THE British and the world Press these days are full of the words "Bevanites" and "Bevanism". These imply that there exists in the British Labour Party a group committed to a common policy, accepting a common gospel, committed to a common policy, accepting a common ends.



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

Ships have to waste time in port

THIS turned out in 1941 was excellent in the United States ports, but it is generally considered poor in Britain, India and Australia. The Liverpool Ship Owners Association states:

In all the principal ports

AIR FORCE NOT YET ADEQUATE

Review by Minister

SPECIAL PRIORITY FOR LATEST TYPES OF AIRCRAFT

THE Royal Air Force is still far from adequate to defend Britain and the Atlantic, Mr. George Ward Under-Secretary of Air, has told the House of Commons.

But it was announced that Britain had 2,000 aircrews during the coming year—twice as many as now.

Mr. Ward himself a wartime pilot, was working Parliamentary Committee on the RAF's budget, £437,000,000 for the Royal Air Force.

Expansion of the R.A.F. was the only way, he said, but it would be some time before Britain could plan that British air defence without powerful allies in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Complaints from Britishers were that Britain had to buy bombers but also in the Arctic, the Royal Air Force, *Coronation Times*, reported.

Government had recognized that Britain must have bombers to defend itself in Europe.

Mr. Ward said that when Britain's air expansion was complete she would have a larger force than France, Germany and Italy.

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The Cathedral of the Highlands will be consecrated today





TODAY, Friday March 21, will go down in the history of the Diocese of Mombasa and the Colony of Kenya as the climax of the work of 35 years.

All Saints Cathedral, popularly known as the Cathedral of the Highlands, on which the first foundation stone was laid in 1917, is now at last completed. The building will be solemnly consecrated by the Bishop of the Diocese at 5.30 this evening. *

IT is calculated that the cost of the whole building over the years, together with the furnishings, so far given, will have been not less than £30,000. This sum does not include the cost of the new organ case which the recent Appeal was launched in October, 1949.

The Cathedral is being opened entirely free of debt, though the sum of some £6,000 remains outstanding. The £30,000 will be used to meet the cost of the removal of the organ console and to cover the cost of the removal of the organ console and the electrifying of the organ. This work cannot be carried out for two years. *

THIS completed building is seen in the accompanying pictures, and as viewed from Dalmeny Avenue, is now a handsome addition to the architecture of Nairobi.

Having been for so many years in an incomplete state, the cathedral has twice been in the possession

of the Government, its tenure in the first being

the original nave, the second the chancel.

The length of the building is 170 feet from the west door to the organ case, a further extension beyond containing the Chapter House.

The latter is an octagonal room situated in a corner, with a hammer-beam roof, and a octagonal table in the centre. It will be used exclusively for meetings of the Cathedral Chapter and Council.
