GENERAL ELECTION: THE FIRST DAY.

LABOUR LEADING BY 25 SEATS.

Victories in Industrial Centres and the South.

OVER 50 CONSERVATIVE DEFEATS.

LIBERALS' OPTIMISTIC FORECASTS NOT BORNE OUT BY EARLY RESULTS.

Premier's Son Returned For Labour.

At the time of going to press, the results of 253 contests in the General Election had been declared. The position at 12.30 p.m. yesterday was:

Conservatives	64
Labour	129
Liberals	15
Other Parties	5

There are still 361 results to be declared.

London, Friday. There are several election results which are of special interest to East Africans. Among those successful are Sir John Sandeman Allen (C. West Derby), one of the prominent members of the Joint East African Board; Sir Rennell Rodd (C. St. Mary's, London), one time Consul General in Zanzibar; Colonel Josiah Westwood (Lab. Newmarket-Lyvedon); Mr. Harry Snel, (Lab. Woolwich) and Mr. Fitzwick Lawrence (Lab. Letchworth). The three latter were frequent questioners on East African affairs.

Amongst those defeated are Sir Sydney Hemi (C. Blackburn) Chairman of the Joint East African Board; Mr. Eugene Ramsden (C. Bradford N.); Capt. F. E. Guest (Lib. Bristol W.), who served in the East African campaign and of one time Coalition Whip; Mr. J. B. Harris, Secretary of the Aborigines Protection Society who contested Blackley North in the Liberal interest; Sir Arthur Shirley Bann (C. Drake, Plymouth) one-time President of the Association of British Chambers of Commerce; Lt.-Col. J. T. C. Robinson (C. Chatham), at one time Parliamentary Secretary of the Ministry of Transport.

Labour must win an hundred more seats to secure a clear majority. Women voters seem to have followed the opinions of their parents. Eighty per cent. of the Labour gains have been due to the split vote.

Features of the Results.

London, Thursday. Polling day in London was marked in by cold, grey skies and a bitter North East wind. Many booths were opened at seven o'clock in the morning and voters observed in the main as they went in to support their candidates. Thousands of women arrived to take early advantage of the newly-conferred franchise.

The clouds disappeared later in the morning and warm sunshine favoured polling day. There was heavy polling by women. Early visitors to the booths included crowds of shop-girls and typists who en route to work stopped to record their votes.

One of the sensational returns is that of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, Sir Austen Chamberlain who was returned for Birmingham West by a majority of 45 only in a contest which with a Labour candidate. Sir Austen's majority at the last election was 7,400.

The only Communist Member of the House of Commons, Mr. S. Salikravla, who contested Battersea North was defeated by a Labour Party opponent. So far the Communist Party's representation in the new House is nil. The Battersea fight was four-cornered.

An interesting success is that of Mr. Oliver Baldwin, son of the Premier. He has both returned as the Labour interest in a three-cornered fight at Dudley by a majority of 2,000 votes.

The Rt. Hon. J. E. Clynes, Deputy Leader of the Labour Party retained Dudley with an increased majority. The Labour veteran, Mr. George Lansbury was re-elected for Bow and Bromley.

Labour re-captured all the three Salford Divisions which they lost in 1924. The results indicate that the four divisions of Bradford and two of Swansea are now safely Labour. Bristol has now four Labour Members and one Conservative, while Labour has also secured a footing in Portsmouth where the Party gained the Central Division. The Conservatives also gained Chatham.

The Labour Party's most notable victories were at Birmingham where they were victorious in the Divisional, Aston, Edgbaston, Yardley, Reddingley and Ladywood Divisions, the last controlled by a majority of eleven. Birmingham is now represented by Conservative and six Labour Members instead of 11 Conservative and one Labour. The chief Labour success in Greater London was the defeat of the Deputy Mayor, the Rt. Hon. J. Fitzalan Hoppe who contested Westminster East.

The late outcome of the morning newspapers representing all party views agree in their verdict that yesterday's results, which are mostly those of contests in the Midlands, need in no way necessarily be regarded as a safe indication of the voting throughout the whole of the country.

 Mr. Ben Tillett (Lab.) ... 17,833
 Dr. Haden Guest (Cons.) 13,807
 Mr. J. Rothwell (Lib.) 6,609
 Lab. Majority ... 3,720

"Mr. Ben Tillett the well-known dockers' leader was returned for this constituency in 1918, 1922 and 1923, but was defeated at the last election by Mr. S. Finborough (Conservative) by 1,196 votes.
 Dr. Haden Guest was returned for Southbrink North in the Labour interest in 1923 and 1924, but in 1927 he resigned from the Labour Party on disagreement with their attitude on sending troops to China. He then joined the Conservatives.
 Mr. J. Rothwell stood for this seat at the last election.

Wakefield.
 Mr. G. H. Sherwood (Lab.) re-captured the Wakefield seat from the Conservatives in a three-cornered fight.
 "Mr. Sherwood won the seat in 1923 but was unseated at the last election.

Accrington.
 Mr. Tom Stowdon (Lab.) has re-captured the Accrington, Lancs. seat in a straight fight with the retiring Liberal member, Mr. Hugh Edwards, whom the Conservatives decided to support.
 "Councillor Tom Stowdon is a wares manufacturer and has previously contested the Ripley and Skipton divisions in Yorkshire and Central Sheffield. Mr. Hugh Edwards was returned as a Liberal. Constituents at the last election when he defeated "Mr. C. Roden Burton (Labour).

Stockton-on-Tees.
 Mr. F. F. Riley (Lab.), in a three-cornered fight with the Stockton-on-Tees election, which the Conservatives wrested from Liberals in 1924.
 "Mr. F. F. Riley has previously contested South-East Essex, Bedford, St. Albans (E.) and a three-cornered contest, Capt. Mansfield defeated Mr. Riley at the last election by 5,212 votes.

Salford South and West.
 Messrs. A. W. Haycock and J. Toole (Lab.) regained the Salford South and Salford West seats respectively in three-cornered fights.
 "Both Messrs. Haycock and Toole were unseated by Conservatives at the last election.

Bristol.
 Lt. Col. Sir Vivian Henderson, Chief-Secretary for Home Affairs,

has been defeated at Bootle by the Labour candidate, Mr. J. Kinley, in a three-cornered contest.
 "Sir Vivian Henderson was M.P. for Frodsham, Glasgow from 1916 to 1923. He was defeated at Bootle in 1923 but in 1924 he captured the seat from Maj. J. Burns (Labour). This constituency will be represented by Labour for the first time, the successful candidate having twice contested the seat previously.

Reading.
 Dr. Somerville Hastings (Labour) has gained the Reading constituency by defeating the retiring Conservative member, Mr. H. G. Williams, Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade. It was a three-cornered contest in which a Liberal candidate took part.
 "Dr. Hastings captured Reading for Labour in 1923, but was unseated by Mr. Williams at the last election with a majority of 8,501 votes.

Bristol Central.
 Mr. J. H. Alpass (Lab.) as a non-unionist and ex-ata agent of Bristol, has defeated Sir Thomas Inskip, Labour's Deputy Leader,

since 1918.
 The Attorney-General, at Bristol Central in a straight fight.
 "Mr. Alpass has previously contested Chichester and Thornbury in Gloucestershire. Sir T. Inskip has represented Central Bristol since 1918.

Dudley.
 Mr. Oliver Baldwin, the son of Mr. Stanley Baldwin, the Premier, captured Dudley for the Labour Party. The following were the figures:
 Mr. Oliver Baldwin (Lab.) 12,221
 Mr. C. E. Lloyd (Cons.) 10,269
 Mr. T. J. Coomb (Lab.) ... 4,890

Lab. maj. ... 8,049
 The Communist member Mr. E. Salikravla was defeated by 800.

Walsley South.
 There was a four-cornered fight at Walsley South, where Mr. H. Morrison (Lab.) won the seat from the Liberals.
 "Walsley South was at one time represented by Mr. Harold Bostonsley. Mr. Morrison captured the seat from the Conservatives in 1923, but was unseated by a small majority in 1924 by Mr. G. M. Garro-Jones (Lib.).

Action, Middlesex.
 There was a double Labour gain at Action, Middlesex, where Mr. Gilliker, in a three-cornered contest.

POLITICAL STALEMATE IN BRITAIN.

**LABOUR FAIL TO GET
THEIR MAJORITY.**

Despite Sweeping Victories
Throughout Country.

A POLITICAL DILEMMA.

**WILL MR. BALDWIN BE ALLOWED
TO CARRY ON?**

Party Leaders and Press Discuss Situation.

The Labour Party, while the largest in the new House of Commons, has failed to obtain a majority. It is in a minority in relation to all other parties of 32 but has 33 more seats than the Conservatives.

The latest position is as follows:

Labour	287
Conservative	254
Liberal	57
Independents	8

There are now only nine results to come in. The death of the Labour candidate at Rugby necessitates a re-election. The postponed Rugby seat is regarded as Labour's only chance of a success in the remaining nine. The balance being considered safe seats for the other parties.

The result has placed the parties on the horns of a dilemma. It is uncertain whether Mr. Baldwin will continue with the present Parliament or will resign. The Cabinet meets to-day, Monday, to decide.

It is interesting to note that although Labour has the largest number of seats, the Conservatives polled the greatest number of votes, while the Liberal polling was very much heavier than the proportion of the representation the Party has gained in the new house.

The polling figures are:

CONSERVATIVES	5,659,117
LABOUR	8,397,859
LIBERAL	5,244,398
OTHER PARTIES	145,879

The total votes cast were therefore twenty-two and a half million.

Over 80 Conservative seats were lost on the split Conservative-Liberal vote.

Mr. Lloyd George has declared that he will not use his balance of power in a haggling spirit and will carefully consider what best should be done in the interests of the country.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald states that if he can prevent it there will be no disturbance of the country by an election within two years although Labour is not going to submit to Tory autocracy. Any Party taking over the government should have a chance to develop its policy.

Labour Victories.
The Liberals gained Liverpool, Bedford, Ripon (English) and Colwyn North in three-cornered seats. An incalculable position gave

Labour 286 and Conservatives 218. Thus the totals at the hour passed the Government in a minority.
Second Day's Position.
The state of parties as a result of the returns for the second day was as follows—
LABOUR 286
CONSERVATIVES 218
LIBERALS 57
INDEPENDENTS 8
Out of a total of 597 seats the Labour gain were 126, Liberals 30, Conservatives 2, Independents 2. The losses were—Labour 4, Conservatives 118, Liberals 19 and Independents 4.

Mr. J. H. Thomas, the Labour Secretary for Agriculture and Fisheries, was elected by a majority of 287 to be the new Secretary of the House of Commons.
Mr. H. G. Wells, the Liberal Secretary for Education, was elected by a majority of 254 to be the new Secretary of the House of Commons.

The Lady Members.
There are now six new women members so far in addition to the six re-elected. The new women are: Miss Mabel Lloyd George (Liberal), daughter of the Liberal leader, Lady Cynthia Montagu (Conservative), Mrs. Cecil Curzon and Mrs. Herbert Curzon and Mrs. E. H. D. Wilson.

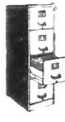

HINTS ON THE SELECTION OF FLOWERS FOR SHOW.

Now that June 17, the date of such the Flower Show will be held, is drawing near, I want to give my readers a few instructions on the selecting of flowers for this purpose.

It is not my intention to go deeply into the matter but rather to give a cursory and concise list of those who, up to the present, have not considered entering in any class.

When approaching a committee to show their flowers, it is best to ask the members of the committee the answer that they should send a class. Some of the participants in general admit that they do not know the material that will be the best for the class.

The first point to decide is what class you can contribute. The show class by making round garden and investigating what plants are looking best, while keeping in mind that the show is a fortnight hence. Have the best of classes which may be obtained from the Secretary.

Some of the classes which may be obtained from the Secretary are: K.H.S. Box 27, Nairobi. I can supply blooms for. Having done this, notify the Secretary and forward your entrance fee.

Now the next stage is to have the plants forward by having the surface of the soil round the plants free that they are not overcrowded, and cut off all fully expanded blooms. Never let them approach the fading stage as this takes all the vitality from the plant and impairs the quality of the blooms. A little judicious thinning of buds and as time advances when the buds which will be opening on or about the show day are mature, they may be thinned down to one per stem.

In the case of spikes of flowers, one or two spikes per stem are sufficient, however that each of the spikes, as the case may be, will give you an exhibition bloom. The number required shows here can best be judged by the percentage of really good specimens being produced.

When you have chosen the best specimens which I say will give you the professional touch to the trade. After all you will not compete with amateurs, and some of the finest specimens have been produced with ordinary care and attention.

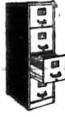

HINTS ON THE SELECTION OF FLOWERS FOR SHOW.

Now that June 17, the date on which the Flower Show will be held, is drawing near, I want to give my readers a few instructions on the selection of flowers for this purpose.

When approaching a number of my friends on the question of showing their flowers, I usually get the answer that "they would not stand a chance." I am afraid if horticulturists in general adopted this view the Flower Show would not materialize. Far better to say, "I will show my best" and let the judges decide.

The first point to decide is, what flowers you can produce. That can be done by walking round your garden and investigating what plants are looking healthy and coming into their best stage of bloom, keeping in mind that the show is a fortnight hence. Read the list of classes which may be obtained from Miss the Secretary of the K. H. S. B. Box 27, Nairobi and decide which of the classes you can supply blooms for. Having done this, notify the Secretary and forward your entrance fee.

Now the next step is to help the plants forward by hoeing the surface of the soil round the plants. See that they are not overcrowded, and if any of all fully expanded blooms. Never let them approach the fading stage as this takes all the vitality from the plant and imparts a faded bloom. A little judicious thinning of buds and so on, is an advance when the buds which will be thinned down to one per stem, or in the case of spikes of bloom to one or two spikes per plant. Do not expect, however, that each bud or bud spike, as the case may be, will give you an exhibition bloom. The number required to choose from can best be judged by the percentage of really good blooms being produced now.

The notes which I give below will help you to choose the best blooms for show. I do not wish to go into the professional tricks of the trade. After all you will compete with amateurs, and some of the finest specimens have been produced with ordinary care and attention.

Notes.

Good form is the chief quality perfectly shaped petals, and not too full blown. Remember that

the little pointed ones of unexpanded petals in the centre counts more than a large mass of cabbage leaves. Of course it may be comparatively easy to find a budding rose with its mass of unexpanded petals, but the rose that retains it when well expanded has a great deal to recommend it. In fact you may find a rose that has its petals eaten by insects. Substitutes and colour are the next points to be looked for. Substitutes are those which do not resemble the flower which they are intended to replace. If you choose the flower which has the most natural appearance without being too artificial, you will be the more likely to succeed. The most desirable substitutes are those which are not too artificial, but which are not too far from the original. The most desirable substitutes are those which are not too artificial, but which are not too far from the original.

Chrysanthemums

Choose a symmetrical bloom, the greater the diameter the greater the depth, about 10, brilliant in colour and fresh to the extremity of the stems. In the case of chrysanthemums, the petals are gradually curved, at the same time the flowers should be full and firm. With unopened Chrysanthemums smoothness and symmetry should be noted. As you progress to the stage of Chrysanthemums more that one of the other points are to be noted. It is in some showing a large bloom, which is more the other qualities.

Ornamentals

The petals should be broad and firm. With white and pale ground varieties, shades of colour should be clear and distinct and the few spots the better. With purple the colour should be uniformly faced on the margin. The rays should be long and not short, with the flower a specimen. The eye should be two and not one, the diameter and size.

Dahlias Show and Fancy

Form is an important part of a good quality flower, with even a single stem. The petals should be flat and not too thick, and should be firm. The petals should be long and not short, with the flower a specimen. The eye should be two and not one, the diameter and size.

Flowers for Show.

Flowers should be evenly spaced or pointed petals, evenly set. The centre moderately developed but no great length. Single or double varieties should have flat broad petals, with an even formation, and in colours, the colours clearly defined. Now with plants which produce the blooms in the form of a spike the main points to look for are length, and symmetry of spike. See that there is no freak growth such as, such as two stems growing together. The individual flower should be well formed. Any markings should be distinct and the flowers free of blemish. I have not gone into the description of all the flowers which may be shown, but the points governing these, I have mentioned, to a large extent govern all the others.

Let us now pass on to other sections of the show. With pot plants the foliage should be any sign of being drawn in crowding to one side of the pot or long naked stems, unless the latter be the natural habit of the plant. The foliage should be bright and clean. Take away faded and withered leaves.

Table decorations, hand bouquets and floral baskets hold much in common. Design and arrangement should be noted, but see that the blending is harmonious. Do not overcrowd. Remember that a properly set bouquet, table centre, or basket cannot afford to lose a single flower or have another added, without destroying the effect. See that the arrangement is finished. Wires and mechanical aids should not be exposed, and the flowers so associated that they all display their natural grace and beauty.

Vegetables are a large branch and the classes are numerous but I will summarize the points as follows: They should be solid, firm, fresh, clean, uniform, large and free from disease. In the case of peas and beans the pods should be full and well filled with seeds and should be fleshy and firm.

I have not exhausted all the points I could give on selecting flowers etc. for the show. To write an exhaustive article would mean a book instead of a page, but I trust I have noted your interest and I hope my endeavour will be of some use in inducing a few more entries.

Should any reader be anxious to have more detailed advice I suggest he writes to the Secretary of the K. H. S. B. Box 27, Nairobi, enclosing S. 1/- P.O. and a book-let giving rules and suggestions to exhibitors will be forwarded.

A Kikuyu Grievance

tion) and 1929 but was leader in 1924, has again been returned, having defeated the retiring Conservative, Mr. G. J. C. Horwood.

W. Suffolk.

Mr. E. Gosville (Lab.) has captured the bye division of Suffolk from the Conservatives, Lord Huntingfield not standing again. He defeated Capt. A. D. Thomas (Cons.) and Mr. O. Aves (Lab.).

Devon.

Mr. J. H. Thomas, the Railwayman's leader and Colonial Secretary in the Labour Government, has again been returned for Walland. He was first elected for Walland in 1922 on the retirement of Sir Patrick Hastings (Lab.), who had previously sat for Northampton and was unopposed at the last general election. There were four candidates at the election, those defeated being Mr. W. Waring (Cons.), Mr. S. Phillips (Lab.) and Mr. W. Mansington (Communist).

Derby.

Mr. J. H. Thomas, the Railwayman's leader and Colonial Secretary in the Labour Government, has again been returned for Derby, while a Labour gain is also recorded. This is referred to in another column.

Seaham Harbour.

Mr. J. Ramsey Macdonald, the Labour Party leader, who had just found a new and safe seat at Seaham Harbour, Division of Durham, the previous member Mr. Sydney Webb having retired, was returned with an overwhelming majority of 28,704 in a four-cornered contest. He was opposed by Mr. W. A. Framley-Whittinghall (Cons.), Mr. H. Haslam (Lab.) and Mr. Harry Pidditt one of the leaders of the Communist Party.

Mr. Ramsey Macdonald sat for Aberdeen up to the dissolution.

Central Hull.

Comm. Hon. J. M. Kenworthy (Lab.), who sat for Central Hull as a Liberal from 1919 to 1929, when he was re-elected as a Labour member, has again been returned. He defeated Mr. L. Kimball (Cons.) and Mr. A. S. Duran (Lab.).

Colne Valley.

Mr. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer in the Labour Cabinet, had retained the Colne Valley division of Yorkshire, for which he was first returned in 1922. He defeated Mr. R. B. Currow (Cons.) and Mr. F. Brock (Lab.).

Bridgton, Glasgow.

Mr. James Mackay (Lab.), the leader of the L.L.P. and one of the members of the more advanced section of the Socialist wing of the Labour Party, has once again been returned for Bridgton, Glasgow in a straight fight with Mr. M. J. McCracken (Cons.), whom he defeated in 1924. Mr. Mackay has represented Bridgton since 1922.

Doncaster.

Mr. W. Paine, one of the Labour Whip has retained Don-

caster, which he had held since 1922. He defeated Mr. J. T. Clark (Lab.) and Mr. E. Phillips (Cons.).

Sheffield.

Mr. E. Turpie (Lab.), socialist law of Mr. George Lambrey, who was severely wounded in action during the war, has again been returned for Sheffield. He had two strong opponents in Vincent Knowlton (Cons.) and Sir H. J. Dickels (Lab.).

North Lanark.

Miss Jenny Lee (Lab.) the 24 year old daughter of a miner and a graduate in Arts and Law, who was returned for North Lanarkshire in a by-election on March 29 last, has retained her seat. She defeated her previous opponents Lord Scott (Cons.) and Miss E. B. Mitchell, M.A. (Lab.).

Elland, Yorkshire.

Mr. C. Roden Buxton (Lab.) who sat for Acerrington from 1922 to 1929 has been returned for the Elland division of Yorkshire in place of Mr. W. C. Robinson (Lab.) who has retired. He defeated Conservative and Liberal candidates.

Liberal Seats Retained.

The following Liberal seats have been retained.

Carmarvon District.

Mr. David Lloyd George, the Liberal leader, was re-elected for Carmarvon, which seat he had held throughout his political career, having first been returned in 1901. His majority on this occasion in a three-cornered contest, was 9,138 having fallen by 5,500 as compared with 1924. His opponents on this occasion were Capt. J. B. Davies K.C. (Cons.) and Mr. T. Blys (Lab.).

Ben Valley.

Sir John Simon (Lab.) has again been elected for Ben Valley, Yorkshire, which seat he captured from Labour in 1922. He fought a three-cornered contest, in which his majority was reduced from 4,475 in 1924 to 1,765. The Conservatives in view of his recent work on the Indian Statutory Commission in India, decided not to contest the seat. He was opposed by Mr. H. H. Elvin (Lab.), who has lived in India, and Mr. S. Amant (Comm.). President of the Indian Trade Union Congress, who is accused in custody in India of a conspiracy charge. The Communist only polled 212 votes, thus forfeiting his deposit, the most of the other Communist candidates.

Bradley.

The Premier, Mr. Stanley Baldwin, secured a majority of 9,467 at Bradley, Westmorshire, in a three-cornered contest against Mr. S. Carter (Lab.) and Mr. F. Hancock (Lab.), the latter being an old opponent. Mr. Baldwin has sat for Bradley since 1908, and this is the first time when he has been opposed by two candidates. He was returned unopposed at the last election.

Angloes.

Miss Maura Lloyd George (Lab.) the daughter of the Liberal leader has been returned for Angloes in place of Sir R. J. Thomas Hart, who has retired. She defeated Mr. A. Higgins (Cons.) and Mr. W. Edwards (Lab.).

Cardiganshire.

Mr. R. Hoyle Morris (Lab.) has held Cardiganshire in a straight fight with Col. R. C. Fife Williams (Cons.).

Cathness and Sutherland.

Sir Archibald Sinclair (Lab.) has again been returned for Cathness and Sutherland. He defeated Mr. J. A. L. Duncan (Cons.).

Inverness.

Sir Murdoch Macdonald (Lab.) has retained his seat at Inverness by defeating Mr. D. N. Mackay (Lab.).

Conservative Seats.

The following seats have been retained by the Conservatives:

Nottingham Central.

The Conservative candidate, Mr. A. J. Bennett retained Nottingham Central, but with a majority of 2,568 as compared with 8,285 at the last election. He was opposed by Mr. A. Brampton (Lab.) and Mrs. E. Barton (Lab.).

Stafford.

Mr. W. G. A. Omsby-Gore, (Undersecretary for the Colonies), was again returned for Stafford, a seat he has represented since 1918. He was opposed by Rev. A. S. Leyland (Lab.) and Mr. L. Smith (Lab.).

Bredford.

The Premier, Mr. Stanley Baldwin, secured a majority of 9,467 at Bredford, Westmorshire, in a three-cornered contest against Mr. S. Carter (Lab.) and Mr. F. Hancock (Lab.), the latter being an old opponent. Mr. Baldwin has sat for Bredford since 1908, and this is the first time when he has been opposed by two candidates. He was returned unopposed at the last election.

MR. SAESTER'S ADVICE TO KENYA INDIANS.

Local Conditions Compared With India.

A STRIKING SPECIES

Addressing an audience which included hundreds of Indians and few Europeans in the Theatre Royal, Nairobi, on Monday forenoon the Hon. V. S. S. Saester, P.C., gave a striking speech on the question of Indian emigration. He spoke for over an hour without manuscript or even notes. He appealed to the Indians of Kenya to have full confidence in the efforts that were being made in their behalf, spoke of the work of the Government of India in the interests of Indian overseas, and told the audience that they were much better off in Kenya than millions of their fellow-countrymen in India, or than they would be if in rank haste they returned to India.

The views of the Government of India on the question, he declared, were to the effect that if the status of Indians in Kenya was not placed upon a satisfactory basis, the connection of India with the Empire stood in no mean peril.

Mr. Saester prefaced his address with a reference to a certain misunderstanding which he said had been spread among Kenya Indians by something which appeared in a local paper. He had been represented, as having in some way disparaged the character and standing of Indians in this part of Africa. Since that appeared another letter from the same source had been published in the paper which he believed, had needed the notice of most of them. "That second letter contradicts the statement upon which I was condemned in this town, and I would beg of you to accept from me this assurance that upon no occasion that I can remember have I uttered a word in any disparaging terms. It would, in any event, have been wrong and unwise for I had never been here before and to your citizens on my own continent without having seen them, or knowing them in person would be a source of a black type, which, I hope, you will not consider me capable," continued Mr. Saester.

Turning to his main topic, Mr. Saester said:—"The population of India living abroad, in comparison with the population living at home is very very small indeed.

I have often been told by certain non-staying critics of mine—and I have in abundance of them—that I am a non-staying critic. I am engaged in seeking to be of some use to your country. India, when I might be doing for her by remaining at home to attend to the wants and wishes of the many millions who have many able workers in their labor, but my top many. To those criticisms I have not been able to give full value, but have allowed myself, in circumstances compel, to go outside India and seek to understand the troubles and grievances of our countrymen outside the Motherland and if possible to be of some little service to them. To me, who have been during the last twenty years or more a member of the Senate of India Society, it has not appeared proper to make a distinction of any importance between service to those at home and service to those abroad. We are all one, it seems to me, and we could never be happy at home unless we were happy and prosperous abroad and our self-respect, though of primary importance, cannot be maintained and advanced in full without our countrymen abroad obtaining the status among outsiders to which, it seems to me, by their influence, by their character, by their industry and by their law-abiding qualities, they are fully entitled. Moreover, you cannot serve your countrymen abroad by remaining at home. The conditions in which you live here and elsewhere not only differ one from another in the various dominions; they also differ in essentials from the conditions at home. But, gentlemen, to write in journals and address public meetings without particular knowledge is merely to achieve nothing.

The primary consideration of states who do that, it seems, is not the improvement of your status, the relief of your sufferings and the redress of your hardships. It would rather seem to be through their ignorance and in difference, a mere means of adding to the political agitation in India an element of an indefinite character which somehow or other seems to them to make things appear rather worse than they are.

The Spirit of Service.

We are seeking to be of practical and direct service to you, and I hope, in spite of our short comings and in spite of our politics at home, which may not always appeal to you, that you will accept our services such as they are as coming from loyal hearts and as rendered out of a pure spirit of service and helpfulness to our countrymen.

On this topic of Indian overseas, let me assure you that there is not much difference between the

THE GRAVE MENACE OF MEASLY BUG.

Of Vital Concern to the White Country.

URGENT ACTION NECESSARY.

URGENT ACTION NECESSARY.

(STANDARD CORRESPONDENT).
Nairobi, June 1.
In the depressing atmosphere caused by absence of rain and presence of the devastating mealy bug pest, life in these parts is none too rosy at present, and there is very little consolation to be gained from the fact that other parts are in the same boat, and that these conditions affect other people as well as ourselves.

But what we people cannot understand is the lethargy of the professional and other elements in Nairobi. Day after day has passed until at the moment of scribbling these notes only one letter from a correspondent has appeared in your columns in support of an agitation fraught with most vital significance to all alike. It is true that your Chamber of Commerce gave its unanimous support to a resolution calling for the speedy nomination of the long promised Agricultural Commission and that the Chairman of the Chamber has contributed a valuable suggestion regarding a matter which that Commission will of course have to deal with, but what about the professional men? Do they or do they not realise that they themselves are dependent upon Agriculture as is the Farmer? Why don't they step in and help a bit? What are they afraid of, or is it that they are—or think they are—too prosperous?

And especially the Lawyers, the trained thinkers. Where would all their nice fat fees for conveying, drawing up mortgages, etc., etc., be if there were no mealy bugs? If they give a lead to the General Public and run the fast into the hands of the community which would later on them, if to no one else! They need not attempt to go into the technicalities of the position. They need only keep their eyes on the main chance—the use which is that the stability of an industry in which 95 per cent. of all the European occupiers—the agricultural producers—in the Colony are engaged.

ed, and which furnishes nearly if not quite half of the exports upon which the Colony and its credit are so greatly dependent, is becoming more and more undermined daily by a visitation utterly beyond the immoderate power of the Planter to control.

Everyone's Concern.

It is of course possible that in the absence of a proper realisation of the fundamental fact that everyone in a purely agricultural country is dependent for his or her prosperity upon Agriculture, professional and other busy men in Nairobi do not read those parts of their newspaper devoted to matters agricultural. All I can say is that if such be the case they will be well advised if they amend their ways in this respect, and pay more attention to the subject, and back the agriculturist in his efforts to develop and render secure an industry which, as all too many of them must know, has been rendered extremely insecure by the presence of a pest for which the farmer is in no way responsible and which can only too properly be placed in the same category as other "cosmic catastrophes" such as plague, earthquake, and so forth.

And if any plague of sorts had descended upon Nairobi and found the Department charged with the preservation of its health so ill-equipped to deal with it, the same as our Agricultural Department has been to deal with Mealy Bug, I think that those referred to would feel very sore with the Farmer if he stood aloof to the soundly and rightly had done up to the present and abstained from taking any part in the agitation for a proper medical service and the immediate allocation of public funds with which to see that a situation of such gravity.

A Tragic Change.

To those who have read the correspondence on the subject that has been appearing in your columns, recently there is no occasion to further emphasize the grave nature of an infection that has turned many thousands beautiful bushes covered with glossy green foliage and smothered with innocent fruit into filthy blackened skeletons, and this in but a flash of time. Thousands of tons of a crop which at months hence would have been providing the people with enough rain—should have been traversing the world and which planters themselves have spent many thousands of pounds in attempts to preserve has been destroyed by a measly little bug.

And the value lost beyond recovery. And that is not all. Unless the speediness of speedy work is put in during the next two or three months in the way of obtaining an adequate staff and furnishing the necessary equipment there is no hope of preserving the next crop from the same fate. In fact, had I not been a pessimist, I should be judging from past experience, there is every probability of the pest extending a very much longer time unless the counter attack can be initiated immediately by the psychological moment arrives. And this will involve the expenditure of a very large sum of money in addition to that spent by the Planter in heading off the pest three to eight pounds sterling per acre, according to circumstances.

And a conservative estimate, out of the eighty odd thousand acres planted in this Colony, some twenty thousand are already more or less infested with mealy bug, the only remedy for which at present is the command of planters is banding. If the people of Nairobi are wise they will see to it that there shall be neither any lagging, lagging or shilly shally regarding the provision of the money required to meet this very grave and extremely critical emergency, which is as of much concern to them as to the Planter himself.

A Bright Spot.

The one bright spot in the country of this country is provided by usal, which appears to be absolutely immune from pest and likewise requires very little rain as compared with other crops. At present prices usal planters are doing well and the hums of their doctored cars prove that they are making the most of their opportunities. But although many of them are more or less on relief in regard to their water supply—there is an ever-growing concern on this head, especially amongst those who have been unable to construct dams either by reason of insufficient capital or through lack of the necessary permit from the P.W.D. Of course like all the rest of us the P.W.D. is up against the fact that there is not sufficient water to go round, consequently they have to be very careful about granting permits which may in the future lead to complications consequent upon "Chow Settlement". This fact alone shows the urgency of getting on with the job of saving the water that the present just runs away to the sea. What's the use of talking about clearer settlements until we have provided sufficient water for those already on the job?

"Dick" Burton is on his way back so we may expect that he will soon be relieving the Major of some of the load he appears to carry so well. When rumours are of the fact that he has asked me to back up all matters to stand his Water Conservation Meeting in the Memorial Hall next Friday at half past ten in the morning, I am all for it. Anyway we shall be all there, and all in it, we are confident that the staff which has had such a wide and interesting experience of the world is deriving himself from his old age to the task of looking after the Colony's interests. We've had enough of Pocking. What we want is Water and security against pests. All the rest on follow.



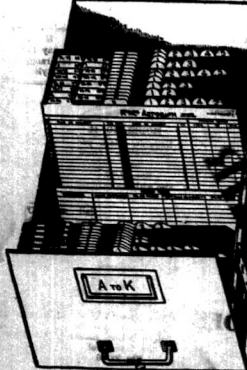

"THE PROOF OF THE PUDDING."

New Cricket Proposals on Trial.

SOUTH AFRICANS ON TOUR.

(FROM A CORRESPONDENT.)

The wide-spread interest in the Test matches "down under" has finally prevailed, and today has been last cricket season and that which has just started in the public eye during the winter months is now football, particularly among that section of the community which does not embrace itself over the big ball game. But the interest comes nearer home now that the English season has started and the presence in our midst of the good fellows from South Africa, coupled with the changes in the dimensions of the white, promises to mark the 1929 season as one different from those that have gone before.

The new wicket, one inch wider and one inch higher, may not appear to make a great deal of difference but there have been the usual interviews with famous players on the matter and different thoughts on the subject have been uttered by different men. The best thing would appear to be to wait and see how things work out in actual practice for the "proof of the pudding is in the eating" and when some of the county championship matches have been played with the new wicket a better understanding of the position will, no doubt, be revealed.

The other change in cricket law are of minor importance though a batsman must remember in future that he can be out leg before wicket even though the ball may have first hit his hand or bat while the maximum of seven minutes actual rolling instead of ten minutes is more the concern of groundsmen than players.

So far the playing part of the season has been concerned with trial matches at both the Universites and among the counties, but the South Africans have participated in a couple of "Country Trials" matches. The first engagement was with Mr. B. Barlow XI at Goldingdale, where the English players craved 138 while the tourists had lost seven wickets while obtaining 129 runs. The South Africans, owing to a good knock by I. J. Siedle, who hit a bright 100 before having his

No very great skill or training, however, is needed for carrying out many of the simpler jobs and an experienced owner with practice should not be very long before he can undertake more or elaborate repairs...

Many people imagine that the cost of equipping a home workshop is prohibitive, but this is far from being the case. An extensive but careful collection of tools and equipment used in conjunction with a few simple accessories...

It often happens that in the course of repair work the need for screwing a rod or tapping a hole arises, therefore a set of taps and dies should form part of the workshop equipment. A high quality set of taps and dies are those of Whitworth or B.S.P. make. Two sets of taps for cutting threads would perhaps be a more useful investment for an amateur. Therefore the Whitworth thread should be chosen and a set of dies and taps cutting threads from 1/4 in. to 1 in. will be found ample for all ordinary purposes.

The job of selling a metal through a piece of metal, particularly if it is steel or iron, can be very laborious when only a hand brace is available. It is advisable therefore to fit up a bench drill. Filters these machines have been somewhat expensive, costing a matter of £5 or so, but recently there has come out on the market a foreign-made still selling at the extraordinary price of £1.50.

If the space available in the garage or workshop will allow it a bench of simple size should always be chosen. One of 18 in. long by 27 in. wide will be found very useful. This bench appears to be suggested because this plastic is a standard size and therefore comparatively cheap. Some of them, of course, may be made up to form a bench of 14 in. by 27 in. which is sufficient for all amateur needs and the plastic should be well supported underneath on a wooden base. If the lack of the bench for use as a hand rest is a well so much the better. All that will be required is to support the front edge on two legs of 6 in. by 3 in. timber, the base of the legs being tinned to the floor. The vice should be fitted on more to one leg as possible, and if a choice of position for the bench in the garage can be made, one which will allow plenty of light to fall on the vice top should be selected.

There is a very large number of vice available, but one which can be strongly recommended for the amateur use is the Record Auto-vise. The vice is very strongly made, having detachable steel jaws for use on soft work. The jaws are arranged to work on an extremely useful feature—while mounted in it is a tube vice, a pipe-holding arrangement and a hardened jaw...

The use of an electric soldering iron, which is a most useful tool, presupposes the existence of a source of electrical energy in the garage, but the majority of home garages nowadays are lighted electrically and the current taken by an iron is so small that the lead can be plugged into an ordinary lamp socket with perfect safety.

The foregoing references and remarks about essential tools will not exhaust the list of special tools which the home workshop owner should be equipped and it remains only to discuss the smaller tools, such as files, chisel and so forth.

The choice of suitable files is one of considerable importance if the maximum use is to be obtained from them. It is for instance, both useful and laborious to use a comparatively expensive double-flute file for rasping the metal, which has one side sharp, or that when filing into a corner the plain edge can be well adapted to the work. The most useful filing work, such as finishing the corners of small steel brackets and so forth, a thin, second-cut file should be selected, which if a high finish is required a smooth or double-flute file is the proper tool to use.

The tendency for files to become clogged with metal is known amongst professional fitters as "plugging," and the prevention of this is a matter of some importance. It may be prevented by using the edge of a piece of file which is simply rounded on a wooden holder, or by using the edge of a piece of diagonal pushed across the file in the line of the teeth cuts. In addition to flat files two or three half-round, round and square files should be bought; generally

the second-cut type will be found most useful for all ordinary purposes. There is no need to provide a handle for every file, as two or three handles will be sufficient for about half a dozen files.

A cold chisel is extremely useful for cutting short work of a thick iron which is beyond the power of ordinary tin chisels, but iron chisels to be used for a very cheap chisel, which is probably will be made of inferior steel and consequently harden only quite a good outfit, which should be about half an inch wide, and be obtained for five shillings or so. It is useful to have at least two chisels; but one of the best type type. One should have a weight of about 1 lb., while the other may be quite light, the use of small riveting jobs and so forth.

A selection of twist drills will be necessary, and the provision of some kind of steady which will hold the drill steady while the work is being done is an advisable step. A good hand drill of recent vintage, which can now be obtained at prices from 10s. to 15s. or so upwards. If however the amateur will stand the strain it is well worth while to get a motor-operated drill, as this will have both hands free to manipulate the drill.

The ability to carry out repairs to the car at home will make a very considerable difference to the yearly upkeep costs. There are few things which, as a rule, prevent owners from doing their own repairs. These are their lack of mechanical apparatus and the absence of working facilities.

No very great skill or training, however, is needed for carrying out many of the simpler jobs and, as experience comes with practice, it should not be very long before quite ambitious repair or alteration schemes can be undertaken.

Many people imagine that the cost of equipping a home workshop is prohibitive, but this is far from being the case. An extremely useful collection of tools and equipment can be put together by an expenditure of a £2 note or even less. The two essential items which must go to form a basis of even the simplest equipment are a bench and a vice, and an essential of both is that they should be simply strong. Benches can be very large or small, but if of course, an extremely expensive, or they can be built at home from wood supplied by the local timber merchant.

Bench Details.

If the space available in the garage or workshop will allow it, a bench of ample size should always be chosen and one 6 ft. long by 27 in. wide will be found very convenient. This particular width is suggested because it fits on a standard size and therefore comparatively cheap, three of them, of course, going to make up the width. A thickness of 1 1/2 in. is essential for all standard benches and the planks should well supported beneath on even bracing. If the back of the bench can be fixed securely to a wall so much the better. All that will then be required, is to support the front edge on two legs of 3-in. by 3-in. timbers, the latter legs being secured to the floor. The vice should be fitted as near to one leg as possible, and if a choice of positions for the bench in the garage can be made, one which allows plenty of light to fall on the vice top should be selected.

There is a very large number of vices available, but one which can be strongly recommended for the amateur is the Record Auto-Vice. This vice is very strongly made, having detachable jaws for use on soft work. The vice is arranged to swing—an extremely useful feature—while combined in it is a table vice, a pipe-holding arrangement and a hardened anvil.

It often happens that in the course of repair work the need for screwing a rod or tapping a hole arises; therefore a set of taps and dies should form part of the workshop equipment. On English taps most of the holes and dies are either of Whitworth or B.S.F. pitch. Two sets of taps for setting these threads would perhaps be somewhat extravagant for an amateur. Therefore the Whitworth thread should be chosen and a set of dies and taps cutting threads from 1/8 in. to 1/2 in. will be found ample for all ordinary purposes.

The job of drilling a hole through a piece of metal, particularly if it is to be used on cast-iron, is very laborious when only a hand brace is available. It is advisable therefore to fit up a bench drill. Herbert's tools machines have been somewhat expensive, costing a matter of £8 or so, but recently there has come on to the market a foreign-made drill selling at the extraordinarily reasonable price of 11s. 6d. It is the standard type, with a three-jaw chuck taking drills up to 3/8 in. and a screw feed. The tool operates very well made and quite sufficiently accurate for all the drilling jobs which an amateur is likely to undertake. The drills are stocked by most tool merchants.

The need for soldering very often arises in repair work, or even in new fitting. A soldering iron and a means for heating it must therefore be provided. A blow-lamp at once suggests itself, because not only would it provide heat for the soldering iron but it can be used for many other purposes, such as heating, softening, tempering and so forth. If, however, the amateur's machine has any idea of undertaking light work he will be well advised to buy a lamp burning paraffin and fitted with a pump for maintaining the pressure. The small petrol or benzene-burning lamps, as a rule, do not provide sufficient heat for anything but the very smallest brazing jobs.

With regard to soldering, it is much more convenient to have the least self-contained, as it were, than to be under the necessity of frequently refilling the tin, particularly at a distance from where the job is being done. The use of an electric soldering iron, which is a most useful tool, presupposes the existence of a source of electrical energy in the garage, but the majority of home garages nowadays are lighted electrically and the current taken by an iron is so small that the lead can be plugged into an ordinary lamp socket with perfect safety.

The foregoing references and remarks about essential tools which the amateur should have are intended only to discuss the smaller tools, such as files, chisel and so forth.

The choice of suitable files is one of considerable importance if the maximum use is to be obtained from them. It is, for instance, both wasteful and laborious to use a comparatively expensive dead-smooth file for removing the burriness of a large piece of mild steel. The proper file for a job of this kind is a 12-in. rough-cut file. Incidentally, it is advisable, in the case of fine files, to buy the type which has one safe edge, so that when filing into a corner the plan edge can be allowed to rub against the portion of the metal which is to be removed. The medium filing work, such as trimming the corners of small steel brackets and so forth, is done most efficiently by a file which is selected, whilst if a high finish is required a smooth or dead-smooth file is the proper tool to use.

The tendency for files to become clogged with metal is known amongst professional fitters as "plugging," and the presence of only two or three particles on the surface of a file will prevent its proper use. Birthday Honours.

The 57th birthday of His Majesty the King of the Belgians is celebrated on the occasion of His birthday. In recognition of His Majesty's long and distinguished career in the Empire, and his important role of personal and public relations Liberator, the stage newspaper world, the political sphere, industry and military matters are mentioned in the wide variety of sections and the Dominions and the Colonies. His Majesty has been particularly interested in East Africa. It is not so long since that the name of members of the colonial public appeared in the Honours List yet in the rank of Companion in a new and mutually unknown part of the Empire that their service merits recognition. It is of no small importance in supporting the establishment and growth of a young colony. With that reference we would offer our congratulations to the Rt. Hon. Lord Delamare upon his 57th birthday. His Lordship has been associated with the development of Kenya for more than a quarter of a century and since he met her, his great personal ability to the support of his growing ideal—the establishment of a sound basis of permanent settlement in these African highlands. He has never wavered in his faith. His private contributions to the early requirements of that task were practical and necessary although they did not always bring him the public work there is little need for detail. He held firmly by his ideals primarily the establishment of Kenya as a typical British Colony, capable in the character of its white people of bearing all the responsibilities its status in the Empire would require. To his progress of his neighbours and a stronghold of the Imperial tradition on the roof of tropical Africa. To his work he brought a strong loyalty and a profound patriotism, most surely apparent when the trend of affairs has created a tension in relations with the Imperial authority and he has always been a zealous protector of those constitutional privileges so important in the early life of a growing country. During a quarter of a century of pioneering work Lord Delamare has created in East Africa a tradition of public service. He appears amongst us as he is accepted outside Kenya as the symbol of white settlement, the personification of the aims, ideals, energies, aspirations and responsibilities of the group of people who by their presence in an African Colony, shoulder a heavy burden of personal and communal example in the planting and growth of western traditions of private and public life in an alien soil. While we regard the honour conferred upon Lord Delamare as a recognition of his personal service to the Empire in Africa, we would like to look upon it, too, as a recognition by His Majesty and the Imperial Government of all that Lord Delamare has done for Kenya for the white settlement of Kenya. He has had more than his share of criticism in his task, much of it abusive and bitter. It is personal and much of it directed against and borne by him because of his faith in and his work for the white settlers. The appearance of his name in a list of men and women whose distinguished service to the cause of Empire has earned them recognition, has for Kenya a period when Lord Delamare is retiring from the field of active public work a very special significance and value as a merited appreciation of the man himself and as a generously unqualified approval and justification of his

labours in the interests of British settlement in the African continent. To his work in Kenya we would also extend our congratulations. The charming gentleman who has given his assistance to Kenya for many years at the selection of delicate problems affecting the Coast and its peoples, the kindly benefactor and supporter of many deserving public movements, irrespective of race or creed, occupies a very special place in the affections of Kenya. The extension of the Honours List to the officials of communities in young countries is a definite encouragement to those who give their time and ability to the service of their fellow-countrymen, the thought of reward. The work performed for Africans by the Marquis of the Furze and the Marquis of the Furze will receive the recognition that is due to it. There is, however, one other person who has fully merited it. Others, too, whose work has been distinguished in the Public Service, or whose special achievements have contributed a benefit to the community as a whole, the same mode of thanks will be generously extended.

London, May 2. The most interesting figure there was Sir John Lubbock, F.R.S., who acted as Chairman, and at the close of the debate gave the audience the extreme pleasure of a little of his own unimpaired historic power in the course of declaring himself to be on the side of the angels—those who would leave Shakespeare untouched. We were all very intrigued by the aptness of Mr. Leslie Faber as the pig for his defence of the original text. "If you rewrite it as many of your players do, I would as lief the former spoke my lines!" My lines, as Mr. Faber pointed out, all dramatic authors say, in effect—Do what you like with the other fellow's, but don't alter my line!

RUSSIAN SOVIET EXPELS WINERS' SECRETARY.

For Fraternising With "Prince Waleski"

"TREAHEROUS ARTHUR."

The Moscow correspondent of the "Daily News" states that on the ground of treachery to his class and the interests of the proletarian the Moscow Mining Academy has expelled Mr. A. J. Cook from honorary membership of the Moscow Soviet, and the academy in the same resolution has called on British workers to act decisively against "treacherous Arthur."

Whether the expulsion is due to Mr. Cook's "fraternisation" with the class enemy, the so-called "Prince Waleski," is not specified, but it is not allowed to proceed with royalty without special permission of the Soviet's order.

Judging from the tone of the newspapers the Soviet has been preparing to "unload" Mr. Cook for a year and recently published a photograph of Mr. Cook fraternising with Mr. Ramsey MacDonald in order to show what a "bad man" Mr. Cook really is.
