COMMONWEALTH SUMMIT

DIVIDED OPINION will be expressed at the Commonwealth Conference in Lagos as the deal with the Rhodesia situation is most effectively. Some delegates, though in the minority, will advocate the use of force to pursue the line of economic sanctions laid down by Britain.

All agree however that the rebel regime must be brought down and the responsibility remains with Britain to do so. On the other hand, departing members from London, including Mr. Wilson, intend to caution the fullest support for the Commonwealth representatives for the reasons set out above. Having reviewed their position in the light of the Rhodesia situation, they will seek to persuade other members of the commonwealth to intervene with the use of force.

TASHKENT MEETING ENDS IN TRIUMPH

India and Pakistan renounce force

India and Pakistan broke through the deadlocked Tashkent talks yesterday and pledged to renounce use of force to settle their dispute. They will withdraw their troops from each other's territory by February 25.

A nine-point "Tashkent declaration" adopted after week-long talks, said the troops would be pulled back to positions they occupied on August 5, before the two armies fought a 22-day war over Kashmir.

The Indian and Pakistani leaders also agreed to send their High Commissioners back to each of the capitals. The declaration was signed by the Foreign Ministers, Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru and the Indian Prime Minister, Lal Bahadur Shastri, and the Pakistani Foreign Minister, Agha Shahi Khan.

Reputation of prisoners

The declaration also stated that the two countries would respect the rights of prisoners of war and would not subject them to any ill-treatment or to any other measures which would be likely to affect their reputation.

INVESTIGATION MUST GET ALL THE FACTS

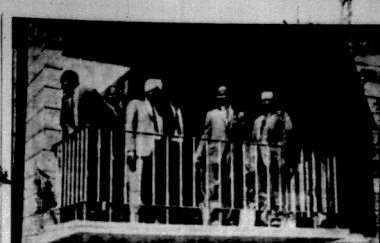
