THE PIG INDUSTRY CONSULTING COMMITTEE.

Advices to Breeders on Feeding Stock. BACON PRICES

The Pig Industry Consulting Committee held its first meeting at Nairobi on Monday of this week under the chairmanship of the Hon. A. H. H. M. Director of Agriculture...

The Committee heartily endorse the reasons recommended that bacon curers and pork butchers should not buy pigs of inferior quality and decided to appeal to the pork butchers for their active co-operation...

It was noted that as a result of the recent reduction in bacon prices to the manufacturer, the consumption had risen and it was hoped that this rise would be maintained. A point of importance was the fact that bacon prices in the country were now higher than elsewhere, though the latter has been experienced before in the history of the country.

New Market. Some time ago directed to the investigation of the opening up of new markets. The requirements of the trade in regard to the Indian and Egyptian markets are now being studied.

The question of cheaper freight rates for pig floss received considerable attention but although the subject was forwarded to the Railway Commission...

## WHEN KINGS WOKED MIRACLES.

### Ceremony Instituted by the Confessor.

### A NOTABLE FAILURE

The King's recovery recalls quaint old customs of a by-gone day, when kings were believed by their loyal subjects to possess the power of healing some diseases by the mere laying-on of hands.

Queen Anne was the last ruler to perform the ceremony, but she was not a great success. In the case of Dr. Beane, Johnson's assistant, the man who made the ceremony was among 400 people to receive the laymen of hands on March 30, 1714, when he was four years old; but he remained a life-long victim of asthma.

### The Confessor.

Edward the Confessor first pressed the ceremony, when he was based on the assumption that power was given to the King the moment the Holy Oil was applied during the Coronation ceremony. It must, however, have been an expensive custom, for each applicant for having the king was expected to make a money present. In the time of King Edward III this was usually a rose-gold, a gold coin bearing on one side the king's image in a ship; and a religious inscription on the other.

Henry VII, who was a pious person, was even more generous. He insisted on paying over a gold signet-ring, a coin of the purest gold, which bore the image of an angel standing with horns like a dragon. The practice cost him something like £5,000 each year.

Queen Elizabeth was a most successful practitioner. It is on record that "A Roman Catholic, who was very firm in his communion, happened to be thrown into prison, probably on account of his religion. There he became terribly afflicted with the King's Evil; and, having applied himself to physicians, and gone through a long fatigue of pain and expense, without the least success, at last

he was touched by the Queen, and perfectly cured."  
 He seems to have been a grateful patient. This is what he said of the cure: "I am now satisfied by experimental proof, that the Pope's announcement, making since this still continued blessed with an Elizabeth's quality."

James I was, further. He was interested in scientific matters, and so, no doubt, was satisfied concerning his mystic power. And he was a careful person, horn still continued blessed with an Elizabeth's quality."

Charles II, who was the most popular leader who ever sat on the throne of England, "Touching" dabbed in orthodox medicine. The numbers applying to him for treatment were overwhelming, but apparently he did not feel that very much. If he touched him, he turned up at the appointed time; if it didn't, he didn't. He was a very human king.

### As Peppys put it:—

"June 28, 1660. To my lord's lodgings, and there stayed to see the King touch for the King's Evil. But he did not come at all; it rained and the poor people were forced to stand all the morning in the rain in the garden."

Which was just what might have been expected of Charles.

### In the Park.

Yet when he was in the mood he was willing to do a good turn to the most ill-favoured of his subjects. There was a man named Arnie Evans, generally known as Evans the Prophet, whose condition was so repulsive that none would present him to the King to be touched. He was covered with sores, and altogether was a disgusting spectacle. But he was a man not easily daunted, and, taking up his station in St. James' Park, where he knew the King would walk, he waited. Presently the King came along. Evans cried out and attracted his notice. Palling upon his knees, he loudly exclaimed, "O God bless your Majesty!"

Charles laughed, and despite the protests of his attendants, laid out his hand for the man to kiss. The Prophet was waiting no chance. Starting forward he seized the royal hand, and first kissing it, rubbed it on his forehead, inserted nose, which, so it is recorded, from that time improved and ultimately recovered. —(Sunday Express).

## EAST AFRICAN RECIPES.

### Marrow.

Just now there seems to be a good number of marrow about, and either the green or yellow varieties may be used in several ways.

### Marrow Soup.

Put a desiccated portion of dripping to melt in a stew-pan over the fire. When it is melting out into small pieces, add pepper, salt, a slice or two of onion, and one or two sprigs of parsley, and stir well together. Add a quart of water, and boil about a quarter of an hour. Strain the soup into a bowl, and add a couple of spoonsful of cream, and a little butter, and serve with a slice of toast.

It is sufficiently thick. Serve very hot.

### Stuffed Marrow.

Use very small marrow. Cut in halves lengthways, and take out the seeds with a spoon. Boil in salt water until almost cooked. Take out and drain, leaving good space to insert the stuffing in the cavity left by the seeds, pack a stuffing made of rice, onion, one teaspoonful of bread crumbs, one large onion chopped finely, half a teaspoonful chopped parsley, quarter of a teaspoonful chopped nutmeg, herbs, one egg, salt and pepper to taste.

Put the two halves, filled with the stuffing, together, and tie securely with string. Place with hot fat in a stew-pan, and cook until almost browned.

If instead of rice, beef or mutton, is added to the above ingredients for stuffing, the marrow can be used as the best course for a light lunch, and it is a good way to use the surplus of marrow. Serve with a good brown sauce gravy.

### Marrow Turnovers.

Take a full sized marrow, say about five or six pounds. Wash out the seeds, peel it, and cut into one inch cubes. Place in cold water for twelve hours. Then take out and weigh, and use about one pound of marrow, allow one pound of sugar. Let it stand, covered with hot sugar for another twelve hours. Drain the juice and rind of three lemons. Cut the rind very finely with mincer, and boil with the marrow. Tie up in muslin, one and a half ounces of bruised ginger, and two dozen cayenne pods. This is to be taken out when the syrup is according to taste. Boil all gently until the marrow looks clear and the syrup rather thick. It takes about two hours to boil gently. A wine glassful of whisky or rum to every four pounds improves the flavor and helps the preserve to keep.

### Boiled Marrow.

Cut the marrow into pieces about two inches square and boil till tender. Drain carefully and pour over it a good white sauce, it is essential that marrow be served very hot.

### Fried Marrow.

Cut in large pieces and boil as above. Drain well and coat each piece with egg and breadcrumbs, and fry in deep fat until browned. Put on a wire tray to drain. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and finely chopped parsley, and serve hot.

### Mashed Marrow.

Boil as above, and beat with a fork or press through a sieve. Add a tablespoonful of melted butter and pepper and salt to taste. Stir over the fire, gradually stirring in a tablespoonful of flour until the

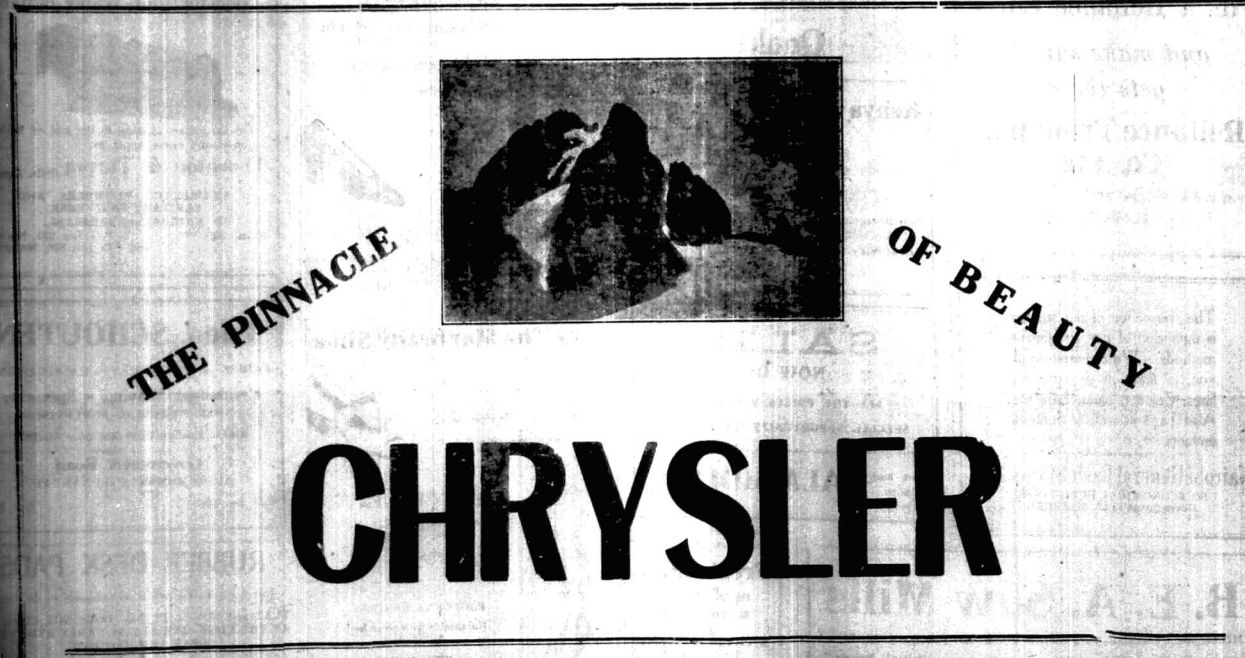

"TURNING UP THE WICK".

Hints for Motor-Cycle Speedsters.

A PRIMARY CONSIDERATION.

Modern motor cycle engines, more especially those of 350 c.c. and upwards, produce so much power that anything beyond a brief full opening of the throttle on the road is rendered impossible by the speed limitations of the road. Thus, barring road races, little opportunity is afforded to open the throttle unless a racing track is used.

The wider the throttle is opened, the more heat is developed in the engine. On the road it is seldom possible to run on full throttle for more than a mile; thus there is seldom time enough to obtain maximum heat conditions.

On the race track your engine soon attains a temperature it has never reached before, the piston is swelling, the cylinder distorting, the valves stretching, and the plug baking. Very likely your jet, which has been set for the road, is not big enough to supply a sufficiently rich mixture for sustained full throttle—so a weak mixture is being used, a very common cause of overheating. Additionally, as the engine heats up, the ignition charge expands and so a full charge is not drawn in and the power starts to fall off.

Beyond the air draught there is only the lubricating oil to seal in the engine cooling. Therefore, an increased oil supply is called for. Full throttle work sends oil consumption up in an extraordinary

Obviously, this process of "turning up the wick" may be approached cautiously—especially if the machine is anything like new.

Primarily, for speed work—the correct gear ratio must be ascertained, so that the engine runs as light as possible, bearing in mind the power curve of the engine. This means that the highest gear ratio possible should be used on which the maximum speed required for the occasion is attained. On the same time, however, consideration has to be given, particularly for road use, to the fact that the engine will not be able to maintain a high speed for long periods, and that the engine will over-heat.

Next, attention must be given to developing a perfect piston; and to do this without spoiling the cylinder-bore requires special attention and patience. Piston clearance, rings and ring gaps as used on the road are useless on the track, and unless an oil seal will run in piston in the engine, it is necessary to fit one with special clearances before attempting any sustained speed work. Even then the piston must be carefully rubbed over many laps of the track, starting at a minimum of throttle and opening up by consecutive stages until which, if the slightest sign of "drying up" be noticed the piston must be withdrawn, all high speeds carefully filed down, and the rings filed, either by rubbing down their edges or by increasing their gaps.

The most suitable plug will only be found by experiment, and some trouble will be caused, no attempt should be made to vary it, since the increased heat conditions set up by the faulty plug will start piston trouble, which may result due to insufficient clearance.

Having solved these problems, matters of adjustment and valve timing offer endless avenues for research and experiment, as also do compression ratios, fuel, timing, tyre, riding positions and a host of other details making up the complete engine cycle.

One can only repeat—"turn up the wick" cautiously, never ignore an unusual sound or sensation, be prepared for many failures and remember that the old saying "the engine cannot be made without breaking legs" was never more applicable than to the development of a speed bike—"The Headlight".

Long memoranda were read from East African organizations in regard to the Bill. Young Bepko said the Board consisted of 11 members to suspend notice until it was in possession of Sir Hearn's views.

#### An African Candidate.

The Board also considered Mr. J. H. Hofmeyr's proposal for East and South African Conference.

Sir Edward Grigg suggested that this was a matter for the Imperial and Union Governments. The Government in East Africa could do nothing except look out for the Imperial Conference in 1910.

#### E. A. Cotton.

There was a lengthy discussion on correspondence received from the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce on the probably cotton prices in 1910 and their effect upon cotton growing in East Africa.

Mr. Higgins (Liverpool) intimated the receipt of reports from Tanganyika indicating that if prices dropped much further, natives would revert to growing foodstuffs and abandon cotton. He said that the price was likely to fall still further and he urged proposals to turn native against discrimination of cotton growing. Mr. Higgins undertook to submit concrete proposals to the Board.

### A KIKUYU CHIEF'S MASAI LAND.

#### An Echo of Kinyanjui's Death.

#### K.D.S.A. REVOLUTION.

An interesting fact concerning the late Kinyanjui, Paramount Chief of the Kikuyu Tribe, was revealed during a discussion at yesterday's meeting as members of the Kikuyu District Settlers Association.

It will be recalled that the Paramount Chief of the Kikuyu died last March. It was reported in the "Standard" at the time that his death was due to blood poisoning which he contracted while on a visit to his grazing lands in the Masai Reserve. The late Chief of the Kikuyu being grazing grounds in the Masai Reserve constituted some surprise, though no satisfactory explanation was obtained at the time.

The question of Kikuyu farms and cultivating land in the Masai Reserve came before yesterday's meeting of the Kikuyu District Settlers Association in the form of a resolution which will be discussed at the next meeting of the Convention of Associations. The resolution was to the effect that the Government be requested to lay down rules and regulations which will ensure maintenance of policy in native reserves, with special reference to the Masai Reserve, and

men who had been consulted did not regard the situation as likely to cause anxiety. During the past 20 years cotton had fluctuated and it would do so in the future. Low prices might cause a setback but this would only be temporary. Sir Humphrey Leggett said that there were now 25,000 bales of Empire cotton worth a million pounds in Manchester without a buyer.

Major Steele recalled the reference in the "East African Standard" to Kinyanjui's death following a visit to one of his grazing grounds in the Masai Reserve. It had occurred to him as being rather strange and he had been desirous to know how Kinyanjui had come into possession of grazing grounds in Masai land.

Major Steele applied the explanation which was that one of Kinyanjui's many wives, was a Masai woman, who, although married to the Kikuyu, retained her tribal rights and the grazing rights which included the grazing ground where Kinyanjui contracted his fatal illness.

#### Death Duties.

#### THEIR ABOLITION TO KEEP A TRAGEDY

Mr. Ernest Carr, Nairobi, asked at a public meeting at Nairobi yesterday how one could avoid payment of death duties in Kenya. It has come as a surprise to a large number of residents in the Colony that death duties are applied to property in Kenya, though

representations are to be made for their abolition.

At a meeting of the Kikuyu District Settlers Association yesterday reference was made to a resolution on the point which will come before the next meeting of the Convention of Associations, the resolution being that the death duties should be abolished. It was explained that in such a young Colony death duties represented a very serious burden, particularly in the case of farms which had been newly acquired and upon the development of which considerable sums of money had been spent. It was thought that the country could reasonably ask for their abolition.

It was stated that the death duties in Kenya Colony were as follows:—Under £200, £200-£500, 1 per cent.; £500-£1,000, 2 per cent.; £1,000-£2,000, 3 per cent.; £2,000-£5,000, 4 per cent.; £5,000-£10,000, 5 per cent.; £10,000-£20,000, 6 per cent.; £20,000-£50,000, 7 per cent.; £50,000-£100,000, 8 per cent.; £100,000-£200,000, 9 per cent.; £200,000-£500,000, 10 per cent.; £500,000-£1,000,000, 11 per cent.; £1,000,000-£2,000,000, 12 per cent.; £2,000,000-£5,000,000, 13 per cent.; £5,000,000-£10,000,000, 14 per cent.; £10,000,000-£20,000,000, 15 per cent.; £20,000,000-£50,000,000, 16 per cent.; £50,000,000-£100,000,000, 17 per cent.

Mr. Carr asked if that rate one had to dispose of one's property in order to have payment of death duties.

It was informed that a could probably avoid payment of the duties if he disposed of his property the day before his death—if he knew when he was going to die.



## THE LOCUST TRAIN AT WORK.

### Scattering Death Over a Big Area.

### OLD FIRE ENGINE'S USES.

The operations of the locust train proved on the most interesting features of the anti-locust campaign in the Masai Reserve. It is also probably, one of the most effective units in the active organization since it not only makes an excellent means of communication for locusts in the area, but also concentrates on the destruction of millions of hoppers which seem to find a fascination in a railway line. The branch line which is used practically exclusively for the transport of soda from Lake Magadi to the main line junction was from under 2,000 feet to 5,675 feet in altitude. Even under normal conditions, full steaming locomotives are not able to load up the steep gradients, and now, when the line is covered by dense swarms of hoppers at several points, there is always the likelihood of trains being brought to a stop.

The East African Standard representative who made a tour of the locust campaign in the Masai Reserve last week end, travelled from Nairobi Station to Turika Station on one of the ordinary trains from Magadi to the Junction. ### The Locust Train.

The danger zone is between mile 38 and mile 56. The locust train operates between the two points, the officer in charge being kept informed regularly by the drivers of the ordinary trains of the infestation. The locust train is a daily run at sunrise. Before the start of the day the locusts are already dead at the time baiting and spraying is done more easily and more effectively. The train travels at a comparatively slow pace. A swarm of hoppers is seen on the line or in the bush near by. The officer in charge stops the train, draws his whistle and jumps from the footplate to supplement the work of the boys. By this time, know their job well. Before the train is brought to a stop they are getting out the spraying hose and are 100 and 150 yards in length. There are two poison tanks and four hoses two on each side, are attached to each tank. Other boys jump to the pumps on the top of the tanks, and the officer is sprayed on to the swarms. Meanwhile the engine is scouting the way in the direction of the locusts.

WORLD BOXING TITLES.



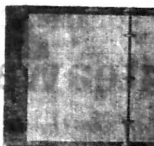

## THE INDIAN COMMUNITY IN KENYA.

Position of State Servants and the Artisan.

REASSURING THE COLONY.

The Hon. A. H. Malik, M.L.C. in his article today, discusses the position of Indians in Government service, artisans in industry and the professional class. He declares that no serious Government and no body of artisans has any desire to adopt a policy of non-cooperation.

(By the Hon. A. H. Malik, M.L.C.)

Having dealt broadly with Agriculture and Commerce, the important occupations that a community can adopt, and having examined the position of the Indian community with regard to these, I shall now examine the position of the Indian community in the Public Service and industry. It must be borne in mind that the Services in general considered an inferior occupation in comparison with Agriculture, Commerce and other professions, a consideration very important for the Indian population of the country, and in considering the general strength and status of the community it is impossible to do so without giving very full attention to the position employed in various services. Since the Indian community began looking through commerce and managed industries as a few it is the Service people who have suffered most. It is therefore of paramount importance to safeguard the interests of these people, the majority of whom are made helpless by the conditions of their service. They can not take active part in the politics of the country and they are unable to raise their voice for or against a measure which they would like to do so. It is the duty of the State to take steps to do with the agitation should be the target of all the sufferings.

Letting Ground. The Government has not been slow to take steps to improve the position of the Indian community in the Public Service and industry. It is a fact that the Indian community in the Public Service and industry has been suffering from the conditions of their service. It is therefore of paramount importance to safeguard the interests of these people, the majority of whom are made helpless by the conditions of their service. They can not take active part in the politics of the country and they are unable to raise their voice for or against a measure which they would like to do so. It is the duty of the State to take steps to do with the agitation should be the target of all the sufferings.

Government Servants. To do justice to the subject, it is necessary to divide this occupation into two parts, viz. (1) Government and Railway service of the clerical type and (2) general service of the artisan class. As pointed out in the analysis of population 10 per cent of the employed Indians are employed in Government and Railway service. ## CRICKET IN ENGLAND.

### South Africans Considered "Easy Meat."

#### THE BEST LAD SOLEMNS "GANG APT AGLIE."

**STANFORD CORNERSTONE.**  
 London, July 15.—The South African cricketers were on their way to England, and during the early part of their tour, there was a tendency among those players to regard them as "easy meat." For the men who had just returned victorious from Australia, but no such idea can now be entertained, in view of what happened at Birmingham during the first of the Test matches between South Africa and England. The "Spring-bobblers" not only drew the game, but drew in a good position, for having scored 171 for one wicket in their second innings, they were only 100 behind England when stumps were put down. The visitors had gained a head of 100 runs on what might be considered a somewhat "easy" wicket. This position is a perfect blending of youth and experience. Certainly Test matches with South Africa can no longer be regarded as mere practice contests for more serious games with Australia, and it is there that the men, despite a certain "stolidity" in batting during their first innings, may feel well satisfied with their first test at the Lion.

The English batting on the first day was disappointing, and but for a timely stand between Peasey Hancock and Martin Tate, who made 70 and 60 respectively, the home team would have been out for a very small total. E. T. Killick, the young Cambridge University batsman, who in the absence of Hobbs went in to open the match with Sutcliffe, scored 63 runs in good style, but E. H. Dalglish, who is a batsman also included in a Test team for the first time, made only 12 before being caught off Mordaunt's bowling. Mitchell took three wickets for 40, but O'Keefe, the South African fast bowler, who captured four wickets for 70 runs, was the man mainly responsible for England being all out on the 245. South Africa made a good start in reply to this by no means good total, and for the first time in the history of the Tests between the two countries their leading batsmen topped the century in partnership, as E. H. Cattell and B. Mitchell making 67 and 88 respectively, carried the score to three figures before being separated. The cricket, however, was very dull, and because still more dismal when, after Leavelle and Tate had obtained cheap wickets and later South African batsmen demonstrated in the off-stump to exceed the English score. This aim was achieved, but when England went

in again all hope of a finish, which was a possibility, after the departure of Killick (24) stayed together to place the home country in a firm position. Sutcliffe made 114, his death Test century, and Hancock carried his bat for 100, the innings being destined closed at 300 for the first South Africa nearly 2 1/2 hours in which to get the 304 runs necessary for victory, and Cattell and Mitchell bore the task at a wicketless pace by scoring 100 runs in 1 1/2 hours. There was never any prospect of a finish, however, though Cattell suffered a disappointment in being caught by J. C. White off P. G. Fender's bowling when within two runs of his century.

The outstanding feature of the other first-class cricket during the season period was the manner in which Middlesex frustrated Lancashire's efforts to force a victory at Lord's, where Leas, the home county's professional, scored a century in each innings, carrying his bat for 100 at the close. Lancashire, for whom Ernest Tyldesley made 102, gained a first innings lead of 18 runs, and in an effort to force a win declared their second innings closed at 210 for nine, Hopwood making 100 not out. Thanks to Leas, however, Middlesex were able to even details.

Gloucestershire gained a remarkable victory over Sussex, who were beaten by 56 runs at Epsom, after gaining a lead of 300 runs and forcing the Welsh county to follow on. Gloucestershire batted splendidly at the second attempt and were all out for 408, Guy Morgan, the Cambridge University and Welsh International, three-quarter back, being top scorer with 91 not out. Sussex had an especially simple task in scoring 204 runs for victory, but were all out for 147. Essex taking five wickets for 77 runs and E. Davies four for 94. In Gloucestershire's first innings, which realised 101, Wansley had captured five wickets for 49 runs and James Langridge four for 25. Yorkshire defeated Nottinghamshire by five wickets in a low-scoring game at Sheffield, after gaining a first innings lead of 46 runs with a score of 205. Some splendid bowling by Wilfred Rhodes, who took seven wickets for 68 runs, brought about a Nottingham collapse in the second innings, and Yorkshire needed only 97 runs to win. They lost five wickets in obtaining these, however.

In the few of the first innings score of 840 Essex, Surrey did well to draw their match at the Oval, but after setting the home county out for 208 Essex captain did not enforce their follow-on, and believed his destination (as 115 for seven) until dangerously late. Surrey seized the chance and with good batting by Sandham, Baring, Shepherd and Gregory managed to save the score with 261 for three wickets. Despite batting fatigue at the head of the table, Nottinghamshire defeated Worcestershire at

Worcester by 66 runs. The home county's total was 119 and 80 respectively, and Clark bowled well in each innings, taking nine wickets for 67 in the match. Leicestershire, after gaining a first innings lead of 60 with a total of 270 (Berry 100) got Gloucestershire on a second time for 151 and had no difficulty in winning by eight wickets. Both University teams were beaten, Cambridge, without Killick, losing to Somerset by an innings and 71 runs, and Oxford failing to defeat Derbyshire, who won by seven wickets.

Bain interfered a little with the matches played during the previous three days, but the match between Surrey and Gloucestershire was over in two days, owing to the fact that the Welsh county, going in first, were all out for 97 runs, of which Bates, the first man in, made 38. Six of the other batsmen made no score, and Alton and Gregory bowled unchanged, the former taking 5 wickets for 14 runs and the latter five for 22. Surrey's reply was in very different straits, and before stumps were drawn for the day they had made 205, of which Sandham had contributed 187 and Duns 70. Fender declared at the total on the second morning and Gloucestershire, though making a better show, were all out again for 108, and Surrey were successful by an innings and 75 runs.

Derbyshire were not engaged in any match, and Lancashire met Oxford University in a drawn game, the county championship table was unaltered for as the principal issues were concerned. Bain spoiled the chance of victory entertained by Essex, for whom Nichols, the test bowler, brought about a collapse in the middle of the Sussex innings, and the match at Hereford ended in a draw. The element also prevented a decision at Bradford, where Yorkshire gained first innings points from Northamptonshire and for a similar reason the test between a Minor Counties XI and the South Africans, at Stoke-on-Trent, had to be left drawn. Sydney Barnes came out of his shell with a fine spell of bowling for the Minor Counties, and W. T. Cook, of Sussex, bats i well in a game which saw the Minor Counties man rather superior to the tourists. Middlesex defeated Hampshire, at Lord's, by six wickets, but the scoring was low, as the home county's total were 192 and 122 for four respectively, and Hampshire made 154 and 166. Kent won their match with Leicestershire at Tunbridge Wells by 81 by runs, thanks to some fine bowling by Wright and Freeman. Cambridge University saved their match with Gloucestershire, but it rained so heavily on the third day at Worcester that no play was possible in the match between Nottinghamshire and Worcester'sshire, which was left drawn; four Norths had declared at 350 for four and taken seven Worcestershire wickets for 44 runs.

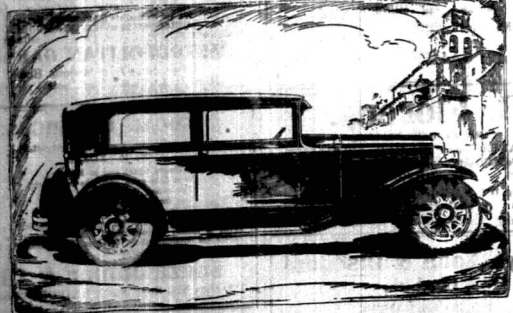

It is frequently stated that there is hardly a single job about a modern light car which cannot be tackled by the owner. In fact this is one of the principal talking points of up-to-date maintenance. Doubtless it is quite true—providing a man has the same cautious knowledge and necessary skill demanded by the variety of the work both large and small which crop up from time to time. The whole point is, however, that unless a man has had certain mechanical experience he is very foolish indeed to attempt on ambitious undertakings like taking down the engine or even withdrawing an axle shaft, but in his mindless eagerness he may quite likely make the attempt in the belief that he might be doing harm to do the job and that in any case he will have no difficulty if he props up the instruction book or his work bench.

It would be more correct to say that anybody with the smallest aptitude should be able, and ought to tackle routine jobs. The question naturally arises: Where does simple routine and complication begin?

How it may be asked, can anybody become enthusiastic about a job which is not as though it had to be done once in a way, or the contrary, it must be undertaken at least once a fortnight. The reason why most people loathe greasing is because they endeavor to make it a kind of experience. It does not occur to them perhaps why they are waiting for their passengers that they just have time to run over

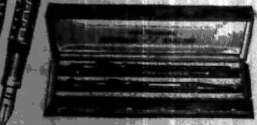

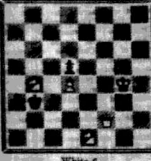

**SOLUTIONS.**

Problem No. 1016. ("L" in the Tourney) Composed by Dr. J. B.

Armstrong. No Solution Possible! The intention was, Key 1, B-c1 with various excellent mates including pretty play by the Pawn. (Unhappy both the Composer and myself overtook that the intended mate by P-c4, after Qx1, is spoiled by the Queen interposing at d2!)

This is one of those instances, much prized by solvers, when they have the opportunity of demonstrating the human frailty of the Chess Editor and the Problem Composer. In the whole history of this column, since I started it in 1911, this the first case in which an unsolvable problem has appeared in any competition. With the exception of a task problem by Mr. W. H. M. Fowler, which proved defective, we have never even printed an unsolvable problem. Hitherto we have always been able to dispense the claims of "No Solution" that solvers frequently make. In this case the solvers are right, and it shows the reason for the rule which gives full marks for a correct claim that a problem cannot be solved. It provides for such an emergency as this, but as the Composer has withdrawn the problem, I am glad to say we shall not need to apply Rule 2.

Several solvers claimed the Composer's key 1, B-c1, and several other failed to make any claim at all.

A Telegram from Tanganyika. Dr. Armstrong, finding that he couldn't solve his own problem, wired at the end of last week "Apologizing for awful slip. Book should stand on 15" and asking that the problem be cancelled and withdrawn from the tourney." In fairness to everybody, and to preserve the unaltered reputation we enjoy, this "awful" problem is hereby cancelled and replaced by No. 1017 ("L" calling). No top-scores failed to spot the flaw, so it makes no difference in the ladder, and, in any case, I should hate to think that anyone's chances of winning or losing a prize were affected by a composer's mistake. One solver solemnly claimed to have found no less than three key-moves! "Happy mad" you can't!

**Nondescripts Win by the Only Score.**

**THE BETTER COMBINATION WINS.**

More than the ordinary degree of interest centred around the meeting on Saturday of Muthaiga and Nondescripts on the former's ground. Apart from the fact that there was the usual specimen of a "local Derby" encounter, there was the additional flourish of the result practically determining the destination of the Nairobi championship.

**TANGANYIKA'S NORTHERN PROVINCES AND KENYA.**

It is a great pity (says the "Tanganyika Times") that the Mombasa Chamber of Commerce through its representative, Major Furkin, still hangs on to that out-of-date suggestion that the Northern Province of Tanganyika Territory should be transferred for administrative purposes to Kenya. A resolution was again brought up to this effect at the recent sessions in Nairobi of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa and, and rejected. Even the Kenya representative, with a commendable absence of parochialism, thought it an unwise proposal.

We are glad to see also that Arusha, which was believed at one time to be more opposed to federal administration than Mombasa strongly opposed the suggestion, to these ends.

It will be recalled that the matter was discussed at the February sessions of the Associated Chambers held at Mombasa, and it was hoped that the subject would be brought to rest. Judging from the proceedings of the Congress of Association's sessions at Dar-es-Salaam in May, the proposal does not meet with unanimous approval even in Mombasa.

With all this opposition that such a suggestion has aroused, we trust the Mombasa Chamber will realize that the major part of the country is in favour of such a suggestion. They want federation not partition. Even Kenya regards the "gift" with suspicion. Major Furkin will be well-advised to let the subject die a natural death.

**Farmers' Losses.**

Colonel Durheim, who appeared for the repeal of the Ordinance, referred to Captain Schwartze's statement that he had discovered the working of the Ordinance with settlers in the country. He recalled that Captain Schwartze left the Colony a day before the Ordinance was brought into operation and returned only a month ago.

A member—Ken away—  
Capt of "No." "No."  
Colonel Durheim—I can remember that Captain Schwartze did not run away.

Turning to Captain Schwartze's remark on controlling labour, Colonel Durheim declared that farmers in the Nakuru district were losing thousands of hours altogether daily. The natives would not get up before sunrise. When the train hooter went at 5.30 in the afternoon, he left off work, and if the farmer proffered the native would simply say that the hooter was Government time. The Hon. Gidway Harvey also opposed the retention of the Ordinance.

In an abundance of talk, all sorts of amusing reasons were advanced for the repeal of the Ordinance. One gentleman referred to Mr. Gidway Harvey's loss of £2,000 yearly because of the Ordinance, another declared that natives were suffering from chest diseases and the mortality rate was higher because of the alteration of the time, while a lady told a touching story of early morning domestic workers—boys late with first tea, lost sleep—because of the alteration of the time.

When the champions of the measure rose to reply, they had few arguments to advance. Mr. Anderson stated that the only facts before the meeting were that farmers were losing money as a result of the introduction of the Ordinance, and that Mr. Gidway Harvey had lost £2,000. Mr. Gidway Harvey—I never had £2,000 to lose. (Laughter.) Dr. Anderson—I was about to congratulate you on having it to lose. (Roared laughter.)  
A Medical View.  
Continuing Dr. Anderson stated that there was five degrees between Mombasa and the West-

ern boundary of Kenya, representing a difference of twenty minutes in sun-time. There were eight degrees between Nairobi and Zomba. The Uganda labourer, therefore, had always got up twenty minutes before Kenya labourers, and because the Kenya native had now to get up only ten minutes before the time in Zomba, the opportunity of the bird and it should be repeated. He had seen many natives in Kenya and could assure the meeting that it was daylight at 5.30 a.m.

"My opinion as a medical man is that the Ordinance has been of immeasurable benefit to the agricultural and shop assistant class in Nairobi," continued Dr. Anderson. "At the present time, we have no factory legislation; the Shop Hours Act is only a travesty, and until there is some other method of regulating the shop and business hours in the town, the Ordinance should be continued. In this tropical country, the people have sufficient exercise. We must provide the Government with adequate opportunity for outdoor exercise, and that extra half hour makes all the difference whether a man stays in door, or goes out of doors. As a professional man, I never had a game of tennis during the week until the introduction of this Ordinance. There is a suggestion that the shop hours in Nairobi should be altered. I wonder how many farmers would have breakfast at 7 a.m. and lunch at 1 o'clock. How many farmers would go five hours without food?"

**General Case Wanted.**  
Captain C. B. Anderson requested Captain Schwartze's appeal

for genuine arguments in favour of the repeal of the Ordinance. He referred to the statements regarding labour difficulties and mentioned the working of native labour on a small plantation in the Colony. The labourers on the plantation were put on piece work and could start their work at any time they liked. On the occasion of a visit to the farm, he was surprised to see the natives working in the very early morning, and the explanation was that, because of the piece work arrangement, they were all out of work. In consequence of the conservation which existed in the Colony in consequence of the repeal of the Ordinance, and he thought that had got in connection with the alteration of the time.

Captain D. Beaton declared that the Ordinance was costing Nairobi about £2,000 a month in labour, and that the natives had suffered severely in health as a result of the introduction. "It is nothing short of class legislation," he declared.

"Bunk!" said a gentleman in the audience.  
Mr. Bergman, speaking in support of the repeal of the Ordinance, stated that all the Chambers of Commerce in the country were opposed to the measure. This statement was also challenged.

When it was stated that the death rate among natives was higher now than ever before, Dr. Anderson stated that the death rate from pneumonia was always higher at this time of the year. He was rather curious, however, that they had a smaller death rate than in 1928, and he thought the explanation must be that the alteration of the time Ordinance was not in existence in 1928. (Laughter.)

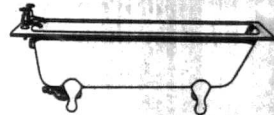

**The Legislative Council.**

The session of the Kenya Legislative Council will be resumed to-day and, under normal circumstances, will be the last before the opening of the Budget session. The principal measures expected to come up for consideration during the next few days include the Motor Service Bill, on second reading, and the amendment to the Municipalities Ordinance. On the subject of the former, which deals with the proposed to extend Motor Services in competition with the railways, it has been made quite clear from the many meetings held throughout the country during the last few weeks that while there is a majority opinion willing to agree that when a case is made out, the Government can afford approval of the principle of limited competition, the fact for urgent action does not exist. The Legislative Council will be asked to approve if it proceeds with any further stages of this contentious measure until the situation has become much clearer and until a full examination of the situation has taken place. A demand has been made on behalf of the public for lengthy discussion of this case in both sides, particularly that of the Bill was Department. The principle should be placed side while some

attempt is made to find just how far its application at an early date is warranted, what the facts are in regard to present competition, what provisions remain in the Bill ways to meet that competition by other means than those proposed and what will be the effects upon the development of private enterprise and the country's economic policy. A survey of the whole field of transportation seems indicated and we hope that the Legislative Council will emerge from the present session with some suggestions concerning the machinery which should be set up to conduct that enquiry and to examine the status of the controlling authority or whose hands such powers may be placed. The second measure arises from the refusal of the Indian community to abandon their present policy of non-co-operation. We are prepared to believe that moderate leaders of the community have realized the futility of that policy and that when the time seems opportune—probably after the settlement of the closer union question—they will be prepared to advocate a return to the Council. But at the moment the conduct of public affairs must not be impaired. The groundwork has been prepared for the proper introduction of such government reform in Municipal problems and administration and the country would be quite unable to tolerate delay dictated by the political prejudices of one section of the community. The history of the past few years has shown that the country can carry on with the active assistance of that section, who have considerably weakened their position as a result of their self-imposed isolation. There are other things which we hope and expect will mark the present session. The first is a declaration of the proposed and terms of reference of the Agricultural Commission. The delay in making this being an enquiry which is nearly a year behind reaching the stage when it can be suitably regarded as a completed. We have been disappointed that the Government has taken the advice of its leaders in this week ago

DAYLIGHT SAVING.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—At last night's meeting several people spoke, good, and convincingly, in favour of repeating the present act of reverting to "God's own time." I wonder whether it has ever occurred to any of these gentlemen that "God's own time" is not actual solar time, it lays at exceptionally few places on the earth? The morning of Greenwich is one of these but there are no many others. In order to demonstrate the point to which I shall presently lead, let us temporarily forget that Dept. Sub-committee have accepted the present Ordinance into effect. Before then we had a fixed time throughout Kenya and Uganda. This, unless my

memory is playing me false, was 24 hours fast of Greenwich. Now, Sir, there is between Kenya, and Port Portal, on the Indian Ocean, a distance of approximately 1,000 miles, or roughly 15 degrees of longitude. Therefore, if the book will show you that there is a difference of five minutes in solar time between any two places one degree apart. Therefore, long before the present Ordinance was introduced, there was an actual difference in "God's own time" of just one hour between Mombasa and Port Portal. Western Uganda had, indeed, been 15 degrees further west! It must surely be apparent, therefore, that as some part of the coast and the Congo Valley, and the neighbourhood of Kisumu, was being urged to diverge time from his, surely he should have done of his own volition. The present time is really only an accident between 11 and 12 o'clock in those days and the hour he would have done of his own volition. The theory that the country is likely to become depopulated through the arrival of the morning sun is rather badly borne by Dr. Anderson's statistics, and the death rate had actually gone down since the Ordinance came into force. PROTECTION—SUGAR

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—May I comment upon the subject in your issue of 11th inst. Messrs. Baker & Co. have been their principal, saying, "The present position of our sugar is deplorable. This means that our own sugar is being exported, although on the other hand Mr. Anderson said we should be exporting in large quantities. The sugar prices given by the Government are not the price of our own sugar, but the price of the world's sugar, which I take to be in the neighbourhood of the average of the prices for our own sugar. I am indebted to Mr. G. A. Tyson for pointing out a mistake, a small one I think you will admit upon reading further, which I made in my last letter, for which I apologise, namely that the Sh. 97 per cwt. mentioned in the Standard Bank review was for raw sugar, not refined. The difference in price between what is called raw sugar and refined is Sh. 97 per cwt. and the difference in appearance is so small that many people out of a hundred would not know one from the other. The Sh. 2 per cwt. can be obtained by market fluctuations, as shown by the quotations here which I have taken from the London sugar market report in the Financial Times of August 12, 1929, namely that the value of refined sugar fell to Sh. 9/10 1/2, but the value of raw sugar, Sh. 9/11 1/2, the date:

I am sorry that Mr. Tyson's comparison of produce of sugar with that of the East is misleading. The kinds of sugar we have been taking about are kinds which would be sold by growers in England. The quality supplied in England is of a high standard and would not be looked at in progress in England, but could only be used for molasses. It is dark in colour and will write to a fine in England, who know all about sugar, to send me samples of various kinds both raw and refined with particulars and will exhibit them on arrival. In reply again to Mr. Tyson I feel sure the property in America cannot be attributed to protection. I do not think the farmers in the States would agree to that. 

**RETAIN PRINCIPLE OF PROTECTION.**

**Report of Kenya Tariff Committee.**

**REDUCTIONS RECOMMENDED.**

**No Change in Railway Policy Pending Closer Union Decisions.**

The Kenya Tariff Committee has issued its report on the subject of the proposed reduction of the Kenya Tariff. The Committee recommends the retention of the principle of protection as necessary to the development not only of Kenya but of other areas in East Africa to which similar industries could be applied.

Maintenance of the Customs Union is urged in view of its great advantages to trade, provided the principle of adequate protection is included in the common tariff.

No change should at present be made in the principles governing the Railway rates, which should play an important part in retaining and extending markets, particularly at the Coast.

Generally, the Committee believes that no alteration in fiscal policy should take place pending decisions on the constitutional issues raised by the Closer Union discussions.

**Reductions in the duty on imports include:**

Bacon and Ham from 80 cts. per lb. to 50 cts. per lb., Butter and Cheese from 8s. 1s per 100 lbs. to 5s. 6d. per 100 lbs., Sugar from 8s. 6d. per 100 lbs. to 8s. 1s. per 100 lbs., Timber from 30 cent ad valorem to specific duties per ton.

**THE CUSTOMS UNION.**

The Report of the Kenya Tariff Committee has now been issued. The Committee has recommended the retention of the principle of protection as necessary to the development not only of Kenya but of other areas in East Africa to which similar industries could be applied.

The Committee also recommends the maintenance of the Customs Union, provided the principle of adequate protection is included in the common tariff.

No change should at present be made in the principles governing the Railway rates, which should play an important part in retaining and extending markets, particularly at the Coast.

Generally, the Committee believes that no alteration in fiscal policy should take place pending decisions on the constitutional issues raised by the Closer Union discussions.

### ELECTED M.L.C. AND THEIR FUTURE.

LA Col. the Hon. C. G. Durban in Legislative Council yesterday asked His Excellency the Provincial or District Officer the power, without reference to the Food Control Board, to prohibit the export of food supplies from the area under his administration?

The Hon. the Acting Attorney General replied: A Provincial or District Officer has power, without reference to the Food Control Board, to prohibit the export of food supplies from the area under his administration if such power is granted to him by a Proclamation issued by His Excellency the Governor in the exercise of powers conferred upon the Governor by section 3 of the Food Control Ordinance, 1929.

**A Prohibition.**

(1) Did the Provincial Commissioner, Kenya, and/or the District Commissioner, South Nyanza prohibit the export of maize and/or maize meal from the South Nyanza District since the beginning of June 1929?

(2) If so, was such action taken arbitrarily or after consultation with the authority of the Food Control Board?

The Hon. the Acting Chief Commissioner replied:

(1) The export of maize and/or maize meal from South Nyanza to the District Commissioner was prohibited by Proclamation No. 31 issued by His Excellency the Acting Governor which appeared in the Official Gazette of 30th February 1929 P. 225 Early in June the District Commissioner owing to a severe local shortage temporarily withheld the permission to export as was within his competence under the Proclamation.

(2) The withholding of permission was within the competence of the District Commissioner under the power granted to him in the Proclamation.

LA Col. the Hon. C. G. Durban in Legislative Council yesterday asked His Excellency the Provincial or District Officer the power, without reference to the Food Control Board, to prohibit the export of food supplies from the area under his administration?

The Hon. the Acting Attorney General replied: A Provincial or District Officer has power, without reference to the Food Control Board, to prohibit the export of food supplies from the area under his administration if such power is granted to him by a Proclamation issued by His Excellency the Governor in the exercise of powers conferred upon the Governor by section 3 of the Food Control Ordinance, 1929.

**A Prohibition.**

(1) Did the Provincial Commissioner, Kenya, and/or the District Commissioner, South Nyanza prohibit the export of maize and/or maize meal from the South Nyanza District since the beginning of June 1929?

(2) If so, was such action taken arbitrarily or after consultation with the authority of the Food Control Board?

The Hon. the Acting Chief Commissioner replied:

(1) The export of maize and/or maize meal from South Nyanza to the District Commissioner was prohibited by Proclamation No. 31 issued by His Excellency the Acting Governor which appeared in the Official Gazette of 30th February 1929 P. 225 Early in June the District Commissioner owing to a severe local shortage temporarily withheld the permission to export as was within his competence under the Proclamation.

(2) The withholding of permission was within the competence of the District Commissioner under the power granted to him in the Proclamation.





Brake force may be used to remove the old lining, but when the new lining is being mounted on the shoe the greatest care must be exercised to make sure that it beds down evenly and that the rivets are slightly countersunk into the material.

It is a good plan to level off the leading edge of each lining with a wire file so as to prevent any possibility of chatter. 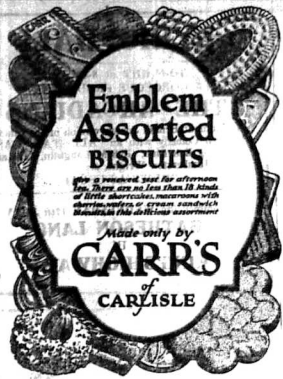

that it was logically inadvisable to charge duties on the importation of certain goods. The principle of protection is the one which all European countries accept. The member for Mombasa favoured the former view. The Committee was unable to make any unanimous recommendation on this point but considered generally that in view of the constitutional changes now under consideration the broader constitutional question raised by the Hilton Young Report had been dealt with.

#### Revenue Aid.

The Committee considered the alternative of granting bounties to industries in place of protection but were unable to recommend the application of the bounty system. Their view was that the industries of East Africa were in a position of interest to all parts of East Africa; that they had already achieved a degree of development which with the growth of communications per 100 miles a regular and adequate supply in the near future; that it was to the common interest of all territories to maintain the identity of markets; that the bounty system was extremely complicated and expensive and in East Africa its equitable application would be a practically impossibility.

#### Reduced Duties.

The Report therefore examines at length each of the industries affected by protection. The following are the industries and the present rate of duty:

Bacon and Ham	per 100 lbs.	25/-
Butter and Cheese	85% 100/-	100/-
Ghee	80% 100/-	100/-

In regard to the bacon and ham duties the recommendation of the Committee is that the present duty is above the amount now necessary to afford adequate protection and can be decreased without endangering the industry provided railways rates, suitable to retain and extend the East African markets. On this understanding the committee recommends the reduction of the duty to the following:—  
Bacon—50% per 100 lbs.  
Ham—30% per 100 lbs.  
It is further recommended that the same duty should then apply to hams and hags in whatever form it is imported.

#### Butter and Cheese.

So far as the dairy industry is concerned the Committee considers that the present duty of 85% on butter is unimportantly high. A lower rate in respect of butter would tend to stabilize prices in cases of shortage. The Committee recommends the following rates:—  
Butter—50% per 100 lbs. or thirty per cent. ad. rel.  
Cheese—50% per 100 lbs. or thirty per cent. ad. rel.  
In the same way as with hams and bacon, any differentiation in respect of finished or unfinished products imported should then disappear.

#### Ghee.

In so far as ghee is concerned the reduction of the duty to the same rate as that to be applied to butter provided the help of the railways rates remain in retaining and extending markets especially at the coast. The new rate would be:—  
Ghee Shs 50/- per 100 lbs. or thirty per cent. ad. rel.  
Sugar.  
The most industry dealt with is sugar. The committee makes its

recommendations regarding the strict control of prices as it is a cumbersome process and is a source of friction and is a source of loss to the producer. The Committee therefore in the opinion of the committee sugar should be maintained at a rate of 25% lower than Shs 8/- per 100 lbs. while a system of duties should be introduced which would reduce the existing duty of Shs. 12/- should be retained for at least five years. The committee position should be reviewed if it is unanimously recommended that special low export rates and special coastal rates should be favorably considered by the Government.

#### Timber.

**Beer.**

#### Mr. Clarke and Mr. Pandyas also disagree with the suggestion that no action should be taken to vary present policies until the constitutional committee is set up. The many delays already occurring are likely to be more disastrous to the Colony than another change at a later date.

The Hon. A. H. Malik considers that the proposal that footloose should be imposed as a lower rate of duty and dumping should be avoided by a system of special licenses.

Mr. J. B. Pandyas (Mombasa) considers that a general protective duty of 15 per cent is sufficient and points out that under the existing law the duty on the motor services is 15% only by Europeans. He fears the bounty system, would maintain the Customs duties gained only by Europeans. His views of the majority on sugar, outstanding that 20 per cent. tariff would be enough and 30 per cent. per 100 lbs. would be enough for local flour.
