit the Masai the council would meet with a view to passing such a resolution.

Mr. Laken told the Minister that last year the council earned more than £50,000 in entrance fees to Amboseli, 40 per cent of its total budget. The revenue was expected to be far more this year.

The Minister's party later inspected Amboseli New Lodge, Old Lodge, and Amboseli Safari Club. They also inspected drivers' and servants' quarters, ante-rooms and kitchens, and the Minister said he was satisfied with the situation of the drivers and servants quarters at the lodges.

Mr. R. S. Desai, managing director of Kilimanjaro Safari Club, who accompanied Mr. Shako, said that an expansion programme for the lodge was under way and the capacity of Amboseli New Lodge would be increased from 110 beds to 140 at a cost of about £100,000. Mr. Desai said that Amboseli Safari Club would expand from 64 to 114 beds at a cost of about £20,000.

# Zambia defies Rhodesia over guerilla bands

The Zambia Government has refused to accept any responsibility for clashes between Rhodesian nationalist guerillas and African nationalist guerilla forces in Rhodesia.

The Home Affairs Minister, Mr. Lewis Changufu, declined responsibility for these incidents in a statement issued in reply to Mr. Ian Smith's warning that Rhodesia could not continue to ignore in support from Zambia.

Mr. Changufu said that the fighting in Rhodesia was the direct result of the oppression exercised on the majority of the people in Rhodesia.

The Rhodesians reported that two members of the guerilla forces had been killed and seven wounded.

Zambia was a peace-loving nation dedicated to political freedom and peaceful development, he added. The Minister charged that in the past, Zambians who lived near the borders with minority régimes had suffered constant aggression and premeditated, and unprovoked attacks. Rhodesia had nevertheless avoided measures which could serve to increase the tension in the area, he concluded.

The total number of guerillas captured so far has not been divulged. — Agency

In Rhodesia a guerilla force announced it had captured another African guerilla force and killed during operations in the Zambezi Valley.

Six more members of the party were arrested in a police swoop on party offices. "We do not know exactly how many members of the party are in jail," a party member said. "There may be 30 or 40 or more."

Chief Jonathan has turned down an appeal from leading churchmen in the country to restore the constitution. The churchmen also asked that he hand over power to Mr. Ntsu Mokhehle, the detained leader of the Congress Party. Among those at the meeting was Archbishop Morapeli.

Reports from the British High Commissioner in Lesotho, Mr. Ian Watt, contain assurances from Chief Jonathan that the lives and property of 450 British citizens in the country were being protected. — Reuters

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# Israeli jets strike after tank battle

Israeli jets strafed Syrian positions in the Galna Heights yesterday after a four-hour tank and artillery duel between Israeli and Syrian forces, a military spokesman said in Tel Aviv.

The spokesman said two Syrian tanks suffered direct hits and pilots reported seeing Syrian artillery batteries explode in the bank which occurred in the Rafid area, some of several clashes in the past three days. He denied Syrian claims that two Israeli tanks and a mortar battery were destroyed. There were no Israeli casualties or damage, he said.

He added that Syrian planes did not intervene during the air strike and all Israeli jets returned safely to base.

The clash began, he said, when Syrian troops opened mortar fire on an Israeli patrol in the Rafid sector of the southern Golan Heights at 8.20 a.m. (6.20 G.M.T.). The Israelis returned the fire.

At 9.25 a.m. (7.25 G.M.T.) the Syrians launched an artillery and tank fire attack against Israeli forces in the same sector, the spokesman said.

The fighting lasted until 12.25 (10.25 G.M.T.), he added. Israeli jets were also reported to have bombed Syrian supply camps in the Nile Delta in the seventh deep air raid into Egypt in less than a month yesterday.

Arab Economy Ministers and members of the United Arab Emirates Economic Council were yesterday adopting a resolution condemning the Syrian attack on the Golan Heights and the United States because of Washington's Middle East policy, the Cairo daily Al-Gumhuriya said.

The council which was meeting behind closed doors, was also to publish resolutions designed to counterbalance the Arab common market.

President Nixon yesterday submitted to the U.S. Congress an austere \$83,655,000,000 budget for 1970-71, marked by cuts in spending on Vietnam and the Space Programme.

He told Congress that it was an anticongressional budget with a re-ordering of priorities to spend more money on human resources programmes than on national defence for the first time in 20 years.

The fight against crime, welfare and the President's anti-pollution drive were also earmarked for substantial boosts.

Mr. Nixon asked for only minor tax changes — income and excise taxes were left unchanged — to help offset \$3,480,000,000 revenue loss when the present five per cent surtax expires on June 30. His budget contains his spending proposals for the year beginning on July 1.

The President said he expected total revenues of \$84,208,000,000 providing a slim surplus of \$555,000,000, but government officials admitted could slip into deficit if the economic picture worsened.

Mr. Nixon said in his accompanying budget message: "The surfeit is essential both to stem persistent inflationary pressures and to relieve hard-pressed financial markets."

In sending the new budget to Congress, Mr. Nixon also estimated that the current 1969 fiscal year ending on June 30 would result in a surplus of \$225,000,000. Total expenditure would be \$82,437,000,000, against \$83,107,000,000 in revenues.

Nowhere in the 1,095-page budget was there any breakdown

More than 150 people were killed and some 300 injured when a station wagon ploughed into a stationary passenger train packed with 1,000 people north-west of Buenos Aires, police reported yesterday.

Police said they had 84 bodies in one police station six hours after the crash in a neighbourhood of 22 miles from the Argentine capital.

The express was carrying mail and passengers from Tucuman, 700 miles north-west of Buenos Aires. It was 50 minutes behind time and travelling at about 60 miles an hour when it hit the stationary train packed with returning weekend trippers — at Benavides station.

Most of the dead and injured were in the station wagon which was disintegrated when the twin diesel locomotives of the express ploughed into it.

Scores of bodies and injured people were trapped in the twisted and mangled wreckage of the railway cars, and police said many of them could be removed only by daylight.

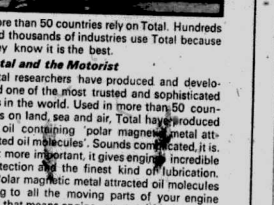

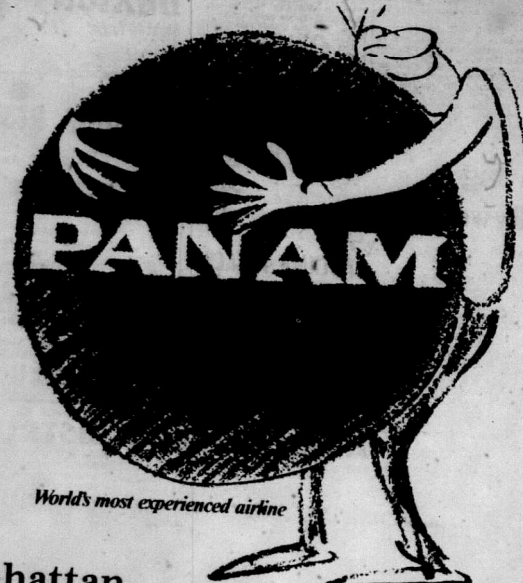

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**Skin test for cancer patients**

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Dr. Donald L. Morton, chief of the National Cancer Institute, told the American College of Surgeons recently that the test could save a patient from a futile surgery, or prevent a patient from putting him through the trauma of a major surgery if some other form of therapy could be used.

The test consists of applying a widely used industrial chemical known as DNCB to the patient's forearm. Dr. Morton's research showed that 90 per cent of the allergic reaction remained disease-free for at least six months following surgery.

But, of the negative reactors, 97 per cent could not escape their cancers.

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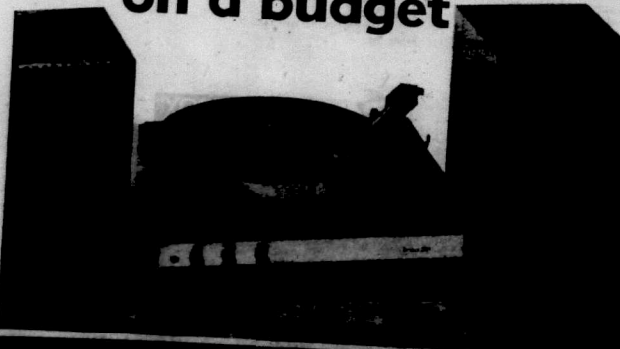

**£8,400 set aside for self-help work**

A total of £8,400 has been released by the Ministry of Co-operative and Social Services as a grant to self-help projects in Eastern Province for the year 1969/70.

Announcing this the Chairman of the Eastern Provincial Development Planning Committee, Mr. Malabu, strongly urged the District Community Development Officers to submit their applications for this assistance through their District Development Committees as soon as possible so that the Provincial Development Planning Committee could consider and approve them.

Mr. Malabu, who is also the Eastern Provincial Commissioner, was flanked by the Eastern Provincial Community Development Officer, Mr. Thiaka, and the Deputy P.C., Mr. Karanga, when he declared that the deadline for receiving such applications would be March 5.

He urged them to work hand in hand with the Government officers for the rapid development of their location.

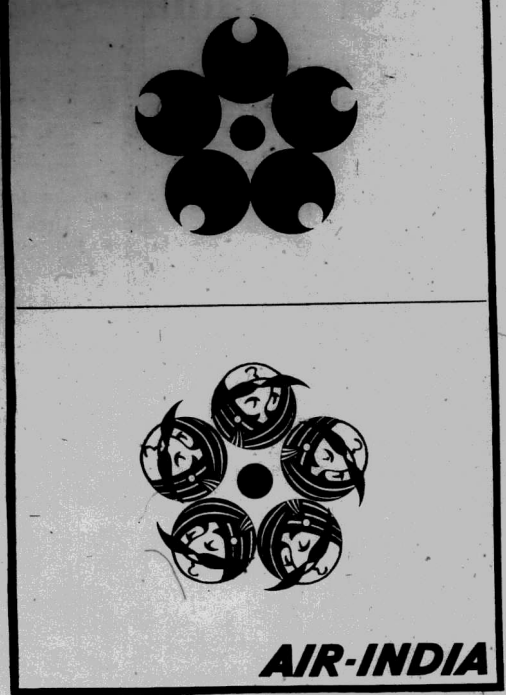

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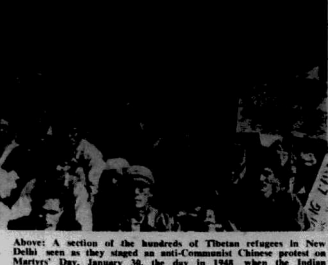

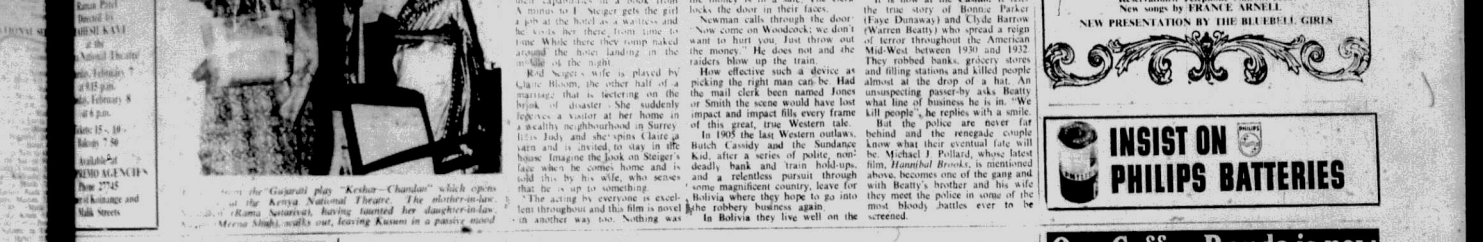
**Gujarati play**  
The Gujarati play 'Keshav-Chandani' which is to be presented tomorrow and Sunday at the Kenya National Theatre, has a strong story element and as such, might provide quite entertaining fare to those interested in contemporary Gujarati theatre.  
It is being presented by the Art Circle of Bombay and is sponsored in Nairobi by the Gujarati Art Circle. The play has been written by Mr. Roman Patel and the production is being directed by Mr. Mahesh Kavi of Bombay.  
The story is based on the ideals of chandani (sandalwood) and keshav (saffron), i.e. creating an atmosphere of fragrance, coolness and peace around oneself.  
It is a social melodrama revolving around a rich young woman married to a well-brought-up man, their marriage being threatened by the villain.  
The dejected husband seeks solace elsewhere, returns and returns to the wife. The villain continues his evil designs and the play attempts to portray the hard-fought battles of ideals when faced with the easy way out.  
It will be interesting to see how the director and his cast interpret and project on the stage the playwright's intentions.  
I understand the Art Circle of Bombay is quite an experienced group of Gujarati actors and actresses and Mahesh Kavi is well known in the Gujarati cultural circles for his stage and literary activities.

**Three Into Two** (Two Boys Go) does not stop middle-aged men picking up young girl hitch-hikers, nothing will. Besides being a terrible warning, the film is also a superbly acted drama in which the audience cannot escape the feeling that they are looking on to something that should be private.

# killing himself

Never has the pace of big business been so fast or so killing. Never have wives had to shoulder so much of the family responsibility as their men devote up to 80 per cent of their time to chasing promotion. It's up to us to show the men in our lives how to combat stress and strain — and how to stop them taking life's problems squarely on the chin. **STELLA BRUCE** writes...

While men usually take responsibility squarely on the shoulders, wives are often the ones who willpower to get things done. But it was only the help of my wife that really pulled me through.

Some companies strain only too well what the strain of modern business can do to a man. We're running a lot of families, said the medical officer of a large West German industrial company.

Our welfare department offers psychiatric services, but we're not really geared to handle serious mental problems.

It is in the family — and particularly the wife — which is left with the job of keeping a businessman fit and happy. If husband and wife can talk about the problems work brings, they're at least halfway towards solving them, says an industrial psychologist visiting a young executive who decided to leave the home an hour early so that he could relax before the

children were in bed and spend some time with his complete family.

He also guaranteed that he would not work on Saturdays and that he would not bring work home on more than two nights a week.

"One of the worst aspects of present-day high-pressure business is the resentment generated in wives who believe that husbands always put their work first regardless of the consequences," says Dr. Morton Begley, an industrial psychologist retained by several major American companies.

"Certainly, the demands of executive status have increased tremendously in recent years. Today's executives not only must work harder and longer at the office, but they're also required to spend more time out of town.

"Indeed, one poll showed that the average executive can now spend up to 50 per cent of his working life on the road, which means he will have some nights—and his wife will always be manage on her own.

The tug-of-war between a man's loyalty to his family and his obligation to his job is becoming one of the most psychological problems of the 20th century.

Early in the marriage a couple must decide on priorities, says Dr. Begley. If the husband wants to go all out for material success, this neglects his family. Or he can limit his ambition and play a larger part in home life.

If he chooses the latter course, this then grows outart to the wife to completion of a lack of material possessions. But this does happen.

"Another danger is the gap between husband and wife, which widens as he continues to rise in company circles. In many cases, the stress is driven by his work that the family home provides an escape from the relentless pressure of his work.

So what can a wife do to keep her husband happy and a stress-free husband? Primarily, it's accept the fact that he is and taller

family life to his basic qualities and shortcomings.

Help him keep a sense of proportion. When he comes home at night limp with worry after a rough week, suggest — by example rather than words — that there is more to life than an office desk and a shelf of sales reports.

Encourage him to develop outside interests. Let him enjoy family life; he's playing his part by bringing in the money, so he should not have to spend the entire weekend with his hands in the sink.

Suggest a few simple relaxation exercises. For instance, get him to lie on his back with hands at his sides and eyes closed. Ask him to direct his attention to wriggling his toes!

After a few seconds of this, the focal point of attention should gradually come up the legs, through the body, until it is level with the face.

Reading larly in this state, the body will surrender to feelings of physical heaviness. This is called deep relaxation, used by mystics as the first stage in acquiring their extraordinary powers of mental control.

Finally, there is my own feeling, shared by many others, that if this wool was really good it could stand up to normal competition. When it was introduced the import of all other knitting wool was immediately banned — few other local industries get this kind of protection and naturally consumers wonder why.

Knitting is something I can take or leave alone. I quite enjoy it while watching television, and while I regard myself as a good average knitter, it is a hobby I could get wildly enthusiastic about. For the wool, incidentally, the raw material, including cable and Fair Isle, and the garments I knit (about two a

As it happened, it was a wonderfully soft wool to use, it kept its shape and neither shrank nor stretched. It was washed first in lukewarm Lux flakes and the water was slightly tinged with blue — but this can happen with brightly coloured wools of better known brands. It did not "bleed" into the rinsing water, nor during the second test wash, this time in Surf. It has now been washed six times and has retained its softness, shape and colour.

Although, like the salesman, I cannot vouch for the seven other wools made by this company, I have no hesitation in recommending Knitkit for any one-colour garment, though I do not think I would risk it in combination with white or pastel shades. There are 11 Kwiknit shades from which to choose.

Not all Raymond wools are 50 gm packs — some are in 25 gm size (1oz is 28.3 gm). They range from 2 to 275 a ball and most of the different ranges have a fairly wide choice of colours — one that, perhaps, will get around to trying out the other—

## Singapore legalises abortion

Singapore has legalised 13 abortions — but this does not mean that the small island republic will become the abortion capital of Asia.

The passing of the law in the last days of 1967, after a relatively stormy year-long passage through the single-party Parliament, will not bring plane-loads of women flying in for cheap legal abortions.

Singapore's tough Socialist Government has waded the law to prevent this.

Although the new law is liberal and wide-ranging — opponents of the Bill claim it virtually means giving abortion on demand — the Government has made it clear that the abortions to be carried out in Government hospitals are for Singapore citizens and residents only.

The law states that a woman may be treated in Singapore for at least four months prior to having an abortion. It also allows abortions only on pregnancies less than 16 weeks old — making it impossible for pregnant outsiders to make use of the new freedom.

The 16-week limit is imposed on women seeking an abortion under the most criticised clause of the law. This is the environmental, socio-economic clause, permitting abortion on the grounds that the environment, including the family and circumstances of the woman justifies it.

This clause was left completely unamended by a select committee

formed to study criticisms of the Bill.

The Minister of Health, Mr. Chua Han bin, introducing the Third Reading of the Bill in Parliament, said that by allowing abortions on purely socio-economic grounds, it was a most progressive piece of legislation.

The 16-week limit has also been imposed on abortions for pregnancies caused by rape and incest. Abortions will, however, be allowed up to 24 weeks for cases where there is a serious risk to life or serious risk that the child will be born abnormal.

This clause has been slightly amended, and represents one of the few minor changes to the Bill by the select committee.
