STORY OF THE THOMSON'S FALLS CRIME.

Magisterial Hearing Opens at Rumuruti.

TWO EMPLOYEES INVOLVED.

Trouble with Houseboy and Another Servant on Day of Murder.

The story of the discovery of the terribly mutilated body of Ernest Kenyon, the Thomson's Falls white settler who was brutally murdered on the night of July 8, was told to the Rumuruti Magistrate on Monday afternoon when the hearing opened.

The accused are two Wakikuyu—one a houseboy and the other a driver employed by the accused.

A neighbour of the deceased, with whom Mr. Kenyon died on the night of his death, in evidence told the Magistrate that Mr. Kenyon informed him he had cut the houseboy a month's wages that day and had had trouble with another boy.

The violence of the assault is suggested by the bent and notched condition of two swords produced which a witness said could have caused the wounds.

The examination of the body was carried out by a woman doctor. The hearing is continuing.

WOMAN DOCTOR'S EXAMINATION.

"STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT. Rumuruti, July 23. The magisterial hearing of the charges against two natives, namely, the murder of a white boy, Ernest Kenyon, near Thomson's Falls a fortnight ago yesterday, opened at 10.15 a.m. today. The first witness was Dr. Dorothy Middleton, who examined and announced by the deceased's neighbour, Mr. Ernest Kenyon, near Thomson's Falls, a fortnight ago yesterday.

Dr. Middleton said she was called to the scene of the crime at 11.45 a.m. on July 9. In her story to the Magistrate she said she found the body of a white boy, Ernest Kenyon, who was still warm but who had been dead for some time.

Dr. Middleton said there were three wounds, five of which were on the head. The skull was broken in several places and the wounds were largely superficial. The right hand had been nearly severed by a hanging by a tree.

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EVACUATION OF THE RHINELAND.

Britain Retains Complete Liberty of Action.

PROPOSED COMMISSION.

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 22. In the House of Commons today, Mr. Henderson, the Foreign Secretary, was asked whether the Government was bound by the undertaking given by the late Government in regard to the proposed Commission of Verification and Conciliation in connection with the evacuation of Rhineland.

He said that His Majesty's Government as well as the French, German, Belgian, Italian and Japanese Governments, were committed by the decision taken at Geneva last September to the principle of a proposed commission. The composition, operation, objects and duration of the commission were, however, matters which would form the subject of negotiations.

He said that His Majesty's Government had not committed themselves and did not propose to commit themselves until the Commission met.

The meeting place of the forthcoming Conference on reparations was still under consideration between the Governments concerned. Mr. Henderson stated he hoped that a definite decision was now imminent.

In a letter to the "Times" on June in Kenya, Lord Francis Scott, says that the views of settlers towards the evacuation of the Rhine independently of the question of reparations.

He said that the Government retained the complete liberty to withdraw British troops from the Rhine at any time, and that it was expedient to do so—British Official Wireless Service.

League Expenses.

PROPORTION OF BRITISH CONTRIBUTION.

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 22. Mr. Henderson stated in the House of Commons today that the contribution payable by the British Government to the League of Nations including the International Labour Organisation during 1929 amounted to £100,000.

The contribution of the British Empire as a whole was gold francs 100,000,000. The percentage of the League's expenses payable by the British Government was 10.66 per cent. The British Empire as a whole 26.2 per cent—British Official Wireless Service.

The Pope and Malta.

GOVERNMENT CONSIDERING THE SITUATION.

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 22. With reference to a recently published letter from the Pope to the Bishops of Malta and those of the Maltese Government, Mr. Henderson, the Foreign Secretary said in the House of Commons today that he could not yet make a statement on the subject but the situation involved in the letter was being considered carefully.

FRANCE FAVOURS USE FOR HEAVY TRACTORS.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT. Marseilles, July 23. The inaugural meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science was held at the Grand Hotel today, the delegates from the British Empire were welcomed by the Government.

African Elephants.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT. Marseilles, July 23. The Higher Council for the Colonies in Paris passed a vote today recommending the American, British and other Governments to take steps and employment for heavy traction work of African elephants in tropical Africa.

"BLUE RIBAND" OF THE ATLANTIC.

"Mauretania's" Record Broken.

Time Reduced by German Liner.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT. New York, July 22. The Blue Riband of the Atlantic has been wrested from the "Mauretania" by the new Norddeutscher-Lloyd liner, the "Bremer," which left Bremerhaven on July 17, on her maiden voyage. She made the crossing from Cherbourg in 4 days, 18 hours and 17 minutes as compared with the "Mauretania's" record of 5 days, 2 hours, 34 minutes.

CROSSING FROM CHERBOURG UNDER FIVE DAYS.

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Final Day's Run.

The "Bremer" was tumultuously welcomed by blasts of brass on numerous craft as she glided in to New York harbour.

On the final day of the voyage she averaged a speed of 26.2 knots. Passengers declare that her engines were not pushed and there was no sensation of swift movement.

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MEDIATION IN BOUNDARY DISPUTE.

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 22. Asked in the House of Commons today whether British mediation had been offered in the boundary dispute between Bulgaria and Yugoslavia, Mr. Henderson stated that the British Government and the French Government were in communication with both Bulgaria and Serbia with a view to facilitating direct negotiations between the Governments concerned.

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King of Egypt's Visit.

(BY WIRELESS.) Rugby, July 22. King Fuad of Egypt visited Nairobi today. He arrived in the afternoon and was received by the Queen.

Replying to a question in Parliament, Mr. Henderson said having regard to the private nature of King Fuad's visit, it was not proposed to have conversation with His Majesty regarding the Egyptian situation in this country—British Official Wireless Service.

Relations Not to be Discussed.

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Mails to Europe.

The Post Office announces that mails despatched to Europe on July 17 by a "Q. Marconi" arrived in Britain on July 21.

EFFORTS TOWARDS PEACE IN CHINA.

Soviet Declines Offer of Mediation by France.

BOTH SIDES PROMISE TO ABIDE BY KELLOGG PACT.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT. London, July 22. A report of working hours and a negotiation for a national agreement were the outstanding issues at the Miners' Federation Conference at Blackpool.

M. Herbert Smith, in his Presidential address, urged the nationalisation of mines, minerals and hydro-power. He confidently anticipated a reduction in hours during the present year.

The past year, he said, was the worst on record regarding comparative wages and short time. He expressed the opinion that the time had come to approach the coalowners with a view to the conclusion of a national wages agreement.

The Post Office announces that the despatch of mails to China and Japan via Siberia has been suspended.

Russia Demands Restoration of Conditions on Eastern Railway.

(STANDARD) CORRESPONDENT. Moscow, July 22. The Soviet Agency states that the Soviet has declined France's offer to mediate on the Soviet-Chinese dispute, owing to the refusal of the Chinese authorities to restore the previous conditions on the Chinese Eastern Railway as demanded by the Soviet in its note of July 18.

The French Ambassador has notified Mr. Stimson that the Russian Ambassador at Paris had informed the French Foreign Minister that the Soviet would abide by the Pact.

Washington, July 22. The British Ambassador has delivered a note formally expressing the British Government's displeasure to associate itself with Mr. (Continued on page 10).

EAST AFRICAN WOMEN'S LEAGUE.

The President Miss Khatu.

AN ENTHUSIASTIC BRANCH.

A special meeting of the Trans-Nairobi Branch of the East African Women's League was held recently in the house of the R.M. where the President of the League (Mrs. R. S. Turner) had been invited to hold the meeting and to introduce the members and to discuss the work of the League.

After a few words of welcome from the D.V.P. (Mrs. Drayton) the President addressed the meeting, thanking Mrs. Drayton and the members of the Branch for their invitation and expressing her pleasure at being among them again, and that so many had been able to attend.

She recalled the difficulty in arranging meetings in so scattered a district.

After paying a tribute to the husband of the district which was neither suffering from drought nor locusts the speaker said she thought it was very difficult for the League Headquarters to find its touch with the central work. She hoped that personal contact through the meeting that day would dispel this feeling, if only temporarily, also if members would keep in contact with their D.V.P. and Secretary they would have regularity of the many common cases in which the League was working, though some districts had their own special problems to solve, but they secured the backing and force of the League to help them to do so.

The D.V.P. of every branch received the minutes and reports of the meetings of the E.A.W.L. Council held at Nairobi on the 2nd Monday every month, which were attended by the D.V.P.s of the 40 branches, wherever possible, and when they could not come, substitutes had been sent from several districts. This should be easy to manage as people were often in Nairobi on business and Mrs. Turner appealed to the Trans-Nairobi to try to arrange to do the same. She also hoped every member would visit the E.A.W.L. Rest Room and Library in the Memorial Hall, Nairobi.

The work that was being done by the thousand odd members in the various branches from the Coast to the Lake, was the important work of the League. The Headquarters-Council at Nairobi was the point of unity and co-ordination.

It was hoped that inclusion was impossible today, and she hoped to accomplish this or nothing. The withdrawal of the League was cooperation and ser-

vice. The League was not organized to suppress any special party or propaganda, but to represent the common sense of opinion of the women of the country on all matters affecting their welfare and their children, politically or otherwise.

The work was not spectacular and often of a confidential and intangible nature, results were not apparent to the public. Progress at times was necessarily slow.

Mrs. Turner stressed the duty of every woman to see that her name was on the voters roll and she had husband's and friends this applied to the Legislative Council's voters roll, and to the municipal and district councils.

Today the Khatu district was represented by a member who actively supported measures that benefited women and children, but as a later date quite a different man might win the seat owing to the sparsity of the women in not seeing they were on the voters roll.

The speaker made a point of the responsibility of every woman to try to make it a fit place wherein to bring up their children, and getting the best men into the Commonwealth towards that end. It is selfish as well as shortsighted to hold aloof from such work, and there was no plea for anything small or short-sighted in a free colony. The League had worked unceasingly for years towards procuring legislation for the registration of native domestic servants, which had resulted in an Ordinance being passed in the Legislative Council last year providing for the Registration of Domestic Servants. Mrs. Turner had been informed that it had been stated by Government that the Bill had now only awaits His Majesty the King's signature before being put into operation. As so long a time had elapsed since that Bill had been passed by the Legislative Council it was not surprising some members of the League were suspicious of the waste-paper basket. The speaker expressed her sympathy with the many obstacles and then disappointed members of the Council had to contend with in its work.

The British Select Committee of Legislative Council on the censorship of films and posters etc. which the League has every reason to believe will be adopted, as it stands, during the July Session is the outcome of the League's persistent pressure for some years. It is believed this Bill and Regulations based on this Report will be drawn up and put into force immediately.

In this connection the speaker said she would again like to congratulate Khatu in having set an example in the Trans-Nairobi district and that the movement would expand to every part of the Colony.

of late. The feasible means by which they could be withdrawn while being exhibited to a mass audience of European and colonial races, should be inquired to their honour in the minds of the district.

At the present time everything being done to obtain suitable facilities for the comfort and convenience of European women leaving by coast train, based on facts that have been supplied to the League of the revenue prevailing to-day.

When the cost of living was at its highest, the League was instrumental in the Government appointing a committee to inquire into the subject, on which the League was represented. It now seems a long time has elapsed since anything had been done of it, but it was understood that the subject would be recommended to the Government.

The President pointed out it was not necessary to give a thought to the standard of living as well as the cost. Probably, and put in the Trans-Nairobi in parts of Kenya, the standard of living was unacceptably high, and there was very little in Colonial simplicity or economy.

Scarcities ago the E.A.W.L. had a meeting and resolved to try to stem the tide of emigration and extravagance—very little result had been visible. The speaker had been asked why the E.A.W.L. did not refuse in the Home papers what Sir Alfred Davis had written of Kenya women and the money washed on coathills. The idea it had given of Kenya women as a whole, was most unjust, but refusing such a meeting in preparation for a meeting as a rule, since in many points, and a higher standard of public opinion was needed.

Nothing counted as much as example. The growing membership of the League should help as much as anything as those who were interesting themselves in service to their fellow women, surely were not so likely to be the target for snide in the home or any other papers. The speaker urged the necessity of example and carrying over before native, and that women hold resident in the country should explain the necessity to new comers. She thought the same aim was not observed with native servants as was with men servants at home.

The formation of classes for lectures on first-aid, home nursing and invalid cooking, here to keep well up, was receiving attention in several districts. The British Red Cross Society had presented financial assistance at a later date, after training had been completed. Mrs. Turner's sphere of influence embraced the question of the health of the community and it was hoped that classes would be arranged in the Trans-Nairobi district and that the movement would expand to every part of the Colony.

Mrs. Turner referred to the names of the women and children had at the Exhibitions of Home Industries etc. arranged by the E.A.W.L. at Agricultural Shows at Nairobi and Eldoret in which exhibits would be sent to the Durban-Salisman Show to be held on September 2nd this year.

She complimented Khatu on the Library which had been organized by the E.A.W.L. and later handed over to a Public Committee. She had been invited by the Chairman of the Garage Corporation this year to be the patron of the Kenya Women's League, and she thought the interest of all in benefiting by supplies of books, was very helpful. She congratulated Khatu on the improving room school where there would be room for books and all other facilities for the district, that the women were taking an active part in trying to obtain the best schooling and housing for their children, as well as for the standard of living as well as the cost. ## KISUMU-LONDANI DISTRICT COUNCIL

Commissioner for Local Government Attends.

### ROADS AND BRIDGES PROBLEMS.

(WARDEN'S CORRESPONDENT.)  
 Londoni, July 15.  
 The Hon. the Commissioner for Local Government attended a meeting of the Kisumu-Londani District Council with the primary object of making his official enquiry into the division of the District into Wards. He was also able to give the Council some valuable information at first hand on several matters on which it had been in doubt.

One point which has exercised the minds of the Council since its formation is the matter of obtaining funds for new works. Section 105 of the District Councils Ordinance lays down that "additional road grants may also be paid from the general revenues of the Colony to the Council in respect of expenditure in any financial year on account of—(a) Construction and maintenance of new district roads; (b) improvement of existing district roads; (c) New permanent bridges or other special works in connection with district roads.

There is a strong feeling in the Council, as evidenced by resolutions that have been passed at almost every meeting, that so far as possible permanent bridges should be constructed in the place of the temporary works which are to be found on every road in the district.

When asked what sort of works would be considered by the Central Authority under this section the Hon. the Commissioner for Local Government explained that the smallest work that would be considered under this section would be one costing not less than £1,000, and that funds for the construction of works costing less than this sum must be found out of the Council's normal revenue.

This rule the case of the Butler's Bridge-O'Leary road in a very unpleasant position. They applied to Council in the first place for the sum of £60 for the purpose of putting this bridge on this road into repair. This application would readily have been approved had not Council laid down a policy of permanent works. A further estimate was

made of £170, which, it was considered would be well spent in building three permanent timber bridges; but Council was still of opinion that the road was beginning to assume such importance that permanent concrete bridges were desirable. It met at the moment actually necessary. The estimated cost of £400 each, so they cannot be supplied for the present. Council has not the funds at its disposal to construct them without Government aid. It had this position known before. It would have been possible to have indicated the sum for the construction of semi-permanent bridges in the Estimates which the Council passed last month. Now the Nairobi folk must wait until supplementary estimates are prepared before funds can be found for the repair of their bridges, which from all accounts, are in a state of collapse.

A curious position. The Standing Committee recognized the justice of the claim, and resolved that his application be granted. Representatives were sent to the District Office, Public Works, who undertook to arrange for the survey of the road, and to see that the road was in a state of repair. In the meantime, considerable agitation has been caused in certain neighbouring districts, on the ground that the procedure adopted by the Standing Committee is in direct opposition to that followed by the District Council. The Hon. the Commissioner for Local Government to ask what the correct procedure is in such cases. The Commissioner explained that these dotted lines have been endorsed

on titles in order to reserve the right to Government to take the road through the farm. The line is defined to show that no survey has actually been carried out, and that the surveyed line will not necessarily be adopted. It is for Council to decide whether this particular road should be a road of public travel, or be merely a road of service from the farm in question to the existing public road. If Council decides that it should be a public road, it must then be duly surveyed and gazetted according to the procedure laid down in the Public Travel and Access Roads Ordinance.

The matter was therefore referred back to the Standing Committee concerned for further discussion, and recommendations to Council.

### Local Roads.

The question of the maintenance of the newly constructed Mbaruni-Songhor-Chemeli road gave rise to considerable discussion. Capt. Paterson referred to the matter of this road, which had cost so much to build, as very shabby. He had heard it said that Songhor had been very highly favoured, but he did not think that they had been unfairly favoured, and he was convinced that it would not stand up facing the heavy rains without a lot of work being constantly put into it. There had been a hasty decision at a meeting of the local rates' Association, and a resolution had been passed urging the Council not to take over the road until the schedule had been carried out, and a maintenance grant of £80 per mile of the road had been sanctioned. His Association was also of the opinion that an additional cost of murrum ought to be put over the whole road, and he was not prepared to argue for this. He was satisfied, however, that six inches of murrum on a black cotton foundation was not sufficient; and that with every heavy fall of rain water of this road would be washed away, necessitating very heavy maintenance charges. He did not think that the demand for £80 per mile was excessive, for without adequate maintenance, the very large capital cost would be wasted.

The Standing Council that this was one of the most important feeder roads in the country, and asked them to be so kind to see that no less than one-sixth of the total output of murrum in the colony passed over this road. There was also a very large amount of maize and other commodities. He realized that it was possible to make this road at the present times, but he did think that

a further six inches of murrum should be laid on the road. He thought that the murrum change would also be necessary for the gradual improvement of the drainage of both roads. Capt. Frost referred to the report that the murrum was in the Press, stating that the murrum used in the surfacing of the road was of inferior quality. He also quoted figures which he had obtained from the District Office, to the effect that 24,139 of murrum had been used for the construction of this road.

The Executive Engineer denied that the murrum used was of inferior quality, and stated that it was of probably the same composition as that used in the construction of the road at Nyeri over the Ekiakwoko Plains, which had stood up for less than five years without any murrum being applied upon it, and he saw no reason why this road should not last equally well. With regard to the funds available, he stated that some of this balance had already been spent, and that £2,000 were necessary for the construction of a bridge and for the section of the road to Wilson's Bridge.

The Hon. the Commissioner for Local Government explained that application for a grant for the maintenance of this road must be made under Section 104 of the Ordinance. The matter would come up for discussion by the Central Authority this year, and they could not assure that sufficient funds would be provided for the maintenance of all loan roads. The question of the taking over of this road was a very different one, in the minds of the Council, for they considered that ample funds for its maintenance should be available before they took the road over. It was therefore resolved that the Council should not take the road over from the P.W.D. until such time as they had the necessary funds.



**LAND VALUES IN THE TRANS NINA**  
 Judgment in Farm Mortgage Case.

**JACK VS. SHAW**  
 Court Clerk, Lawyer of High Court Charge.

Great interest was recently displayed by the residents of the Trans NINA, in a legal action in which well-known people appear—namely a settler in the Trans NINA and the other lawyer in Nairobi—and in which prominent names were mentioned. The amount in issue was over Shs. 10,000.

The plaintiff in the case was Major Jack of Trans NINA and the defendant Mr. W. A. Shaw, Advocate of Nairobi. Major Jack's claim was that year going to England about March 1929 he gave the Power of Attorney to Mr. Shaw then during his absence and without reference to him Mr. Shaw advanced a sum of Shs. 44,000 to Mrs. Catherine Driscoll on the security of a farm in the Trans NINA. Major Jack also maintained that before and after the advance, Mrs. Driscoll had been a tenant of the farm which was sold by public auction in February 1929 and resulted in a loss to Major Jack. Major Jack insisted that the lawyer had been negligent in the execution of his business in making the advance with the knowledge that the security was not in accordance with the instructions and that the advance was made without cash and proper security to the satisfaction of the settler. Major Jack also alleged that Mr. Shaw had benefited himself financially and substantially by making the advance

to Mrs. Driscoll. As Mr. Driscoll was a bona fide settler and there was no evidence that the advance was made for any other purpose than for the purchase of the land, the court found in favour of Mrs. Driscoll. The amount advanced was Shs. 12,200 and a further sum of Shs. 2,000 for other expenses and interest. The defendant in reply to these allegations, claimed that Major Jack, who was then in the Civil Service and was a personal friend of Mrs. Driscoll, had considerable interests in land and was not properly in Kenya; he stated that the instructions given to him were complete and authorized that Major Jack had left him to use his own discretion in regard to short term investments. He also denied that Mrs. Driscoll was a bona fide settler and that she had been guilty of negligence and denied any liability in law or in fact.

**The Judgment.**  
 Acting Judge J. A. Oren said: The Plaintiff is a farmer in the Trans NINA District and claims from the Defendant an amount of Shs. 12,200/0/0 and interest thereon. In March 1929, the Plaintiff went to England on leave and returned to this Colony in October in the same year. At the time of his departure he was a tenant of the Defendant's farm and gave the Power of Attorney and instructions as to the management of his financial affairs and the use of his money to the last defendant. During his absence the Defendant advanced out of the Plaintiff's funds the sum of Shs. 44,000/0/0 to Margaret Catherine Driscoll of Nairobi and in the name of Mrs. Driscoll a farm of 1,174 acres was mortgaged to her on the 29th August 1929 in order to secure this advance. The Plaintiff filed a suit in the District Court, Nairobi, against the Defendant for the amount of his mortgage debt, interest and costs, which amounted to Shs. 49,254/0/0. Following this judgment was granted and the farm of Mrs. Driscoll was sold by public auction and sold on the 17th February 1929, for the sum of Shs. 35,354/4/0.

The amount of the judgment which the Plaintiff claimed in the suit on the above mortgage was Shs. 49,254/0/0, and the amount claimed in the suit, interest, costs, and disbursements, was Shs. 1,728/7/0. The amount received by the sale of the farm was Shs. 35,354/4/0. The difference between these amounts is Shs. 13,200/0/0 and for this sum the Plaintiff now brings this action against Mrs. Driscoll. For her part the Defendant claims that she agreed to hold the Plaintiff's Power of Attorney, but on the Plaintiff's special request, and as a friend of his, and not as a lawyer.

It should be mentioned at this stage that the instructions given to the Defendant in her capacity as the Plaintiff's agent (attached to the plaint) to the Defendant do not include all the instructions given to the Defendant. There were many others in regard to other properties and transactions and an idea of the nature and the extent of these instructions can be gathered from the Plaintiff's own words in his letter of the 4th March 1929, where he says: "I sincerely hope that I have made this letter clear. But so you will realize it is by no means easy to do so when there are so many alternative possibilities. Anyway you will forgive me if it is too involved."  
 Now the Plaintiff says that his full and final instructions are recited in this letter, yet from the wording of it it is apparent that the Plaintiff was not clear in his mind as to what he had intended by these instructions to the Defendant. If he was not certain of the instructions that he had given definite instructions to the Defendant in this letter I have certain amount of sympathy with him, for on reading it I agree with him that the instructions are rather involved and obscure.  
 It is alleged by the Plaintiff that he was never a personal friend of the Defendant yet he asks him to take over any money of his that is lying idle and invest it with his own best advantage 10 per cent. interest. This seems to be a very heavy burden to place on a man whom the Plaintiff describes as a new business acquaintance; and when the Defendant says that he was a personal friend of the Plaintiff for several years prior to the institution of this suit I accept that statement.

**The Issues.**  
 The issues for decision according to the pleadings are—

1. Was the defendant negligent in making the advance of Shs. 44,000/0/0 to Mrs. Driscoll? In regard to this, the witness says he would not take any man's valuation of the land as a basis for the loan. It was in fact an advance of Shs. 44,000/0/0. Was the security advanced for the amount advanced?  
 2. Did the defendant make the advance without proper enquiry as to the sufficiency of the security?  
 In support of his case the Plaintiff gave evidence and says that the Defendant's bank account was overdrawn in March 1929, and returned to Kenya in October 1929, in November of the next year he came to Nairobi and had an interview with the defendant. At this interview his affairs were discussed and on cross-examination he admits that the Defendant Mortgage of Shs. 44,000/0/0 must have been mentioned and that defendant advised him to buy this farm and sell it later on. He further admits that the first time he informed the defendant that he was dissatisfied with this Driscoll mortgage was by his letter to him of the 14th June 1927. A reply was sent to this by the defendant in which he reiterates the case of the interview in November 1928, and tells the Plaintiff to take over the book-hold it and sell it at an appropriate time when a considerable profit on the investment might be expected. The Plaintiff is also informed that the Defendant had no other business with many other people who have mortgages in the Trans NINA.

Land Values.  
 The first expert witness called for the Plaintiff is Mr. Davis, who says that he has been an auctioneer and land agent in Nairobi since 1920, and with that experience he does not consider the farm of Mrs. Driscoll's was reasonable security for an advance of the Shs. 44,000/0/0 on the 29th August 1929. At the same time however he admits that this experience is all contained in the sale of seven farms; and further admits that if Mr. Kirk, a fair land agent to whom the Plaintiff's witness of Shs. 44,000/0/0 was a fair price for the Driscoll farm anyone would be justified in taking his word in 1929. It is a ground of complaint by the Plaintiff that this sum of

Shs. 44,000/0/0 was advanced by the Plaintiff without a written valuation of the land. In regard to this, the witness says he would not take any man's valuation of the land as a basis for the loan. It was in fact an advance of Shs. 44,000/0/0. Was the security advanced for the amount advanced?



**CIVIL SERVICE—AGE OF RETIREMENT.**

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—I cannot imagine that any business firm in this country would dismiss an employee on the ground that he had been with them for twenty years, or had attained the age of fifty. I therefore await with interest the arguments of the Hon. P.A. Bomister in favour of a more strict enforcement of the age limit for European Government servants.

As it affects the Medical Service, I think what is proposed is only fair. If men in health can work on the consulting staff of a hospital, or be actively engaged in consulting practice until the age of 65 or 70, why should they be retired here at 55 or under?

Most Government doctors enter the Service at under 30 and on retiring at under 50 may take up general practice at home.

Why should we waste their experience?

No one can say that the average doctor is no longer fit for work at that age. I know that for my ailments I would always choose the older of two competent doctors. Moreover there must be a financial loss from the posturing of a competent man and his being given to a young man who has got to learn his work. I feel that these arguments must apply with almost equal force to other Government departments and I hope that some Member of Council will champion the cause of a rise in the age limit for Government servants.

**DAILY LIGHT SAVING.**

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—Although the sun is the governing factor in determining "time" no civilized country in the world can adhere strictly to a conventional or "Standard" time.

In 1880 Great Britain enacted by a Statute that the word "time" to be interpreted as "the mean time of Greenwich," and since that date nearly all the countries of the world use as "Standard" the time of some meridian which differs from that of Greenwich by a multiple of 15 degrees.

Fifteen degrees is adopted because the sun moves through a degree of longitude in approximately four minutes and therefore 15 degrees in one hour. Thus there are three times in 12 hours, namely—(1) Greenwich time which is used by Great Britain, France, Spain, Portugal etc. (2) Greenwich time as used by West Africa (3) Greenwich time as used by East Africa, Italy etc. and (4) East Africa, 10 hours fast on Greenwich time used by Turkey, Greece, Russia etc.

In the United States and Canada five different standard times are recognized according to the zones. In an old schedule of Zones Standard Times in British East Africa and Uganda are stated to use the Standard Time of "21 hours fast on Greenwich" time which is equivalent to 27½ degrees and which appears to be correct and somewhere between Sultan Hamud and Malindi.

The alteration of Time Occurs now in fact on Greenwich three hours fast on Greenwich

Kenya lies approximately between longitudes 34 and 40 so that in any case there must be a difference in sun times of approximately 45 minutes between East and West of Kenya.

I have elaborated on the method of determining "Standard Time" because it is poor conductivity that in all civilized countries it is the clock which sets the Standard Time and not the actual second time which reaches the meridian. I therefore submit that what Kenya has to decide upon is a Standard or conventional time which shall be most convenient to most people.

Personally I am strongly in favour of the present Standard. It is three hours fast on Greenwich time. (a) I find the best working hours on the early hours in the day.

(b) It enables me to leave the office at five o'clock and obtain some exercise in daylight.

(c) I am perfectly certain that since the new standard time was instituted, I have left the office feeling fresher and more energetic in the hot sun of the year than this is noticeable.

(d) I have no objection to the impression that I am a confirmed drunkard. It is a fact that coming in from retirement at 6.40 hours of 6.15 p.m. lessons by half an hour that period before dinner when there is a tendency to consume alcoholic refreshment.

(e) I have to pay for less electric light.

I cannot help but think that what applies to me must also apply very largely to all other persons concerned in Commerce and Office work but the advantages of the present Standard Time may not be apparent to those unprivileged persons who earn their living on the land. It is not always possible to frame for such persons who do not adhere to the Standard time should be such as most convenient to most people.

The following table is taken from page 70 of the Report on the meteorological observations of 1926:

(a) Total number of persons engaged in Commerce (Government) Industry and the professions is 19,987	(b) Total number of persons engaged in Agriculture 20,964	Total 40,951
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Indoor workers 70 per cent. Outdoor workers 30 per cent. If it is assumed that that benefits me of similar benefit to other indoor workers that the present Standard Time is most convenient to an overwhelming majority in Kenya.

It has been suggested that those like myself who favour the present Standard Time could, in the event of the old Standard being in operation, still obtain the benefits of the present Standard by spending their Office half an hour earlier and closing at say 3.30 instead of 4.0. In theory that is quite correct but in practice it is impossible. Custom and sentiment are the governing factors. If custom ordains that Office nominal closing at 4.0 p.m. an ordinary worker engaged for his living on working in with his fellow men must conform to that custom or lose his means.

Statement is almost equally wrong and I feel certain that it would be a large and sustained outcry if he attempted to close at 3.30.

The same remarks however do not apply so strongly to Agriculture because although Custom lays down the number of hours labourers are expected to work the fields in spite of what has been written to the contrary is very largely a matter of the Manager's clock and practically does not refer to the question where piece work

is carried out. I have known Labour contractors piece work regularly at 3.0 a.m. till 12.0 p.m. The case has been found to be no different between Kenya and very limited number of Estates owned Town time signals, such as the Railway tower by starting their labour.

I think it will be admitted by most Managers of Estates who are not close to a Railway Line that they never quite certain when they are an hour or so past the Standard time in the end of the day.

The adjoining territories of the East Africa Protectorate and Tanganyika Territory on the South are one with Kenya in the present Standard of three hours fast on Greenwich but Uganda, although no more westerly than Tanganyika, has not yet adopted the Standard.

It would be a pity to break the uniform time which now obtains from Cape to Cairo to take the Uganda will see us way later than the standard three hours standard.

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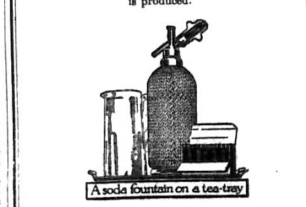

That is in a sense, a slur upon the public spirit of Nairobi, however necessary it may be to take steps in passing legislation to enable the law to work. Nomination Day for the purposes of the election of the nine selected European members of Council has been fixed for August 2. The Town has been divided into wards under the new constitution. The commercial area (known as the Central Ward), Parklands and the Hill side form two wards and the three main residential areas, Westlands, Ngara Road district and Muthaiga are united to elect one member. The elections will be carried out on the new Voters' Roll. It is well-known that the Roll was compiled with the greatest difficulty, owing to the apathy of the European population. That is so far as the Interior Council, the Government or the legislation, the responsibility for the position rests upon the shoulders of those who were insufficiently interested in their own welfare as citizens to take the trouble to register themselves as voters. They can have no quarrel with the position now or after the election. Candidates who continued to show who are on the Roll but a candidate has full liberty to allow his name to be nominated for any of the wards if he secures the necessary proposals and signatures from among the voters in that ward. There is some talk in what the forward people say turn their minds to the selection of suitable candidates. That is an added reason why within the next week Nairobi should busy itself in giving thought and action to the revision of its own outlook and knowledge who will have regard to the problems of the Greater Nairobi as a whole, who will be able to discern their personal interests, and who will be unimpressed by petty parochial considerations when the issue is one of the general welfare of a growing city.

**NATIVE OFFICE BOY'S FORGERY.**

**Wrote Out a Cheque For \$45.**

**A YEAR IN PRISON.**

The manner in which a native office boy employed by Messrs. Hoogterp and Jackson endeavored to forge a cheque in his employer's name was described to B. A. Coates, Resident Magistrate's Court yesterday.

At a statement from the National Bank of India, Mr. J. Drummond, remembered the accused going to the Bank on July 15. He brought a letter and cheque. Witness was suspicious of the signature on the cheque and after comparing it with the specimen signature and found a distinction. Mr. Jackson was communicated with. Mr. Jackson came to the Bank and took the letter away. Mr. L. G. Jackson, of Messrs. Hoogterp and Jackson, identified the accused who used to be their office boy. On July 16, he remembered the accused being sent to the P.W.D. by the secretary of the firm. He was not told to go to the Bank of India. Letter witness received a telephone message from the Bank and a result he went there. He saw the Chief Accountant, and the accused was taken to the prison. Witness saw a cheque, the signature on which was not his, and the letter had been written on the previous day by the secretary.

**Missing Cheque.**

He took the native back to the office. On examining Mr. Hoogterp's cheque book he found that one cheque and the counterfoil had been removed. The cheque book was kept in a box which was left open in a day three but was locked at night. During the lunch hour the accused was the only person at the office. He had about a month and witness did not know if he was a writer. The body of the cheque was usually filled in by the secretary. On the Court the writing was neither in handwriting nor in that of the secretary.

When he took the accused to the office he escaped in going up the stairs, leaving behind him a despatch book and a roll of drawings.

Mrs. Wilson, the secretary of the firm, and that on July 15, she sent a cheque to the Bank. On July 16, she sent the cheque to the P.W.D., but not to the Bank. In reply to the accused witness said that she did not give him two letters on the day in question.

Sir—In order to decide a small loss could you kindly inform me—

(a) What would be approximate rate at which a rifle bullet on a certain exposure would travel straight up into the air, assuming an initial muzzle velocity of say 2,000 feet per second?

(b) Acting out of the above, whether a bullet striking a target at a distance of 100 yards would strike the target with less or greater force than the target had lost flat upon the ground and the bullet's weight up into the air in such a way as to drop upon the target?

If it is of course assumed that the atmospheric conditions remain constant while the above experiments were carried out.

The papers have been the subject of enquiry and the following answers in the questions have been supplied:

(1) Calculations worked out on certain exposures made in the autumn of 1910 proved that the Mark VII bullet when fired vertically at a muzzle velocity of 2,440 feet per second attained a height of about 9,150 feet, taking 182 seconds to ascend and 393 seconds to descend, at a total of 575 seconds from the time it left the muzzle of the rifle until it returns to the ground. It was also calculated that the retreating bullet never attained a velocity much greater than 300 feet per second. Although the above applies only to a muzzle velocity of 2,440 feet per second, in the case of a velocity of 1,000 feet per second the height attained would be proportionately greater and the descent proportionately more rapid. It may be of interest to note that a descending bullet is calculated to have a striking energy of 30 foot-lbs. and as it is calculated that a striking energy of 60 foot-lbs. is necessary to put a living target out of action, it would appear the danger to be apprehended from bullets returning after being fired vertically is no so great as might be supposed.

(2) Writing on the above calculations and on the known quantity that the same bullet (Mark VII) with muzzle velocity of 2,440 feet per second travels 300 yards in 0.79 seconds flat horizontally and that the bullet descending from a height of 9,150 feet takes approximately 393 seconds to cover a distance of 300 yards at its greatest speed, it would appear that the bullet fired horizontally at a target at 300 yards will travel at its greatest speed than the descending bullet.

The authority for the above is "The Theory of Rifle and Rifle Shooting" (by John W. Hills) and "The Text Book of Small Arms" (1909)—Military publication.

**LOCUSTS.**

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard".

Sir—In view of the purpose of maintaining all crops of the Registrar's area supplied with smoke, and in order to ensure the best use of the "bag of war" and put out areas under a cloud in imitation of those conditions that would have been and smoke should come in with it.

These smoke canisters are cheap and easy to handle and are not inflammable.

Two years ago Halobichien was invaded by swarms of locusts. It was noticed by some of the farmers that smoke canisters, that locusts avoided the smoke cloud. If the same fact holds good with the hungry locusts of Kenya, it should be easy to save crops of wheat and cereals.

It is possible that the efficiency of the canister would be increased by the addition of sulphur or wood smoke. The fireworks manufacturers would probably be glad to help.

I suggest that experiments be made with smoke canisters without firing. The cost would be slight and the possibilities are considerable. As regards the death ray suggested for locust extermination, it is worth noting that in spite of the popular Press it has been found that no positive realization there is to it.

**DAYLIGHT SAVINGS.**

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard".

Sir—The object of Daylight Saving Bill, as far as the towns are concerned, is to secure the maximum efficiency of other methods.

The most important point in my mind is as to obtaining the best and most economical return from the investment of capital invested in labour? The term labour includes everybody who receives remuneration for his or her services. In my opinion we are not before the hours of labour were always in Great Britain, work employed had to be made the promise by 6 a.m. to the second. In nearly every case the worker was incapable of putting forth his best effort before 8 a.m. The period which produced the best results was between the hours of



6 a.m. and 1 p.m. After lunch between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. the energy of the individual was almost at its maximum. The least of day used well would be noticeable. Such work would be noticeable. Such work would be noticeable. Such work would be noticeable.

These conditions prevail in Nairobi. When you have a chance, try to consider the order to plan, very few people desire your programme between 6 a.m. and 1 p.m. The work planned within the hours of the clock runs on a 4 p.m. period of daylight in the morning across through the adoption of your present business hours:

Office open at 9 a.m. Mails open at 10 a.m. Lunch from 12.30 to 2 a.m. Mails close at 3 p.m. Office close at 4 p.m.

It is generally agreed that it is not necessary nor desirable in the tropics to lag in a heavy blanket of work before the clock. In most places there is a copy of the clock 11 a.m. This may be the time for the light refreshment. We could then rearrange our hours to suit our needs.

Office open 9 a.m. Closing 3 p.m.

Some of the advantages are as follows:

(1) The efficiency of the labour will be increased by the saving of the unbroken period of six hours.

(2) The cost of living would be decreased by the saving of the expenditure on petrol, tyres, car wash, repair, and oil in the cutting out of the lunch-hour.

(3) There would be a greater minimum waste due to the decrease in the rate. It would go far to solve some of the traffic problems which are now so pressing.

(4) It would provide greater shopping facilities for the local public, many of whom refer to the shops after 4 p.m.

(5) It would give all suitable people ample time to complete their business and return to their homes in a more reasonable time than at present.

(6) It would have a great effect on family life. As present pressure on our leaving business, rush off to get into school for their family except at breakfast time.

(7) It would allow more time for people to interest themselves in public services and other important matters affecting the public welfare.

(8) Having said more hours for sleeping it would tend to startling. Theatres, etc. could commence earlier and people have to come earlier to bed.

(9) Business men who are occasionally to leave by the 4 p.m. train would have the satisfaction of seeing the day's work completed beforehand.

(10) There are six hours available the bulk of the shopping would be done by 2 p.m. and enable the shops to clear earlier without having recourse to a "Shop Hours Act".

The efficiency of the Nairobi Municipality is that the efficiency of the labour has decreased since the introduction of the Daylight Saving Bill. The value to be obtained from the alteration of the hours of labour appears to be unobtainable and a return to the old-time would seem to be the only way to secure the maximum efficiency can be obtained.

Conference of the British Empire Service League, General Innes and Lord Justice were amongst the visitors. The Prince, in a speech, referred to Kenya. He said that not only was the work of the Empire Service League of the highest importance, but, even more satisfactory still, there was an increase in the number of organizations and in their progress as well as in the number of members formed since their last meeting two years ago, and he hoped that the last part of the Biennial Conference would see the latter recur to have a branch. He felt that one of the finest proofs that the effort was becoming a reality was the fact that so many of them, (some of them) had left their homes and travelled thousands of miles to attend this Conference. They had travelled all those miles to give of their best in discussing not only problems affecting ex-Servicemen but also the vital problems of Empire development and trade.

The Countess of Erroll, who, after her marriage with the Earl of Erroll visited Kenya in 1924, was granted a decree nisi by Mr. Justice Hill in the Divorce Court on Monday.

Her address was given as Glabe Place, Chelsea, and she alleged the non-cohabitation of her husband with Mrs. Edith Mildred May Agnes Ramsay Hill, the divorced wife of Major Cyril Saxe Ramsay Hill. This was not defended. Mr. Justice Hill pronounced a decree nisi with costs against both the Earl and Mrs. Ramsay-Hill who, it was stated, was reported in previous proceedings to have an income of £2,000 a year. Mr. Justice Hill said there was no reason why costs should not be granted against her. She was no longer a married woman, the decree having been made absolute in the Ramsay-Hill petition. The Countess of Erroll is the custody of the one child of her marriage.

Sir Ronald Ross was presented on Friday night with the President Gold Medal for distinguished medical services for his discoveries and work in connection with malaria, by the West London Medical and Charurgical Society. The presentation was made at the annual meeting of this Society at Kensington Town Hall by Dr. Harold Sanghetti, who presided. He said, in making the presentation, that although the discovery made by Sir Ronald that malaria was transmitted from one person to another by the mosquito, was a

revolutionary medical one, it was not a discovery made on 21st Feb. he would have done better for himself if he had discovered it now. He had not seen or something of the kind. It was, however, in relation to the Empire. Sir Ronald, who could only walk with great difficulty and with assistance, was not well enough to speak and was helped from the hall by several members of the annual meeting of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, which was held at 10, Chandos Street, Cavendish Square. A touching tribute was paid to him on his entry, all the members at one time to their feet and cheered. The meeting was presided over by Professor J. W. R. Macleod, F.R.S., which he was inquired on the election of the new President, Dr. G. Carruthers Low, M.A., M.D., F.R.C.P. At the close of the meeting Dr. Low presented Sir Ronald with the Macleod Medal, giving a tribute to his great work.

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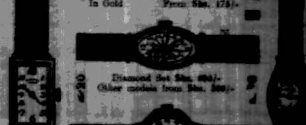

(Continued from page 5.)

The risk-rates of prisoners in jail during the term of their sentences. Whether or not it should be provided by settlers on farms in Kenya can only be decided for individual cases, when all the circumstances relating to malaria especially the frequency with which individuals on the farms become infected) on the particular farm concerned are thoroughly known. It is not a method for which a general rule is applicable.

Dr. Gilis also expressed about our practice of not giving quinine in merozooides and relapses. I think I should repeat that what may result from experimental work may not necessarily yield a wise rule for private practice. In our case malaria is not a therapeutic measure; therefore, within reason we endeavour to let these patients have as many clinical attacks as their physical condition permits. This practice has enabled us to discover that a person whose merozooides or relapse is treated with quinine as soon as it begins, is very liable to relapse again, whereas a person whose relapse has been allowed to go on for a few days often recovers without quinine and thereby gains an immunity which protects him against further relapses.

I think the most important point raised by Dr. Anderson was whether a malarious patient should be a primary attack and relapse is a sick man or not. My personal view on this point is that a patient who has had a frank attack of malaria, properly diagnosed by finding parasites in the blood, and properly treated by a sufficient but not too prolonged course of quinine, is not a sick man. Moreover he has, in his own quinine, a degree of immunity to the disease which may save him in good stead if, and when a relapse comes.

SIMPLICITY IN BRAKE DESIGN.

How Bendix Duo-Servo Operates.

ADJUSTING ITSELF TO ROAD CONDITIONS

There has recently been developed a two-shoe brake which has a self-adjusting servo action in both directions of rotation. This is something of an achievement, and it stands to the credit of Bendix Power Brakes, Ltd., who are well known as the producers of the three shoe brake used on so many American cars. As the latest Duo-Servo brake is now in production at the Westwood Road Works, Witton, Birmingham and will figure on several high-class British cars in 1931, the following details are of interest.

In the first place, it should be understood that self-adjustment must not be confused with servo action as is often the case. In a two-shoe servo brake the front shoe is self-adjusting when the car moves forward because the contact of the shoe with the drum tends to pull the shoe inward and so assist in adjusting it. On the other hand, as regards the rear shoe, the frictional force, far from assisting, definitely retards the spring force. When the car moves backwards the front shoe is reversed.

In a servo brake the front shoe is not provided to the back plate but hinges on the end of the rear shoe, the other end of which is anchored to the back plate. The front shoe is free to swing in and out of the drum slightly in response to the frictional drag of the drum and the action of the spring which the rear shoe. It is the front or primary self-adjusting shoe acting on or serving the rear or secondary self-adjusting shoe which constitutes servo action. This was the object of the forward direction action of the first Perrot two-shoe servo brake.

Duo-Servo Layout.

In the Duo-Servo two-shoe brake the two shoes are linked together by means of a simple adjusting screw with right- and left-hand threads. The outer ends of the shoes are located by anchor pins fixed in the back plate, but the ends of the shoes have pre-adjusted holes which allow the shoes to have the anchor pins. Between these ends of the shoes is the expansion gear, consisting of a floating link and two trunnion blocks, operated by means of a small crank. The trunnion blocks bear on the ends of the shoes and this method of expanding the shoes, in conjunction with the pre-adjusted holes, enables either shoe to be moved independently of the other.

As the shoes are interchangeable the servicing is rendered easier, and when the linkage finally wears, as mentioned it is intended that the whole shoe should be exchanged for a new one, credit being allowed for the old shoe. Incidentally, the shoes are built up of steel, and all parts are cadmium-plated to protect them from rust. It should also be noted that the only lubrication required is that of the bearing of the spindle carrying the operating link.

As regards operating gear, the Bendix lever type front control is recommended, but other types can be used—(The Author).

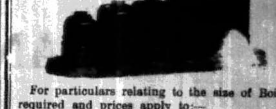

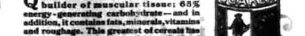

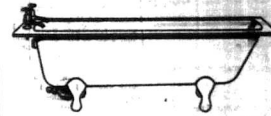

of opening the way for an agreement on naval matters which hitherto had failed settlement. By a happy coincidence, the Government's assumption of office corresponded with the arrival of the new Ambassador, General Dawes, who had come to the agreement with the mission of preparing the ground for negotiations which had been suspended since the States had been surveyed and the Government had made a fresh start in its relations.

"We have agreed upon the principle of parity," said Mr. Macdonald. "We have agreed without in any way departing from the conditions of parity that a measure of elasticity can be allowed so as to meet various requirements of the States. We have arranged that we shall not insist upon parity in the great public issues involved in our being, as it comes to a settlement."

**Premier's Visit to America.**

Mr. Macdonald continuing, said he proposed to make this matter his immediate concern as soon as his business had been disposed of. His visit to the President of the United States was the subject of conversations so that it might take place when it would be most desirable to promote peace and stability between the two nations and, in particular, to advance the cause of disarmament and to bring about the terms which they held in common. It had to do with certain other international conventions and other matters which are at present securing the most likely opportunity.

**Construction Suspended.**

The Government had decided, said Mr. Macdonald, to suspend all work on the cruiser "Hector" and "Northampton," to cancel the submarine depot ship "Malahite," to cancel five contracts for submarines and to slow down dockyard work on other naval construction. In any event no commitments would be taken to proceed until the matter had received further consideration.

The Government, of course, recognized that the reduction of the naval budget programme must have a direct effect on employment in the dockyards but was glad to say that, having expressed their technical view on the minimum armament which they consider to be necessary, they have furnished us with legal help in the selection of objects with the least possible effect on the employment of the Liberal leader, Mr. Macdonald assured him that as conversations with the United States proceeded the effect and general result of them would be given in a way that would ultimately be satisfactory.

**Early English Christmas.**

**INTERESTING FIND AMONG ROMAN VILDS.**

**"STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.** London, June 27.

A discovery has been made within the last few days which is considered as regarded as the earliest evidence in the whole of Britain of the existence of a Christian religion in these islands. This discovery was announced at Newport by Mr. V. E. Nash Williams who is in charge of the excavation work at Cardigan, when addressing the first day's session of the British Archaeological Association. He said that the custom of the pagan Romans to fasten to the roofs of their buildings an anti-lava—piece of pottery or a tile—on which was stamped in relief a human head and a disc to represent the sun. Within the last few days an anti-lava, differing from all others, had been found at Cardigan. It bore a human head, but in place of the sun disc was a cross. This was the first Christian sign found in any Roman city in this country, and the first direct evidence of Christianity.

**Through Rupture's Agency.**

Mr. Macdonald said that all Powers concerned recognized that a preliminary Anglo-American agreement was essential to a final convention. Immediately the way was clear the Powers represented at the Washington Conference of 1921/22 would be invited to a preliminary conference with a view to reaching a comprehensive agreement. A final agreement would be ratified at a peace conference which would be common consent would be closed by the United States in recognition of the splendid part played by its President.

It would then be reported to the League's Preparatory Commission as Disarmament as a contribution to its work. If these preliminary negotiations were fulfilled the requirements of the League's Disarmament Committee made at Geneva on March 15, 1923, that the Powers should be invited to agree on disarmament would be accomplished, and we would be in a position to pursue the essential process as to how to reduce the armaments of the world in accordance with the Allies' plan at Versailles when imposing disarmament upon Germany, and also in pursuance of the pact of London.

His Majesty's Government would think its thoughts and energies towards co-operation with the nations immediately this year. The Disarmament Conference would be finished. To generate the Disarmament Conference would then be possible. Mr. General Dawes and other diplomatic representatives were present in the Distinguished Guests' gallery.

**Waiver in America.**

Washington, July 24.

The President, Mr. Hoover, has announced that a waiver of the three cruisers included in the year's Naval programme will not be given until there has been a treaty for full consideration of the subject. In the opinion of the committee, the waiver of the three cruisers would be a serious blow to the Navy party which Britain and the United States.

President Hoover expressed his satisfaction at Mr. Macdonald's statement at the Washington Conference. Mr. Macdonald had introduced the principle of parity which they now adopted. His announcement made that Britain and the United States heretofore would not compete in armaments as potential opponents but would cooperate in the reduction thereof.

The President Hoover said the American people had been greatly complimented by Mr. Macdonald's proposal that Mr. Macdonald would find a real welcome in the United States.

The Football League considered the members of the Council and it would be merely a matter of time to get the matter straightened out.
