

I TAKES courage to criticise a person whose boundary of authority or status for criticism brings him criticism.

This would be the last in a series of articles, probably in another paper, in which I would argue, for one must believe in something to write about, that the letter 'A' and the letter 'B' (a challenge Huxley) is debatable. I would like to add that the 'humanism' as defined by Huxley is debatable. The argument that 'Humanism' is a 'philosophy of life', a 'philosophy of humanity', literary culture and education, is absurd. What remains is particularly curious. For in his letter Huxley says: "John Keats, I say again, had a grain of mechanical philosophy, but he had no original ideas of each field (in science) in his later, agreeable period, but does one always find that 'the triumphs of the human spirit lie in its capacity to go from one level to another, from one field to another, from one form to another without losing sight of the whole picture'. He ends with the words 'but where is the man who can imagine a God, who does not feel that he is at the object of his creation?'

An interesting quote, from Dr. Peter P. Hellew, expounds the personal belief concerning God, man, and the universe. Dr. Hellew, a man of many minds and wisdoms, has written several articles on what would happen economically in Kenya if she left the Commonwealth. Two Negroes were denied a place in white schools, another refused admission to a Negro school.

A fourth Negro, who had been admitted to a white school, was denied entrance because he had not been admitted to a Negro school.

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

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

Elliott and Davis
break world
track records

PAKISTAN yesterday started the final of the Olympic games when they beat Spain by 10 and 0 in the men's hockey. Pakistan, who reached the final by defeating India 2-1 in the semi-final, were beaten by the Spaniards who were also eliminated and therefore only remained teams left in the tournament. Pakistan's victory gave them a gold medal.

Highlight of the Olympic track events was undoubtedly the breaking of two world records in successive events. The very tall American, Harry Elliott, and America's Gus Davis, both from New York, were the first to break world records. Elliott was the 1,200 metres record holder with a time of 3 mins 35.8 sec. and Davis打破了 44.6 sec. with the men's 400 metres by a distance of 0.1 sec. The German, Kaufmann of Germany, who was given the same time.

At Cambridge University Elliott ran 1,200 metres in 3 mins 35.9 sec. down a 6300 ft. slope after an interval of 10 minutes. Davis, 5 ft 11 in., ran 400 metres in 44.6 sec. After the race he said it was not worth while to break world records.

He has run the 1000 miles in 10 hours and 10 minutes, yesterday's performance was his best.

Earlier another Australian, Dennis Willis, from Melbourne, record 1000 miles in 10.35 hrs. with the best of all records.
