## EGYPT FACING A CRISIS

**Cotton crop not yet sold**  
**GOVERNMENT SETS UP EMERGENCY COMMITTEE**

**EGYPT** is facing economic difficulties. With only fuel and food imports—the only thing which can save the country's economy—left, a committee is in desperate need to avoid the financial crisis which may hit more seriously. Arthur Cook, in Cairo for the Egyptian government, says: "The value of the Egyptian pound abroad is falling, and there is no sign of the dollar stops coming."

The allowance of £3000 per month has been reduced to £2000.

All sterling being sent abroad is being taxed in an effort to keep local prices down. The Egyptian pound is being held up in the warehouses.

The main cause of the economic and social crisis is the fall in the cotton crop, which is not yet on the market but so far hardly any cotton has been sold.

Industrial shares are finding the market as merchants desperation to get rid of stocks is forcing them to come down on the cotton price.

Egypt's balance now stand at £10 million—recently released from £100 million held by Britain—and 100 million dollars.

No further sterling can be expected until the new Mayr will take in dollars for sterling to meet imports.

**Barter agreements**

Last year, trade deficit stood at £6 million, £6 million above the budget.

The sterling crisis has rapidly worsened since last November and Egypt will have two months to pay all its debts before it reaches a standstill.

Soon, Egypt will be forced to enlarge the barter agreements made with the U.S.S.R. and Communist satellites. So far the U.S.S.R. has agreed to supply goods from their countries and Russia shows no signs of coming to the rescue.

present-day university curricula seemed to him to be irrelevant to what was happening in the world. "I have not had time to think," he suggested at the weekend, "but I am sure that the Director of Imperial Chemical Industries and President of Birmingham Chamber of Commerce.

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## WEATHER FORECAST

The most important feature of the weather during the last few days since the start of the rainy season is the strong ridge over Eastern Africa south of the Equator. This ridge has been very stable with certain certainty that the rainfall will be normal or above normal. It seems most probable that the main feature of the rainfall will be the eastward movement of the main ridge, which will bring heavy rain to the northern parts of the country. 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## Personalities In The World Of Music

**STRAVINSKY:** His mastery grows with every new work

**R**USSIAN-BORN Igor Stravinsky, who has come a naturalized Frenchman and is now an American, is perhaps the greatest living composer, certainly one of the most influential.

Since the violent rhythms and brutal harmonies of "Firebird" and "Rite of Spring" exploded on the scene in 1910 and 1913 respectively, Stravinsky has been a leader, a spokesman, a controversial figure, by composers from top to bottom.

Musical history offers no example of a composer who, after achieving international success, has been the subject of more acrimonious latter controversy than Stravinsky. The cause of the "Firebird" and "Rite" was the originality of his music; the cause of the series of radio plays and symphonies during the original 1940s was his political sympathies. Stravinsky's career is distinguished as a series of all too frequent theoretical battles, accusations and denials, centered by means of the move of his residence from Paris to New York, and by his political sympathies.

What can build up an audience's interest in Stravinsky's music?

Born at Oranienbaum, near St. Petersburg, Russia, in 1882, he was the son of Professor Stravinsky, a teacher of drawing, and his parents decided on a law career for him. He studied at the University of St. Petersburg, where he began his musical studies with Rimsky-Korsakoff, a special voice of America, and the author of the famous "Flight of the Bumble Bee." Rimsky-Korsakoff's death, however, made it almost impossible for Stravinsky to continue his studies at the conservatory.
