MR. BALDWIN ON JOURNALISM.

A Warning From History.

SIR J. BARRIE'S "VINDICATION"

Mr. Baldwin and Sir James Barrie provided the principal speeches at the 60th anniversary dinner in London of the Newspaper Press Fund. Both were in very good form.

Mr. Baldwin proposed the toast of "Journalism," remarking that he did not know why he had been chosen because he was very ignorant of the subject. Until he was 60 he never knew a journalist.

"Conceive with what pleasure I come here," said Mr. Baldwin later. "If I saw how you draw on me by helping Mr. Lloyd George, and I should make it impossible for him to have a little moment with his supper, I should feel that I was not living in vain."

The Power of the Press.

In more serious mood Mr. Baldwin considered what journalism had become. "I have spoken of the journalist as a man who is paid to write for the public, and I should make it impossible for him to have a little moment with his supper, I should feel that I was not living in vain."

And as a contrast he drew attention to the Duke of Albany's 80-year-old statement: "We representatives of more private lives and private ambitions but that you constitute a body of public functionaries no less important than any of the established departments of the State, being as it were the unrecorded servants of the whole progress and civilization of mankind."

Between these two extremes Mr. Baldwin decided to take the middle course, but he warned his audience to beware of "Pringle's complacency to journalism. Pringle told them they inherited the old power of the Church to control, to punish, to discipline. "Pringle

you take that upon yourselves... Mr. Baldwin said Mr. Baldwin "that no one has ever yet succeeded in controlling or disciplining the English press, and those who have tried have come to an untimely end—Cromwell's barons and the Church and the State were the Press is not the fourth."

This Age of Publicity. Dealing with publicity (which "whether you like it or not is going on because it answers the very clearest need of human nature").

"I will give you an example," he added. "There was a young couple who ran away from home. They then saw indications that they desired privacy. But what do I read in my evening newspapers? 'I have succeeded in tracing them. I found them in an hotel on the shores of Lake Walden.' All I say is 'God help them!'"

This reference to the used induced thoughts of what he would have done if he had come to London nowadays. "I suppose," said Sir James, "he would have become a journalist. You know I don't think he would have written plays; he would have turned them into novel thrillers for which Mr. Baldwin, and perhaps most of us within a dark veil."

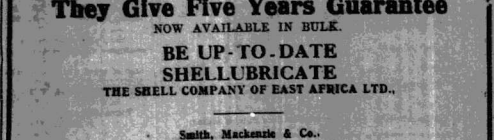

**EAST AFRICAN RECIPES.**

**Wholesome Puddings for Lunch.**

Now that the cooler weather has arrived, the home cook will do well to seize the opportunity for introducing variety into the daily menu, for the heavier type of pudding which would remain untouched in the hot weather will be appreciated on chilly days. Many people imagine that steamed rice puddings are difficult to make, but when once a native cook, with only a little intelligence, has been clearly shown what to do, he should be able to make every variety with no further trouble.

**STEAMED PUDDING.**

Put chop finely four ounces of meat, removing the skin and dropping well with flour during the chopping process. Beef suet is lighter and richer than mutton suet, and has no disagreeable flavour. In a basin mix the chopped meat with two small breakfast-cupful of flour, one and a half teaspoonful of baking powder, a good pinch of salt, and enough water to make a rather stiff paste. Put the mixture into a well greased basin which it should only three quarters full. Grease two pieces of stout paper on both sides and cover the basin securely. A basin with the sides secured upwards is the most convenient and a length of strong string or wide tape wound round round and tied is better than string for fastening down. The grease paper, if there is the smallest puncture in the paper covers the pudding will be spoiled. Place the basin in a saucepan containing enough boiling water to come half way up the side of the basin, and steam for about two hours. Serve with jam, treacle, or a suitable sweet sauce.

When once this pudding has been made successfully, many variations can be introduced. Use half the above ingredients. Half out the paste lightly and with it line a well greased basin, putting extra ingredients paste to form a lid. Fill the lined basin with mince, suet and sago, apples, walberries, apricots or any other

suitable fruit. Add sugar to taste, and two tablespoonful of water. Put on the paste lid, wetting the edges to seal the joints securely. Cover with greased papers and steam for one and a half hours.

**TRACLE PUDDING.**

Use the same quantities of ingredients as for the Fruit Pudding, but when lining the basin put aside enough paste for three lbs. Instead of the fruit, pour a layer of golden syrup into the lined basin, and sprinkle thickly with white breadcrumbs. If the pudding is liked add a thin layer of grated lemon rind. Cover with paste, joining the edges to the paste lining of the basin. Pour in more syrup, and lemon rind, and add another layer of paste. Repeat until the basin is full. Cover with greased papers and steam for an hour and a half.

**GINGER PUDDING.**

Use the same quantities as for the simple steamed pudding, and add a level teaspoonful of ground ginger, three tablespoonful of milk, and five or six good tablespoonful of golden syrup. Steam for two hours.

**DATE PUDDING.**

Add four ounces of stoned and chopped dates to the steamed pudding mixture.

**RAISIN PUDDING.**

Add four ounces of cleaned and picked raisins to the steamed pudding mixture, and for a change turn the mixture into a well greased cloth and bake gently for two and a half hours. Leave to cool for a minute before turning out of the cloth.

**BANANA PUDDING.**

Mix four ounces of finely chopped suet with two tablespoonful of sugar, six bananas cut in thin slices, a breakfast-cupful of minced meat and a breakfast-cupful of boiling milk. Allow to stand for an hour and a half or two hours, if at all stiff, a little more milk. Beat all well together. Pour into a basin and steam for one hour.

**THE SHOPKEEPERS OF MIWANI.**

**Difficulties of Notice to Quit.**

**OFFICIAL EXPLANATION.**

**\*STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.**

Miwani, June 20. A position has arisen here that may or may not be peculiar to Kenya Colony, or may have been duplicated in other places and in the publications it will certainly be of interest to those who may be acting in ignorance or contemptible disregard of a similar state of affairs.

When the sugar mill was built and scores of Europeans, Indians and hundreds of natives arrived on the scene it was inevitable that disputes would follow "saga" where trade was to be done, then the trader will go. For five years at least shopkeepers have been allowed to put up buildings on private shambas but in defiance (through ignorance probably) of the law, and during this time the Government has taken these trade licences out and granted them without pointing out that they were living on land under High conditions. Even this year's licence has been paid despite the fact that last year Government officers visited the shamba and gave the occupants notice that they were in the wrong and would probably have to go out.

**Proposed Return.**

Now Government wish to refund the amount paid for these trading licences for the year and give the occupants three months notice to quit without providing a certificate of Miwani where they can register their claims. I believe the explanation is that the only land available in the Company's or native reserve. These shambas have a good connection with the European, Indian and native employees on the Company's estate, and the surrounding farmers of cane and it is necessary there should be a date or two available if the convenience of the inhabitants is to be studied. It seems hard that these shambas have been allowed to grow up and trade for years, and then to be told to move on. The Government have been pleased to accept their licence money so that it seems as if the amount at least might determine a Kiwari township where the date owners can start with a

degree of civilization. They trading shambas and know that they are living under shabby conditions. It is a pity that in the district a shop, it used to be native people would be a loss, but that the native shopkeepers buy lately it would be a hardship to have to go right to one mile and their position, when in every other locality will work with the necessary dukas available. Europeans do not buy much more in the dukas as a loss for those who run short of essentials, and will not buy more than they need. There are six dukas on one farm and six on another so it will be seen that there is certainly a trade. Moreover these dukas are stocked for the fishing from six to twelve months in advance, and how frequently the stock of the impulse is found it may mean a real loss on top of it all by having to sell cheaply to clear stock.

\*Explanations from the Department of Local Government, Lands and Surveys reveal that the statements made in the foregoing article are substantially correct. The existing law on the Public Health Division of Land Ordinance, 1910 which specifies that no land shall be subdivided into lots of less than 30 acres without the permission of the Public Health Board. This Ordinance superseded the Public Health (Building) Ordinance of 1913, in which the subdivisions of land was restricted to three acres. In the instance referred to in the foregoing article the construction of the Ordinance is of some years' standing. The land has been granted for agricultural use only and is owned by Indians. It retains the property of the Sugar Company. It would be possible for the dukas owners to make application for a suitable site for a subdivision of land and such application would be considered by the Division of Lands. It is probable that the Government will acquire land at this place for a township although the Company would not cede a portion of their land over the station for the purpose of a township, and this could then be declared as such by Government. The reason for the demolition of the premises in the present case is their insanitary condition.

**BIRTH RATE OF THE WHITE RHINO.**

In terms said, if the risk of serious permanent injury to the rhino is to be avoided.  
**Notes.**  
The white rhino is evidently unable to black out in one important respect. "All the white rhinos encountered in West India were exceptionally peaceful and tame," declares Capt. Prater. "This was most gratifying as previously Capt. Neilson had reported that some of the rhinos were nervous and timidly of the animals, presumably due to their frequent hunting. Capt. Neilson, I fancy, habitually reached exactly opposite quarters with all the animals he had under observation, and it was once as close as ten feet. In no single instance did an animal exhibit aggressive tendencies either towards him or myself, although they often knew that we were within a few yards of them, and watched us with interest. In fact at times inquisitive specimens would advance so close that it became impossible to turn them."  
The Game Warden declares that there appears to have been a marked decrease in the numbers of white rhino since the 1920 census when the total was reckoned to be 150. Animals known to have been killed since that year, as represented by "found" horns numbered 187, "an unpleasant total," the Game Warden adds, "representing one third of the 1920 census and would at first appear to be a staggering blow but the normal natural increase for the various years must also be taken into account."

**COFFEE PRODUCTION IN THE EMPIRE.**

**East Africa's Growing Contribution.**

Coffee production within the Empire, which is mainly carried out in East Africa, and British East Africa, showed a steady increase during 1920, and although Brazil still leads the world in coffee crop, still provides the bulk of the world's supply. Empire coffees, which are graded as "mild coffees," find increasing favour (says a contributor to the Trade and Engineering Supplement of "The Times").  
The record for the last crop season shows a total world production of some 30,000,000 bags of which 27,500,000 were Brazilian, and 6,000,000 were "mild coffees." Of this last total, the British Empire supplied about 225,000 bags; hence there is considerable scope for the extension of coffee growing in the Empire. Everywhere points to the fact that Empire coffees have a good commercial future before them.  
India is the largest Empire producer, the native-grown coffee going largely to France, while the plantation coffee finds its market in Great Britain. For the year ended April 1, 1920, the total exports, which were mainly from Madras, amounted to 270,700 cwt., as compared with 150,000 cwt. in 1917, and some 300,000 cwt. in 1920. Indian coffee has a high reputation on the London market, but the Empire's coffee for which there is the keenest competition is the Blue Mountain coffee from Jamaica. By common consent this coffee, of which there is only a limited annual supply, is sold at a price which is the highest of any coffee, and last year some 2,000 barrels of 11 cwt. to 2 cwt. were produced. Jamaica's total exports of coffee, Blue Mountain and other, were slightly less for 1920, at 78,200 cwt. than for the preceding year, when 80,110 cwt. were exported. Trinidad's production, however, increased by about 50 per cent. last year, the total amount exported being some 278 cwt. British Guiana, which exported 7,201 cwt. during the year, may be expected to increase its production when the new agricultural policy has had time to show results.

must also take place in East Africa. The word "talkie" means something more than a reproduction of the human voice. It must be remembered that the coffee industry in British East Africa is young, the first exportable quantities reaching this country only just before the War. A great impetus might be given to this young industry if only British consumers could be induced to drink more coffee. An advertising campaign appears to be needed to bring the fine qualities of Empire coffee to the notice of the British consumer. The principal drawback to greater consumption is that so few people know how to make coffee, the weak, tepid concoction usually served up being unworthy of the fine qualities of the Empire-grown Good coffee is usually obtainable in both France and the United States, and the extension of British consumers in its proper preparation should not prove an insuperable difficulty.

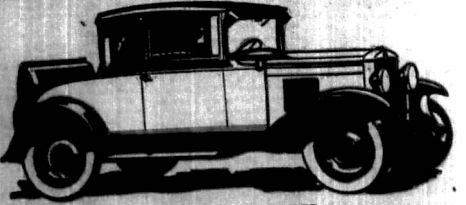

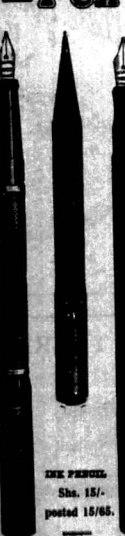



**AGRICULTURE. NATIVE AGRICULTURE. Methods of Promoting Progress in the Reserves.**

The section of the Report of the Department of Agriculture for 1926 which deals with the work made in the Native Reserves is of unusual interest. The suggestion that agriculture should be used over the Reserves by District Officers and Agricultural Officers for the purpose of determining the extent and position of grazing areas, and the quantity of cultivation is a new one.

Inter alia, the Deputy Director of Agriculture (Mr. E. Harrison), in whose charge this section of the Department's activities fall, states:

The housing of Departmental Officers in Native areas leaves very much to be desired. An officer who spends a great deal of time on safari needs comfortable and healthy accommodation at his station.

The Department maintains two Schools of Instruction in order that trained Native Landowners may be available for its own demonstration work as well as for Local Native Council officers and for Mission Schools at which gardening is taught.

The Department maintains 100 Demonstration plots throughout the reserves. The tendency was to increase the number and to increase the size in order that more sophisticated seed will be available for use. In addition, a new method of management will be a testimony to the care which the Department will in effect maintain a perpetual sowing machine for the purpose of disseminating seed and grain cultivation. Native seed and other stores in reserves is still in an unsatisfactory condition.

Leaves of seeds and plants are being made of the two Schools and poultry houses are increasing mainly to the extension of poultry breeding at the Scott Laboratories.

**Increasing Interest.**

Seed is purchased by the Department in large quantities where it is desired to improve seed stocks and to demonstrate the value of mass issues of good seed. Local Native Councils are now more largely interested in good seed issues and relatively large sums are being raised by these Councils for the purchase of seed for their particular district. In Central Kavirondo, Local Native Councils are providing money for instruction. Native people are purchasing numbers of Rhoda Red Bed cocklers and are themselves carrying out the operation of cultivating coconuts. There is a growing demand for Rhoda Red Bed, a seed whose introduction it is believed everywhere has been uniformly successful. It is strongly recommended that no other variety be introduced into native reserves in any quantity until the experience of a comparatively small sum of money annually for this class of live stock has been a most potent demonstration of the value and effect of good seed in native flocks.

Inferences are being drawn by natives and are from the desire to improve the other kinds of stock will become more manifest. A large trade should eventually arise in all kinds of improved stock—sheep, goats, cattle and poultry, and, it is possible to conceive that within a few seasons a very large trade is to be developed. The principal steps to be taken to breed the quantities necessary to meet this demand are to increase the number of purebred Persian Rams and Ewes were imported and are to be used in breeding and flock improvement. Instructions were issued to Officers to give demonstrations wherever possible on the shade drying of hides and a large number have been given.

**Cultivation.**

Cultivation on much larger scale than heretofore can readily be observed. We estimate that in South Nyeri and Fort Hall the increase in cultivation in one year is perhaps 20 per cent. One might have imagined the great value of the operation in revealing the extent of cultivation in a country which is so broken into ridges, that it may not be properly overlooked from high points. If only because an aeroplane flight over a Reserve gives a conception of its extent, the position of the grazing areas, trees, the density of cultivation, and the extent of flights should, it is thought, be regularly taken by District Officers and Agricultural Officers. There are other things which may be observed but the most important are, it is considered, sufficient to justify the effort which is being made to increase the area of cultivation, but only after careful trial in the experimental plots in the position of the seed, rates and other crops should be made particularly from Florida.

**Planting.**

Native people are much more readily taking to ploughing. In Central Kavirondo, where ploughing contingents have been one of the features of the Native Shows, there is a steady demand for ploughing. In Fort Hall the Local Native Council is doing excellent work in introducing these implements. So many factors influence these advances that it is a testimony to the care which the Department has taken to ensure that one would wish to mention the unsatisfactory condition of many Administrative Officers in connection with the introduction into reserves of native oxen and incidentally cultivation extending agriculture.

The time is coming when the Native Reserves will be looked upon in part as native reserves rather than as areas of occupation. It is recognized in Africa but so well recognized elsewhere, that native people vary greatly in capacity and industry. This Colony does not produce natives of the type met with in Uganda, Zululand, the West Coast, our people are far less advanced. However, native people are developing rapidly and the methods of contact with modern methods are being rapidly adopted. It is revealed in the coming generation the steps they inhabit should be developed rapidly but as a mass the people are neither wealthy enough nor sufficiently interested in the development of their reserves.

**Irrigation.**

More attention should be paid to the development of irrigation, particularly in the arid areas, and the head works and main furrows should be improved.

Each migrant, no matter what may be his reason for leaving these shores, carries with him the torch of our national civilization and culture and the continued migration of man and woman of our race is desirable if the development of our open spaces is to be carried on successfully. (Cheers.)

The nation is today in many advantages prospered with the lot of the settler of the past. He is no longer alone in the face of great difficulties. Throughout the Empire he will meet friends of his own race and will be inspired by the achievements of those who have gone before.

There are many ways in which a dispirited man can acquire himself, and it is likely to meet, and in this respect I feel none could do better than visit the great library of this society, which is a storehouse of the best literature of the Empire and is ready to unlock its treasures to all inquirers and students.

In this and indeed in every other aspect, the world-be pioneer of today is particularly fortunate. Almost any part of the British Empire offers great opportunities for the man who is ready to meet its principles of humanity and tolerance for which we as a nation have long distinguished. (Cheers.)

To the Chairman, The Committee of Legislative Council on the Daylight Saving Ordinance.

Sir—Now that Legislative Council has appointed a Committee to examine into the wisdom of the Colony with regard to the repeal or otherwise of the Ordinance, I am instructed to make known to the Public in general and the Committee in particular the earnest desire of the entire Catholic Mission in Kenya Colony that this Ordinance shall be repealed.

The observance of the Ordinance has been a serious inconvenience as regards the services in the Townships, such as Nairobi, Mombasa, Kisumu, and others...

As pointed out by me before the Ordinance has become an extremely unnecessary hardship on thousands of natives whose lives have been observed. It has obliged the native labourers and likewise numerous Italian workmen to rise at least an hour before sunrise in order to be in time at their work.

The Catholic Mission in particular for the purpose of the entire European Staff (over 2000) and at the same time on behalf of the Catholic Native population amounting to nearly 100,000. The Vice-Consul representing Native Interests, who supported the Ordinance, has to our knowledge never consulted the Catholic Natives and certainly did not obtain their "pro" verdict.

I have taken the liberty of communicating this letter to the Press.

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard". Sir—Amid the almost universal objections to the retention of the Daylight Saving Ordinance, the one—perhaps paramount—objection about the same is the damage to health, that on the score of health, especially in the case of children.

Most people must have noticed the epidemic of colds now afflicting the community, most colds and coughs. Upon consulting a doctor one of the first injunctions is not to go out too early in the raw and cold air now prevailing at early morning. Public attending office early and children attending school late to the school 7 a.m. which means nearly 6:30 a.m. To cold time is sharp and intense, which added to the custom here in Kenya of going about lightly clad undoubtedly is a fruitful cause of so much influenza, as it is commonly called. It is very bad for children and also for natives, who I find also suffering a good deal in town.

God's own time in Kenya is the right time, for it gives us some respite to the morning and sends us indoors when it gets chilly at evening. Getting up half an hour earlier with the young does not entail coming into the house earlier, but only the time outside, where the sun is still up at half past six and they lie to linger outside, where it is light especially after a hot mid day sun.

By all means let all legislators review this absurd experiment.

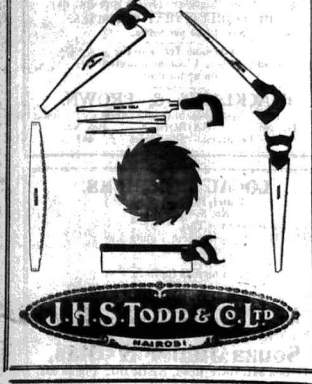

## COTTON GROWING IN THE CENTRE.

Influence of American Crops.

A TRAIL OF KNOWLEDGE.

In reviewing the progress of Empire cotton growing during the past year it is necessary to keep in view two main aspects of the question (writes Mr. John A. Todd in the British Empire Products Supplement of "The Times"). The first is that the development of Empire cotton growing depends primarily on the world cotton position, which is dominated by the American crop. Thus also very markedly progress during the years 1924-29 was largely due to the high price of cotton, which was the legacy of the three years 1921-23, when the American crop suffered very severely from the boll weevil.

In 1929-30 the whole position was changed by the bumper American crop, which brought prices down to pre-War levels and checked seed of the new Empire fields with exhaustion. Fortunately for the Empire, however, the position was again reversed by the comparative failure of the American crop in 1930, so that the effect on the Empire fields in that season was not so serious as had been anticipated. During the current season, 1930-31, the world position has not greatly changed, because the American crop made only a very partial recovery, and there is reason to hope that the total yield of the smaller Empire fields will again establish a record figure.

The second desideratum is the necessity of maintaining a due sense of proportion with regard to the total quantity of Empire supplies. From that point of view the Empire crops must be directed into two broad categories: (1) The new fields in all parts of the Empire, and (2) the once really large old-established cotton-growing areas in the Empire—namely, India. The essential fact is that apart from India, the total amount of cotton so far grown in all the new fields has not yet reached half a million bales, whereas what the world requires to offset the gap of the American crop is millions of bales. For, as recent experience has again proved, the amount of the American crop may vary as much as 5,000,000 bales from one year to the next, and to set against such huge fluctuations there is only the Indian crop. It is a fortunate co-incidence the fluctuations of the Indian crop in recent years have nearly always been in the opposite direction to those of the American crop, and this has had a really valuable

compensating effect on world supply. The smaller fields, as regards the world position, are encouraged by the fact that they are admittedly only at the beginning of their real development. Some of them are already playing quite an important part in the particular section of the cotton trade to which they belong, as for example the Sudan crop in the supply of Egyptian cotton and the Uganda crop in the supply of long staple American cotton. But their future growth is bound up with the question of the world price of cotton.

In a new cotton-growing country a good price is essential to encourage the pioneer to launch a scheme for large capital expenditure required for the cotton crop in the form of ginnettes, etc. apart from the far larger expenditure needed on transport and on some advanced irrigation schemes. In most of Africa transport is the major problem, and all that has been spent so far on the making of roads and railways, and the establishment of water communications on the lakes and navigable rivers, is but a drop in the bucket to what still must be spent before these African countries can be developed to their full capacity for cotton growing. But the distances of all these countries are in most cases extremely limited, and in some cases, especially Uganda and the Sudan, they border a sea, or are almost entirely on the price of cotton.

The hopeful feature of the situation is that all this capital expenditure remains in the form of permanent improvements which will yield large results in the future and in the long run these countries can and will grow cotton at a much lower cost of production, and in many cases of a higher quality, than the American crop. While, therefore, those talk about the Empire being able to supply its own needs in cotton is apt to mislead the outside world, it is more true to say that the realization of that consummation far too soon, yet the aspiration itself is a mere dream. It is quite clear now that the United States cannot be relied upon to maintain the steady increase in supplies which the world unquestionably requires. Consumption in recent years has shown that the world's potential capacity, as the world has now resumed the steady increase which characterized it before the War. The world wants now from 15,000,000 to 16,000,000 bales of American cotton every year and there is very little hope of getting it from the United States. The only countries such as Russia, China, Brazil, etc. and lately Argentina on a small scale, are doing a great deal to help to fill the gap, but there is an immense scope for expansion, especially as so many of the new Empire fields are producing cotton of superior quality.

The Sudan this year will see

likely establish a new record, and it is not unlikely that the relative increase in 1929 has marked falling off from the previous record of 1924. It is clear that the relative increase in the supply of Sakel cotton (the best of the Egyptian crop) the progress in the Sudan supply is most welcome, all the more so because the new crop seems to be of really outstanding quality. Uganda also shows a very encouraging recovery this year, and there is reason to hope that the final figure will exceed the previous record of 1924. Tanganyika is also making good progress, but it must be remembered that in this territory cotton growing is still in the infancy, for the Germans had virtually wiped out all the cotton in 1914.

Nyasaland and Rhodesia.

Other areas in Africa have proved rather disappointing, especially Nyasaland, where, such as tobacco, have proved formidable economic rivals to cotton, while insect pests and the uncertainty of the rainfall have made the crop largely unprofitable. In Nyasaland the development of cotton still awaits the completion of the essential link in the bridge over the Zambezi. In South Africa the position is complicated by the labour problem. In West Africa cotton growing has proved a real success only in Nigeria, but there the difficulty of finding a variety of cotton suited to local conditions while giving a heavy yield per acre, and the lack of indigenous types is still not quite solved. The low average yield per acre, the lack of consistent quality, and the necessity of devoting a large part of the land to the production of essential foodstuffs are still delaying the development of cotton growing for export on a large scale.

In Malaya progress has been made, but it is slow and there are many difficulties. In Australia, where cotton is practically a white man's crop, it is unfortunately doubtful whether any developments on a large scale can be hoped for. In the West Indies the importance of the crop, and its size, but by its quality, for these islands are now practically the only source of the world's supplies of the best Sea Island cotton, though other countries, especially the American possessions in the West Indies, are making great efforts to compete in this direction.

In India one very satisfactory feature of the position is the comparative steadiness which has characterized the crop figures in recent years. Twenty years ago the average yield could fluctuate from 50 to 60 to 62 to 63 in some two years. Now even in the worst years it has not fallen below 45 lb. an acre. During the current season the crop had a very abnormal mishap in the form of a severe frost, which seriously reduced the yield in the whole of the Gujerat district, this area, un-

THE WORLD'S TEA SUPPLIES.

British Empire's Huge Share.

INFORMING TRADE.

The world's production of tea during 1920 is estimated to have been in the neighbourhood of 800,000,000 lbs. Of this enormous quantity, which is approximately double the total for 1900, the British Empire through its two great producing countries, India and Ceylon, supplied some 600,000,000 lbs., or roughly 75 per cent. The total amount of tea imported into Great Britain last year was just under 510,000,000 lbs. or nearly 50 per cent. of the total production, and the amount actually consumed here was, in round figures, 424,000,000 lbs., which works out at some 91½ per cent. of the total supply available in the United Kingdom. The remainder is exported to the British Empire, the Continent, and other foreign countries.

The tea trade during the past two years has provided an interesting example of the interplay of supply and demand in the adjustment of prices, with all the advantages, so far as 1920 is concerned, on the side of the consumer. During 1920 and 1921 there was an infation of prices, which rose until North India, South India, and Ceylon, teas fetched respectively 1s 11½d. in 1914, 1s 10½d. and 1s 10½d. per lb. on the London market, these being the highest prices recorded during the tea trade, and tea companies did exceedingly well. Stocks of tea some eagerly to the market, with the result that, early in 1920, supply overhauled and then surpassed demand, with the inevitable further result that prices began to drop, and continued to do so, month by month, until the end of August last year. During the year the three teas already mentioned touched the following low levels:—North India, 2 1/2d.; South India, 1s 0 1/2d.; and Ceylon 1s 4 1/2d. per lb. For the full year it is estimated that the lower prices meant a drop in income to producers, for the tea sold on the London market of

some £2,000,000 to £4,000,000, the larger proportion of which was borne by Indian tea companies.

Reduction in Stocks.

Ordinary economic laws, however, again asserted themselves. Low prices meant favourable buying for consumers, and towards the end of 1920 stocks had been sufficiently lowered to give promise of an upward tendency, and the market opinion at the end of the year was that the trade was in a healthier condition than for some time past. Lower prices meant an increased use of Empire-grown teas for blending purposes, in place of teas from Java and Sumatra, and which noticeably larger quantities were imported by Great Britain during 1921 and 1922. Expert opinion is agreed that lower prices are also, all in favour of increased consumption in foreign markets of Empire produce. This point is important in view of the large amount of British capital invested in India and Ceylon in the tea industry, which gives employment to over a million natives as well as to many thousands of Europeans.

Of the 600,000,000 lbs. of tea produced last year by India and Ceylon, India's share was 594,000,000 lbs., of which 54,000,000 lbs. came from Southern India, where there are still large areas of land available for tea cultivation. The remaining 280,000,000 lbs. came from Ceylon, where production has increased so rapidly that there is now no further land available for tea-planting. Attention is therefore being directed towards more intensive cultivation of the plant which is the mainstay of Ceylon's prosperity.

It is only during the present century that Southern India has become an important tea-producer, due largely to the great attention that has been paid to the improvement of the quality of its product, and it is, perhaps, from this quarter that the latest future developments in tea-planting may be expected. Tea-growing is said to be developing in Malaya, where production per acre is reported to be heavy. Another tea-growing area of recent development is the Kuru Hills, in Burma, where tea from this district has already realized high prices on the London market when small growers have been offered, and the quality with improved manufacture would do it credit with good European tea. In British East Africa, Nyasaland excepted, production is still

in the experimental stage and confined to the supply of local demands. Remarkable progress has been made in the tea area in the Mlango Mountain district of Nyasaland; local needs for tea have been met for some time, and in the first six months of last year over 1,000,000 lbs. of tea were shipped to the London market. Production is showing a steady increase, and this year it is anticipated that some 3,000,000 lbs. will be exported. In Uganda progress is also being made, as also in Kenya, where on the high lands between the Great Rift Valley and the basin of the Victoria Nyanza it is estimated that some 800 square miles of land suitable for tea-planting are available.

The Entrepot Trade.

The export of tea from Great Britain on spite of the smaller quantities taken by Russia, showed an increase of some 4,000,000 lbs. in 1920 over the 1921 figure. Russia took 2,500,000 lbs. less, but imports of 2,000,000 lbs. to European countries, 4,000,000 lbs. to Canada and Newfoundland, and nearly 2,000,000 lbs. to other countries made up for the decline in Russian demand. The extra buying is attributed to the replenishment of stocks at the very low prices ruling during the greater part of last year. In the United States an additional factor was the vigorous campaign carried on by the Indian Tea Association in favour of tea-drinking.

Kakaba's New Home.

A BEAUTIFUL PALACE OF ENGLISH LINEN.

A magnificent palace has been built for the Kakaba, or King of Uganda. The palace is an artistically designed building, worked out in a free modern classic style, says the "Uganda Herald." The frontage is relieved by a wide verandah from which rise four massive pillars, supporting the main structure and the dome. There are, in addition to a central tower, artistically designed chimneys as essential features of the general design of the building, though they are unusual adjuncts to any building in Uganda. The chimneys, however, are not there wholly for decorative purposes, each of the front bedrooms having a fireplace. Of the spacious entrance hall, there is a large reception room on the right and a room of similar size, the dining room on the left. On this floor there is also a library and reading room, and a Council Chamber. Special attention has been given to this room which is a lofty chamber with a magnificent ceiling.

The first floor, with its bedrooms, dressing rooms and bath-rooms, is approached by a wide staircase.

**RUNNING IN THE NEW CAR.**

**The All Importance of the Early Life.**

**WHY CARE IS NECESSARY.**

Before an athlete enters on any feat of physical endurance he goes into strict training. If he did not he would stand very little chance of success and, furthermore, it is possible that he would subject his constitution to such a strain that it would suffer permanent ill-effects.

What have athletes to do with running in the new car, you ask? Simply that the new engine should be regarded as being "out of condition," so that it must go into training and get fit before it can be expected to develop its maximum power and speed.

All the many working surfaces, cylinder bores and pistons, valve guides and stems, tappets and bearings, big-end and side-bearing bearings, and camshaft bearings, are comparatively rough, although finished with great accuracy and smooth to the touch. So when the engine is running these new and comparatively rough surfaces give rise to a considerable amount of friction, with the result that the various parts become heated. This would the engine be run too fast, the friction and heat developed in the bearings may be too much for the lubrication system to deal with, so that the white metal lining of one of the bearings may actually wear.

**A Costly Experience.**

Should this happen the engine, and the car, are useless for the time being, until the engine has been taken to pieces and a new bearing fitted, a fairly costly repair which will not be covered by the guarantee, for the damage is due to bad driving.

While things may not come to this pass, the engine may "seize up," and become immovable for a time. This is due to the pistons becoming so hot that their expansion causes them to press so tightly against the cylinder bore that they jam together. Should this happen one can only wish until the engine has cooled down, meaning while taking out the sparking plugs of the engine free, or it may be done only with much difficulty. Little or no harm may be done, if the cylinder bores may be badly scored, the pistons and rings considerably damaged, and even the cylinder blocks slightly warped.

How can the possibility of one or other of these troubles be avoided? Quite simply, by the use of only common sense and restraint. Many new cars have on their windscreen a label stating that they should not be driven at more than 30 m.p.h. for the first 500 miles. The speed and distance figures may vary considerably, possibly not more than 25 or 30 m.p.h. will be specified for 500 miles, and then not more than 40 m.p.h. for another 500 miles. But whatever the makers' instructions are, they should be strictly adhered to.

**The Retaining Washer.**

These figures refer to the performance on top gear, and most drivers on the road gears must likewise be retained in proportion. Thus, with a three-speed car the equivalent of 20 m.p.h. on top will be about 12 m.p.h. on second, and about 8 m.p.h. on first.

On other cars a washer may be fitted in the inlet pipe to restrict the amount of mixture admitted to the cylinders, so automatically preventing the engine from being over-rich either on top or on the intermediate gears. The washer should not be removed until the speedometer shows the requisite mileage.

Apart from being careful not to drive the car too hard there are other precautions to be observed. Particularly should one make sure with a new car that the radiator is full of water and that there is plenty of oil in the crankcase. Obviously if the water in the radiator is allowed to get low the engine will not be cooled so efficiently as it should be. The amount of oil is equally important, for the oil not only reduces the friction in the bearings but helps to cool the engine by conveying heat from the pistons and cylinders to the crank case. Thus the dipstick should be examined before every run, and the level kept up to the maximum mark on it.

Provided then that the water and oil supplies are maintained, and the bearings are not over-heated, one may feel reasonably sure that the engine will cause no harm, but the careful driver who wishes to make the most of his car will nevertheless look frequently at the radiator thermometer, and stop while the engine cools down should it show a tendency to rise above normal.

So much for the engine, and the most important. The other major units, gear box and back axle, are not likely to give any trouble, for if the engine is not allowed to develop anything like its full power they will not be called upon to transmit it. It is

well, however, to inspect the brakes after the first few miles to see that they are not rubbing. Let the car come to rest without using the brakes, then dismount, and feel the brake drums. If one of them is hot then you may be sure that its shoes are in contact with it, and the adjustment for that particular brake should be slackened off slightly, say, half a turn. This trouble is most unlikely to be met, but if it occurs, it is not so serious as it may seem, for it has been known to happen, so it is just as well to satisfy yourself on this point.

At last that time will come when the first 500 miles may be slackened off, and probably the hand-book supplied with the car will state that the oil in the sump should be drained out and replaced by a fresh supply. That may seem wasteful, but to continue to run on the old oil would be a false economy, for it probably now contains particles of metal. Accordingly when the car comes in from the bottom of the sump, the oil will then be warm and will flow out easily into a receptacle placed to drain away. After the last drop has been removed, the plug should be secured, and pour in through the filler the necessary amount of fresh oil of a brand recommended by the makers.

Finally, do not imagine that the engine is now thoroughly run in, and that you can forthwith proceed to see what it will do. It is only partly run in, and although it is much more free than at first it should still be treated gently. Never forget that many an engine has been ruined in its first few hundred miles—(A. J. Clear, B.Sc. in "The Autocar").

**Pegasus and Mobiloil.**

An average of 50 m.p.h. over a course of more than 400 miles up to the performance of a new engine of J. S. machine, won the world's longest and most grueling race from Durban to Johannesburg. The performance was such as to break all previous records for this course. J. S. also on an A. J. S. finished second, and Coetsee (B.S.A.) and A. Long (Indian) fourth and fifth. **An Epic of the Kalahari.**

**TRIUMPH OF BRITISH PRODUCTS.**

One of the most notable feats ever accomplished by motors was that performed by a Government expedition, which set out from Malakye in British East Africa, to land to cross the great Kalahari desert, perhaps the worst in the African continent. A way across this arid waste land which could be taken by herds of cattle had to be found. Many attempts at exploration had been made but none succeeded until that of the summer of 1925, when, the expedition under Captain Clifford won through, the hazardous journey being accomplished by motor lorries. These were of the "Motor" type, specially prepared and loaded. They were equipped with tanks to hold 240 gallons of petrol, eight of engine oil, three of gear oil, and 150 gallons of water.

The story of that crossing forms a bright page in African history. Hardships were experienced, but a better transport service was established. In addition they had shown what British motor lorries could accomplish. Not only had the expedition taken part in a great adventure, but they had performed a notable service.

For the first time in history the 500 mile desert journey was completed, and the feat speaks volumes for the personnel and products used in its accomplishment. Mercedes, Buicks, and Spirit and Motor Oil were used.

**Chrysler Makes New High Record.**

The best first quarter business in the history was recently reported by Chrysler Motors for 1926 with total net profits of \$8,838,173 (U.S.). Current net profits and operating operations of Dodge Brothers and subsidiaries, Buicks, and Chrysler did not become a part of the Chrysler Corporation in the first quarter of 1926 a comparative basis for the same period has been taken into consideration. In showing earnings which are equal to \$2 (U. S. Currency) a share the company reports that earnings to dealers show an increase of 8.6. It is said that a gratifying increase in the volume of Chrysler's export business has helped materially in the report of increased earnings.

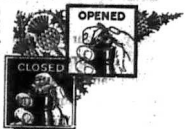

**AGRICULTURE IN UGANDA.**

**A Review of Last Year's Work.**

**PLANTERS' CONFERENCE.**

Some Possibilities of the Future.

**(STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.)**  
Kampala, June 21.

The sixteenth annual conference of the Uganda Planters' Association opened yesterday at 10.30 a.m., with the arrival of His Excellency the Governor Sir W. F. Gowers, K.C.M.G., at the Association's Chambers.

The Conference was largely attended, more than sixty people being present.

The proceedings opened with the following report on the year's working by the President (Mr. N. D. Allen):

"I have much pleasure in presenting to you the nineteenth Annual Report of the Uganda Planters' Association.

"I am departing somewhat from the precedent of my predecessors who, from year to year, write reports ever increasing in length until there is hardly a subject which they do not touch upon and I propose in this report only to include matters which directly concern planting.

"During the period covered by this report we have had five General Meetings, besides a Sub-Committee Meeting, to meet the Game Warden and joint meetings with the Chamber of Commerce first to meet the General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railway and secondly, to meet Sir Samuel Wilson. The attendance at all our meetings, I am glad to say, has been very satisfactory. I think that the most important subjects brought up for discussion during my term of office were:—The Formation of a Coffee Board; Cummulation of Land so as it affects the Planters; Housing of contract labour; Bindepest, and its control; Importation of foreign coffee for curing and re-shipment.

**The Coffee Board.**

Early last year the Governor requested the Provincial Commis-

sioner, Buganda, to form his Coffee Board. Its present constitution is an Advisory—Provincial Commission. Buganda, Chairman, with the following members:—District Commissioner, Mengo; Coffee Officer, Superintendent of Agricultural Education, Kampala; Two Natives nominated by H.H. The Kabaka with the approval of the Provincial Commissioner, Buganda, with the following:—Agricultural Department, as Secretary.

So far, the Board is still working on the subject of marketing and grading with a view to asking legislation for the compulsory grading of all Native Coffees. The Income Ordinance is also being studied with the object of the prevention of theft of produce. We hope that the Board will periodically interest itself in this matter.

Planters, it is hoped will take all possible precautions to see that drying grounds and places where coffee is stored are either adequately fenced with barbed wire or under lock and key. In the past this has all been very difficult but now we have reached a stage of better conditions and commodities such as barbed wire can be easily obtained. In this way we hope to put ourselves into a position in which the Government will be able to help those who help themselves.

During September last year, the Provincial Commissioner and the District Commissioner attended our meeting and settled the matter of the Cummulation of Land, so far as it concerned plantation labour.

**Housing of Contract Labour.**

A number of the Association's Department issued a pamphlet entitled "The Housing and Hygiene of African Natives on Plantations." Besides this, together with its covering letter, caused some considerable amount of trouble. In August, the Director of Labour kindly consented to meet the Planters and after some discussion the covering letter, the tone of contention was withdrawn and substituted by another letter dated December 14, which finally cleared up the matter and gave full satisfaction to all parties concerned.

It has been assured that I shall be signing the opinion of the members of this Association if I think the Director of Labour for the country he has shown in attending our meetings and through such matters as may have caused misunderstandings from time to time.

**Bindepest.**

An outbreak of Bindepest originating, it is believed, somewhere in the West into Long and Gulu Areas, and South-east of Lake Kyoga into Bugera, and then swept into Bursia, Bulemezi, Singo and Bugungu. It was found that the buffalo were the chief means of the rapid spread of this disease and it was decided that some control measures should be taken. Meetings were arranged with the Director of Veterinary Services and later, with the Game Warden. At these Meetings it was decided to attempt the destruction of the buffalo in certain areas and in the future the chances of the disease spreading South into Krugera.

We feel assured that the Veterinary Department have done everything that could be done to arrest the spread and it is hoped that their efforts will prevent the terrible disease from spreading into the densely stocked country of Gambia and so North to France and South into Angola.

I should like to thank the Director of Veterinary Services for attending our meetings and giving us all available information as to the spread of, and the measures being taken to control, this distressing outbreak which has at ready cost the country many thousands of pounds in the loss of its cattle. I should also like to thank the Game Warden for meeting us and co-operating in the destruction of buffalo. I hope after this season the buffalo will be exterminated from all districts where they are a continual source of danger to the Cattle Industry.

**A Coffee Problem.**

A number of the Association's members wishing to import coffee from across the Lake for curing and shipment, found that this was against the laws of the country and so applied to our Association for their support, pointing out the recent legislation in Kenya (owing to the very heavy crop, hand-picked ones presented more serious being sent to Mombasa) for direct shipment and accepted by the legislation but it is just possible that hand-picked coffee may result in the loss of coffee market being moved from Mombasa to Kampala.

The matter was referred to the Plant Food Board and at a Meeting held on March 19th, both the Mombasa and the Entomological give it as their opinion that permitted the Coffee to be brought in.

### DAYLIGHT SAVING.

THE resolution in the Legislative Council this month, Government proposed a large Committee to examine the working of the Daylight Saving legislation and to recommend alterations if any were advisable in the general interests of the Colony. When the measure was originally adopted, after a long struggle for support by its sponsor, the Member for Nairobi South, it rested upon the management given by such representative and influential public bodies as the Convention of Associations and the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce while many individuals declared themselves in favour of the experiment. Associations of farmers displayed a remarkable indifference to the question, and circulated their views by writing their views for consideration by a Committee of the Legislative Council, were largely ignored. After the measure had been adopted, it is not unusual in Kenya there was an outbreak of opposition. That opposition died down after the issue of a few weeks and as recently revived prior to the proposal by the Member for Plateau North that the Ordinance should be repealed. The Member for Nairobi South will address a public meeting this evening. His main subject will be the Road and Rail Traffic (Improvement) but there is little doubt that he will find an opportunity and encouragement for a discussion of daylight saving. We hope the meeting will be well attended. May we say at once that we are in favour of the principle of Ordinance. Like most measures only its opponents are sufficiently vocal to be noticed.

An unreserved incident took place immediately before the Premier began in the House, when Mr. Baldwin, the late Premier, rose from his seat on the Opposition Benches and set his hand to Mr. Ramsay MacDonald, the new Premier, as an expression of congratulation. Mr. MacDonald warmly responded and the members cheered as they walked together to the House of Lords to receive the King's message.

A TIME HONoured CUSTOM.

Members for Pembrokeshire and Lord High Cecil (Cons.), (Unit. Party), proposed and seconded the resolution of Captain E. A. Fitzroy, Conservative member for Daventry who succeeded Mr. Whiteley as Speaker. Both parties voted in favour of the proposal and the Speaker was elected.

His election was accepted unanimously and after the Premier, Mr. Baldwin and Mr. Lloyd George, as leaders of the three parties, had congratulated him, Mr. Gilliet and Lord Hugh Cecil, in accordance with the old custom, proceeded to kiss the Speaker on the cheek.

Tomorrow the Commons will be summoned to the Lords to hear the King's approval of their choice and the rest of the week will be occupied with the swearing in of members. Next Tuesday the Commons will begin with the reading of the King's Speech.

### Sentry's Disgrace.

#### LEFT HIS POST OUTSIDE BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

London, June 6.

#### A Big Event at Olympia.

#### MINISTRY'S HOPE.

#### (STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT.

London, June 6.

The International Air Exhibition which is to open at Olympia on July 10, will undoubtedly be the most important that has yet been held in the world. It will certainly be the most representative view as France, Italy, Germany and the United States are all to take part in addition to the country.

For the first time in nine years the public will have an opportunity of seeing the immense strides that have been made in aeronautics just recently. Standard machines capable of over 200 miles per hour and of view and the main exhibits will range from tiny one-seater flying machines to huge multi-seater passenger craft capable of holding more than 40 people. One sure sign of the general growth in the size of machines is the fact that the whole of the show will be greatly enlarged. Olympia will be required to accommodate the 75 machines on view.

#### More Than a Trade Show.

Every effort is being made by the Air Ministry to make the Exhibition something more than a Trade show alone and to secure an opportunity to bring the public into closer contact with a new branch of industry and transport. It is always being attempted to get the public to see the aircraft as they are, and the attempts are rewarded by much response. The public seems to dislike the air. It still thinks it is a dangerous place and that you can get to most places just as quickly by land or water. The public is right on the whole and it is very doubtful whether air travel will ever become really popular. But the fact that it has been perfected and we are able to stand vertically on our laws or roof.

### Topics for the Motorist.

## CUTTING DOWN RUNNING COSTS.

### Utilitarian Motoring Can Never Be Sufficiently Cheap.

#### REAL ECONOMY MUST BE PRACTISED.

Only a Chancellor of the Exchequer, wrestling with all the perplexities of a forthcoming Budget, can be so callous as to regard motoring as a luxury, and as in this year's Budget efforts were made to increase rather than reduce the heavy burden of taxation borne by motorists it is up to motorists themselves to be anxious to cut down their running costs. The actual difference reckoned in terms of 6 s. 4 d. between the cost of a man who motors extravagantly and one who motored wisely is not great, but there is no harm in acquiring wisely. On the contrary, there is a great deal of satisfaction to be obtained from the knowledge that one's car is giving it the best at the lowest possible cost.

Economy can, of course, be carried to extremes, but in giving the following advice the writer has purposely avoided going so far as this, and the views which he expresses are based on long experience. It is hoped, help to prevent a car being wasteful rather than miserly.

#### Unnecessary Standing Charges.

There are certain standing charges which, of course, unavoidable, but obviously, a light car scores heavily when it comes to the tax on the vehicle itself, which is one of the heaviest items as a rule in the annual or quarterly budget.

Insurance is a matter which deserves far greater attention than it usually receives. It is far better to take advantage of a comprehensive policy issued by a reliable concern at a comparatively high premium than to fall oneself into a false sense of security and consider the taking out a policy at a much cheaper rate with an unreliable company.

If speaking is not regarded, strict economy in running costs is not in endeavouring to ascertain just how much a car has cost to run during the season, such charges cannot be ignored. When it comes to depreciation and interest on capital, however, the writer holds the view that these may definitely be excluded.

One of the first things that a novice should clearly understand is that maintaining high speeds is one of the sure ways of running up expenses. Fuel consumption increases at a surprising rate, even the best engine liable to bring out all the life of tyres is shortened.

considerably, and if the speed is maintained without any regard to the road surface breakages may result.

Few of us have sufficient practice to limit our speed of travel to 25 m.p.h., yet if the experiment were tried for a month the difference in running costs between driving under those conditions and, shall we say, at 30 m.p.h. when the speedometer presented it as possible, however, to strike the happy medium by touring along at about 35 m.p.h. and obtaining from the maximum enjoyment from the countryside.

Incidentally, it is a surprising but nevertheless true fact that the time taken to accomplish any given distance at a speed never exceeding 40 m.p.h. is very little more than when one indulges in frequent bursts of 50 m.p.h. Probably the greatest factor is not relative speed at all, but the distances which are met with in the course of an ordinary run and which have a far greater effect on the performance of the high-speed car than on that of the slow-moving vehicle.

#### Why Speed Costs Money

A somewhat similar parallel may be drawn between the conditions which arise when speed is maintained and the conditions which arise when one is indulged in as compared with getting away gently and pulling up in similar fashion to the former case tyres wear more quickly, more fuel is consumed, more brake lining does so long and a far greater degree of wear and tear is imposed on the vehicle mechanism. The actual saving in time, moreover, may under many conditions be hardly appreciable.

If, for example, a driver wishes to go definitely that he will have to slow down behind a large motor car running along in the distance, he might just as well take his foot off the accelerator and "close up" without using the brake at all. To maintain a fairly high speed until within forty or fifty yards of the van and then heavily apply the brake is merely expensive. In this and other ways the loss of the spectacular "overtake" a driver's skillings, if not possible.

According to some folk's view, the waste of time endeavouring to be economical so far as petrol and oil are concerned, the actual difference

between extravagance and economy being, in their opinion, too small to warrant the aggravation which the effort entails. It is a pity that petrol consumption trials, so popular in the past, have practically been discontinued, for nowadays they would supply convincing proof of the fallacy of the argument.

#### Petrol Consumption.

Folk seldom make any effort to economize in petrol in this year of grace. They are content to take the car as it stands, and if the consumption is so high as 25 m.p.g. to shrug their shoulders and surrender themselves to their inevitable but if one were to point out to them that they had a leaky tap, or that the garage hand was not over particularly so to the way the car was left standing, the carburator habitually tended to flood they might take a sudden interest in the problem. Having gained their attention, one might then suggest by suggesting that an extra air valve would provide definite savings of economy, especially in hilly country.

#### Music for Parks.

Their attention might also be drawn to the fact that even the best people find a use smaller than that of a gramophone when starting up they never keep the time is necessary. Having let us here benefited by the advice, the man who was previously so prejudiced against attempting petrol economy in any form might be surprised to discover that he was obtaining at least another five pence to every gallon—an appreciable saving in the course of a year.

#### Mistaken Ideas

Some motorists are curious people. They may not go quite so far as to fill the barrel and leave the bung-hole open, but in certain matters their conduct is equally reprehensible. They buy cheap quality oil in small proportions instead of purchasing the best that is to be had in five-gallon drums, and they hang on to a set of cheap spark-plugs, not realizing that a new set would soon pay for themselves. If not in actual cash, then in kind. They pick out indefinitely the job of decarbonizing, but do not know the difference between what they are saving money and that they are really very clever.

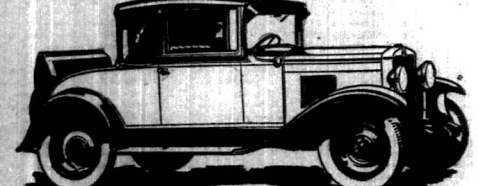

Sir—Some time ago we wrote and asked Messrs. the Victoria Nyasa Sugar Co. Ltd. through our bankers to supply to us a ton of sugar the payment of which could be made in any way dictated by them and they informed us of their inability, stating they had been booked up previously.

A few months later we wrote to them again inquiring if they could supply us with sugar and again we received a negative reply.

As a result we have to pay five or six shillings more per bag in Nairobi and for two shipments in Nairobi from rail to godown and back, consequently the consumer is taxed heavily.

We see that the areas adjacent to the ones where the sale of sugar is prohibited, are overstocked and legitimate retailers are being deprived of stocks.

**Wanganyika Crops.**

**OFFICIAL REPORT FOR MAY.**

The following report on the crops in Tanganyika up to the end of May has been issued by the Tanganyika Department of Agriculture:

**Central Area: North.**

General: Good rains towards end of month, although shortage central areas anticipated. Prospects are brighter.

Rageyo: Beneficial showers have now fallen. Danger of famine now over. Small quantity of maize now ready, also small quantity of rice. Cotton flowering.

**Central Area: South.**

Rudji: Good rains 25th and 26th broken six weeks drought. All grain crops very poor but sufficient local requirements with slight surplus in parts of eastern valley. Cotton crops with whitened drought well but maize April plantings somewhat ungerminated late rains (General count of drought in 1925 estimated) exports grains including sugar (last year 475,000 lbs.) 200,000 Nibani 200 Beans and 100,000 Maize.

Lindi: May rains below normal and food-crops in immediate coastal belt (Kilimanjaro, Kilindi and Lukuledi) and Mamfi failure. Cotton late plantings poor.

**Central Line Area.**

Dar-es-Salaam: Crops on the coast doing quite well. There is very little shortage of rice and cassava, but further west the crops are not so good owing to low water. The chief shortage is in the railway. Cotton is reported to be doing fairly well in spite of damage done by locusts and lack of rain. If the recent rains have been general throughout the District the western area ought not to be badly off for food after two months.

Kilosa: Rice good. Maize and wheat very healthy. No locusts.

Dodoma: Food position not yet secure. Native authorities have been asked to control the sale of maize food-stuffs.

Moroni: Position good. Harvest of groundnuts commencing. Beans finished.

Singida: Harvesting in progress. Groundnuts well. Beans finished.

**Northern Area.**

Lushoto: Good rains last week gave this area. Pasture food-crops improved to normal though wheat in late. Prospects rather poor as result paucity and lateness of rains.

Hehe: All crops doing well. Rain since beginning of month 1.60 inches. Corresponding period last year 1.74 inches.

Moshi: Light rains in higher levels on southern slope Kilimanjaro Eastern slope about. Where irrigated, rice levels crop increasing favourably. Lower levels suffering from drought. Position indicates yield from all crops will be below normal.

Arusha: Drought in Arusha continues. Maize badly affected but would recover if rain comes in immediate future. Coffee doing well.

**Lake Victoria Area.**

Shinyanga: Harvesting of groundnuts, maize and sorghum in progress. Consider sufficient food for local requirements but not surplus for export. Cotton prospects poor.

Mwanza: Intense late planted cotton of which very considerable

amounting through dry winds. Early crops cotton fair. Groundnuts and sorghum crops very satisfactory and had rain. Many light showers generally rain good. Maize partial failure. Heavy Cornish facilities cotton stored. Good average yields considerably reduced in Malindi. No food shortage anticipated.

**Southern Area.**

Tukuyu: Owing failure May rain. Beans are in many cases shortening before fully matured. Other crops doing well.

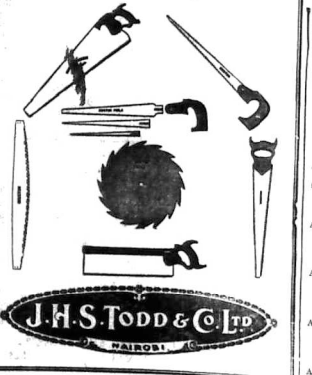
