**THANKSGIVING FOR THE KING'S RECOVERY.**

**Services Held Throughout the Empire.**

**THEIR MAJESTIES ATTEND THE ABBEY.**

**Ceremony Simple But Extremely Impressive.**

Thanksgiving Services for the King's recovery from his serious illness were held throughout the Empire on Sunday.

The special service at Westminster Abbey was attended by the King himself, accompanied by the Queen, with a very representative gathering in the present, including British Statesmen, Dominion Representatives and the Corps Diplomatic. By His Majesty's express desire, the service was not accompanied by formal State ceremonial, and there was a marked absence of uniform. The nave of the Abbey was filled by the general public.

The Service itself was simple but extremely impressive, the most moving moment being when after a roll of drums the congregation sang the National Anthem.

Their Majesties received a great ovation from the dense masses of people who were unable to gain admittance to the Abbey, as they drove through the streets and from Buckingham Palace.

**SERVICE RELAYED.**

Thanksgiving Services for the King's recovery were held in the churches throughout the Empire. Most of them were modelled on the service held in Westminster Abbey at which the Queen and other members of the Royal family were present. This was the King's express desire, accompanied by formal State ceremonial and was as simple as it was extremely impressive.

Although the principal Statesmen of the country, Corps Diplomatic and a great number of representatives were present, there was an absence of uniform and the nave of the Abbey was filled by the general public. The Abbey service was relayed through the broadcasting Corporation to the whole country and many churches equipped with wireless receivers were open to the public, proceeding with their own services. Everywhere on the King's suggestion, observance was devoted to English.

The King and Queen drove from Buckingham Palace to arrive in an open carriage and on arriving at the great West Door, they proceeded to their places in the Sanctuary. His Majesty was led by the organ and the band of the Household Guards.

Perhaps the most moving moment in the service was when a roll of drums, the Dean spoke the words "God save the King," and the choir sang "God give us thanksgiving." Immediately there was a burst of enthusiasm which the church bells sounded the first verse of the National Anthem.

His Majesty's Thanks. His Majesty has sent a message to the Archbishop of Canterbury expressing his thankfulness and joy which he shares in the fact that his Majesty's recovery has been accomplished.

## Kenya Natives.

### A SUGGESTION OF HARBOR TREATMENT.

Those acquainted with conditions in Kenya do not seem at all satisfied with the treatment of the African population by some of those in positions of authority known as the "bosses". Missions here in a somewhat delicate position in a country in which the responsibility for the fair treatment of the natives is in the hands of their fellow-countrymen. Some of the stories that have reached this country are producing a disgusting feeling that all is not right in the dealings of the white people with the native tribes. The reports require that all suspicion of harsh treatment should be removed, and full enquiry made as to establish the British reputation for fairness and even generosity in the treatment of the coloured people who come within the rule of our Empire.

Great sympathy must be felt for these missionaries who feel it their duty to make known to the British public some which seem to them to show a lack of consideration for the interests and the well-being of tribes which are in some instances Christians. Yet a grave responsibility rests on them if they remain silent when they believe they ought to speak.

## The Complete Dug-Out.

### NEW EXHIBIT AT IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM.

Visitors to London should not miss a fresh exhibit in the Imperial War Museum—a dug-out modelled after an original at Gavrelle in 1917. To those who lived in one, it will bring back many a crowded hour of glorious life, and they will see themselves individually as the model figure in tin hat, perching on a parapet by the light of a rationed lamp, with a lighted stove on the floor. From the roof a ground shock depends and muddy gum-boots hang from a nail. Even the parcel from home is not forgotten to re-fortified tinned bully-beef and milk on a shelf, while a rifle and helmet, with a gas-mask, show perhaps how that covered German N.C.O. helmet was obtained. The ghastly light from the steps leading up to the trench overhead is reflected, as before, by gas cylinders from the lighted "cycles" turned from the dug-out without which no dig-out would have been considered complete.

## Mombasa Entertainments.

### A FEAST OF GOOD THINGS AT ONE TIME.

## Art Masterpieces.

### RECENT ACQUISITIONS FOR NATIONAL GALLERY.

Quite a stir has been caused in art circles by the news that the picture of the Conero family by Titian and the Wilson Dyerby have been bought for the National Gallery. The prices paid were £125,000 and £50,000 respectively. The Titian was the property of the Duke of Northumberland who is said to have been most reluctant to part with it. Only after considerable pressure from Sir Charles Holman, the Director of the National Gallery, did he make up his mind to dispose of it to the nation. The "Conero Family" which is a large picture, is a magnificent achievement in colour and design. Mr. Samuel Courtauld gave £25,000 towards its purchase and Sir Joseph Dyerby, £10,000. The Wilson Dyerby, which was purchased from the Earl of Pembroke was painted for King Richard 2nd by an unknown artist about 1387. It is an especially beautiful example of primitive art.

## BRIGHTER LONDON SUNDAYS.

Some of the stories that have reached this country are producing a disquieting feeling that all is not in the destinies of the white people with the native tribes. The reports require that all suspicion of harsh treatment should be removed, and full enquiry made as to establish the British reputation for fairness and even generosity in the treatment of the coloured people who come within the rule of our Empire.

Great sympathy must be felt for those missionaries who feel it their duty to make known to the British public cases which seem to them to show a lack of consideration for the interests and the well-being of tribes which are in some instances Christians. Yet a grave responsibility rests on them if they remain silent when they believe they ought to speak.

#### RECENT ACQUISITIONS FOR NATIONAL GALLERY.

The Wilton Diptych, which was purchased from the Earl of Pembroke was painted for King Richard 2nd by an unknown artist about 1381. It is an especially beautiful example of primitive art.

## THE CRUDE OIL ERA.

### An Italian Two Stroke Engine.

#### SUCCESSFUL INITIAL TESTS.

Although the Diesel principle was introduced so far back in 1897 little advantage has been taken of it in the motor world. This is due largely to the great difficulty of building small, high-speed Diesel engines of reasonable weight. An outstanding advantage of the principle is that the crude oil which can be used is by no means readily ignited, but little has been done to make them suitable in small sizes—for use in light cars or motorcycles. In point of fact there are so many difficulties to be overcome in building small Diesel engines that hitherto designers have not given the matter any great attention.

In the marine and aeronautics engineering works increasing attention is being paid to engines working on the Diesel principle and burning crude oil. Many advantages can be claimed for crude oil engines, but little has been done to make them suitable in small sizes—for use in light cars or motorcycles. In point of fact there are so many difficulties to be overcome in building small Diesel engines that hitherto designers have not given the matter any great attention.

Now, however, an engine very close to following the Diesel principle and working on the two-stroke cycle has been designed by M. Gatti, Gullone di Cereso, 2-Milano, Italy, and we understand that various examples of the engine have successfully passed the initial tests.

A small cylinder and piston are arranged at the top of each main cylinder, the main piston being connected to the crankshaft by a connecting rod in the ordinary way, whilst the connecting rod of

the secondary piston is articulated to the main rod.

#### Exhaust Arrangements.

As in normal two-stroke practice, the exhaust port is formed near the bottom of the cylinder and arranged to be uncovered by the piston on its downward stroke a little before bottom dead centre. The scavenging ports are arranged near the bottom of the secondary cylinder, in the head of which is a channel opening into the top injector situated in the centre of the main cylinder head. The relationship in the travel of the two pistons during one revolution is somewhat complicated and need not be entered into here, but it will be clear that the correct timing of the port opening and closing depends largely upon the exact positioning of the secondary piston connecting rod.

There are two critical points in the cycle, one at the bottom dead centre and the other towards the top dead centre—or even a little past it. It will be clear that, therefore, to vary the cycle of operations. At about 50 revolutions before bottom dead centre the main piston begins to uncover the exhaust ports, whilst the small piston—which owing to the position of the connecting rod is still lagging behind the main piston—will keep the inlet ports closed and does not open them until the main piston is almost at bottom dead centre. This is the first phase of the exhaust stroke, and it ensures that the exhaust gases remaining in the cylinder are very little above atmospheric pressure.

At this point the smaller piston opens the inlet ports which the scavenging air enters, the necessary pressure being supplied by means of an auxiliary pump. The air passes through the auxiliary cylinder then downwards and out through the exhaust ports. Soon after the main piston has passed bottom dead centre on its upward stroke the exhaust ports are closed and the scavenging air must ports so that a small proportion of pure air remains in the main and auxiliary cylinders. This is completed by the pistons as the cylinders are in communication through the upper port until just before the main piston reaches top dead centre the

secondary piston allows the ports and compression is then carried on as usual.

#### Igniting the Fuel.

The main piston passes top dead centre and commences its downward travel before the secondary piston has reached top dead centre, and the air, which is then compressed to a higher value than that in the main cylinder, is forced through a specially designed nozzle together with the fuel supplied by means of a suitable pump. Thus the fuel becomes very finely atomized, and as the compressed air reaches a temperature high enough to bring about self-ignition of the fuel the entire charge burns rapidly on the Diesel principle.

Owing to the high pressures which are required for the scavenging air and for the fuel, piston-type pumps are necessary, the fuel pump being situated on the side of the engine and driven by a small shaft. The piston of the pump is operated by a cam action, arrangements being made to vary the travel of the piston so that the quantity of fuel injected can be controlled to within very close limits. The return stroke of the piston is effected by means of a spring placed within the pump cylinder.

The injector in the system is of the air-actuated type and consists of a nozzle controlled by a needle valve, having, as it were, a rather long point so that an annular orifice is formed in the nozzle. The fuel passes from three channels in the stem, and when meeting the column of air from the auxiliary cylinder is atomized into an almost invisible vapour. A non-return valve is, of course, fitted to ensure that the expansion pressure does not enter the pipe line.

When starting from cold an electric ignition system is brought into action, but instead of an ordinary sparking plug being used a coil of wire placed in the passage-way between the main cylinder head and the fuel valve is made incandescent. Initial rotation of the engine can be obtained by means of an electric starter geared to the flywheel in the ordinary way and, presumably, it would also be possible to start the engine by hand on the fuel and air pumps being the piston type and posi-

tively driven, should work efficiently at low speeds. It is claimed for the engine that, in spite of the use of heavy oil, combustion is absolutely complete, so that no carbon deposit is formed in the cylinders.

It is probable that the Gatti engine would be no heavier than a normal type of power unit of similar capacity. With regard to its mechanical features, the engine appears to be simple, as the air and fuel pumps should not be a complicated nature; it is unlikely also that the auxiliary cylinders and pistons would be in any way unreliable. Furthermore, the high speed and long service life, and, presumably, the impasto as required by a normal type of four-stroke petrol engine are eliminated. (The Light Car.)

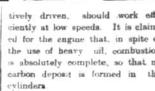

**ELECTED MEMBERS' LEADER MEETS CONSTITUENTS.**

(Continued from page 1.)

The Hon. Member for the Lake district had arranged the meeting with the object of ascertaining their views in regard to the Motor Services Bill which had been read a first time and the second reading of which would be taken about the 15th of this month. But before starting on that highly controversial subject he wished to say a few words on the last occasion I had the pleasure of meeting you in this room, not so very long ago, and the speaker, "it was decided to support the Bill, whatever the terms of the Hilton Young Commission's Majority Report by the Elected Members, and it must be gratifying to us all to know that our hostility to that fantastic publication was shared by a very substantial body of opinion in England."

- 3 The permanent importance of an unofficial workable European majority in the Kenya Legislative Council.
- 4 The restriction of the powers of the contemplated Federal Council in such a manner as to preclude the possibility of the economic or developmental policy of any of the constituent States being unduly influenced by the Federal authority.

**Sr & Wilson's Visit.**

"Apparently the British Cabinet recognized with us the unfavorable nature of the Commission's proposal to send out a 'High Commissioner' who was to be 'the local representative of the personality of the Secretary of State,' whatever that may mean, endowed with full executive powers, and the recommendation from Rhodes that a Special Commissioner should be sent out was adopted."

"I was chosen to be in the person of Sir Samuel Wilson, the permanent head at the Colonial Office, who was sent out to discuss what scheme, if any, would be administratively workable and otherwise acceptable, and I am sure it will interest you to know that after a very large number of consultations with Elected Members and the Convention Executive Sir Samuel informed us that he would formally propose for our submission to the Secretary of State.

**Kenya Principles.**

"Our case for Kenya differed very little from our representations to the Hilton-Young Commission, which have been published, the main principles for which we stand being:

1. An unequivocal declaration by the Imperial Government that it recognizes the scope for increased White colonization in East Africa without native interests being jeopardized.

**Daylight Saving.**

As most of you know, Mr. Harvey continued, "I succeeded a few days ago in securing the unanimous acceptance by Legislative Council of a resolution with regard to the appointment of a Committee to examine the effect of the 'Alteration of Time Ordinance 1920' and to make such recommendations as the result of that investigation may show to be in the public interest."

"A Committee has now been appointed under the Chairmanship of General Rhodes, and my object in mentioning the matter this morning is to urge all representative bodies to furnish the Committee with their views."

"Some of us only agreed very reluctantly last year, to a trial, on the strength of overwhelming evidence in favour of such a course. I am of the opinion that it has now been tried and found wanting but unfortunately a very large number of people do not agree with me and it is therefore of vital importance that the Committee should be furnished with the views of as many as possible. There have been many letters to the Press on this subject which no doubt confer great relief on the writers and undoubtedly stimulate public interest but what is wanted is the measured opinion of organized bodies.

"I hope the master will not be treated as a job, every man's

mission's recommendation. Government policy for many a year as likely to be based on the Road and Rail.

The thing to be done is to insist your views in regard to the Motor Services Bill. The problem resolves itself into the question as to the policy to be pursued in respect of the competition between road traffic and railway traffic, and is a problem which had arisen in most countries during recent years and which has proved a most difficult one to deal with.

"It almost invariably leads to a sharp division of opinion between rural and urban interests. Interests which are not always identical in countries having an appreciable degree of industrial development other than agricultural, though I continue to maintain the view that in Kenya the prosperity of all sections of the community is entirely dependent on agricultural production."

"Among countries which have enacted legislation with the object of overhauling or reducing what is regarded as unfair competition are Italy, Norway, Sweden, New Zealand, Victoria and Tasmania while other countries having legislation in this respect under consideration are The United States of America, Austria, Hungary, South Africa and Western Australia."

"I think that the Kenya Government has been in taking time by the forelock and having such a debatable matter discussed before the creation of substantial vested interests the disposition of which usually entails financial hardship on the general taxpayer."

**The Object.**

"The broad principle of the Bill which such a trial objection has been taken by interested parties in Nairobi, mainly up to now as I understand it, designed to protect the public generally from wasteful and unfair competition and not as has been alleged to confer a monopoly on an extravagant Railway."

"It is not intended to impose artificial limitations or restrictions on the development of modern transportation generally whether by road or air nor is it intended that restrictions should be of general application. The sole object of the measure is to set up an impartial independent Board before which the Railway Administration would state its case for the prohibition or curtailment of certain classes of traffic in certain specified roads,

and action would only be taken by the Board when it deemed action necessary in the best interests of the public as a whole.

"The position in Kenya with regard to Railway traffic is that bulky goods of low unit value are carried at a lower rate than freight rates below cost, this low rate made good by high freight rates on luxuries and other goods of high unit value."

"The wisdom of this policy is admirably illustrated by the rapid increase in general prosperity as shown in Trade Statistics in the last ten years, but the increase in population in Railway Rates which is entirely in line with the increase in the territory of the country as a whole makes it clear that the undercost of the railway in traffic on luxuries and certain goods of high unit value is not being offset."

"It is well to point out that savings in general which are effected in the cost of transporting high priced commodities from Mombasa to Nairobi by road are not passed on to the consumer, all the profits are pocketed by the transporter and a large proportion of them probably find their way to India."

**The Other Side.**

"The main argument against the proposed scheme to me is to be the danger that the Railway Administration may not watch its expenses so closely that a substantial loss would, in the absence of competition, be the result. As presented on the Railway Council which concerns itself with rates and railway expenditure generally, but not with the competitive nature of road competition, it may have the effect of forcing the Railway to reduce its rates, but we may remember the fundamental principle of a railway system of railway the existing system of Government Policy which has been generally followed in the United Kingdom is that it would be disastrous and that in the Railway Administration in this position that it was compelled to increase freight rates on such articles as maize, coffee, cotton and wool, which have been incurred by reason of the eye-popping of motor lorry competitors who are almost certain to be temporary sojourners in the land."

"Railways whether privately owned or whether the property of the State are common carriers to the extent that they are obliged by law to carry all descriptions of traffic for all persons without discrimination and must provide and maintain adequate track, rolling stock and other necessary equipment."

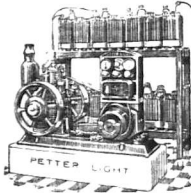

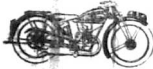

...of delaying the application of the principles of government or responsible government, the answer is that in the absence of reasonable representation of an admitted national state (such as existed in old England and feudal Japan), those can only be applied when a considerable proportion of each of the main racial, religious and social elements composing the community is able and willing to combine with others in establishing a Government which will secure the allegiance of the whole. Even then it will still be necessary to provide for adequate machinery for safeguarding minorities, as in the Dominion States of Europe today. The position is well summed up in relation to Kenya, where the British majority is claiming responsible government, at page 245 of the African Young Report.

While our proposals are carefully designed to avoid committing the Government to an aspect of political compromise, they could equally be used to close the door finally on the political aspirations which the future may show to be desirable. For the present, however, if we are asked to admit the possibility of responsible government, we must accept the fact that we can see no escape from the dilemma that the Ministry must be responsible either to a purely European electorate which would constitute an oligarchy in the guise of a democracy, or to a wide electorate for participation in which the natives are not yet, and may never be, ready.

The principle thus announced has broad wide application in all parts of Kenya, particularly in the Indian States. It is not the intention of the Government to do what a British official would do in the case of the Swazi party, a however disguised in democratic settings—be ultimately more oppressive to the backward races (such as the British in India, the British in the Malay States, the British in the 70 million Moslems, the 60 million Catholics (created and sustained as such by the British), the 13 million tribal, and so on) in India for protection against the oligarchy of the Hindu caste. Fortunately the British Government has a free hand.



### THE WANTS OF THE CONGO.

#### American Expedition to the Congo.

##### A COMPLETE STUDY.

Dr. Engle states that the expedition, which will remain in the Kivu for two to three months, has a complete equipment for the minor operative study of the blood and blood parasites of the gorilla and the chimpanzee. They will also take some films and study the habits of the native races in the Congo, in particular the Masai and the primitive African Pygmies, of which a few still survive in the Kivu. "Engle is known to have been engaged in securing the blood and the blood parasites of the gorilla, or of those of the human being. We may be able to obtain some information on this subject. We shall not, of course, attempt to kill or capture specimens of gorilla, for these usually live only a short time in captivity."

Dr. Gregory states that the party will also make studies of the feet and the primitive posture of native races. This idea was suggested by Professor J. Morton of New York, the originator of the expedition, who desires to compare the feet of civilized life with those of his primitive brother in the wild.

On leaving the Kivu the expedition will proceed down the Congo River to the West Coast, and turn north to French Equatorial Africa, where the party will remain for two or three months undertaking similar investigations. They hope to return to New York in January.

#### Native Foodstuffs Problem Said to be Acute.

##### A WEEK PAST.

**"WARRAND" OVERSEAS.** Mivani, July 7. It is refreshing to be able to report that there have been plentiful and what is more important are spread out well and over a long period, making ideal growing weather. The reserves just now are a picture. The ripening corn and mizans, of which large crops are now nearing harvest, are picturesque enough for the most ardent and unfortunately are picturesqueness is increased by the fact that the natives are not doing things. This is again very prevalent right throughout the Reserve and it is getting a hold on European plantations as a consequence. Last year the natives were put under penalties etc. for not taking out the weed from their land and it looks as if another reminder were very necessary. There appears no attempt to rid the Reserves of this weed and as it is now flowering very freely it will indeed become a menace if destruction is not carried out immediately. Mizans are to be the plant mostly attacked and one native informed me that when they planted maize he thought the maize seed was mixed up with the mizans. Anyhow it calls for urgent methods.

### A Petition.


The Mivani shop-keepers were very grateful for the publication of their case and the register from the Land Board. They are I am informed petitioning for a grant of land to form a township for Mivani. Alongside Mivani Station on the right hand side is a large tract of land which could be easily adapted for the purpose of a township and I am certain the dukas owners would pay the purchase price for their pitches or stands as has been done in other townships. I am informed that Palace, St. Petersburg, collected by the sons of the late Gaur, will be offered at Christie's. Expecting anticipations that the total for this year's sale season will eclipse all previous records except that of 1920 which for some reason of which I am unwarrantably was suppressed.

This state of affairs is not peculiar to Mivani but is prevalent throughout the Colony. If so the whole of upcountry is a number of dukas which could well be condemned to the same ruling.

— The Sugar Mills.

The Victoria Nyansa Sugar Company employees are now on the eve of another season's work as it is anticipated that the crushing will commence again on Wednesday the 10th instant. All repairs have been carried out, replacements effected, and new machinery installed. These should tend to the placing on the market of a higher and better standard of sugar. Indeed the meeting of competition which will come this season has only spurred the employees on to the able maintenance of the plant to do better than ever. Nothing will be wanting to make this year as big a success as any of the past years.

The main question so freely ventilated at the Mivani meeting recently is also acute this day in the Province. Particularly so amongst the Kavirondo and the Nandi who are getting very little work indeed for their few cows. It is the native who is at home producing who has to pay now for his laying in stock when he has the chance. Had the Luo and Nandi doubled their planting last year the country could have taken the output easily and asked for more and it is up to Government to see that they at least grow enough for their own needs. The statement made at Mivani that a syndicate of Indians are prepared to buy the early Luo crop is no secret here. They hope to buy at a few shillings a bush and make a good price per bush. Legitimate trading perhaps but surely the native's own needs must be safeguarded first. The native will naturally start at the first opportunity, if not given the chance so that he can buy some of the pretty things he has been waiting for for months. Personal statement and next purchases will come before next year's need if no action is taken.

"Nothing is known," said Dr. Hodge, "concerning the habits of the gorilla, or of their conditions correspond with those of the human being. We may be able to obtain some information on the subject. We shall look, of course, to capture and kill and capture specimens of gorillas, for these usually live only a short time in captivity."

Members of an American scientific expedition, who have been staying in London for the past few days, left last night for Brussels on the way to the Belgian Congo to study the life habits of the mountain gorilla and the chimpanzee, and, later, to investigate similar types in the lowlands of the French Cameroons. The expedition comprises Dr. William K. Gregory, Curator of the Department of Comparative Anatomy, Dr. J. H. MacGregor, Professor of Zoology, Columbia University, Mr. H. C. ### MOTOR TRANSPORT SHOULD BE CONTROLLED.

#### Railway Protection in Public Interest.

**MR. O'SHEA'S VIEW.**  
Principle of New Bill Strongly Supported.

(STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.)  
Dublin, July 9.

A public meeting called for today to hear the Hon. Mr. T. J. O'Shea expound his views on the new Traffic Control Bill and the O'Shea and Cattle Clearing Bill could hardly be described as large and representative. Probably owing to the heavy rains we have been having during the past few days the attendance was very small, and it was half an hour after the advertised time when there were sufficient present to justify a start being made. Subsequently a number of strangers drifted in, and in some instances afterwards that the roads, in some outlying parts of the district made travelling extremely difficult.

Captain J. McKel Mundell was appointed Chairman, and called upon Mr. O'Shea to speak.

"The first thing I would like to get out of the way," said Mr. O'Shea, "is the question of the repeal of the Daylight Saving Bill. The position is that in accordance with a promise made when the Bill was passed, an enquiry is now being held into its working. The Committee may possibly hold sittings outside Dublin, and if it does I think it is almost certain that I will have a sitting in Dublin; but in case it does not, I suggest that all Farmers' Associations and public bodies in the District should send in their views to the secretary of the Abolition of Time Committee, in the near future, when they will be recorded. The matter is rather important, because the findings of this Committee will be going to be retained permanently, or if it is to be repealed, if it is repealed, we revert to the old time. I know that the majority of the people outside the town are dead against the Ordinance, and quite a large proportion of the people in the town also; that being the case, they certainly should show a little activity in having their views brought to the notice of the Committee.

Similar legislation had been passed in various other countries including New Zealand and parts of America, and it was most significant that twenty States of the United States of America—where probably motor transport was developed to a greater extent than in any other country in the world—had also legislation of this kind.

There was no question of rushing this Bill through the Chamber before the country had plenty of time to consider it. On the contrary, the Government's view was that it should have the fullest possible consideration, and several Members would insist upon being given an opportunity of studying the legislation of other countries before they committed themselves to the final terms of the Bill.

Although the Bill had been introduced some time would otherwise be the case because of the growth of a certain amount of opposition to the Railway, it would be foolish in the extreme to think of the problem entirely in terms of Motor v. Railway competition. The Bill should be thought of more from the point of view of future developments than of present day conditions.

It was true that motor transport had already taken away some of the most profitable kinds of traffic from the Railway, but the Railway were a free agent it could approach that competition footy eight hours by negotiating its rates. The Railway, however, was not a free agent. It was one of the most important instruments of our fiscal policy, as its system of freight charges was very carefully designed to assist the utmost the agricultural development of the country, and that being the case it could not stop and change its rates about to meet every change in conditions.

At the same time there was no reason why those in favour of the measure should endeavour to secure the support of the agriculturist for it, by indulging in bluff about increases in export rates. The Railway could meet the competition without interfering with export rates, but was it desirable that we should have the rates increased on very necessary imports because motor lorries were competing with the cars as commodities as wine and spirits?

**Behind the Times.**  
The fear of giving the Railway a monopoly, voiced in some quarters, was no valid objection to the Bill. People who talked like that were twenty years behind the times. 30-day the creation of a monopoly was not deliberately fostered by Governments in the best interests of the public, but under conditions very different from those that prevailed up to a few years ago. We already had several monopolies in the country deliberately created by Government with the public's approval, and operating with the full approval of the public; as instances, various electric light companies in the towns and water supply.

In the speaker's opinion, the development of this new system of transport would present a solution of the long standing conflict between private enterprise and Socialism. The old system of unrestricted competition had completely broken down, and the world had already seen sufficient of unbridled Socialism in practice to be satisfied that complete State monopoly was not going to prove the solution of the problem either.

In recent years, however, numerous experiments had been made, and the limitations of private and Government enterprise, and looked as if they were going to prove a success. In Mr. O'Shea's opinion, the transport services of this country in the future would be developed along such lines.

It would be a terrible disaster for this country if the all-important problem of our future transport services were dealt with in a petty-minded spirit. The problem was one that demanded consideration from the foundations, and must be approached with broad vision.

It was now generally recognised that the success of any exporting country depended very largely on an efficient and economic system of transport, and that this was absolutely vital to a country whose exports were mainly bulky agricultural products.

Possibly because his business brought him into close touch with transport, the speaker had been deeply interested in the problem for a number of years, and his interest in it had been further stimulated by an interview with the late Sir Christian Felling. It might be said that his views were wholly influenced by him, but everybody who knew the late Sir Christian Felling would agree that he was a man of outstanding ability who had studied transportation problems very thoroughly, and whose views on the subject commanded respect. Though primarily a Railway man, the late Sir Christian Felling was not obsessed by the idea of securing a monopoly in this country for the Railway that he controlled.

On the contrary he was most decidedly of the opinion that our future transportation service would be a combination of rail and motor, and when he advised Government to abandon the policy of constructing short branch lines, he urged at the same time that provision should be made for the construction of motor roads feeding the Railway, to give motor transport an opportunity of playing his proper part

At the same time there was no reason why those in favour of the measure should endeavour to secure the support of the agriculturist for it, by indulging in bluff about increases in export rates. The Railway could meet the competition without interfering with export rates, but was it desirable that we should have the rates increased on very necessary imports because motor lorries were competing with the cars as commodities as wine and spirits?

There was nothing casual about Mr. O'Shea's remarks, as it was the result of a study of the problem by a representative committee, and recognition of the importance of transport services to the country. Similar legislation had been passed in various other countries including New Zealand and parts of America, and it was most significant that twenty States of the United States of America—where probably motor transport was developed to a greater extent than in any other country in the world—had also legislation of this kind.

There was no question of rushing this Bill through the Chamber before the country had plenty of time to consider it. On the contrary, the Government's view was that it should have the fullest possible consideration, and several Members would insist upon being given an opportunity of studying the legislation of other countries before they committed themselves to the final terms of the Bill.

Although the Bill had been introduced some time would otherwise be the case because of the growth of a certain amount of opposition to the Railway, it would be foolish in the extreme to think of the problem entirely in terms of Motor v. Railway competition. The Bill should be thought of more from the point of view of future developments than of present day conditions.

It was true that motor transport had already taken away some of the most profitable kinds of traffic from the Railway, but the Railway were a free agent it could approach that competition footy eight hours by negotiating its rates. The Railway, however, was not a free agent. It was one of the most important instruments of our fiscal policy, as its system of freight charges was very carefully designed to assist the utmost the agricultural development of the country, and that being the case it could not stop and change its rates about to meet every change in conditions.

ART OF SIDECAR DRIVING. The Safest Vehicle on the Road.

A FEW HINTS FOR BEGINNERS.

theory into practice. To the surprise, however, he has found that the outfit still pulls to the left. If this is the case, then it is very likely that the sidecar is out of alignment, which indicates the necessity for a few minutes' work in the garage.

That Left-Hand Lift. It is also wise to make certain that the machine is not leaning towards the sidecar; it should be perfectly vertical, or even leaning slightly outward.

A newcomer to sidecar work is at first worried and a little foolish that his sidecar—especially if it is a light one—going to lift every so readily as he starts. He will learn that he has to take a left turn surprisingly fast before the sidecar will rise. It is a constant nuisance to take his outfit to the level road—preferably one with level ground on the sides—and deliberately practice putting the sidecar at about 5 to 10 m.p.h. and suddenly turn sharply to the left; the sidecar will rise, and the driver, and you will find it possible to straighten out again and travel along with the sidecar wheel a foot or eight inches off the road. But don't let the general public see you making those turns; it will give them quite the wrong impression. It is hardly necessary to add that policemen are terribly interested in them, too!

One who has been found by a motorist who is really taking to the sidecar up you will find that you have complete confidence in your handling of the outfit.

Just as the first few days the beginner will find that he is rather uncertain as to the width of his vehicle, generally, he will over-estimate the amount of road he requires, and accordingly, on narrow roads, give occasion to traffic.

the development of motor transport in the Public Institute.

"Turning to the part that motor transport is destined to play in the future of this country," Mr. O'Shea said, "I think it must be agreed by everybody that it is destined to play a very big part indeed, and it may play that part without in any way competing with the Railway. Surely it is itself that of motor transport which should be directed along the right lines, and not allowed to mislead the public by entering into competition with the Railway without in its infancy, and neglecting the greater opportunities for its services which the existing Railway system offers. I feel sure the soundness of this view will be recognised if one considers for a moment how necessary it is to the future success of motor transport that proper roads be constructed for its operation."

Running occasional services between Mombasa and Nairobi every few weeks of which at times might be a serious effort to develop motor transport. These efforts, Mr. O'Shea regarded as merely an indication of the possibilities that existed and motor transport has not on sound lines would only come into existence when we had developed a proper road system that made it possible at all times of the year.

**Feder Roads.**

The speaker was probably the first public representative in Kenya to advocate the abandoning of building short branch railways and substituting therefor a policy of supplementing the Railway backbone with a proper road system which would permit of the Railway being properly fed with produce from the developing districts. As part of that policy he had advised that the best investment we could make for some years to come, was the expenditure of comparatively large sums of money on a road system throughout the country. That policy was now being accepted, and a recommendation was being put up to Government that a further instalment of £500,000 should be found from loan funds to carry on the construction of Feder roads to the Railway.

If that recommendation were approved by Government and by the country—and the speaker sincerely hoped that it would be—we could begin to look forward to the proper development of motor transport in Kenya, and Mr.

O'Shea believed that in the next few years motor transport would probably be the largest private enterprise in the country.

Turn from wishes to do anything, it was his ambition to do everything in his power to stimulate it, and he regarded the passage of this Bill, subject to amendment, as a very necessary preliminary to that development.

It would be a grave error from every point of view to allow such an important public service as motor transportation to develop uncontrolled. In other countries where this had happened, the waste, extravagance, and inefficiency were already being felt, and it was fortunate that we had the experience of other countries to save us from the consequences of making the same mistake.

If instead of building roads the enable motor transport to play the proper part of feeding the Rail, we were to allow it to go uncontrolled and feeding itself, it would compete with the Railway in the carriage of high freight goods, vested interests would be created in that service, and the demand would spring up for the construction of serviceable roads along the route of the Railway, on the ground that transport people making use of that route were paying taxation on their vehicles.

So far as the speaker knew, the cost of constructing an all-weather road from Nairobi to Mombasa would certainly not be less than £300,000, and as motor road for very much less, but as all-weather motor road as he understood what that meant, would certainly not cost less than £100,000. Considering we had a ready Railway that served that route fairly well, surely it was much wiser policy to spend that £100,000 in constructing roads where motor transport service was very necessary, and where roads to permit of it did not at present exist.

The opinion had been expressed that competition between motor transport and the Railway would cheapen rates, but the speaker had heard no arguments to justify him in accepting that view. On the contrary, he was of the opinion that taking rates all round competition would tend to raise the cost to the country.

It had also been said that Government interference in the development of motor transport was undesirable. Again, the speaker did not share that view. On the contrary, he was decidedly of the opinion that it was in the interests of everybody—including the motor transport people themselves—that Government should control its development on sound lines. In conclusion, Mr. O'Shea em-

phasized that before the Bill was finally passed, it would require very close study by the Nairobi Members, and it was his hope that the public would not be prejudiced by criticising it in a constructive spirit.

There was no question of the Board representing for administration of the Bill being continued by the Railway Authorities. There was only one representative of the Public Institute in its constitution, and four representatives of the Public Institute were present. The Bill did not really involve competition with the Railway, but only provided that such competition should be under control. It should be in the Public Institute before being granted.

The second principle at stake in the Bill was public v. private enterprise. It was all very well for the people at present to object because they thought their interests would be adversely affected. What was to be done if the Bill was the greater interest of the public and Mr. O'Shea felt certain that this could be served without inflicting any hardship on the private interests involved.

The Bill as drafted did not appear to him to be the best possible, but he strongly supported the principle of it, and he would collaborate with his colleagues in endeavouring to get it made law in the least possible form. Being the first bill of the kind that he had had to deal with, our best efforts might still fall short of the ideal, but if all who had knowledge on the subject would make their views public, he should be justified in assuming that the Bill when it did become law, would be sound and reasonable.

**Cattle Bills.**

Dealing with the Housing and Cattle (Leasing) Bills, Mr. O'Shea said that the meeting before him was not a meeting to be criticised but a meeting to be supported. As at present drafted, the Bills would do no harm to the landowners in any district where two thirds of the majority of the landowners were in favour of them. His view, however, was that the Bills should be applied to the country generally, or rather to such portions as they affected, and the districts should then have time in which to vote themselves out. He thought that was the proper policy for the Government to adopt, as the portions that fencing and cattle clearing were essential to progress in the stock industry and in that view they were supported by most of the progressive stock farmers in the country. Unfortunately, however, Government had not got the courage to fight for that policy and was pursuing

"revisionist" tactics, trying to divide stock farmers into doing the right thing and not doing the right thing of the country at large, they should exercise determination. If the Bill were not passed generally, and districts were given the option to vote themselves out of the operation of the Bills, no hardship would be inflicted, as the stock involved in erecting fences and clipping cattle was provided for by the Land Bank, with repayment spread over a long period of years.

Sir,—With reference to Mr. Ernest Carr's letter, dated the 8th instant, the following extract from a letter received from the London Tea and Coffee Merchants Co., Ltd., Glasgow, hardly bears out Mr. Carr's statement, that Sugar Factories could not run profitably in this Colony without protection.

The present position of Cane Sugar is deplorable. New York price is 1.67 cents per lb. 96 sugar cannot be made under 2 cents per lb., so that the chinks and factory owners incur losses as enormous. London market is 1 1/2 to 2 Dollars per bag, or putting it another way, the low average from 25/ to 30/ per ton. The production of Cane is anticipated to be 5,000,000 tons, and if you assume that 20 per cent of this is made in factories belonging to U.S.A. Refiners who have the advantage of refining their own sugar, the balance amongst independent Refiners must be a huge loss. In order to reduce or minimize this, Cane sugar is being dumped in many places, particularly in the East; and the U.S.A. Tariff House of Representatives will agree the dumping of Cuban sugar, with the result that there will be a wide-spread depression of prices.  
In Cuba, in the best places, sugar cannot be made under 2 cents; most places take 2 1/2 cents; whilst in most parts of the world the figure is 6 cents.

If Mr. Carr will read the article he will see that it says "the London price of raw foreign sugar is 100 per cent at 8s. 9/ per cwt. but very low level of 8s. 9/ per cwt. for which 8s. 7/ per cwt. is paid in the Nairobi shops. One might just as well make a comparison so far as Kenya is concerned, between 8s. 10/ per cwt. obtained in London and say 8s. 20/ per cwt. (i.e. 2/8 per lb) at which this same coffee, roasted, is sold retail by Harrod, Limited, or any other big store."  
With regard to the Kenya Tariff Committee which has recently completed its Report, I suggest that Mr. Carr should lay to rest that matter by making any statement that duties are to be continued at the present rates. It is to be hoped that the interests of everybody, in this Report will be made available to the public at the earliest possible moment as it contains much useful information which will enable the community to judge for themselves how far these protective duties are justified. In my opinion there is some evidence to show that a measure of protection for certain industries is more than justified, but most people who have given any consideration to the question, have always felt that there was room for discussion and that it might be necessary to make reductions in certain of these duties to meet the views of other of the East African Territories and at the same time maintain the Customs Union.  
At the recent half-yearly session of the Associated Chambers of Commerce very special efforts were made by all the delegates to arrive at a unanimous agreement on the further action which was to be taken, and the delegates from Uganda, who had instructions to press for the total abolition of all protective duties, were not successful. I agreed that, in view of the probable immediate issue of the Report to the Kenya Tariff Committee, the matter should be brought up again after this Report was available.

Mr. Kirkpatrick who unfortunately fell in before completing his experiments would, in my view, if he were here, agree that cranks of this use. A clever man can afford to own to a failure and tries again. The perfect hand has yet to be found.

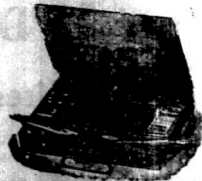

**We're Here in London**

[STANDARD'S SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT]

London, June 6.

The General Election is being over, I think we had better turn the subject positively and consider politics in a more cheerful and sanguine and the drama. A friend of mine, with a taste for these statistics, has written it out that, apart from those M.P.s who make spasmodic contributions to journalism and literature, very few politicians are literary men. These, of course, the Father of the House, the Rt. Hon. T. P. O'Connor, who was returned unopposed as a Conservative; also Sir Ramsey Bodd.

An unopposed candidate on the same side was the poet of Lord Dunsany, the Hon. Cecil Morgan, who tried unsuccessfully to wrest a dockland constituency from the Socialists. To this end he had been "training" the dockmen with a little monthly newspaper which, while not seriously jeopardizing the reputation of the monthly review, was an interesting publication containing no poetry, although on one occasion it did contain a poem which its readers not to believe "gony."

**Others.**

Professor Gilbert Murray, whose "Euripides" is being given by Miss Hall's Theatre at Wyndham's Theatre, was unopposed in his constituency at Oxford University in the Liberal campaign; and two playwrights of a different nature, Captain Reginald Berkeley and Mr. Edgar Middleton, suffered defeat in the same cause; the former in the Liberal and the latter in the Conservative.

It is harder to write a successful play than to become a Member of Parliament. Mr. Philip Gossett complains a quartet of defeated literary Liberals.

So far as I know, Dr. Derwent Hall's name was the only one connected with literature in his distinguished father, but doubtless he does a little in that line himself. It is as you know, about in the Socialism interest and defeated the popular Mr. Mervyn Dymally.

Miss Margaret Bryan. Some months ago I heard that Captain Mackenzie contemplated standing as a Scottish Nationalist, but recent events have shown that this plan did not materialize.

The Birthday Honours list has been characterized as somewhat unopposing; but that may only

You will doubtless have seen considerable space given in the general Press to the fact that Mr. Asquith referred to the film as his "Mum," and that Miss West replied by telling him that his "Mum" had "gone on the hoof" and was in a condition of being somewhat interested and clinging to the area railings.

This, I might add, summarized the tone of the most dignified film, wherein the participants evinced an extraordinary ability to see each other's point of view. 

#### FIGHTING FLAGRA.

The constitution of the League of Nations Sanitary Bureau in Geneva has been completed. The Bureau is to be organized as a permanent body, and its work will be carried out on a continuous basis. The Bureau will be responsible for the collection and distribution of information on the progress of epidemics and for the organization of sanitary measures in the event of an outbreak of disease.

The Sanitary Bureau is now the body which, under the World Sanitary Convention of 1926, collects and distributes the information required under the Convention. The Bureau will also be responsible for the organization of sanitary measures in the event of an outbreak of disease.

The five continents have now been linked up through the League Health Organization into one system for the collection and distribution of information on the progress of epidemics and for the organization of sanitary measures in the event of an outbreak of disease.

The "Weekly Bulletin" compiled by the Central Epidemiological Intelligence Service at Geneva now includes the information received by the Public International Health Office in Paris, the "Weekly Bulletin" edited by the Singapore Bureau, a weekly report issued by the Alexandria Bureau of the Sanitary, Maritime and Quarantine Council of Egypt, which is now beginning to function, and information communicated weekly by the Pan-American Sanitary Bureau at Washington, The Australian Epidemiological

Intelligence Service at Melbourne, and as a centre for collecting and distributing information in the Austral-Pacific area, and this information is communicated through the Singapore Bureau to Geneva.

More and Better Children.

The League of Nations has issued a report by its Commission of Health Experts on Infant Welfare, making a number of recommendations that are the result of one year's careful investigation in twenty-five urban and rural districts in Europe. A parallel enquiry is being conducted in four Latin-American countries and the results will be available shortly.

The League experts praise their recommendations by pointing out that, in all the districts studied, the value and insufficiency of existing measures—such as infant welfare centres, supervision of the mother and child and the benefits of social legislation—were apparent, and that medical research and infant deaths within the first days of life as well as on the prevention of respiratory infections is still badly served.

Their recommendations stress the importance of medical supervision of pregnant women, social and legislative measures to make rest possible during the latter months of pregnancy, an adequate supply of maternity hospitals, better obstetrical training for midwives and physicians and a campaign against the employment of untrained women as midwives.

Among the general measures recommended are education of the public in hygiene through the schools and through better training of physicians and midwives, and the supervision of infants by public health nurses. In view of the results obtained in this enquiry, the League Health Commission recommends that the health administrations of as many countries as possible should undertake similar studies, to serve as a basis for the establishment and application of preventive measures, and to complete official statistical information on infant deaths, which the enquiry has proved to be often insufficient.

#### Story of Malaria in India.

The League Health Committee has decided to set on the Indian Government's invitation to follow up the investigation of malaric and methods of combating the same in Europe and the Mediterranean Basin, by studying anti-malaric work in India.

Several members of the Malaria Commission are being sent to India to examine Indian methods in the light of their own experience and to give medical officers engaged in such work in India an opportunity of discussing their

problems with members of the Commission.

The party will leave Europe early in August, on their arrival in India, it is proposed that they should spend the first few weeks in the Punjab considering questions of interest to the group as a whole. Subsequently, the members will spend the balance of their journey to each to study these aspects of the malaric problem in the Punjab, considering questions of interest to the group as a whole.

### WORKING HEALTH ACTIVITIES.

**Excellent Work by League Bureau.**

**FIGHTING PLAGUE.**

The outbreak of the League of Nations Bureau in an interesting research work on plague in the Far East is indicated in a report adopted by the League of Nations recently. This report describes plague investigations being carried out on a common plan, drawn up in Calcutta last December, in China, Hong Kong, French Indo-China, Union of South Africa, Zeyra, Burma, Ceylon and the Dutch East Indies.

Research work on oral vaccination against cholera is being carried on as a number of points in the Far East.

A survey has been undertaken of the quarantine facilities of Port Eastern ports, and the system of notifying and distributing news about the spread of epidemics and the movement of infected ships in the Far East is being steadily developed and perfected.

The Singapore Bureau is now the body which, under the World Sanitary Convention of 1926, collects and distributes the information required under the Convention throughout the whole area from the Eastern Mediterranean region about the south coast of Asia to Hawaii, south to Australia and New Zealand and west to the east coast of Africa.

**News of Epidemics.**

The five continents have now been linked up through the League Health Organization into one system for tentatively collecting and distributing news about the spread of epidemics, movement of infected ships and other information necessary for health and quarantine services.

The "Weekly Bulletin" circulated by the Central Epidemiological Intelligence Service at Geneva now includes the information received by the Public International Health Office in Paris, the "Weekly Bulletin" edited by the Singapore Bureau, a weekly report issued by the Alexandria Bureau of the Sanitary, Maritime and Quarantine Council of Egypt, which is now beginning to function as a Health Bulletin Bureau, and information communicated weekly by the Pan-American Sanitary Bureau at Washington, The Australian Epidemiological

Intelligence Service at Melbourne acts as a centre for collecting and distributing information in the Austral-Pacific area, and this information is communicated through the Singapore Bureau to Geneva.

**More and Better Children.**

The League of Nations has issued a report by the Conference of Health Experts on Infant Welfare, making a number of recommendations that, as the result of one year's careful investigation in various urban areas and rural districts in Europe. A parallel enquiry is being conducted in four Latin-American countries, and the results will be available shortly.

The League experts profess their recommendations by pointing out that, in all the districts studied, the value and insufficiency of existing measures—such as infant welfare centres, supervision of the mother and child and the benefits of social legislation—were apparent and that medical research on primarily, still-born and infant deaths within the first days of life as well as on the prevention of respiratory affections is still badly needed.

Their recommendations stress the importance of medical supervision of pregnant women, social and legislative measures to make rest possible during the latter months of pregnancy, an adequate supply of maternity hospitals, better obstetrical training for midwives and physicians and a campaign against the employment of untrained women as midwives.

Among the general measures recommended are education of the public by lectures through the schools and through better training of physicians and midwives, and the supervision of infants by public health nurses. In view of the results obtained in this enquiry, the League Health Committee recommends that the health administrations of as many countries as possible should undertake similar studies, to serve as a basis for the establishment and application of preventive measures and to complete official statistical information on infant deaths, which the enquiry has proved to be often insufficient.

**Story of Malaria in India.**

The League Health Committee has decided to act on the Indian Government's invitation to follow up its investigation of malaria and methods of combating the same in Europe and the Mediterranean basin, by studying anti-malaria work in India.

Several members of the Malaria Commission are being sent to India to examine Indian methods in the light of their own experience and to give medical officers engaged in such work in India an opportunity of discussing their

problems with members of the Commission.

The party will leave Harare early in August, on their arrival in India, it is proposed that they should spend the first few weeks in the Punjab, considering questions of interest to the group as a whole.

Subsequently, the members will separate facilities being given to each to study those aspects of the malaria problem in which he is specially interested, under the most favourable conditions possible. During the latter part of the tour, the members will once more work together as a group.

**Leprisy and the League.**

Dr. Barnett, the leprisy expert sent by the League Health Committee to South America, arrived in Venezuela in March, and by visiting the Argentine, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Paraguay, Peru, and Uruguay.

In each country, Dr. Barnett will discuss with the health administration concerned the problems connected with the name and treatment of leprisy and co-operation in leprisy research that are being studied by the League Commission. He is also in touch with the various centres in Europe where methods of combating leprisy are being studied.

The investigation may subsequently be extended to the Far East.

A strange discovery has been made at Scotland Yard, which has resulted in a precision now followed for 22 years being revealed somewhat peremptorily, owing to a doubt as to where the responsibility rests. Visitors to the Foreign Office from the quadrangle have noticed in the reception hall a person in civilian dress. He is really is a policeman who has been detailed by special duty there, for which duty the Foreign Office, strictly speaking, should be responsible for a special fee. It is understood a police officer was placed in the hall originally to deal with fraudulent callers, who made themselves a nuisance or became disruptive. The uniformed Foreign Office official has no power of arrest, but the constable, although in plain clothes, has this authority.

VALUES EXPECTED TO REMAIN STRAIGHT.

The following reference to the East African Seal Market is contained in Messrs. Wigwag's report for June—

### "COME OUT TO EAST AFRICA."

**Business of Zanibar's Advice to Merchants.**

He was taken during the morning over the Ship Canal docks and he went for a sail in the motor launch "Bookland" along the Ship Canal. Ships welcomed him with green, and Lascar saluted cheerfully.

"I have never seen anything so wonderful," he said.

### NON-CO-OPERATION FAILURE IN INDIA.

**"As Dead as a Doornail."**

#### A LEADER'S ADVICE.

"Non-co-operation has been played out, but the possibility of non-co-operation still remains. It is the duty of the clear-headed patriots to remove that possibility by the methods of achievement of freedom must be decided upon by time and expediency," declared Dr. P. Varadachariar, president of the Congress National Conference recently.

Dr. Naidu opined that Nationalists must co-operate with the Government wherever it was necessary for the good of the citizens, but non-co-operate or obstruct the Government wherever it tried to tighten its grip over the people or launch on a policy of repression.

#### Independence Idea Boosted.

It was the speaker's conviction that Dominion Status for India on terms of perfect equality with Britain was a higher ideal than absolute Independence. British opinion was a necessary evil, and he had no faith in a Federation of Asian Nations.

The present system of "irresponsible Government," he said, must be ended at an early date, and the sovereignty of India transferred from the Secretary of State to the Indian people. To secure this object and to force the hands of the Government he would advocate and support even non-payment of taxes, but would never be a party to the talk of complete Independence and severance of the British connection.

#### "Accept Office."

Turning to the question of acceptance of office, Dr. Naidu said:

"I consider it wrong and suicidal to boycott the Councils and refuse to take office hereafter. It is my patriotic duty to warn the next Congress against the folly of repeating the boycott of the Councils. The All-India Congress Committee that met at Bombay last month has practically rejected the Tamil Nadu Congress Committee's proposal regarding office acceptance. It is an eyewash to say, that due to the Viceroy's an-

ouncement extending the term of the Assembly, the Tamil Nadu leaders did not present a decision. As both of these had passed by it, the All-India Congress Committee would have rejected it. Tamil Nadu Congress had not the courage to publish a decision. A I. C. C. must have done a great service if it had independently given a decision in the controversy regarding office acceptance. It is regrettable that the A. I. C. C. has failed to do so.

#### "Revolt Against Congress."

"There is no such a difference. I consider it my national duty to revolt against the Congress decision, and if non-co-operation is actually regarding the boycott of the Councils and acceptance of Ministership, now or later, and use all my influence to secure adequate support for the Nationalists in capturing all the elements of power and influence in the Government from the village Panchayat to the Legislature, and resist the Government. However, it is tried to impede the growth of national freedom. Non-co-operation has failed, and it is idle and unwise to try to revive it any longer. All our actions should be guided by expediency and statesmanship."

#### A New Nationalist Party.

In conclusion, the speaker made a strong plea for the formation of a new party. Neither of the existing parties, he declared, had put before them any programme, and was their past record such as to inspire confidence into the public mind. Therefore, it was absolutely necessary and urgent that a new party, pledged to the ideals of political freedom and social justice, should be organized to capture all Government institutions from village Panchayats to Legislatures. 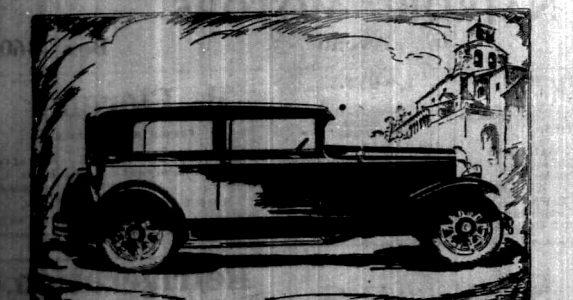

The Sultan leaves Glasgow on Thursday, taking his suite and arriving at Edinburgh in the evening, where he stays until Saturday morning.

### NON-CO-OPERATION FAILURE IN INDIA.

"As Dead as a Door Nail."

#### A LEADER'S ADVICE

"Non-co-operation has been played out, but the possibility of non-operation still remains. It is the duty of the non-co-operators to remove that possibility in the interests of our future, but the methods of achievement of freedom must be decided upon by the people and accordingly," declared Mr. Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, presiding over the Poona-Satara Political Conference recently.

Mr. Naidu opined that Nationalism must co-operate with the Government wherever it was necessary for the good of the citizens; but non-co-operate or obstruct the Government wherever it tried to tighten its grip over the people or launch on a policy of repression.

#### Independence Idea Boosted.

It was the speaker's conviction that Dominion Status for India on terms of perfect equality with Britain was a higher ideal than absolute Independence. British non-co-operation was a necessary evil, and he had no faith in a Federation of Asiatic Nations.

The present system of "irresponsible Government," he said, must be ended at an early date, and the sovereignty of India transferred from the Secretary of State to the Indian people. To secure this object and to force the hands of the Government he would advocate anti support even non-payment of taxes, but would give a party to the full talk of complete Independence and severance of the British connection.

#### "Accept Obedience"

Turning to the question of acceptance of office, Mr. Naidu said: "I consider it wrong and suicidal to boycott the Councils and refuse to take office hereafter. It is my patriotic duty to warn the non-co-operators against the folly of repeating the boycott of the Councils. The All-India Congress Committee that met at Bombay last month has practically repudiated the Tamil Nadu Congress Committee's proposal regarding office acceptance. It is an error which is due to the Victory's an-

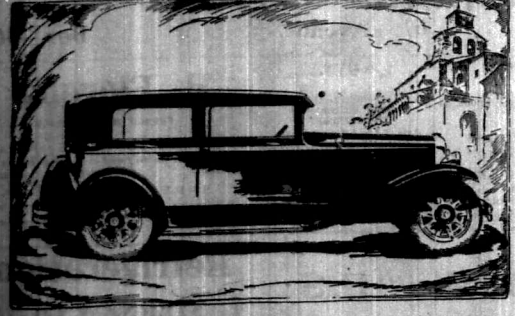

PROGRESS OF THE TRADER HORN FILM.

Details Which Make Picture True to Life.

THE CONGO NEXT.

When Trader Horn began to enjoy in full measure the fruits of his labours in the African bush, his business with natives having developed into a really progressive concern, he built a residential store or depot, in the heart of his wide hunting area he covered. It was a combination of wood and of a permanent structure.

Now, the film corporation which is engaged in the interior of Uganda on the production of a picture on the life of Trader Horn is approaching the filming of that period of prosperity. The portion is following the detail of the life of Trader Horn so closely as it is possible, and, in order to preserve the true atmosphere of his life in the bush, the handsome store is being constructed at the location near Elmor Camp. It has taken three and a half weeks to build it.

The Motor-Goldwyn-Mayer Film Corporation players and technical staff will remain at the Elmor Camp location for about a fortnight. They will then move into the Belgian Congo, proceeding later to Urundi and then to Kampala. It is expected that the Company will be in Kampala for a short stay during the latter part of August.

Filming Begins Seriously. As was stated previously in the "Standard" the intention is to take a feature film.

One of my investigations is to make with the new talking device, the records of every beast and bird in the jungle. Mr. W. B. Van Dyke, the Director of the film, has said: "Of course, any number of picture people have taken wild animal life; but this is the first time an experiment has been made with the various notes of the jungle."

The preliminary work has been completed," he continued. "The

And because this involves the setting up of electric light plants for glass lights, all the newest sound equipment, radio devices, specially equipped gas generators and conveyors of film, cameras and what not the most extraordinary outfit that imagination has ever seen will start moving inland from the Belgian Congo coast early in May. The payment will involve something half way between a circus parade and a military invasion.

"Holly wood actors being what they are, all the comforts of home are to be provided wherever possible. Some of the do-lane features of the equipment are a complete electrical refrigeration system, an electronic electric fan apparatus to keep the performers cool while they work and sleep, a special spraying system to keep off the mosquitoes, flies and insects in general, a British medical expert on fevers, waxes and tropical diseases, a medicine chest of waxes and inoculations to ward off illness, special sleeping equipment and a thousand odd-and-ends which will tend to keep the stars "in good humour." For, with as terrific an expense, any transportation outfit or walk-out would be nothing short of disastrous."

HISTORY OF LOCUSTS IN KENYA.

Worst Infestation Lasted 7 Years.

THEir PRESENT POSITION.

The following locust report was issued by the Deputy Director of Agriculture yesterday:—

Fying Swarms. Between May and May's hordes a continuing cloud of locusts was seen flying south-west. All kinds of small insect swarms had been noted. No further reports as to the movements of the swarms noted in last week's report are to hand and there are no reports as yet of damage to crops.

Hoppers Area.

In Kenya generally matters are progressing smoothly and favourably. Trade continues to be encouraged out in Haringo to enable work to be done on a large scale in the North of the lake. On account of the difficult nature of some of this undeveloped country operations are either impossible or very much hampered.

The Northern Frontier Province is very lightly infested this season; the majority of hoppers being in the region of Lake Rudolph.

Heavy work is being done in the Mandi-Kalado area, so also in the Voi district.

No information is yet to hand regarding progress in Karandi where some ten locust officers are now employed, possibly, but late to affect more than a small clearance.

There are altogether no hundred locust officers employed.

One is frequently asked how many locust hoppers may remain in the Colony. The recent of collections since 1929 indicates that twice up to date there have been lengthy periods, viz. 1931-1932 and 1934-1935. During these periods flying swarms have been reported several times, each year. Hoppers have been reported only five times. Four of the

ports having come from the Voi district.

Comparisons.

The table below is intended to compare the present invasion with the two most important periods, in December, January and June, July.

In the 1914-1917 period there must have been at least seven. It is clear that when natives say that flying swarms have been seen for four consecutive years, they probably mean four years actually and not as is often suggested, four rainy seasons or two years.

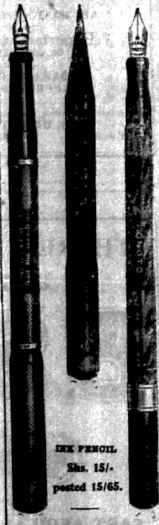
From the above record, it is not possible to state whether the present locust infestation marks the middle of the period of infestation or not. That is, in fact, a matter of conjecture. We know that parasitism of flying locusts is now frequently noticed, but the increase in bird life is not yet very great, although there is an increase.

Under his tutor, he is a bit more than the people should attain some degree of proficiency.

**A Bitter Record.**  
There is an air of maturity about the record of Stoker Shippey, whose fight with the former holder of the title, who has won forty drawn fights and lost five. In the course of these fights, Stoker decided the issue, and only once was he defeated. He is the holder of the light-heavyweight championship of the East India Fleet, which he won on points a few months ago, he added another scalp to his bag when he met and defeated the heavyweight champion of the Middlesex Regiment at Madras this year. 
