**SIDELIGHTS ON THE ELECTION CAMPAIGN.**

**Candidates Struck at Meeting.**

**STEWARDS ATTACKED**

**'WARDEN' CORRESPONDENT**

London, May 30  
 An interesting feature of the Campaign has been the attitude of the leading London papers. The Times and "Express" have remained strictly and dignifiedly Conservative. The "Morning Post" has of course been quite hysterically Tory. The "News" and the "Herald" have been the Liberal and Socialist respectively call for an account. The great surprise has been provided by the "Evening Standard" and the "Daily Express". The "Standard" has been shooting about the railways until their regular readers must be heartily sick of the subject. Yet there is no doubt that their campaign has interested the politicians and all three parties have tried to out do one another in their bludge to "do something" about the railways if they were returned to power.

The "Daily Mail" has taken even less interest and on the very eve of the polls has questioned itself with a leading article on "Wimble-don tennis and golf, the main headline and gave its main body" "This again is the result of a paper. 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There then is a type of driver who seems to consider that he is absolutely entitled to one-half of the road; there are surprising numbers of this variety of motorists. When he is travelling in one direction by himself and a stream of traffic is coming in the opposite direction, he seems to regard it as perfectly scandalous if any car coming towards him makes it necessary for him to abandon the crown of the road, although there is any amount of room for him on the left-hand side. On several occasions recently I have noticed drivers deliberately keeping their cars so near the centre of the road as they could get to annoy other people who were passing in the other direction, a proceeding which seems not only very gross and selfish, but a certain lack of brain power and undoubtedly creates bad feeling.

Naturally, approaching traffic must not get so much over the centre of the road as to cause other drivers to pull up sharply or to go within so much of the kerb, but oncoming traffic has the right to a reasonable amount of space for passing. Possibly the modern motorists dislike each other more than we did in the old days. Certainly people become very tense and excited about matters which do not matter a scrap; equally obviously they make apparently many silly things which make for safety.

**Safe Stopping Distance.** Many drivers appear to forget this is a very important point—that a car cannot be stopped in its own length from 30 m.p.h. in ordinary circumstances. It cannot, indeed, be stopped in the available stretch of road visible at the speed at which some people travel round a corner. Now, admittedly, most accidents do not arise by avoiding by driving rather than by braking, but if only 100 ft. of the road is visible in front of the car it is only reasonable to do so at the speed to at least that from which the car can be stopped in 100 ft. Certainly to drive on the wrong side of the road ought to be absolutely inexcusable in any circumstances and it is one of the most fruitful causes of collisions. Of course, it is admitted that in one case so long as both cars

are moving and a collision occurs, both drivers can be faulted. At least, that is what I think the rules should be, but there is no question but that generally one man is much more at fault than the other.

It is obvious also that cross-roads are the real danger points, since very many collisions occur either at cross-roads or, what is practically identical in effect, at a junction of one road with another. I consider that such collisions are very largely due to a false sense of security, based on reduced visibility. It is the driver's fair chance if another car emerges from a side road and the driver makes a mistake. That is where the real trouble exists, namely, if another driver does something totally unexpected. Yet a real driver has to be on the alert for the unexpected—this is the direction in which many people undoubtedly err.

After all, an expert's skill cannot be expected in an average driver. Numbers of persons who to-day are not experts, are not complete masters of their cars, never will be, and could not be, their machines faultless in an emergency. The moral of which is that the average man does not take nearly enough trouble to master his machine.

Periodically when there is any likelihood of adding in this fact, I have a certain amount of sympathy for people who find themselves in rather a tight corner. It is really a pity, because an intelligent person can go quietly by himself and master his machine. Quite what can be done to improve indubitably upon the average driver the simple hand signals which are all-important, frankly, I do not know. The wretchedly wide washed modern traffic cones really cannot but advise the immense potential danger which is given honestly or in a directly fashion. Time after time a driver gives the signal that he is about to turn to the left, and then turns to the left. Actually I maintain that the signal should have the full power of a law behind them. That

was possible to make a knowledge of these signals necessary before a driving licence could be received or taken out, the scheme might be helpful. For certainly any man, even if below the average in intelligence, can understand the official traffic and driving signals and can give them correctly. The fact that a driver either misunderstands the signals, or uses them properly is not only due to stupidity; it is due to thoughtlessness; to use a stronger expression.

**Definite Law Necessary.** I think it is a pity that we shall have a proper law of the road, and instead of there being a curious accumulation of tradition, custom, by-law, and real law, the whole will be amalgamated in a code which is simple and easy to understand. Nothing short of a definite law properly enforced will maintain order on thousands of cars come on the road, for even the off-putted rules in which people trust so glibly, of a right or wrong side of the road is not, strictly speaking, a law. Some people regard a law very rightly, some regard a law very wrongly, some regard a law as the wrong side of a white line, only to find that they were not supported by the magistracy, as happens to the wise line also, highly detestable though it may be, is a purely voluntary action.

After all, the brain uses notices (as we so often find) to remedy, and one need not be particularly witted in order to be able to drive properly; yet when one comes to think over the matter, half the possibilities of trouble in modern traffic are due to just such little faults.—S. C. H. Davis in "The Anticrop".

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**ELEPHANT HERD BURNED TO DEATH.**

(Continued from page 1.)

have been both seen and killed during the year and in view of various abnormal and far-reaching movements of herds which have been brought to notice, it should appear that there is the end of each cycle of years which culminated in a condition of acute famine, a general starvation of the part of big wandering herds in the drier regions of the east to migrate into the grassier surroundings of the Nile Nile.

**Burned to Death.**

A breeding herd was severely burned during the year in the lower area of Longo. The reports state that the agency which has been notified of the incident, looks upon the present, eight of whom were killed within the space of a few days. Some of the elephants—possibly two including a female—of their injuries and another herd does were shot to kill and sent to their maker.

A report which has been received from the same of these tragic events killed three persons and a dog when for a few days it lay on a river main made in the vicinity of and actually within the station. It is believed that this creature was subsequently killed. A generous tribute as paid to the skill and daring of Honorary Game Warden Mr. John Jardine.

The tendency of the large breeding herds of West Nile and East Nile is to be exceptionally aggressive. Capt. Pittman remarks that they have not yet forgotten the outbreak, harrising to which they were subjected on the part of the ivory hunters in the old Nile days. He recalls the fact that following, one of the most celebrated of the pioneers, was slain and killed by a cow herd. Many of these cows, now seek to avoid without awaiting it, as seen later-day elephant hunt, view them from bitter experience."

**Native Hunters.**

The natives near Lake Rudi and Odu, have a curious little custom. Numbers of elephants can be seen each year and when opportunity offers the inhabitants take advantage of a herd crossing to do a bit of private killing. When a herd comes into the tips of the trunk are visible. Man go out in masses and spear the trunk. The spear is tied, a long rope with a float attached. The elephant is

drowned, floats eight hours later—and is then eaten by the coming hunters.

The position of the elephant herd, in the region of the Nile, is a little peculiar. With the exception of a few uninhabited areas the population and elephants have to live side by side. Broadly speaking the elephants are based on the main rivers and water courses from which they find the neighbouring vegetation.

When herded they pass from one swamp to another and start increasing and steady some unsuitable expenses or sanctions to which they are not reticent. It would appear therefore, that the Game Warden, "that the ultimate fate of the greater portion of the Uganda herds will be extermination unless they can be driven north to join up with the Bunyoro thousands in their existing sanctuaries. Even then the certainty of oversteering these sanctuaries by such action will necessitate a drastic reduction in numbers in the near future.

**Evil Significantly.**

Among the worst elephants in Uganda are the Bunyoro herd in Mwanza. The British says of them that "they maintained their well-earned reputation for evil-intentioned savagery." This remark is followed by an extract from the "Herald" of 1st day—a thumbnail sketch of the life of an Officer of the Elephant Control. It reads:

"I had on Abanda's station during the night, about three hundred yards from the double-holed rest house. Took up track at 9 a.m. and got up to elephants about 4 p.m. after following through some of the worst country to my experience. These elephants created along for four hours without a halt through perfectly good 'savagery' swamps, dense thicket dark as pitch and in places water up to my waist. When I finally got up all they turned round and stood about ten feet from them. by the middle of August. The building will be a two-storey one, the main hall being the largest. It will be twenty-six feet high by twenty-eight feet long. **The Cost.**

Sir Edward Dunham also referred to the financial side of the undertaking. A sum of £2,000 had been subscribed and it required only £2,000 to obtain the necessary total, the plans showing that a building could be erected for £9,000. In regard to the maintenance of the museum, Sir Edward mentioned that a sum of £800 was voted each year for the maintenance of the museum of the Natural History Society, but that sum would have to be increased when it was devoted to the maintenance of the Coryndon Memorial Museum, and it was hoped that a contribution would be obtained from the Municipal funds as well as from the Government funds.

Consequent upon the decision that the memorial to Sir Robert Coryndon should take the form of a museum, the Natural History Society agreed to relinquish their site and their collections. An agreement was entered into that a sum of £2,000 should be paid to the Natural History Society providing the sum went towards the furnishing of the Museum.

### The Coffee Institute Proposal.

A special meeting of coffee planters will be held this morning to discuss a proposal that the 'Coffee Institute' be controlled by a 'Coffee Institute' operating under a charter from Government. The second part of the resolution provides the safeguard that a 'Committee shall be appointed to consider the establishment of the Institute and the scope of its objects. It is further proposed that the Committee shall be made available for study by all planters prior to a second public meeting which may take place at Nakuru later in the year. The suggestions which have been advanced in favour of this 'Coffee Institute' though general in their character, as is to be expected at an early stage, do not rest on the side of modesty. They include the taking over of control of the industry from Government the organization of local sales, the examination of further markets, publicity, the importation of the requirements of the industry the establishment of research services and cultural progress the establishment and control of licensed coffee warehouses, arbitration and the bringing into existence of a local 'Miscellaneous Lane.' It is suggested for consideration that the Institute could be financed by asking Government

to hand over the proprietorship of the Agricultural Department's note now spent on coffee services and the introduction of a Export Tax of perhaps one shilling per bag, to the proceeds of which Government would add from State funds an equal amount. This proposal reminds us of the agitation for the imposition of a Coffee cess discussed so freely a few years ago and rejected by the majority of the planters. But there is an important difference. While the Coffee Cess was an effort not favourably regarded by Government to encourage planters to contribute something to official revenue which could be earmarked for coffee services, the present proposal is intended to relieve Government of all responsibility for the industry except in the form of an unquestioned lump sum contribution. There is no doubt at all in our minds that the 'Coffee Institute' scheme is an essential step towards the disintegration of the Coffee industry which the Government feels with the present position. That feeling is growing in intensity. It is the feeling which stimulated the demand for the appointment of the Agricultural Commission and which is now being expressed in the form of a general resignation both to Government and the industry. But there are many ways in which the various industries can help. Some of them are indicated in this very movement—but they do not include taking over from Government the final control of the country's finances in respect of one of its main industries or the introduction of the 'dangerous' principle of an Export Tax on one of its main commodities. We are prepared to believe that the Coffee Planters of Kenya will agree that there is a good case for examination of the methods which should be adopted to co-operate in bringing to the aid of the Agricultural Department the maximum assistance so that the industry may progress and stand on a market exploration, arbitration, publicity and, to some extent, research are all lines which can profitably be followed. 

**Next Year's World Poultry Congress.**

**MANY APPLICATIONS FOR SPACE.**

A remarkable response has followed the preliminary announcement of the World Poultry Congress to be held at the Crystal Palace in July, next year. Although the event is only a few months off, delegates and members are already being registered and many applications have been received for space in the commercial and livestock sections of the Exhibition which is to be held concurrently with the Congress. It is now clear that the Crystal Palace with its extensive grounds will by no means be too large for all the requirements of the Congress.

With the valuable help of the several Committees responsible for dealing with the different sections, the Congress organizers have lost no time in settling the basis of the Congress. Rules for exhibitors both in the livestock and trade sections have been drawn up and are at present in the hands of the printers. Large scale plans showing the various grades of commercial sites available have been prepared, and definite arrangements have been made in regard to such matters as the erection and lighting of stands. Although printed copies are not yet available and no special steps have been taken to disseminate the unique opportunity offered by the Congress to poultry breeders and trade interests, both classes of exhibitors are already coming forward with applications for space.

**International Response.**

The international response has been equally gratifying. It is now certain that a very large number of nations from Nicaragua to Norway, from Portugal to Peru, will be represented at the Congress. Organizing Committees are actively at work in Canada and the United States preparing for very powerful representation. These two countries have already made definite applications for large areas of space and, without doubt, their national exhibits will be highly attractive features. The matter of space for national exhibits is, in fact, causing some concern in view of the heavy demands which are likely to be made. Holland, for example, is anxious to have a large space, and its national committee is hard at work preparing an exhibit. France too, has set up a very powerful national committee at the instance of the French Minister of Agriculture. In Germany, a national committee is at work under the Chairmanship of Professor Dr. Schatzschel.

adequately represented. Canada has been referred to above. The Irish Free State is actively moving to secure effective representation and the staging of an imposing national exhibit. South Africa intends to take part. Other Dominions and Colonies will doubtless be coming in. There will be a very attractive symbolic display of poultry-breeding within the Empire staged by the Empire Marketing Board.

The organizers are especially pleased with the enthusiasm shown by smaller industrial industries such as rabbits and geese, which are obviously bound to be to the great opportunity which the Congress will afford of strengthening and developing their organizations. This applies also, in a degree, to the small poultry-keepers (including the "backyard" and suburban poultry-keepers) who are most anxious to see the extension of a "backyard" which has proved so profitable to themselves and so valuable from a national standpoint. It is hoped that ways and means will be found by which this class of exhibitors will be enabled to appeal to the general public, who will certainly be attracted in large numbers to the Congress.

**An Official Tour.**

A substantial program has been made in the organization of an official tour to be made after the Congress and it will shortly be possible to publish particulars of the itinerary and the cost. When these are issued, it will be found that the tour provides an opportunity of seeing only the chief features of the poultry industry of the United Kingdom but a great many of the historical and beauty spots of the country.

The national exhibit for Great Britain and Northern Ireland will be one of the features of the Congress. The task of the Committee which is responsible for staging this exhibit is by no means an easy one. Substantially it is to present in a popular form a tangible demonstration of the development of the home poultry industry, with special reference to the influence of the national schemes of education and research in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. In addition, marketing displays will be staged as an integral part of the national exhibit. Voluntary organizations which by educational means have done much to further poultry development at home, will have an opportunity of showing what they have accomplished and in what direction their future efforts will be. The national exhibit it may be said, will be planned under the guidance of the Department of Overseas Trade, who have had a wide experience in this class of work. It need hardly be said that the expense of staging such a demonstration, if it is to compare favourably with exhibits prepared

## TRAFFIC CONGESTION AND THE SOLUTION.

AMELIORATING AN EVIL WHICH IS BECOMING ACUTE.

A Practical But Expensive Way Out of the Difficulty.

There are roughly two and a half million licensed car drivers at present using the roads of this country, and if you asked a man who lives in a large city—London, for example—what proportion of these drivers used the highways in his particular locality he would probably intimate that, judging by results, the figure was about 75 per cent. Two and a half million vehicles, however, go a very long way, and it needs little imagination, even on the part of those whose driving seldom takes them into big towns and cities, to realize that the problem of traffic congestion in such busy centres is reaching a stage when it is becoming acute in some respects, in fact, almost out of hand.

The authorities are fully alive to the gravity of the situation, and they know that there is no way out of the difficulty other than by expending vast sums of money in one direction or another. We believe that it is a mistake to suppose that even the most lavish expenditure can solve the problem in a full way, and that a solution would more easily be reached by a gradual process of elimination of the worst roads, the worst points should be dealt with first. But how?

The most obvious method is to widen the roads. This has already been done, and new widenings are announced almost every week, but the acquisition of the necessary land is possible in many cases only when leases which have many years to run fall in. On the one hand, therefore, the ground, there is the expense of the demolition of old buildings, and the laying of a complete section of new road, which is very wasteful, if not absolutely essential.

**Cross Roads the Difficulty.**

Even when an extensive widening of this kind has been carried out, the solution is really no nearer, for an increased volume of traffic immediately takes advantage of the altered conditions, and

to cap everything, the cross-roads problem has not been eased one whit. The worst cases of congestion occur where main thoroughfares cross one another. In the centre of a large city traffic using a given thoroughfare may have to cross half a dozen equally important roads in a distance of about half a mile. Now, if it were possible to carry one road over or under another, we are definitely nearer to a complete solution of traffic congestion.

The possibility of erecting new viaducts was ventilated about two years ago by high authorities on engineering subjects, and the public subscribed to the discussions which followed. We need not enter in detail here into the various aspects of that discussion, but the general consensus of opinion was against viaducts, owing largely to the enormous cost involved. It would be enough merely to construct an over-head bridge. It would be necessary to link up the bridge with the adjoining buildings and to alter those buildings—which in a great many cases are large shops and stores—so that window frontages were available. Moreover, the financial structures would be ugly and would involve a number of complications.

**What of Tunnels?**

We are left, then, with the possibility of building underground connecting links, and in advancing this idea as being a practicable solution of traffic congestion problems which will call for really drastic treatment within the next two or three years, we are fully alive to the fact that there are in many districts difficulties as insurmountable as those which make the construction of viaducts almost impossible.

London, for example, has already a network of underground passages. Almost immediately below the surface we have water mains, sewers, gas and electric light mains and so on, whilst at a greater depth there are the tube railways, and, however

intermediate strata, and this, we suggest, should be the level at which underground by-passes should be bored. In some localities the traffic congestion on these tunnels would present insuperable difficulties, we are, however, conceiving ourselves solely with areas where tunnels would be feasible.

**The Question of Cost.**

Next we come to a consideration of the problem which the reader has doubtless had uppermost in his mind, namely, cost. We have endeavored to make it clear, and, in fact, to emphasize the point, that no solution of traffic congestion in certain areas where it is becoming really acute is possible without a very great expenditure of money.

Tunnels are, we know, extremely costly things, but the existence of hundreds of miles of tube railway proves that the enterprise is possible, whilst to bring the subject even nearer home we need only point out that the Blackwall Tunnel has more than justified the amount of capital that was spent on it.

The ideal traffic tunnel would be one running immediately below the road surface, and it would be built on similar lines to those of many railways between Southampton Row and the Embankment, London. Unfortunately, however, many areas where the greatest need exists for traffic subways would provide obstacles in the shape of tube stations, together with their underground booking offices, modulators, and so on.

In considering the line, therefore, we must concentrate on the possibility of boring tunnels some 40 ft. below the road surface.

**Structural Details.**

Long experience has shown that underground boring by means of a shield, the fitting of cast-iron segments to form a circular tunnel and the final lining up of "grouting" with cement to make a perfect joint between the outer surface of the segments and the

surrounding earth is the best, most practical and cheapest method to adopt.

The basis of our tunnel, therefore, would be a strong concrete tube, the length of which would depend not entirely on the necessary length of by-pass, but on the distance required to dive down at a suitable point to the required depth and to rise again at the other end.

It would be essential to have adequate ventilation. Whether the fresh air should be pumped in at the lowest point and the foul air extracted from the highest—or vice versa—is, however, a moot point, for exhaust gases are heavier than air.

To cut down the cost of maintenance, we suggest that the roadway and the cross walls carrying the roadway should be made of concrete, slabs, also of concrete, supported on rolled-steel joists being used to form the floor of the four-foot conduits in the roof.

The side walls, intended solely for emergency use and for the use of a police patrol, would be of the open-work grid type and would act as the main or main ports from the dust under the roadway to the tunnel itself.

In addition, adequate drainage, connected at some convenient point by a pumping installation, and suitable lighting arrangements would be necessary.

If the tunnel were a long one, it might be desirable to have one or more emergency exits in the form of vertical tubes having spiral staircases. The interior of the tube could be lined with glazed bricks, as is done in tube railway stations, or, if it were desired to cut down the cost to a minimum—and bearing in mind that such a tunnel would have a purely utilitarian purpose—the interior could be lined with concrete. Viewed in the abstract, an underground bypass may appear to be a very simple and obvious consideration of every aspect of the situation must convince the more level-headed sections of the community that it has points which are worthy of the closest attention.—("The Light Out.")

LITTLE KNOWN PRODUCTS OF KENYA.

The possibility of finding a market for certain little known products of Kenya has come to light through a letter written by the District Commissioner at Mandera to the Provincial Commissioner of the Northern Frontier Province.

It is stated that at Mandera the myrrh is exchanged some kind of tobacco or gum. At Elgeyo in the Northern Frontier Province the price is about Shs. 24/6 for 50 lbs.

There are two kinds of myrrh, one of which comes from trees growing near the Coast in the low country, and the other from trees growing in the hills. It is suggested that there might be a better market for the product in Kenya than in Elgeyo.

Another gum which is plentiful and is also sold at Mandera for a very small price is a substance known by the Somali as Halkole Haddi and by the Indians as Bismal. This is exported from Aden to Bombay and China.

The following Anacia gums are collected but are not sold: (Somali names)—Adad, Wadi, Jiric, Bile, Gedi and Hinal. All of these are brought in Aden, and sent to Europe or Bombay to be used for pigments.

There is also a certain amount of trade done with various gums, roots, and the bark of trees which are used for incense.

The matter of a possible sale for these products was discussed at a recent meeting of the Mandera Chamber of Commerce and it was finally decided that as none of the members of the Chamber appeared to have any interest in the subject the information contained in the letters should be published.

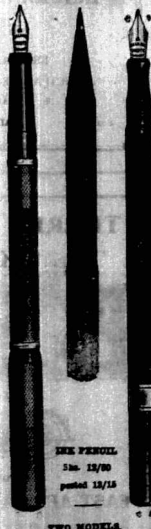

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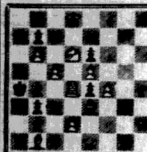

**THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE HITS BACK.**

Coffee Planters Who Neglected Mealy Bug.

INCOMPETENCE & INDIFFERENCE.

World's Best Remedial Measures Disclosed But Ignored by Many.

Some straight speaking by officers of the Department of Agriculture marked the closing stages of the meeting of Coffee Planters held in Nairobi last week-end.

The Director of Agriculture, speaking from his own observations, declared that there was indifference among some coffee planters with regard to the steps they should take to control Mealy Bug. He said that a large number of planters who had done nothing at all.

The Senior Coffee Officer was more outspoken than his chief. He said it was entirely the fault of planters if they were left high and dry with Mealy Bug and a sign of incompetence if they could not guard their plantations against the pest, on the basis of the recommendations laid down by the Entomologist, Mr. Kirkpatrick, before he left the Colony.

"If instructions laid down by the Department are not carried out (said Mr. Trencly) planters cannot expect to make the officers of the Department the target for the inefficiency of the work on their plantations."

**PROBLEM OF ENTOMOLOGY.**

A reference made by the Director of Agriculture in the recent session of the Legislative Council to the extent of the mealy bug pest, led to a discussion at Friday's meeting of the Coffee Planters' Union on the responsibility of individual coffee planters in regard to the pest.

Mr. J. Mordling, Nairobi, who raised the question, declared that in spite of what the Director of Agriculture had said he considered that the Department did not do what they should have done. He said that the only recommendation that was ever made to him in connection with the control of the mealy bug in a pamphlet issued in 1927. Two years had since elapsed, but he had heard nothing further, so far as he was aware, no experiments had been conducted. He did not think coffee planters should allow the pest to rest upon them.

The Director of Agriculture replied: "When speaking on this matter in the Legislative Council, I did not say that, and I stand by it."

He said that planters themselves must assume some responsibility for the pest, and that the Department did not have the means of what is undoubtedly an essential measure, namely the issue of mealy bug available in every part of the country in the world.

He said that he was in a hurry to say that because of his own observations—and these were based on those of other coffee planters who had done nothing at all with regard to the pest. That is what I referred to in my remarks on this subject in the Legislative Council, and I was the spokesman that could be afforded by Government through the Department of Agriculture. **GOLD DISCOVERY IN TANGANYIKA.**

Remarkably Promising Find.

OLD GERMAN WORKING.

Payable Quantities Already Brought to Surface.

For a long time it has been agreed that there are probably many minerals not yet discovered in Kenya and the neighbouring territories. There have been rumours of gold from both Kenya and Tanganyika and occasionally stories are received of actual finds.

Such tales were told on this occasion by the late Mr. Niropi, in the Thomas district of Tanganyika, where a mine was started here in Germany days but work has not been continued until recently when the only eight claims in the district were taken up by Mr. G. Moore of Nairobi and Mr. H. H. Waters.

Only two claims have been worked so far and the results achieved are remarkably promising. It is generally considered by experts that the most valuable finds may be situated from 100 feet downwards.

In the present instance the shafts have only been dug to a depth of 45 feet. In spite of this, although one third of an ounce of gold per ton is considered a payable proposition samples from Niropi have increased during the past four months in value to such an extent that the present value of the mine is estimated to be of the order of £10,000.

One is bound to come to the conclusion that it is almost hopeless to expect to keep our gardens growing all the year round, but that we must resign ourselves to what I can best describe as a Nairobi Garden, i.e., a very brilliant display for a few weeks after the rains and then a gradual fading.

This is the situation, but the Annual fits the situation like the paper on the wall. Most of our Annals are like the Dalhia, short lived out here, but they are worth while ten thousand times.

You have but to think, not only of the marvelous range of color that they provide in the garden, but of the tremendous utility of most of them. From the Sweet Pea downwards to the Magnonette and dwarf nasturtium, they are indispensable in our homes for cut flowers, and even though our phloxes, ranunculuses, and lepto-phloxes may be too short for actual cutting, they more than make up for it by their charm of colour and fascinating forms.

More than that a great many of them will carry on with comparatively little water once they are established, if so be they are housed and mulched carefully.

**Soil.**

One can scarcely compare up in one's mind a soil that won't grow annuals, but the more liberal the treatment, the greater will be the result.

The Annual delights in a well-tilled, well cultivated soil always, and the more you put in, the more you'll get out.

**Sowing.**

Soil may be sown in two ways. In boxes and in the open where the plants are to bloom, but be-

fore I go into detail, it may be as well to issue a warning.

There are certain subjects that do not transplant well, notably magnonette and poppies of all kinds, including scabiosa, and much disappointment will be avoided if this is borne in mind, and they are sown actually where they are intended to bloom.

**Sowing in Boxes.**

The best time to sow is generally some few weeks before you expect your first rains. Zinnias of course are quicker. Look for snow. Everyone soon learns from experience not to sow too early. It is far preferable to keep your seedlings growing all the time than to keep them starved in boxes. Starvation means check, and should starvation be prolonged, the seedlings may never get the chance to fully recover, no matter how liberal the after treatment.

There is a distinct advantage in sowing in boxes if you can see your way clear to the extra trouble involved, for several reasons. Firstly your season is prolonged, secondly there is the advantage of bigger and better grown plants, and thirdly there is the saving of the seed or seedlings being washed away by heavy rain at the outset.

Annals sown, potted out and planted out at an opportune time, have far more chance of showing you what they can do.

I am not speaking particularly of the things like Lupin, Sweet Pea, or Buttercups. Take Salpiglossis for instance—the seed of this is fine, and what you may get a return from seed sown in the open, the chance are that you won't. It simply does not like the buffeting it gets from the opening rains. Drain your seed boxes well by placing broken inverted pots over the bottom—the bigger ones below, the smaller ones on top, finishing off the drainage by a layer of leaves or moss or grass.

This prevents the soil from getting down into the cracks and clogging your drainage.

turn it at intervals of four or five days.

When your boxes are all ready, take the first packet of seed, tear off a tiny corner, blow the packet out, and sow the seed straight from the packet with a sharp rhythmic backward and forward movement evenly and thinly over the box. Then cover the seed lightly to the depth of two inches, and water with a fine syringe can. After this label the box, and do not forget that there is a right way and a wrong way to label.

Cedar wood labels 1 1/2 x 6" should be used. Right across the top put the date of sowing and draw a line, then underneath, and along the side, write the name of the seed sown, and below that, about the bottom, write the name of the person or firm who supplied the seed. Just Sowing, Weeds, Seeds or Open Sowed as the case may be, is sufficient, but all this helps to make perfect, and is in the hands of very useful reference as to whose seeds germinate the better.

Any notes regarding date and strength of germination can be made at will afterwards on the back of the label. For fair quality put an X for very good two, and so on.

When this is done shade your seed boxes, until germination is observed.

All seeds germinate better in the dark, but the very moment you observe germination your shade and give more light. If seedlings are allowed to become weak or drawn at the outset, all sorts of illness, and the great probability is that you'll lose more than half at pricking out time.

Just as soon as the seedlings are big enough to handle prick them out at even distances into a slightly deeper box filled with slightly coarser soil. A half inch stove will do nicely, and a light sprinkling of well decomposed cow manure over the drainage—where the seedlings will be found to do better.

When they establish themselves will be found good. After pricking out, water in your seedlings well and gently, and shade for a few days, or until you notice that their heads are up, when consequently their roots are going down.

Greenhouse Annals like Cinerarias and Calceolarias never like direct sunshine, in fact half an hour direct sun on the latter may be fatal, but they do like light and air and tons of it. The middle of a back yard is often the best place to grow your seedlings, and a veranda with its one sided light and usual attendant draught the worst.

Don't ever attempt to coddle your seedlings, they are much like children. Wrap up their chests on a rainy day, but if it is rain or air or sun, you are almost bound to get weak chested children.

Hardly is the word you need to keep ever in your mind and abundance of light and air. Just as soon as your seedlings are established run over the top of the boxes with a pointed stick and lightly scratch between the lines. The seedlings love this little culture, and air in the box is just as necessary as air in the outside soil.

A light sprinkling over all around the boxes each early morning and again the evening with a syringe of fine rose can, will water at all the roots as necessary and be all the attention needed until you plant out.

These are my rule for watering, and one only. Wait till your boxes are needing water and then give plenty.

Every gardener should know that a plant does not live to drink but drinks to live, and either it wants water or it dies. This is absolutely no half measure.

These are no greater. Post than the period known as the Tickle, one who neither waters a plant or leaves it alone, and all such need to be treated as pests.

**Sowing in the pen.**

The best time to sow in the open is undoubtedly when the first so-called green rains appear. These rains are generally more gentle and wet the soil sufficiently to bring about germination.

More than that there is often time to run the ditch hoe over the first young crop of weeds for the first time before the heavier rain falls.

Now that a quiet day with no wind for your sowing, nothing I can think of is more calculated to give a "five" than an attempt to sow in the open.

The best method of sowing in the circle is to throw a tin of all round development, and a far easier working out of any colour and shade from left to right with a stroke from left to right underneath to meet it. Then take out your packet and sow evenly and thinly exactly as described for the boxes. After the circle is sown, turn your trowel over and with the back fill in the line of the circle.

 and in the middle plate a vent stake to show where your seeds have been sown.  
 The finer your seed, the shallower you will draw the circular drill, and for the larger seeds deeper. It is surprising how many circles one packet of seed will sow. If you sow thinly. As soon as your seed is up and showing the line of the row get to work with a hand-ditch hole and loosen the soil all round them.

**Thinning.**  
 Environment is a law, and you can no more expect plants to give off their own humants if they have to live under crowded conditions. There should be no stunts in any garden. Try not to think of the law of "The Survival of the Fittest" but strive to create the conditions of all fit.

There should and need be no struggle for supremacy if the watchful eye and the loving hand have done their duty and their duty is to see it that every seedling is given its chance by affording it room and light and air.

**The Creation of a "Thousand" forests lies in one Acre."**  
 Judicious and early thinning will do perhaps more to bring about real success than anything. If you have a big litter of seedlings which you do not want, you generally remove the ones not needed the moment you can see which are the better, not only that the strain on the mother may not be so great but to ensure that the remaining family have food enough and to spare. I am quite sure Miss M. Collyer will forgive me for trespassing into her domain.

Exactly so with Mother Earth—she can do a lot but not impossible.

It is far better to have ten well grown plants in your circle, than five hundred poor starved specimens fighting and quarrelling over place food, light and air, that isn't there.  
**Picking Out in the Open!**  
 Only in exceptional cases some of which I have already quoted will you need to waste any of the seedlings thinned out since they can always be planted out in the open border. Clarkias, Godolias, Larkspurs Zinnias, in fact most of all the annuals thinned out can be used in this way. When you have picked them out, however, do not wait for the next shower that may never come, but water them well and shade them for a few days if the weather be at all bright by placing small

branches of trees above them. The ordinary broken fern is ideal for this purpose.

**Staking or Pruning.**  
 This of course ought strictly speaking to be dropped on by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to animals!!! But like the cutting of puppets tails it is very widely practised, because it will be found that if at first the separation of the annuals is restricted by the whole removal of the most tip of the main growing shoot, when your plant in some few inches high, the flowering area will be found to be much increased and much busier specimens formed.

It must not be forgotten, however, that this process retards slightly the flowering period, and should be practised at home to prevent the annuals flowering until a given date. The Smartas is perhaps the best instance of this.

**Staking and Tying.**  
 As soon as it is seen that your taller annuals will be ere long called upon to bear the added burden of bud and spike place some neat bushy stakes around them—small pieces of spreading bamboo are splendid—or failing these five or six small neat stakes with two or three strands of string or lute at intervals.

If the top of the stakes reach to the level of the flower spike this will be found to answer. Nothing looks worse in a flower border or bed, that stakes sticking up like lightning conductors above your front display.

**Feeding.**  
 It must be borne in mind that the first bud on an annual is your first signal that it is trying to reproduce its kind, the initial hint that the following days are to be marked by the added care of a future generation, with the attendant burden, and it is now that we can help particularly.

In the first bud stage and until the flowers open, water if possible twice a week with weak liquid cow manure or root water. Clay's artificial manure used at the rate of a teacupful to two gallons of water will be found excellent, but so long as the dear old Nipmole with us we shall not want for a real good stimulant for our annuals. Stop feeding entirely when you see that your plants are approaching their zenith.

**Exhibiting.**  
 I hope to live to see the day when the K.H.S. can see it's way clear to perfect law, and on all that you desired space will be allowed for an exhibit of annuals. I am afraid I won't be content with six or twelve kinds, because it is possible to get a mass over well within the limits of my above mentioned Nairobi Garden.  
 Only think? Aster, Cosmos, Zin-

nia, Larkspur, Clarkia, Chrysanthemum, Sweet Pea, Schizanthus Godolias, Phlox Nemosa, Dimorphotheca, Linaria Lupin Salpiglosson—think of any or all of these in a colour scheme, and then think of the Memorial Hall, and mark you that there are dozens more annuals that time fails me to tell of.

**Annals in Pots.**  
 These give a marvellous display and will repay one for the extra trouble taken. Salpiglosson, Clarkias, the tall double Godolias, Almon, Linaria and Nicotiana, are especially useful groups in this way and special mention should be made under this head of Terebinthifolius, or the poor name of the garden of Mr. Le Hoer Trench when one of the Horticultural Gardens took place there. It will be found best to transfer the potted seedlings from the nursery to well drained pots, six inches in diameter, and care must be taken to see that until the pots become more or less filled with roots, they are not watered too heavily or do not become saturated by rain.

Part of the next previous remarks upon feeding, staking, etc. apply. For anyone contemplating the staking of an exhibit of annuals I would strongly advise the growing of a few plants of course in annual in pots and of course it goes almost without saying that subjects like Cinerarias and Calceolarias will be always grown in this manner.

**Seed Saving.**  
 If care is taken in selection no other seed than a purely initial one need be involved in the growing of annuals since the wonderful stimulus of one's hands is particularly to seed saving.  
 Only tonight I visited a beautiful garden close to me and saw the first class zinnias which I was assured came from an original three packets of seed a few seasons ago, and every annual is practically the same. Honestly say, there is a real joy in being able to write "Own Saved" on your labels.

**General.**  
 May be the bloom of our annuals in this country is the judge of their decay, but they live far longer than long enough to prove to us that they have not come to their end, but have come to improve and in their resurrection they are both glorious and generous.

### EDITOR'S NOTES.

To go into detail regarding the Society's Show held on Monday, 17th at the Memorial Hall, Nairobi, would be repeating largely what has already been published, although the entries in some of the classes were good, the quality of the exhibits shown was good, and the staging was excellent.

The "Blue" section of the show was very good, and the blooms certainly showed care in picking them, but again, points were lost in a number of cases owing to bad staging. In the class for a "Bunch of Flowers" some were shown in vases and other which were in bowls were very flat, instead of being raised in a centre of form a dome.

A number of entries were disqualified, as they were not staged according to schedule, for example, Class 1, Open Flowers, Best Collection. (One vase of each variety). Exhibitors still persist in putting two varieties of bloom in one vase. No matter how good the exhibit otherwise is, the judges must disqualify it. Exhibitors must read the Schedule thoroughly, and hold strictly to it.

Only one exhibit was staged of *Winkleria* Bower. I hope next flower show there will be an increase in this very ornamental section.

In the Dahlia section, disqualifications took place, owing to exhibitors staging more blooms of one type than that specified on the schedule, others were rejected owing to unevenly formed blooms.

It is a great pity that with a number of new seedlings the date of sowing, and other particulars, were not given, which of course disqualified the exhibits.

# RUNNING WRINKLES.

## Hints and Tips on the Care of the Car.

### ROUTINE POINTS FOR ATTENTION.

No car, whether a new one costing £2,000, or a second-hand one costing less than £500, will run time to run satisfactorily unless it receives a certain amount of attention. New owners are sometimes apt to think, or rather they have to do so to keep the engine, supplied with oil and, of course, petrol and water. These are, however, two other important units, the gear box and back axle, which demand adequate lubrication, while on the chassis itself there are several points which must be oiled regularly if the car is to be comfortable to drive or ride in, and if premature repair bills are to be avoided.

With every new car the proud owner will receive a number of handbooks dealing with the car itself, the electrical equipment, the carburettor, the tyres, and so on, and he should take an early opportunity to read through these and to assimilate that knowledge which is most likely to be useful, making a mental note of many other points, so that he can refer to them when occasion arises.

#### Use the Lubrication Chart.

With this literature there will probably be a lubrication chart, and this should be read on the wall of the motor home so that it is available for instant consultation. This lubrication chart will show a point on the chassis which requires attention, and indications will be given of how frequently the different points should be lubricated. Some charts are made out on a time basis, that is, say certain points are indicated as requiring lubrication every week, others every month, and so on, and while this may be satisfactory if the car is in constant use, it is not quite so convenient as a chart made out on a mileage basis, if the car is not used regularly. For example, a car might not be used on only one week and it would obviously be unnecessary to go over the various points requiring weekly lubrication. On the other hand, during a holiday tour the car might cover 1,000 miles in a week, and it would then be advantageous to go over the various points requiring weekly attention.

tion of the grease gun twice during the seven days. Many of the charts are prepared on the basis of a weekly mileage of 500, and if a good plan to convert a time-based chart to this it can be used on a mileage basis.

#### Lubricating the Steering.

It may seem an extraordinary statement to make, but I think one of the best things a beginner can do is to forget to lubricate the various steering joints, for the resultant stiffness, and the manner in which the stiffness disappears when the grease gun is applied, will bring home to him the importance of chassis lubrication. It is a good plan when greasing the steering pivots to jack up the front wheels so that the weight of the car is not transmitted through the steering pivots and such action to the wheels, for it will then be found somewhat easier to force grease into the bearings of the steering pivots. It is helpful to keep a simple log in which the distances covered can be recorded, and in this note should be made also of when the various chassis points were attended to, so that one can tell at a glance when next they are due for lubrication, according to the distance covered and not intervals of time.

#### Clearing Nipples.

Sometimes it will be found difficult, and even impossible to force lubrication through one or other of the grease gun nipples, and in such a case a pin should be used to clear the small hole in the nipple. If this is not sufficient to allow the grease to pass it may be useful to find that the nipple can be cleared by ensuring that the grease gun can be applied to it with the utmost force. As there is a resistance behind the nipple it will be found possible to clear it by a vigorous push on the grease gun.

#### Oil Versus Grease.

It is important to follow the manufacturer's recommendations as regards the lubricant to be used. If oil is specified for chassis lubrication then grease should not be

used, for in all probability it will not find its way through the small passages which are provided for the oil. Similarly, oil should not be used if grease is specified, or this will find its way too readily through the larger passages provided for the grease.

It is just as essential that one more important unit should receive the correct grade of oil or grease, and if a gear box or back axle is intended to be lubricated by oil serious damage may result if grease is used. Many modern gear boxes are, in fact, intended to be lubricated not even with gear oil, which is comparatively thick, but with the same grade of oil as is required by the engine.

I do not yet remember to have seen a lubrication chart on which attention is called to the tyres. True, the tyres do not actually require oil or grease, and, in fact, oil and grease have a very bad effect on rubber and should never be allowed to come in contact with it. At the same time tyres do dirty things require weekly attention. They wear if they are not kept well when they are correctly inflated.

#### Care of Tyres.

It is also a good plan to jack up each wheel in turn so that it may be turned round while one examines the condition of the car for flats and emulsion, or some other suitable small job, as otherwise they are likely to wear their way deeper into the cover and so eventually cause a puncture. #### Care of Battery.

It may not actually be necessary to inspect the battery weekly, but it most certainly should be inspected regularly. It is wise to start off by taking a look at it every week, especially when there are some new ones, so that if it is insufficient in any way one can be sure that it is sufficient

to look at it, say, every two or three weeks. The only attention it requires is topping up, by which it means the addition of distilled water to each cell to bring the level of the electrolyte about an inch above the top of the plates. On some cars which have no syringe to reach, so that the battery is always being charged when the engine is running, it will be necessary to top up fairly frequently. As evaporation is more rapid in warm weather than when it is cold, it will be necessary to top up more frequently during the summer.

Distilled water alone should be used for topping up, for water from the household supply contains small amounts of certain substances which will cause damage to the plates of the battery by chemical action. The distilled water should be kept in a glass bottle, and a metal funnel should not be used to pour the water into the cells. A glass or celluloid funnel should be used, or if nothing suitable is available then a funnel can be made by rolling up a sheet of clean white paper.

Keep the top of the battery clean and dry, and should any corrosion take place round either of the two terminal pillars carefully scrape this away and connect the plates to the pillars and terminals.—A. G. D. Casser, R.S., in "The Automobile."

# RUNNING WRINKLES.

## Hints and Tips on the Care of the Car.

### ROUTINE POINTS FOR ATTENTION.

No car, whether a new one costing \$5,000, or a second-hand one costing less than \$100, will continue to run satisfactorily unless its motorist is certain of the correct attention. New owners are sometimes apt to think, or rather they take it for granted, that all they have to do is to keep the engine supplied with oil and, of course, petrol and water. There are, however, two other important things which require a certain amount of demand: adequate lubrication, while on the chassis itself there are several points which must be oiled regularly if the car is to be comfortable to drive or ride in, and if premature repair bills are to be avoided.

With every new car the proud owner will receive a number of handbooks dealing with the car itself, the electrical equipment, the carburettor, the tyres, and so on, and he should take an early opportunity to read through them and to assimilate that knowledge which is most likely to be useful, making a mental note of many other points, so that he can refer to them when necessary.

#### Use the Lubrication Chart.

With this literature there will probably be a lubrication chart, and this should be mounted on the wall of the motor house, so that it is available for instant consultation. This lubrication chart, on the chassis which needs attention, and indications will be given of the frequency with which the different points should be lubricated. Some charts are made out on a time basis, that is say certain points are indicated as requiring lubrication every week, others every month, and so on, and this may be satisfactory if the car is in constant use, it is not quite so convenient as a chart made out on a mileage basis if the car is not used regularly. For example, a car might not be used at all every week, and it would obviously be unnecessary to go over the various points, requiring weekly lubrication. On the other hand, during a holiday tour the car might cover 1,000 miles in a week, and it would then be disadvantageous to go over the various points requiring weekly application.

tion of the grease gun twice during the seven days. Many of the charts are prepared on the basis of a weekly mileage of 300, and it is a good plan to convert a time-based chart so that it can be used on a mileage basis.

#### Lubricating the Steering.

It may seem an extraordinary statement to make, but I think one of the best things a beginner can do is to forget to lubricate the various steering points, for the resultant stiffness, and the manner in which the stiffness disappears when the grease gun is applied, will bring home to him the importance of steering of chassis lubrication. It is a good plan when greasing the steering pivots to jack up the front wheels so that the weight of the car is not transmitted through the steering pivots and stub axles to the wheels, for it will then be found somewhat easier to force grease into the bearings of the steering pivots. It is helpful to keep a simple log in which the distances covered can be recorded, and in this order should be made showing when the various chassis points were attended to, so that one can tell at a glance when next they are due for lubrication, according to the distance covered and not intervals of time.

#### Clearing Nipples.

Sometimes it will be found difficult, and even impossible, to force lubricant through one or other of the grease gun nipples, and in such a case a pin should be used to clear the small hole in the nipple. If this is not sufficient to allow the grease to pass it may usually be found that the nipple can be cleared by removing it and by holding it in a vice so that the grease gun can be applied to it with the utmost force. As there is no resistance behind the nipple it will be found possible to clear it by a vigorous push on the grease gun.

#### Oil Versus Grease.

It is important to follow the manufacturer's recommendations as regards the lubricant to be used. If it is specified for chassis lubrication then grease should not be used, for in all probability it will not find its way through the small passages which are provided for the oil. Similarly, oil should not be used if grease is specified, for the oil will find its way too readily through the larger passages and be wasted for the grease.

It is just as essential that no more important point should receive the correct grade of oil or grease, and if a gear box or back axle is intended to be lubricated by oil various dangers may result if grease is substituted. Many modern gear boxes are fitted, but tend to be lubricated not even with gear oil which is comparatively thick, but with the same grade of oil as is required by the engine.

I do not yet remember to have seen a lubrication chart on which attention is called to the tyres. True the tyres do not actually require oil or grease, and in fact oil and grease have a very bad effect on rubber and should never be allowed to come in contact with it. At the same time tyres do definitely require weekly attention. Every week they should be tested with a pressure gauge to see that they are correctly inflated.

#### Care of Tyres.

It is also a good plan to jack up each wheel in turn so that it may be turned round while one examines the tread of the cover for signs of wear. The tread should be removed with the aid of a small screw-driver, or some other suitable small tool, as otherwise they are likely to wear their way deeper into a groove, and so eventually cause a puncture. If one habitually runs on smooth main roads there should be sufficient to give the tyre this attention, say, once every two weeks, but if any rough country roads are traversed a surprising number of times can be picked up in a week.

#### Care of Battery.

It may not actually be necessary to inspect the battery weekly, but it most certainly should be inspected regularly. It is wise to start off by taking a look at it every week, and experience will soon show tell one if it suffices.

to look at it every, every two or three weeks. The only attention it requires is topping up, by which is meant the addition of distilled water to each cell, to bring the level of the electrolyte about 1/2 inch above the top of the plates. On some cars which have to dynamo switch, so that the battery is always being recharged when the engine is running, it will be necessary to top up fairly frequently, its evaporation is more rapid in warm weather than when it is cold. It will be necessary to top up more frequently during the summer.

Distilled water alone should be used for topping up, for water from the household supply contains small amounts of certain substances which will cause damage to the plates of the battery by chemical action. The distilled water should be kept in a glass bottle, and a metal funnel should not be used to pour the water into the cells. A glass or enameled funnel should be used, or if nothing available is available than a funnel can be made by rolling up a sheet of clean white paper.

Keep the top of the battery clean and dry, and should any corrosion take place round either of the two terminal pillars generally scrape this away and smear vasoline all over the pillars and terminals—(A. G. D. Class B. S.S., in "The Autocar").

**Land Transactions.**

When a Select Committee of the Legislative Council considered the first Supplementary Bill of the year a few days ago, the members put forward a request to Government which was answered with alacrity and completeness. The request and the terms of the answer are worthy of more than casual notice. In the course of a somewhat long session when many subjects of general interest arise and hold the attention of the floor in debate, little attention is apt to be given to matters of equal importance which appear, usually as it were, in the midst of a mass of minor detail and give rise to no comment either in the House or outside. In the present instance, we refer to the request made by the Elected Members in Select Committee that Government should regularly publish details of land transactions pending and completed. His Excellency the Acting Governor has undertaken to do so. He has given instructions that details of land transactions pending and completed will appear quarterly in the "Official Gazette". The Colony will avail itself of the form in which the information will be provided. The reductions made in past years upon some aspects of the land policy of this country and the constant erosion of which the Government has been guilty, give a special importance to the new pledge. We imagine that for many obvious reasons, Government will realize the wisdom of providing information of a type and of a completeness likely to discourage inconsequential and legitimate questioning. The country has not yet forgotten how one of the most plaguey was kept. After long centuries of misgovernment, a few years ago, permission to provide an Annual Report from the

**Capo-Oiro Walkers.**

A letter has been received in Nairobi from Ronald Mungai and J. Hamer Wilson, the Capo to Capo walkers who spent a few days in Nairobi about three weeks ago before embarking on the Nairobi-Cape stage at their walk. On June 19, Mungai and Wilson with a party of porters, left Meru for Meru where they intend to raise ten cents for the transport of their pack. From Meru, their route will be by way of the high-altitude of Lake Rudolf and Lodwar in Thuria. Provision is being made to help them make their way north by the Eastern Desert.

**Kikuyu Association.**

The Kikuyu Central Association has presented to the Native Affairs Department and to the P.C. Nyeri, D.C. Kiambu and D.C. Elburg Hill, the original proposal of Government to provide "representative bodies" of the tribe to meet for the discussion of tribal interests. The Association also expresses the view that the Kikuyu people should be formed into a single unit and not divided into districts. Two petitions are made in which the land question figures. One refers to alleged alienation of native land by Government to a Mission at Meru and the other concerns a protest against the destruction of land crops by the Public Works Department resulting from the construction of an unsewered drainage system. It is urged that the Native Affairs Department should report and advise the Government on the matter and that the matter be referred to a committee of the House of Representatives.

**How to Use Them.**

Most women who keep houses are puzzled to know what to do with odd scraps of cheese. Here are some recipes which may help.

**Cheese Toast** Take three ounces of the scraps, fry them in a pan and mortar adding if very dry, a few drops of salad oil. When the cheese is reduced to a paste, add a teaspoonful of mustard, half a teaspoonful of tarragon vinegar, a pinch of cayenne, and a teaspoonful of salt oil or cream. Have ready some pieces of toast, spread the mixture rather thickly over these, sprinkle with sliced paprika and serve.

spoonful of butter, stir in one heaping tablespoonful of flour, and, when smooth, add half a cup of milk, half a teaspoonful of salt, and a pinch of cayenne pepper. Cook for two minutes. Add the yolks of two eggs, well beaten, and one cupful of macaroni. Grated from the oven, remove from the stove and let the mixture become moderately cool; then add the stiffly-beaten whites of the eggs, place the dish in a hot water bath, and bake for about thirty minutes. Serve immediately.

**Cheese With Potatoes** Take 1 lb. of cold, boiled potatoes; 1 gill of white sauce; 2 ounces of cheese, grated from left-over scraps; a pinch each of salt, pepper and paprika; a few bread-crumbs and a little butter. Cut the potatoes into dice and place in a well-greased casserole dish. Sprinkle over a little of the cheese; then pour in the sauce which has been carefully seasoned. Add the remainder of the cheese, sprinkle a few bread-crumbs over all, and put a few tiny pieces of margarine on top. Bake in a hot oven to brown the surface, and serve in the same dish.

### MR. BALDWIN ON JOURNALISM.

### A Warning From History.

### SIR J. BARKER'S "THEATRE."

Mr. Baldwin and Mr. James Barker provided the principal speeches at the 68th anniversary dinner in London of the Newspaper Press Fund. Both were in very good form.

Mr. Baldwin proposed the toast of "Journalism," remarking that he did not know why he had been chosen to be the speaker on this occasion of the subject. Until he was 50 he never knew a journalist at all, except his cousin Kipling, who left that great profession early, being assisted by his proprietor that in no circumstances in any vocation should he ever hope to earn more than £600 a year.

"Conceive with what pleasure I come here," said Mr. Baldwin later. "If I am able to draw on my overcoat to help your head I am helping Mr. Lloyd George, and I should make it possible for him to have a little brooch with his name on it, should feel that I have not lived in vain."

The Power of the Press. In more serious mood Mr. Baldwin considered what journalism was what it ought to be, and what Cyril's sarcastic reference to the profession. "Journalists are now the true kings and clergy of the modern world, unless they are fools, most write up of Bourbons, dynasties, and Tudors and Hapsburgs, but of stamped blood, and quite new successive names, according as this or the other able editor, or combination of the able editors, gets the world's eye."

And as a contrast he drew attention to the Duke of Albany's successful statement: "We representatives of mere private aims and private ambitions, but that you constitute a body of public functionaries on the most important of the State, being as it were the unincorporated servants of the whole progress and civilization of mankind."

Between these two extremes Mr. Baldwin decided to take the middle course, but he warned his audience to beware of "Flood's" soulless theory to journalists. Flood's soulless theory that they inherited the old copies of the Church to control, instead, to discipline. "Barker

you take that upon yourselves remember," said Mr. Baldwin. "This is not your job. You are called in controlling or disciplining the English people, and those who have tried to stop all come to an untimely end—O'Connell, Keble and the Church, and so on. The Press is not the Church."

This Age of Publicity. Dealing with publicity (which, "whether you like it or not is going on because it answers the very deepest need of human nature"). Mr. Baldwin remarked that it was very plain that "the alphabet's press" had suffered from its own insatiable curiosity, and it was a question whether there would be any privacy left in this country by and by—except the privacy that attached itself to those who were fortunate enough to belong to the Press.

Shakespeare and Shoozers. Sir James Barker as usual was jocular and whimsical. He began by saying that his one desire that night was to be nice to Mr. Baldwin. It was not his fault that he was a Worcestershire man. After all, Shakespeare was very near being a Worcestershire man, but his mother slipped across into Warwickshire to give the boy a chance. This reference to a well-known thought of what he would have done if he had come to London nowdays ("if you please," said Sir James, "he would have become a journalist.") You know I don't think he would have written plays; he would have turned them into novels, thrillers for which Mr. Baldwin, and perhaps most of us, admit a dark predilection.

"Hamlet, if written in these days, would probably be called 'The Strange Affair of Elsinore.' How hard on me to have to make a speech when I know that the Prime Minister would far rather tell his own detective story."

The Plot Thickens. "As that moment the telephone bell rang," said Mr. James, "using his wine glass as a receiver." "Hello, hello, hello, yes I'm here, I'm speaking. Who are you?" "It's Scotland Yard. The Yard asks you as a favour, ladies and gentlemen, to wipe your glasses, as the waters are plain clothes men taking finger prints."

Empire Films. "STANDARD CORRESPONDENT." London (By mail). Under the auspices of the Dominion Film Company four talking films of the Empire were shown at the Dominion Theatre. The first, a film taken in Australia and will be called "The Trail of the Southern Cross." It will recreate the glories of Australia's past and will deal with the cross-country trek of Burke and Miles, and the gold-rush days of Hildreit, Deedig and Gold. Meanwhile another talking film will be under way in Canada recasting Wolfe's storming of the Heights of Abraham; and then developing the romance of the lumber trade.

Having had his little job at Mr. Baldwin's expense Sir James proceeded to add another chapter to the history of his journalistic beginnings. His only noteworthy discovery was a document he declared was that he himself had not mind but that he could enter for the space of a column into the minds of other people. "In my multitudinous articles," he said, "I assumed characters, varied as the characters in which I got most of them back. My regular characters as a rule, I can still recall the dispensary I was never—I have been a member of the House of Commons and a policeman at the dock; see my article about how I was looked up in the Clock Tower. I was vicar of all sorts and as many more as I please. I have been the last blacksmith at Greta Green, and down and his shop, and my dog and my dog's puppies did not grow on my legs. I could have filled an uncounted number of 'Who's Who,' if you can conceive such a work. I was even over kind of lady. I suppose I am now looking upon the first woman journalist."

ISLAND WEATHER. "STANDARD CORRESPONDENT." Melbourne, June 2. The weather is again wet and uninteresting. In fact, the thermometer yesterday registered only what is quite good going for Melbourne. Very heavy squalls of rain sweep across the island and there is every evidence of further storms in the offing.
