Newspapers in London and Paris accept the possibility calmly, but with sincere regret, reflecting the feeling of commentators in London that Great Britain has already shown herself ready at every point to meet the legitimate aspirations and complaints of Italy.

In a broadcast yesterday June 3, the Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs, Galeazzo Ciano, declared that Italy must join in the war on moral grounds because of the great national pride and the sense of national honor which Italy must maintain in the face of the Italian people. 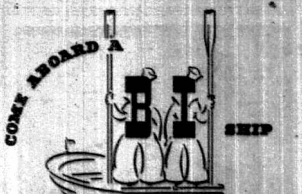

Industry's Budget Approved

Improves Chairman's Work In London

A HELPFUL VISIT

The Coffee Board of Kenya has received a report from its chairman, Mr. R. S. Wollen, on the information he obtained and the representations he made during his visit to London.

The report was adopted by the Board which expressed itself satisfied with the visit. The chairman dealt successfully during his visit with shipping problems, publicity, import and exchange control, the needs of the British home market and many other questions of importance to the Coffee Industry.

It is, however, for many reasons considered to publish this report in full as much of it was necessary of confidential nature. It has already appeared in the Coffee Board Bulletin for May.

Coffee Industry officials are now busy conversing with the problems and difficulties of the industry. Mr. Wollen is satisfied that they will be overruled which the difficulties of wartime conditions permit them to do so save for the interest of the Coffee Industry in East Africa.

The following is a resume of Mr. Wollen's report:

Shipping Section

The requirements of coffee to reach the port in East Africa, Kenya and the Colonies are now fully discussed with the Colonial Office and with the Ministry of Shipping. After consultation and agreement with the Coffee Trade Association of London a request for the allocation of 10,000 tons for the coffee trade for East Africa was put forward and there is every reason to expect that amount to be made available. It is hoped that the Government will be able to meet the requirements of the coffee trade for East Africa and which appears to be of a great importance to the industry.

Ministry of shipping was asked that, provided due notice of requirements were given, arrangements could be made for storage and marketing which would enable shipment of the coffee to be made by the United Kingdom to the extent of the tonnage in the quantities most suited to the needs of the industry and that any such special arrangement will prove necessary.

For The Middle East

Provision of space for coffee to the Middle East was also discussed with the Ministry of Shipping. The Middle East, which already takes nearly 10,000 tons a year, is a market of great importance to the industry.

Arrangements are under consideration for the purchase of coffee which should considerably ease the present position.

French Government Purchases

Discussions with the Colonial Ministry of France, the French Food Purchasing Commission culminated in the French Government making arrangements to purchase coffee from East Africa through normal channels of trade.

What these purchases will primarily mean is that the coffee of the coming season will be of interest to the French Government. It is expected to export purchases of lower grades of Kenyan coffee which is being sold privately in connection with this interest.

Import Control

On March 20 additional import restrictions on foodstuffs were imposed by the Ministry of Food and the Board of Trade and it is necessary to make arrangements for the necessary for importers to obtain licenses for every consignment of coffee. Representations were made with a view to the Board of Trade including on the list of foodstuffs which may be consigned to British Possessions in East Africa. At present, import licenses for coffee are issued by the Board of Trade and not by the Ministry of Food. It is hoped that the reason for control of coffee is exchange control rather than food control.

The question of the inclusion of coffee in the foodstuffs which may be consigned from British Possessions to the Colonies is being dealt with by the Economic Section of the Colonial Office, in connection with the benefits which will accrue to the Colonies and to British producers. It is considered that this question will be dealt with in the near future.

Market Prospects

During his visit, Mr. Wollen received a most friendly reception from the coffee trade in London. The continuing position of Kenya coffee is said to be very satisfactory. LIGHTING REGULATIONS: MOTOR CARS

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard", Sir—After having had some eight months of experience in which to consider the matter, the authorities have at last decided how motor vehicle lights are to be treated during black-outs.

The regulations appear to be based on those in force in Great Britain at the outbreak of war and superimposed shortly afterwards; the main objection is that no lights are to be shown from stationary vehicles.

The most incredible thing about the new regulations is that no special provision has been made for vehicles which have no side lamps, but which have side lamps integral with the head lamp, if, as instructed, the off-side lamp bulb is removed, it will be impossible for approaching traffic to estimate the width of the vehicle which has been so treated and it will thus become a menace to every other road user.

It is impossible to carry out the operation to the reflector required by the regulations if the vehicle is fitted with the latest form of head lamp.

Under the regulations are modified in the near future, to permit some form of light to be shown

on the off-side of vehicles having no side lamps if the fitting of such lights is made compulsory. I shall be compelled to remain, as usual, Yours etc.

MAN POWER

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard", Sir—It is refreshing to read of the article in your issue of 21st ult. I am alluding more particularly to the advocating countrymen of all in this country. Although I agree that Government should do what it can to help voluntary I do submit that his powers have been limited, what we require in this country is a mobilization of every man and woman, to matter what the colour of their skins, I have personally advocated this for some time past.

Some have said the matter is too difficult so far as the African is concerned. I fail to see that. Natives who are walking about doing nothing, we all know that the African in his reserve sits down to watch his babba do the work. One thinks that increased production is not necessary but so far exceeds the growing of more beans, very little has to be done to make the vast of the delegates sent to London for the purpose of the war. African would do very little in this respect: it is not his attitude, but his organization which these leaders and discipline which the Chiefs is sadly needed would have a good effect. What are the Tories and Homeless doing to do? The Government, have the Africans as property holders in East Africa, Asiatics, all registered to do a job of work, at the disposal of the State and for each farm and the rest put out to other work, roads and maintenance and studium responsible. I may be asked what about the Indian, physician, cotton, etc. The chiefs should be given the power to send such numbers of them as are required to such farms or shambas but the number for each should be strictly limited to the actual requirements. Perhaps we should get back to a decent day's work for a decent wage, but what forced labour. Grants? But what support in East Africa today? That recent Act, places everyone, has property in East Africa, and so as his ability to do a job of work, at the disposal of the State and so it should be here.

Mr. Kiser in his recent talk to the Rotary Club emphasized the need of a League of Nations, we need a League, but unfortunately the European as a whole are much too indulgent and believe their point of view must be the correct one. I may be told that it is more so than that. Let us help the Empire, of course, we need a big and strong organization but I do consider that such an organization should not be impracticable. We want no weak policy but a strong one, capable of disciplining all men and women of every colour and creed. It is for the powers-that-be to say this or that, but the best that their orders are carried out without fear or favour.

At 6 o'clock on Sunday night there was broadcast a message issued by Lord Beaverbrook, Minister of Aircraft Production, which said: "Gerrage hands are urgently needed at factories. They should be sent to the nearest aircraft factories. Within the hour mechanism motorcycles and bicycles were arriving at factories eager to start work at once."

AIR ARMAMENT

New Designs

The newer types of aircraft now coming into service (says a Home Correspondent) were designed 18 months or two years ago to be faster than the fastest machines we had when war was declared.

But they are actually faster than they were designed to be. This increase in speed is due to the lessons gained during the war.

The speed of one famous warplane has been put up from a little over 250 m.p.h. to well over 300 m.p.h. and still the same engine.

One of the first lessons obtained from experience in air fighting was that our single-seat fighters, with their eight gun armament, were good enough to sail-manoeuvre and out-bomb the German bombers.

And we have since discovered a much more surprising thing, namely that our single-seat fighters were more than a match for the very latest two-seater engine-carrying German fighters.

But the improvements are not all the more performance of the air craft and engines. They are developing in lots of other ways.

When our big bombers first went against the man in the tail had four gun fighters. They were not equal to that of the fighter. But that was unpropitious, whereas the German fighters had the advantage of his engine which to a certain extent acted as a protective armour. Our man's bullets might put the engine out of action, but the men would escape.

Then our people put armour round the engines. They were so strong that the weight of the armour minus carrying less petrol, or so many bombs, it saved the gunner.

The Handley Page Hampden, which is very fast and is classed as a medium bomber, suffered in the early days of the war because, although it had a gunner-bombardier in front, underneath the pilot, it had no guns to fire backwards underneath. So the German fighters could come up at it after a dive, and the Hampden squadron was a machine and man's consequence.

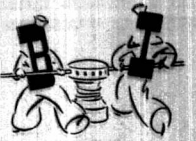

INCREASED WILL TO VICTORY

In striking contrast to the frank statement of British losses in the Battle of Flinders are the fantastic claims put forward by the German High Command.

Experienced observers of the German Mr. Churchill's speech on Tuesday as given in the despatch over in British history.

The third is the victory in the air which the Germans must concede. It is pointed out that the British and French air forces have inflicted damage on the German Air Force.

The Times says: "The speech that of a leader behind whom a resolute nation stands, and the bravest of the British Empire." The Prime Minister's speech breathed the spirit of Shakespeare's England: "Whatever happens to England and Frenchmen, Britain and France are unseparable."

ITALY'S CONTINUED HESITATION

Influence Of U.S.A. President?

Considerable interest has been shown in Britain in messages from Washington to the effect that President Roosevelt is being convinced of the credit in the United States for Italy's continued hesitation in entering the war.

Recent correspondence between the President and Signor Mussolini, it is suggested, may have had considerable bearing on Italy's course of action.

The attitude of the Allies in regard to the possibility of Italy entering the war was revealed yesterday by Mr. Reynaud before the Foreign Affairs Committee of the French Senate.

The Prime Minister said that it Italy did enter she would do so deliberately and for the sole purpose of leading the war.

Nothing provocative in our attitude nor in that of our British friends has been shown. We have never closed and do not now show the door to any aggressor.

It is pointed out that though these overtures have not been widely reproduced in the press, they have been seen by the Italian people.

There has been no response so far from the Italian side to this Allied suggestion. Indeed, yesterday's issue of the Popolo d'Italia gave no indication of any such friendly reference to Italy.

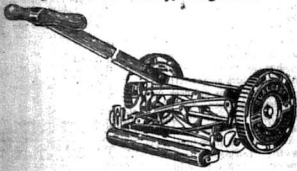

Tanganyika Expects Bumper Crops

OFFICIAL SURVEY AFTER THE RAINS

The first fruits of the excellent rainy season which East Africa has enjoyed are promised in an official Tanganyika report dealing with the crop position both for local food supplies and for export.

Although conditions vary throughout the country and indeed in some places the rains were inadequate, the general outlook is that if favourable conditions obtain for the rest of the year there will be bumper harvests of all crops and maize, wheat, cotton, native-grown coffee, tea, pyrethrum and onions may easily reach new records.

Tanganyika's war-time crop position and prospects are set out in a progress report on increased production of food and export crops. This report has been issued by the Department of Agriculture and is based on the latest telegraphic information received this month.

In the Central and Southern Highlands the seasonal condition of the soil is very good, except in the high altitudes. The harvesting of early crops has commenced in some parts. The previous indications of bumper food crops have generally been justified. There are certain localised areas, however, where late-planted food crops are being sown. The Department is providing some seed material.
