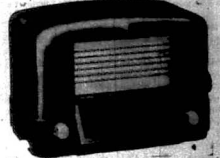

Business Raid On Channels

PEOPLE MACHINE-GUNNED IN THE STREETS

A few hours after the Home Office had announced that in view of the German occupation of parts of France it had been decided to demilitarise the Channel Islands, waves of German raiders bombed and machine-gunned Jersey and Guernsey.

It was Germany's easiest "victory" of the war since there was not a single gun on the islands to defend the people many of whom were killed and wounded.

The Home Office had announced that in view of the German occupation of parts of France it had been decided to demilitarise the Channel Islands, waves of German raiders bombed and machine-gunned Jersey and Guernsey.

Reports from the islands say that the German attacks were particularly ruthless in Guernsey. The raid on Guernsey lasted for 24 hours and the planes circled, continually dropping high explosives and incendiary bombs and machine-gunning the streets.

The German army and navy turned their fire on an ambulance which was taking injured people to hospital and so killed it with bullets that it was unable to proceed.

Some were set alight, and many people in them as well as those who had sought shelter underneath were burned to death.

The Nazi machines came at a great height over Jersey and then dived to attack spectators who had come into the streets to watch them. The bombs were falling and machine-guns were spattering in the streets before many of them could get to shelter.

It means that the whole of the east coast of England is now virtually a zone of bombs.—(Reuter)

Only those goods which could be carried in suit cases or bundles were taken away by the inhabitants. Cattle, with the exception of some fine breeds which were shipped to England, were destroyed, and everything that could prove of possible military value to the enemy was rendered useless.

The air field at Jersey was ploughed up. The organization for bringing the people to England was carried through without a hitch. The children were the first to leave, and the adults followed in later boats.

Modified Claims
 The German claim that they bombed port concentrations and embarkation parties on the undefended Channel Islands have now been modified.

The German radio has now told Germany and re-announced that they are just pleasure parties, that they have been requested and that 20,000 inhabitants have been taken to Britain as well as all the military forces. Having said so much, the Germans have not thought it worth while to be so silent, and he thanked them for their forbearance and unmarital spirit.

**THE QUEEN

FUND**
**To Alleviate
Distress Caused
By The Invasion**

A Fund, to which the South African Parliament has voted a substantial sum, has been organized to alleviate distress caused by the German invasion of Holland which is known as the "Queen Wilhelmina Fund (S.A.)."

The Council-General for the Netherlands in East Africa, Mr. A. M. L. Winkelman, states that a Central Committee has been formed in Pretoria, South Africa, to co-ordinate the efforts of all bodies at present working to relieve the distress occasioned by the invasion of the Netherlands and the Queen Wilhelmina Fund will be under the control of this Central Committee.

The committee consists of: H. E. J. W. F. van Lennep, Minister Plenipotentiary for the Netherlands, as Chairman, and Major the Hon. P. V. G. van der Bijl, Minister without Portfolio; Dr. E. G. J. Zeyl, Speaker of the House of Assembly; Mr. J. E. Holloway, Minister for Finance; Mr. A. J. Bosman, Under-Secretary for Commerce and Industries as representing the S.A. Government.

The Government of the Netherlands Bank of S. Africa, Board of Barclays Bank of S. Africa, Mr. P. A. Kadebeke, General Manager, Netherlands Bank of S. Africa, and Dr. J. Koenig, Attorney-General, are also assisting in the work of the Netherlands Bank.

This structure is in co-ordinating under the one head all offers and donations received, unless specially earmarked for a particular purpose, will be applied to the general object—i.e. alleviating the distress in Holland caused by the invasion.

Moyale "Attack" Sequel

On Saturday an official communique issued from Force Headquarters referred briefly to an enemy attack on British Moyale. It was stated that the attack, though supported by artillery fire, was ineffective and no British casualties were reported.

This nervousness, it is said, is not confined to Moyale, but is shown by the series of destructive air raids which the South African and Rhodesians carried out during the first fortnight after Italy declared war, shaken even more by the daring raids which patrols of the King's African Rifles have carried out at Moyale, El Wak and elsewhere, the Italian forces all along the frontier from Lake Rudolf in the southern end of Somaliland suffering from what in modern warfare is called the "jitters".

BALBO DEATH MYSTERY

Designed By Duce?

July 1. A mystery has developed around the death of Air Marshal Balbo. It is officially announced in Rome and Berlin that he had died in an accident when his plane was shot down by British fighters over Tobruk.

The news department of the British Foreign Office issued a statement on Sunday night, stating that the most careful investigation shows that no British aircraft were concerned in the crash of Marshal Balbo's machine. There is no truth in the statement that he fell in battle, shot down in flames during a British raid.

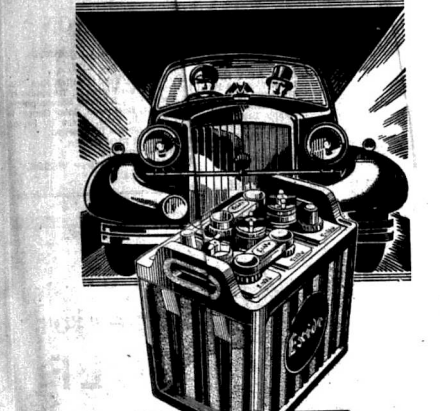

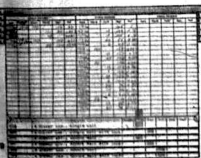

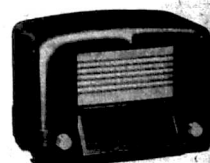

"ARIP" Again
 Today we once more give a great deal of very valuable information to our readers about A.R.P. Except in Nairobi we have very little about the subject at all. If other centres in the province throughout East Africa are dissatisfied or uneasy they are amazingly inarticulate. The probability is that they have got on with the job and are satisfied with what the authorities say the public have achieved in connection with A.R.P. We are certainly making progress at least and public opinion is beginning to be more enlightened. It is not the matter here. The Minister of Commerce, the Municipal Council and other bodies and authorities have done their share in voicing public criticism. But today anyone reading the public Press would think that the Capital of Kenya was preparing in something very like a panic, for a war that might come upon them at any moment. It would certainly be difficult to realise that the war had already been going on for ten months. The fact of the matter is that most of us today are shouting. We want protection in our own homes and quite rightly so. But we will never know just how good our bed and our paper planes are until there is an actual attack. They have to be put into operation. When that happens—and it might never happen at all—then we shall see the weaknesses in organisation, in mass psychology and in every other factor, and our Government will have to show the real reason. In the meantime the public have indicated their anxiety by sufficient clarity and it is now the responsibility of all the authorities, the Government and the people, to get about making the preparations as complete and as sensible as they can. There is only one guiding principle. The greater and the better the measures of protection, the less will be the loss and damage and so the community looks to Government to make good the loss which the individual may suffer—the body of taxpayers being the burden of the loss—it is the clear duty of Government to be absolutely satisfied that everything reasonable has been done to limit liability.

The recent extensive calls upon the man-power of this Colony and the best methods of dealing with the increasing military appointment, render it advisable to consider the relation to the Empire war effort. THE COPPER INDUSTRY AND THE WAR

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—Readers of Mr. Colclough's leading article in the Standard today will be amazed at his latest exhibition of his invertebrate habits in discharging or holding the real issue involved in a controversy. My letter of June 21, which has excited Mr. Colclough's ire was written with the object of drawing attention to, and supporting Mr. Robson's patriotic and eminently sensible proposal that the Reserve Fund standing at the credit of the Copper Industry's only financial help that the industry can give towards the purchase of England's war aims, be handed over to Mr. Robson's suggestion, "unconditionally as a gift to the war effort of the Imperial Government."

Mr. Colclough makes no reference whatever to his proposal and his needless offer either to say "banned and misleading" distribute my humble self. Why are the visits of his wrath thus poured forth only devoted to the fact that the councils of patriotism and industry are being misled? It is true that the protests I have frequently made against the £50,000 to £60,000 of my money on antiquated and useless equipment have been disregarded, but Mr. Colclough may remember that many of his other pet schemes have been curtailed or frustrated by the intervention of my planter like myself who have had practical experience of the handling of produce in foreign and home markets. I suggest that it may be that our intervention may well procure the acceptance of Mr. Robson's proposals but in any case, I beg Mr. Colclough to forego for the moment his bitter vendetta and to state clearly whether his patriotism will rise to the level of renouncing the scheme to board the Copper Industry's savings until the storm be overcast on the head of England's need ended.

MR. ROBSON'S CLOSING
Remarks the encouragement of trade with the U.S.A. and the consequent provision of exchange, can be safely left in the capable hands of the Coffee Trade Association and existing agencies of reputable merchant bankers the manifold factors are more successfully controlled by high time in possession of actual stocks than by representatives of official bodies who are forced to confine themselves to vague recommendations which I have no personal experience, not to let dealers and consumers. Witness also Mr. Atkinson's successful tour in Australia.

finding refuge with that of his family in this country. I know that it is an impossibility for any Jewish refugee to have anything but feelings of horror and hatred for Nazism and all its work. These people know from their personal experience, what consequences a German victory would have for them, and it is absurd to think of them as connected in any way with "fifth column" activities.

The Jew in Germany was not only robbed of his material possessions but of something of far greater value and of all his rights as a citizen and as a human being. As a reward for hundreds of years of loyalty and service to his country, my great-grandfather, my father and I, myself (I fought in the wars in the last hundred years) he was turned into a refugee, a man with no home, no country, no religion, no race, no color, no sex, no age, no status to get their dream, world domination. For years, Jewish refugees have been warning the world against the danger of Nazism, and were called "warners" for their pains. Now the catastrophe they forecast has come upon the world, their only hope for themselves and their children—has, indeed, of all mankind—is at hand. For it is a Jew who is at the helm of Hitlerism and all it stands for.

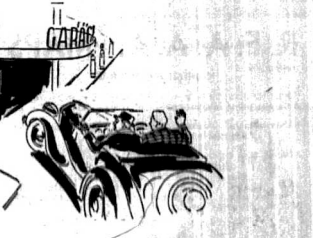

Surprise Attack
At Kiel**

The German battleship Scharnhorst was heavily bombed last night by Royal Bombers, also A la Carte GRILLS.

One of our planes pressing home its attack was reportedly hit and the rear gunner of the machine said he expected the tail turret to fall off, but luckily it did not.

Great Fire

When the bombs dropped there were a series of heavy explosions and a big outbreak of fire. The flames could be seen 85 miles away, on the way home.

**BOMBS ON COAST TOWN
12 Killed; 123 Injured**

For the second evening in succession enemy planes passed over the coast of Britain in daylight yesterday. Bombs were dropped on a town on the north-east coast where 12 people were killed and 123 injured.

Enemy report says that several children were among the killed and others were injured by high explosive bombs which fell in the poorer quarters of a North East coast railway station.

German bombers were also over Britain late last night. A joint communique issued by the Air Ministry and Ministry of Home Security states that bombs were dropped at random in Wales and in England. No serious damage was caused and no casualties are recorded.

Bomber Shot Down

Another German bomber was brought down early this morning off the east coast of England, and the engine fell to the credit of the Royal Air Force Fighter Command.

This is the 24th raid to be destroyed since the daily series of spontaneous raids of Great Britain began a fortnight ago. The total number shot down or around our coasts since the war began is now nearly 100.

It was one of several raiders which crossed the south coast this morning and dropped bombs on a number of points.

As widely reported above, yesterday evening a single raider dropped high explosive bombs on a poor class quarter of a north-east coast town. This or five or six raider were damaged and many people lost their homes. The casualties were relatively high. 11 persons being killed and 118 injured. Most of the casualties were women and children.

Bombs were dropped at various points and the machine gun fire last night, but no serious damage was caused and the British lines have been reported.

Apart from the bomber brought down today, the following is the list of Britain's latest successes:—(Reuter.)

Burma Wants to Help

It was learned in London last night that the Government of Burma has offered to help the British Government during the war. This was a statement addressed by the Prime Minister of Burma to the Government which also urged the British Government to declare its intention of granting self-government to Burma after the war.

In reply the British Government has expressed its deep appreciation for the offer and has announced a representative Burman to help the Government in its decision on the question of defence matters.

The Burman Government has also promised to enter into discussion on the question of dominion status for Burma after the war has been brought to a victorious end. (Reuter.)

**Heavy Air Attacks On Italian Moyale
ARTILLERY, TROOPS & MACHINE GUNS BOMBED**

Enemy Inactive AGAIN yesterday, for the second day in succession, the Italians remained inactive before British Moyale. Since their three attacks on Monday they have attempted nothing more.

But they have been taking steady punishment from the air. With remarkable accuracy and effectiveness our aircraft have been steadily demolishing their gun positions, attacking reinforcements hiding in deep ravines and bombing and machine-gunning every important military target, meeting only ineffective small arms fire in return.

The story of the stout defence of Moyale by the British force and the highly successful air co-operation is told in the communique issued yesterday.

These statements, issued through the Kenya Information Office, read as follows:—

Yesterday morning— Further details of the attacks on British Moyale on Monday last disclose the fact that the first attack was strongly supported by light-mechanized machine guns but it appears that our concurrent air attack did much to break down the enemy's advance.

"In these attacks the enemy fired some 350 shells into the post but with apparently no damage as only slight casualties have been reported.

"Enemy casualties have not yet been definitely estimated." Yesterday afternoon—

"The day has been quiet on all fronts. "An examination of the bombing attacks made by our aircraft on Tuesday discloses the fact that direct hits were secured on enemy gun positions near the Banda camp. Enemy light machine gun posts were also bombed and machine-gunned. During the bombing of the gun positions a large explosion was observed, suggesting a possible ammunition dump.

"Enemy reinforcements sheltering in an adjoining ravine were also machine-gunned from the air.

"In these operations a certain amount of small arms fire was encountered but all our aircraft returned safely."

Appeal To French A CRISIS IN CONSCIENCE

July 3. General Dupleix, head of the French National Committee in Britain, in a broadcast from London last night expressed the hope that every Frenchman would sign the appeal.

He asked all Frenchmen to ask themselves the question whether honour, common sense and the heart of France called to them to carry on the battle with those who will win it and share the victory.

U.S.A. MUST AD BRITAIN'S FLEE Cannot Afford To Be Passive

July 3. GREAT interest has been evinced in Britain in the statement made by Mr. Stimson, Secretary of State for War to the Military and Naval Committees of the United States Senate.

Mr. Stimson was one of the Republican leaders recently nominated by President Roosevelt in the Democratic Government.

His statement Mr. Stimson made the point that the time which America will have for rearmament is largely dependent on Great Britain's control of the Northern Atlantic. He added that the United States should give any assistance it could to guarantee continuance of the British Fleet's control.

Mr. Stimson emphasized that the United States faces today a grave emergency and he did not believe that the country would be able to resist invasion if they simply waited for the enemy to come to the shore.

Colonel Frank Knox, the other Republican leader who is Secretary for the Navy, is also in favour of giving all assistance to the Allies short of war.

Senate Approves Mr. Stimson's appointment as Secretary of War has been approved by the Senate Committee by 14 votes to three.

The Daily Telegraph, commenting on Mr. Stimson's statement, says that President Roosevelt has already publicly recognized that Allied usage is the cause of popular indignation throughout the world and has promised every effort to supply aircraft and munitions. His Secretary of State for War now goes further and has announced that America's own interests require their support for British sea power. The Telegraph comments on the fact that the American Government has now made it impossible to transfer to the Allies stocks of arms and there has been a surplus to Naval and Military requirements, and to enable them to be bought. will be given to these proposals. No doubt some of them have been considered already or are being studied now, and it is quite true that what is being said here is equally true that the surplus balances might as well be thrown into the firebox of a K.I.R. engine for all the use they will be. THE WAR IN AFRICA

Desert Battle Continues

The latest news of the fighting in Africa is contained in a communique from Cairo which reports that Italian and German troops and Italian and German aircraft are still active in action near Bardia and Capuzzo, in the western desert.

The latest information (following the U.R.C. observer's statement yesterday) says that our operations are continuing with the Italians who have succeeded in bringing up some reinforcements. Apart from this, the general situation in the Middle East has changed little.

The B.I.C. observer states that Italian troops are still active in the vicinity of the village of Bardia, where they are continuing to dig in. It seems possible that it may be necessary to attempt to capture Bardia before attempting to advance to the next stage in the campaign. The observer added that Italian troops had been there for two days and nights, sleeping in the open and eating in the deep waters. It is a village of light white houses which runs from the coast into the desert. Any attempt to advance to be made by night, unless the journey is made 100 miles south. 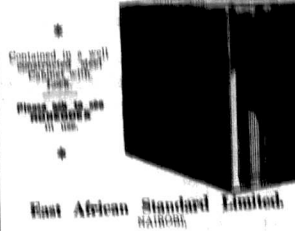

raids were carried out from altitudes too great for accurate bombing but that some of the material they used was the first to be inferior or at least variable quality. On the following day our aircraft were over Kenyas and then other raids occurred and then other raids on aerodromes at Yavello. Neghelli and Moyale have all told the same story of daring and effective bombing and an increasing toll of destruction of barracks, landing grounds and installations, many of them replaceable only with great difficulty. Italian losses in aircraft alone amounts to seven, two fighters and five bombers. Our losses have been one aircraft. From the enemy point of view these continuous air raids on their aerodromes nearest to Kenya have had serious results and they considerably increase the measure of protection which is given to the British territories.

On the ground the story is no less encouraging. Patrols have been sent out and have carried out several well organized raids on enemy frontiers. They have been successful in all respects, in our favour, and no story of the whole campaign so far has been more sustaining. The level of our leader will not be surprised to hear that the measure of the attack on El Wak at the end of the first week when the post was surrounded by the enemy was found in retreat, important stores destroyed and an Italian flag brought back as a trophy. Air cooperation with the ground forces has been of the greatest value and while withholding no tribute from the ground forces, it is impossible to refrain from complimenting the South African and Rhodesian pilots whose magnificent work in these early days has done so much to retain the initiative and prepare the way for such developments as the bombing of El Wak which has been devastatingly accurate. Their raids have been carried out with marked vigour and spirit and their domination of the position in the air is of the greatest importance.

Our enemies have attempted few attacks of importance. Their air raids have met with little success. Their operations have been sporadic and irregular, appear to conform to no military plan and have been singularly uncoordinated. On the other hand their first major action has been the unsuccessful attempt to capture British aerodromes at Yavello and Moyale and is still in progress. The defence has been a gallant operation. Supported by the ground forces, our troops have been proud in their use of ammunition that in the short preparatory bombardment of the enemy's positions and fifty shells into the post, the Italians launched three attacks in one day. Since then the enemy has been singularly inactive. The attack has not been pushed home and in the meanwhile the capacity for offensive action is being built up.
