Two Dramatic Admissions in Murder Case.

NATIVES COMMITTED TO HIGH COURT.

Witness Placed in Custody to Ensure Appearance at Trial.

The two natives, Mgogo and Nyari, who have figured in the Kibunret hearing in connection with the Thomson's Falls crime, have been committed for trial by the Supreme Court of Kenya on a charge of murdering Mr. Ernest Kenyon.

At the end of the case both natives admitted having committed the act but asserted that the witness, Njigi who, it will be recalled, told a dramatic story of the scene on the hillside on the night of the crime, when he found both men naked in front of a bowl of bloody water, had been a party to the crime and had assisted them in the killing of Mr. Kenyon.

Njigi, issued in Court with this allegation, contented himself with the reply: "I have nothing further to state."

The Police, however, have taken Njigi into custody in order that his appearance as a witness before the Supreme Court may not be jeopardized.

One of the dramatic incidents on the last day of the hearing was the evidence by a Kikuyu who had been nearly three years in Mr. Kenyon's employ. He told how he had witnessed his master about the threats made by the accused, Mgogo, but Mr. Kenyon had dismissed the matter as of little importance.

MR. KENYON WARNED BEFORE ATTACK.

NOTES ON THE TOURNAMENT

It will be seen that every competing player plays four games, and each player has the White pieces during two of them. As there are five entries there will be a bye in each round, each entrant will thus have an opportunity to reach the other side of the table, or to see the Tactics Championship Matches which are to be taking place on the Nairobi Club Courts a few minutes' walk from the Post Memorial Hall.

The Secretary of the Nairobi Chess Club, Mr. A. H. Spenser Palmer, will act as Referee and Adjudicator, and will conduct the Tournament according to the regulations of the British Chess Association which he is the East African Representative. The winner of each match (or the player who has the White pieces in the case of a draw) must hand in to him the score of the game. He will then be credited with one point for a win and half a point for a

draw. The time-limit of one hour for the first twenty moves, two hours for the first forty moves, and so on will be strictly adhered to, and no game may be adjourned until forty moves have been made on both sides. No time is counted against a player while it is his opponent's turn to play.

The procedure in the case of adjourned games is as follows: The player whose turn it is to play, must write his move down but not actually make it. The secret move, together with both sides move sheets and the diagram recording the position, is handed to the Referee who seals them in an envelope marked with the names of the players and a copy of the time they have spent over the moves already made. When the game is resumed the Referee sets up the men, makes the move that was sealed, and notes each player's time.

SOLUTIONS

Now the White Pawn has made ten captures in order to reach the square on which they stand, and Black has lost just ten pieces. Therefore every missing Black piece indicates the White Pawn originally stood at or was taken by a White Pawn. As the Black Pawn on N7 is still unmoved, the Bishop must have come out from G7 via D7 and this proves very neatly that it is not the G7 Pawn, but the F7 one, which was his last move!

This little bit of retrospection puzzled several solvers considerably. "Amirer" loses a point by claiming either D7 or F7. S. Mookia gives it up. "Tweedle," W. McDonald, and D. V. Wainman claim the impossible: a Pawn for obvious reasons which they have not yet divulged! "D. O. E." claims "No Solution."

COMMENTS

"Tweedle": "N" is a nasty nut!

P. J. H. Coltham: "N" for Nil depression. The man was a genius who invented this, and we shall all end up in Malindi Avenue if we get a few more like him. I look me three days and I had to play the game right through from the start.

W. A. Way: Involves some pretty retrospection; a geometrical position with an asymmetrical key.

D. O. E.: "Aha! I thought we should get one of 'em." "What was his last move?" problems.

D. G. Venning: I suppose it is no part of a solver's duty to explain how players of such a game escaped from these padded cells.

"Undesirable" to Stay at Hotel.

A GATE CASE

Consable Abraham Johnson Kriel, of Wellington, who stayed in an hotel because he suffered from rheumatism and was confined to his room, was ordered to leave the hotel, and that a policeman need only obey an order from his superior officer which is in respect of his duty.

Mr. Justice Gutton, in dismissing the application, said that Art 14 of 1915 gave the Government General wide powers for making regulations for the control, discipline and general governing of the police force. It is significant that Regulation 89 commences in many respects the private life of a policeman. It is an offence to be drunk off duty, to wear party colours when off duty, to become a member of a political society, to place himself under an obligation to a licensed dealer in liquor, to receive a party to an accommodation without the consent of the Commissioner, or to marry without the consent of the Commissioner. Such acts are prohibited because they are contrary to the good order, morality or the discipline of the force.

Ben on Hotels.

The Commissioner, in his affidavit, states that, for obvious reasons he strongly deprecates non-commissioned officers and men of the force residing in licensed premises for any other accommodation is available. When any instance of this nature comes under his notice he invariably gives instructions to the renter concerned to find accommodation elsewhere.

"With this I agree," the judge went on. "The police force has no special officers in reference to the control of liquor, and it is undesirable that, under exceptional circumstances, a member of the force should reside prominently at an hotel."

Treasury Wasteful.

THE LATE LORD REVELSTOCK'S ESTATE.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]
Just over £1,000,000 is payable to the Treasury in estate and legacy duties on the fortune left by the late Lord Revelstock. The amount of this estate was £2,492,312. Lord Revelstock was a partner in Messrs. Haring Bros. and died recently in Paris during the middle of the work of saving the Representation Committee. Mr. Chamberlain, in his Budget statement just before the Dissolution, advised that the estate duties produced £60,870,000 in the year 1919-20 and although there have been some fluctuations in the amount payable by the estate of Lord Revelstock.

Whether in view of the heavy taxation that exists to-day, persons will continue to be able to arrange these enormous fortunes, remains to be seen. The accumulation of money should be limited by the fact that everything is to-day accomplished but it is not becoming more difficult to hold the large fortunes that have been left in Great Britain within recent times—those of Sir David Yale who left £25,000,000, Lord Dalmeny £17,400,000 and Mr. W. H. Coates £7,000,000. How large a fortune will be left to the heirs of the late Lord Revelstock, who has just died, remains still to be seen.

Shp. 6j. by the Resident Magistrate yesterday for leaving a motor car unattended in Government Road with the engine running.

"The order given was not contrary to the ordinary civil law, and was, in my opinion, justified by the law relating to the police. The whole time of the committal was at the disposal of the Government, and it was lawful during that time to order him not to reside at an hotel. As is said in the Manual of Military Law in case of doubt the military knowledge and experience of officers will enable them to decide the lawfulness or otherwise of a command."

The application was dismissed, with costs. Mr. Justice Waterhouse agreed.

Richer Pastures.

DEEPEX RESEARCHES ON INCREASED PRODUCTION.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]
London, July 3.
The following is from an "Manchester Guardian" article:
H.M. Stationery Office publishes (price 2s.) for the Royal Agricultural Board "The Composition of Pastures," by Dr. J. D. Argy, Director of the Rowett Research Institute, Aberdeen, with a preface by Mr. L. G. Amery. Mr. Amery notes that "co-operation in the pasture research referred to in this review has been secured largely through the instrumentality of a sub-committee of the Committee of Civil Research, including a group of scientists interested in different branches of biology, which has given constant advice and guidance on the more fundamental work upon the composition of pastures carried out in Great Britain and also on some practical experimental work in the colonies. The Empire Marketing Board, to which the Committee of Civil Research has from time to time given recommendations, has made grants to various Governments within the Empire for investigations on the lines of research dealt with in this volume.

Related Problems.

As a result of these activities information from different branches of science is being brought to bear upon the problem of increased production of grasslands. There is a continuity of effort and there is a free and informal exchange of information between the workers and institutions in different parts of the Empire. Thus the work on iodine deficiency in Canada is throwing light on the problem of iodine in Australia and New Zealand. The work of the Waite Institute in Australia on transpiration of plants grown on different types of soil is yielding information which is being considered in connection with the improvement of pasture lands in the semiarid parts of Africa. The pioneer work in connection with phosphorus deficiency in South Africa has been applied in Australia and New Zealand. The results of the work on "bush sickness" in New Zealand have been applied successfully in the prevention of similar diseases in Kenya Colony. The work on the composition of pastures at Cambridge and Aberdeen has thrown a flood of new light on the question of deficiencies in pasture which occur in practically all countries.

"The recent growth of scientific

co-operation between the constituent parts of the Empire could not be better exemplified than in the record of associated endeavours to foster the better exploitation of the Empire's grasslands."

Dr. Orr says that in Britain much more information is needed with regard to the amounts and kinds of fertilizers used on the different types of soil. This information is now being obtained in field trials, and countries are being done to show the relationship between the amount of fertilizer and the increased return in grassland production.

Genetic Experiments.
"Associated with these experiments in intensive pasture production is the investigation on grasses which is being carried out at Cambridge University. This can be produced by spraying pastures and the increased return in grassland production.

The same man has been mentioned in connection with the maintenance of a high level of production and the amount of fertilizer in good condition. The success of his work is being produced in the form of a book on the cost of production. The investigation has involved much labour and an expensive problem.

The Anti-Vivisectionists are very indignant and they have already made a visit to Scotland Yard to lay their complaints before the Commissioner of Police. The deposition was headed by Lord and Lady Trenchard.

While no one can really approve of such crude methods of criticism as those adopted by the Medical Students, the majority of people feel that vivisection is an unscientific and unscientific method rather than definitely banned.





CAUSE AND CURE OF CAR NOISES

Some Hints for Notices.

A VARIETY OF SQUEAKS AND RATTLES.

In the mind of the novice owner-driver there often is a nervous dread that his new acquisition is not running quite as it ought to run. Some squeak, or rattle haunts him, probably, leading him to fear the worst. When investigated, however, the noise probably will boil down to more lack of lubrication of some moving part.
 Taking car noises in the order in which they occur, most frequently they proceed from the springs, spring shackles, universal joints, brakes, road wheels, and various parts of the engine. Some noises from the body work, door hinges, the steering column where it is anchored to the seat, axle, hood, wind screen, wings, and tailgate, tool boxes, and various gaskets with which so many owners love to tick their cars.

Spring Lubrication

Spring leaves which are gathered and require little attention, but otherwise they cannot be neglected. Lubricant, which must be more or less frequently replenished. For more movement takes place on the ends of the spring leaves than most people imagine, and it is only when the leaves are stripped for inspection that this motion and consequent wear become apparent.

Apart from squeaks, rattling and illusive cracking, the most annoying noise which develops in the chassis is that of the shackles. This is most apparent on turning corners, where the weight of the chassis is thrown to one side. If the shackles cannot be taken up a steel washer of suitable thickness will usually do the trick.
 Wear usually will be found in the place on the rear part of the front springs and at the front portion of the rear springs, more than at the point of anchorage to the chassis itself. Make sure that the shackles and spring washers will cease from troubling.

Universal Joints

The squeak or rattle caused by a dry universal joint is most unpleasant, and should immediately be rectified. Apart from greasing under strain on the final drive, a worn universal joint tends to set up shatter, especially when driving on uneven roads. In some cases, if the universal joint is not greased frequently on new cars, which have tight bushes everywhere, it may be necessary. Those owners of old cars who are not the fortunate possessors of a grease gun should get one. In most cases they can fit the adapters themselves. They will not regret it after the experience of filling up grease caps, more

as much annoyance to the public as the driver.

Where the brakes shoes are not due for oiling, when the holding rivets are rubbing on the brake drum, the trouble may be caused by either or similar substance melting out of the lining and adhering to the brake drum. This can be stopped by a liberal washing with paraffin, but let the driver wear afterwards, as he will find his shoes practically useless on the first few applications. The remedy is to drive the car a short distance with the brakes well off in very dry weather cars fitted with woodies whose occasionally will get out of control. Water, used judiciously, will clean away the cause of sticking in water. Another form of sticking on cars fitted with woodies is a consequence of the rain suds being automatically ignited. Woodies are a nuisance to the owner, as it tends to produce a very sticky condition, which is remedied by the use of the vertical

Inside the Bonnet.

Under the bonnet a variety of minor squeaks and rattles may be traced to the engine, or, as they can be searched for, the engine is running and the car is stationary. "I DID IT -- DO WHAT YOU LIKE ABOUT IT"

Remember then went to his hut and put away his things. When he came out he noticed that Mingo had a bandage on his foot and the latter explained that he had cut himself on a tin. Mingo also said that Mr. Kenyon had put the cotton wool on his foot. Witnesses asked when he had done so but Mingo did not reply. While he was with Njagi and others, Njagi remarked that he was going to take his revolver in case the police should find it, but the witness did not see him hide it, he was unable to say whether or not the sword was in the scabbard. He was in the habit of taking his sword to work daily. He had done so on Monday, the day of the murder, but did not do so on the Tuesday.

A Previous Incident.

Mombasa also said in his evidence that Njagi had previously complained that his master made him get up too early. Mr Njagi did not get out at once when called, Mr. Kenyon went into the hut and smashed his head. Njagi then drew his sword which was remembered that the sword was thus in a clean condition and was not damaged. He added that he had assisted Mr. Kenyon in his struggle with Njagi on that occasion, otherwise the former might have been hurt.

When Inspector Asho arrived, continued the witness, Mingo's clothes were cut on the line dry, but had not yet dried.

This closed the evidence of the Mombasa driver and there was no cross-examination.

Njagi's Supper.

The Mombasa witness followed into the witness box by another native, Wangombe, a Kikuyu cattle herder employed by the deceased. He said he knew both the accused and he slept in the same hut as Njagi and others. He remembered that his master was missing on Tuesday morning and he confirmed the story told by the Mombasa regarding the supper arrangements on the Monday night. He stated that Njagi had returned to the hut and said, "Where is my sword?" but no one answered. Witness also asserted that Mingo had not slept in the hut on Monday and that although his foot was cut on Tuesday there was no sign of the injury the previous night.

Witnesses also mentioned that Mingo was another Kikuyu. Njagi was referred to as Wamania. He informed the Court that Njagi had come to his hut on Monday evening and had remained there until half past eight when he had been found by the two natives to give evidence was the fifth witness. A Warning.

Kanana, a Kikuyu employed by Mr. Kenyon for two years and eight months then gave evidence. He was well acquainted with both the accused. In the course of a story he said that two days before Mr. Kenyon's death he came into the kitchen and saw Mingo there about ten o'clock in the morning. "I asked him why you go so up?" And Mingo said, "The boss has cut my wages because I am not doing my work as well as I should. I will wait for him and see what he says." He went to the garage and found Mr. Kenyon there mending his motor. He told him I had heard from Mingo that when he (Mr. Kenyon) next went to see Mr. Evans, Mingo would wait and beat him. My master replied to me, "It is nothing." On Monday Mingo said he worked as usual and in the afternoon, but at two o'clock in the afternoon he had cut his foot and asked him how it had occurred. Mingo replied that he had caused it. Witness then enquired why Mingo had not found someone to sew it up and he replied that he could not find anyone. Witness asked why and Mingo answered because it had occurred in the night. Mingo then took some salt and water from Mr. Kenyon's bedroom after which the witness returned to his work.

He next heard from a boy employed by Mr. Evans that Mr. Kenyon was dead. He called to Mingo and others to go to where the body lay and Mingo replied, "You go. I cannot because my foot hurts." Mingo in fact followed but refused to go near the corpse. Kanana added that on the Tuesday the accused, Njagi, was wearing his usual working clothes. The witness was then cross-examined by Mr. Kenyon's counsel who enquired why Mr. Kenyon cut his foot? Kanana answered, "He did not cut it."

A Tuto's Tale.

The seventeenth witness was a Kikuyu who also employed on the farm and called Kumba. He stated that he had been employed as kitchen boy until the Sunday preceding Mr. Kenyon's death. He knew both the accused, the deceased and the witness who became because his master had smacked him for being concerned in the theft of the milk which Mingo had stolen. He identified the weapon in court and stated that it had been in its place on the impala horns in the house on Sunday. The same applied to the sword which had belonged to his master.

During the hearing of cases in which Europeans were charged before Mr. B. A. Protest by Somali Residents.

GOVERNMENT CONFERENCE

The Veterinary Department has been asked to remove all cattle from Nairobi Township after the end of August. The Somali population of Nairobi who own several residential plots and two lantary businesses in the township have protested against the proposal.

The following letters have been sent by their Nairobi relatives to the Colonial Secretary, the Veterinary Department, setting out the Somali case. The "Standard" learns that a conference will be convened by the Acting Governor to discuss the matter. It is expected that the case will be discussed on Monday afternoon.

We have the honour to inform you that we have been consulted by the Somali Residents of Nairobi in connection with the removal of their cattle from the Nairobi Township. The Veterinary Department has been asked to remove all cattle from Nairobi Township after the end of August, and although we understand from the Veterinary Department that the removal of the cattle is necessary, we are of the opinion that the removal of the cattle is not necessary.

Each plot-holder has been issued with a permit from the District Commissioner granting him permission to keep a limited number of cattle for his own use and for the use of his family. THE PLEASANT JELLY.

The "Setting" Problem Solved.

If you want a jelly to set quickly, dissolve six grains in a small quantity of hot water, and add cold water to make up the amount, so that no time is lost in waiting for the liquid to cool.

Another way of making a jelly set quickly is to dissolve a handful each of salt and soda in a bowl of cold water, and stand the jelly mould in this. A mild freezing mixture is the result, and a firm, cool jelly may be quickly prepared on the hottest day.

Difficulty is often experienced in turning out a jelly. To remedy this, try pouring the mould before pouring in the liquid. If this has not been done, and you are about the jelly is not going to turn out well, plunge the mould into cold water, and you will have no further trouble.

In trying to turn out a jelly in the centre of a dish, do not give sundry little jolts to get it in position, but set it in a bowl of water over the dish. The jelly will slide into position without trouble, and the water will be poured off at your own risk.

In spite of all our care, a jelly may refuse to come clear from the mould on account of too much water, or incorrect mixing. In this case, cut it into cubes and cover it with the whipped whites of eggs. This will make a very appealing dish, and one that is quite out-of-the-ordinary.

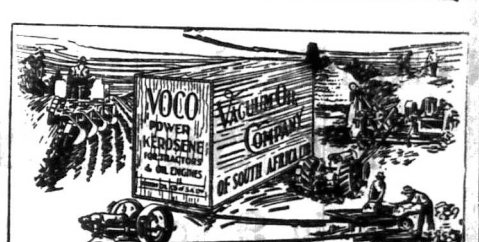

I want to say that very frankly, continued Mr. Henderson, I am through the whole of the proceedings so far as my personal opinion is concerned. In numerous instances, Lord Lloyd was clearly out of sympathy with this object.

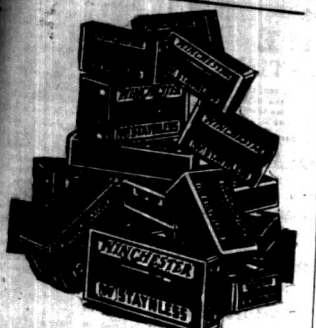

He is unwilling to permit attending 'The Hague Separation Conference.' If he were accepted it is generally considered that President Doumergue will ask M. Briand to form a new government which will probably immediately summon parliament.

Cabinet Resigns.
Paris, July 25. The Cabinet has resigned. M. Poincaré permitted in his determination to resign despite the supreme appeal to retain the premiership of M. Briand, and M. Herriot, who called at his house early this morning. The operation is on a private scale and will necessitate several months complete rest. General opinion is that M. Briand will succeed to the Premiership.

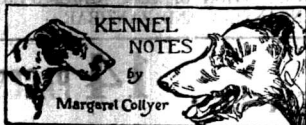

KENNEL NOTES by Margaret Collyer

Mrs Collyer, Gt. Col. to whom all correspondence, in connection with "Kennel Notes" should be addressed, does not hold herself responsible for accuracy of statements made by her which are in the main, based on information supplied by her correspondents. I'm afraid my "Notes" will be mostly pedigree of ferocious very interesting ferret breeders to study, but exceedingly boring to have to write out. To begin with Capt. Charles Gordon has written to my sister, asking her to sell his imported wire fox terrier "Fibberus". The owner he fetches is to be given to the S. P. C. A. "Fibberus" is one of some good puppies and should be easily worth £15 to anyone. There being so many ferret-breeders in the country now, he would very shortly earn his worth of money at stake. The dog is immediately bred, and before doing so, let me have a look at the second prize in puppy class at Cheltenham. I have given this dog's pedigree before, but such things are easily forgotten so I intend to repeat it here. His sire was "Craney" by "Champion Crackey Sensation out of Tranquility by Ch. Fountain Grandeur ex. Active". Crackey Sensation was by that great terrier and sire Ch. Harrington Bridgebrook who I believe sold to America for a large sum of money. I have a picture of a photograph of "Fountain Grandeur" a most perfect little dog, and one after mine own heart, all terrier, lovely head and great style. "Active" was by "Yorkshire Champion" "Broken-down Bendish" out of "Pottery Tally" "Fibberus" was by "Compassionate Prince" by "Datum of Dimple" ex. "Gale" by "Epping Epitaph" ex. "Beakley" by "Bostman's Selected". "Datum of Dimple" was by "Braggs of Hens" by the well-known "Ch. Collations of Notts" by "Ch. Collar of Notts". The extended pedigree carries back to such high class dogs as "Ch. Short-Circuit", "Ch. Breckley Gamester", "Ch. Whiskey of Paterson", etc. I should say that no other terrier in Kenya could show a better pedigree than this. Such a dog should have no difficulty in finding a new owner at once. I don't think the S. P. C. A. will have to wait long for the money. I have now received the pedigree of my sister's dog. "Whiskey of Hens" by George Hewitson, born January 7, 1923. Colour: Fawn. "Dumbell of Paisgion" was by "Master Collier" by "Towyn Collyer" by "Ducky Kest" from Mr. Redmond's noted kennel "Belching Bull" the dam of "Braggs of Hens" goes back to "Barrington Supreme" and Irish Elegance. This pedigree gives us a wide outcross, and mostly Irish

But as my many friends who I am not advocate for washing dogs at all, unless it is absolutely necessary, I wish some genius would send me who would tell me not how to destroy fleas, but how to prevent a dog picking them up again when one has taken the trouble to rid one of one batch. The only thing I can suggest is to use a very fine steel dust comb every morning through the coat. The comb can be kept in petrol which gives one more control over the number of fleas combed out. Even if there is not sufficient spirit to kill the fleas, the fumes make them hopelessly drunk so that they are incapable of hopping from the dog on to your clothes and causing you a restless and irritable day. These steel combs which are very expensive can be got from most chemists. I got my last one from Messrs Howe and McKeogh's it was about 2 1/2 by 1 1/2 inches long and if I remember rightly cost me Sh 7. 75. I lost this valuable possession so many times I got tired of looking for it, and generally discovered it stuck into the hair of my dog boy who assumed me to be the best and safest place to keep it. I have one or two other letters to answer, but as there is nothing of vital importance in them they must wait till next week.

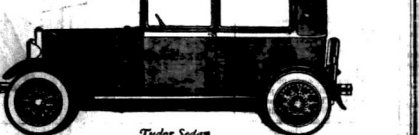

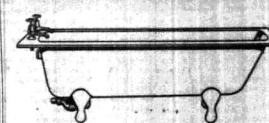

The Cotton Crisis. The Labour Government has not been long in office before the clouds have gathered, dark and ominous, over its head. The heated controversy regarding the resignation of the High Commissioner in Egypt, and the rumours that the Government, so recently permitted with the consent of strong opposition, to assume the reins of power, is escalating a new crisis, when Egyptian policy is watched with anxiety. Although the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has associated the Conservative Administration with the difficulties that have been ascribed to Lord Lloyd's unwilling intervention in his interventionist and unpopularity with the British public, the feeling persists that is discrediting the man on the spot. Labour has acted hastily and rashly. Nevertheless, the position of Egypt in British international policy is so important that the Imperial Parliament, in regard to the welfare of the Empire, has in its desire to permit Egypt an opportunity for control and direction of its internal affairs and when that Egypt has reached the stage in its post-war development when the people can be permitted with confidence to assume the grave responsibilities of self-determination. Following upon that completion in international affairs

they has come a series of internal difficulties concerning the relations between employer and employed in industry. The Minister's organizations are pressing for the abolition of the eight hours day and the Government has indicated its intention, considering the fact, someone which may permit of a gradual return to the shorter seven hours period. In the engineering trade disputes concerning wages have also arisen. But the most serious crisis has come about in the cotton trade. The Government Cabinet messages published today indicate that negotiations continued until the last moment have broken down and there is reason to suppose that half a million operatives are now locked out. Over a month ago, the employers' organizations claimed a 50 per cent. wage increase equivalent to 12.50 per cent. At the beginning of June this year, wages in the cotton industry were 30 per cent. above the pre-war rate and over a period of years the scale of increase made during the war, following the rise in living costs, has been gradually reduced. The claims by the employers is not, however, based on considerations of costs of living, neither is this a factor admitted by the operatives in wages fixation. The basis of the proposed reduction is that unless costs of production are lowered, the Government cannot meet the competition throughout the world. It is maintained that such a reduction would enable Lancashire to return again to its leading place and would benefit the workers by increased sales and employment. The supply of the operatives has been that while conceding the value of the reduction in wages, there are other directions in which lower costs of production can be achieved and in support of this contention they have pointed out the immense quantities of cotton yarn which are being made in the spinning and weaving sections in the total cost of production. There is no doubt that Lancashire, which has lower costs of production than any other country, has this in its favour. It is in the East African



be desired, and a very fine speech by George exists among all ages. If any proof were needed of this, the above, quite a number of our boys are in their respective "Houses" teams.

An Encouraging Message.

For the youth of the present generation—and more especially in a land like Kenya, where the large native population—the essential motto is, or should be, "Learn to command." This is one of the chief lessons an endeavor to instill in our boys.

In this connection we would like to emphasize the fact that no boy while he is at the school is permitted to address a single word to a native for any reason what ever. The African has many messages to be conveyed, but it is not good for European boys, especially when they are very young, to be in intimate contact with him, and we would appeal to parents to support us to the best of their power in keeping their sons as far as possible from contact with the native.

Old Boys.

While in England last summer I made a point of visiting many of our Old Boys as members of the public schools, and I was gratified to hear from the authorities what an extremely good impression our Kenton lads had on all and all. It was told that in restaurants, work, and play they more than held their own. Further, which is a very important matter, they were in many instances above the average physically and did not seem to have suffered in any way from remaining out in Kenya till it was time to go to a public school.

Since last Prize-Day boys have had to enter Tenbury, Leiston, Lancing, Stone, Wren, and Drono (Wales). In addition to these schools we have Old Kentonians at Winchester, Westminster, Wellington, Marlborough, Malvern, Cheltenham, Sharnbrook, Uppingham, Rossall, Bedford, Brighton, Bedford, Oundle, and Gloucestro. We have also boys at Hilton College, Natal, and at the Anderson School, Grahamstown. From one and all we have had the most satisfactory accounts.

Seddick (Malvern), who passed his School Leaving Certificate last year, at a very early age, with six special, and is now going up into the Vth and F. H. Too Old at Fifty? To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir—A point that seems so far to have been missed in the discussion on the subject of the suppression of Civil Servants is the great importance of the term of tenure of appointments by Heads of Departments and other holding administrative posts. Age, while limits, is hardly to do with fitness for work. Many a man of fifty and over is full of good work and more vigorous than twenty-five and under is tried to death of it.

It is the tenure of office of Heads of Departments is strictly by the tenure of office of Ministers is inevitable, and however good the head may be, his good work will be of no use if the inevitable lethargy that sets in when there is no prospect of promotion for say nine or ten years. The danger also of the whole Department getting into a rut is obvious.

In most services in the Empire, the necessity of maintaining a high standard of efficiency throughout the army for instance, the tenure of all appointments is limited to five years, no matter how young a man may be when he enters the list. In India, the tenure of all such billets in the Civil Service is limited to five years. Promotion to the Head of a Department is always by rotation for such a post is held by no man for more than four years, so that their record of service as junior influences their chances later on.

All these laws and regulations are devised with the idea of preventing stagnation in the services for which no brilliance in any one individual can ever compensate. Very exceptional exceptions of course are granted under special circumstances but generally speaking the good old maxim of "enter every one of it, is rightly adhered to."

At first sight it would seem that working on the above lines would unduly burden the pension list, and 't would if we confine our view to the parish of Kenya, but the Secretary of State for the Colonies, who of the Colonial Empire, would have sufficient administrators to allow even to evolve a scheme whereby the superannuation age could be raised to fifty-five years as it is elsewhere, and as few who had the ability to last the full course.

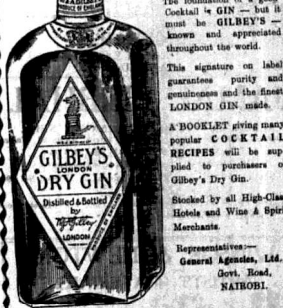

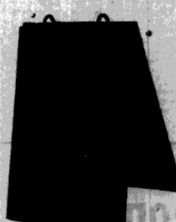

H. Smith, presiding, it was decided that the whole of the reform of the country be circulated for an expression of opinion on a motion. Mr. Arnold Joseph, South Shields, referee of the Cup final at Wembley, was present with the Association's mediation.

The Rodeth-Sheppard Bout.

The Editor, "E. A. Standard," Sir—Having read the interesting leading on the Rodeth-Sheppard Tournament, I should like to make a few observations, especially with regard to the Sheppard-Rodeth bout. I have refereed a good many tournaments, and hold under N.S.O. and the Imperial Services Boxing Association rules. In essentials these two codes are similar, and, as a referee, I have no objection to giving the correct version of what took place.

This, however, should not have been permitted to "galvanize" Rodeth, and it is understood that Boxing has not recently been taken up in Kenya, and it is therefore, of the utmost importance that all tournaments should be well con-
