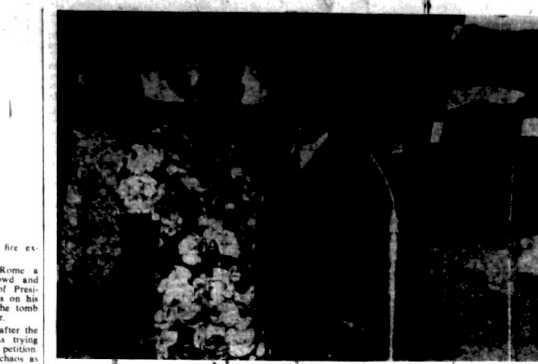

'new dialogue'

President Nixon and President de Gaulle passed yesterday after talks which Mr. Nixon described as representing "the beginning of another journey" in Franco-American relations.

The American side believes the talks show that a new dialogue has begun between Paris and Washington after years of coolness and that it will be continued eventually by return visits by President de Gaulle, French Foreign Minister Pompidou and the two leaders at Versailles, had been met to discuss matters and was not a question of signing agreements.

During a press conference which coincided with the U.S. President's visit anti-Vietnam

War demonstrators burned effigies of Mr. Nixon and President de Gaulle. Riot police used tear gas and water on a crowd, estimated at 50,000 by the organizers and 3,500 by police.

The invitation to General de Gaulle was in line with similar offers to Government leaders of the other four countries the American President had met on his European tour, the spokesman said.

Mr. Nixon was expected to have an hour of private talks with the French President and to return to Italy.

PARIS BRIEFING ON VIETNAM TALKS

President Nixon met the head of the U.S. delegation at the Vietnam peace talks, Mr. Henry Cabot Lodge, yesterday in Paris as Communist troops in Vietnam continued their new offensive by bombarding 45 military installations throughout the country.

The American President was also meeting the South Vietnamese head of the delegation to the talks, Vice-President Nguyen Cao Ky.

A spokesman for the South Vietnamese delegation described as "fantastic" foreign reports that Vice-President Ky intended to ask Mr. Nixon to approach General de Gaulle in an effort to persuade the Vietnamese to withdraw their position at the talks.

In Vietnam Communist forces deliberately avoided ground attacks as they apparently redeployed their troops.

An American spokesman said that the bombardments were of somewhat greater intensity than

the previous night but described the damage and casualties they caused as "light".

The Communist bombardment came in the wake of heavy B-52 raid and a dropping in the bud of a new drive against Saigon.

France's attitude to Biafra will be a crucial factor in the success or failure of the Nigerian Federal forces, the Nigerian Foreign Affairs Commissioner, Mr. Arifayo, said in Kampala.

Answering reporters' questions at Enyebu Airport on his way back to Lagos from the O.A.U. Ministerial Council meeting in Addis Ababa, he said Biafra had been on the point of collapse last year until French supplies began arriving.

In Lagos the Government has charged that France was in the process of supplying 10 million rounds of Hungarian-made ammunition to Biafra.

Mr. Arifayo said a list would now depend on whether France considered it too expensive to continue supplying arms to Biafra.

There had been some change in France's attitude to Biafra after recent visits by French Parliamentarians and lawyers, he thought, but he said he would not be too optimistic about this.

In Paris proposals of breaking a deadlock in the Vietnam peace talks seemed no brighter after the meeting between Ambassador Nixon and the South Vietnamese Vice-President Mr. Nguyen Cao Ky.

Mr. Ky spent 45 minutes with the President and his advisers discussing the stalemate in the enlarged negotiations and the current wave of Vietcong attacks on South Vietnamese cities.

Asked afterwards if he was more hopeful about the outcome of the war, Mr. Ky said it was "very difficult to say right now. He described his talks as very good and open.

Mr. Ky, who speeded up his return to Paris to meet Mr. Nixon at the U.S. Embassy, spent 15 to 20 minutes with the President and the Chief U.S. negotiator, Mr. Henry Cabot Lodge, then he went into conference with Mr. Rogers, the Presidential National Security adviser, Mr. Henry Kissinger, and Mr. Lodge.

Mr. Gomułka's last publicised meeting with Mr. Brezhnev took place in November, when the Soviet leader attended the Polish party congress in Warsaw.

His arrival follows a visit to Moscow last week by the Polish Foreign Minister, Mr. Jendrychowski, who spent two days in talks with Mr. Brezhnev, Mr. Kossygin, President Podgorny and the Foreign Minister, Mr. Gromyko.

University closed as student agitation mounts in Addis Ababa

The Haile Selassie University and all secondary schools in Addis Ababa have been closed till further notice because of student agitation. Ethiopian radio announced yesterday.

Quoting the Government order, the radio said the closing was necessary "because public safety is threatened by student agitators who have incited their comrades to demonstrate in the streets, which is illegal."

The students were warned that tough measures would be taken against demonstrators. As the warning went out security forces were in position round the university, but were showing discretion and not using force.

The students have a five-point programme, in which they demand the sacking of the Education Minister, Mr. Hakele Habtewold, and a revision of the "unjust" law of allotting the present year's study grants a year.

They also demand the removal of the average six-day school-leaving examination fee. They also urge the Government to raise the education budget and cut expenditures on embassies, banquets and Ministers' salaries and travel, and to expel the "immoral" Indian and American Peace Corps personnel.

ROCKETS KILL 11 IN SAIGON

Dockworkers and shopkeepers fled in terror through Saigon's narrow waterfront streets yesterday when three Vietcong rockets hit the city, killing 11 people, wounding 21 and starting a fire in one area.

The rockets, which landed across the city at about 10:30 p.m., exploded at 6 p.m. local time, when the toll strike the South Vietnamese capital since the start of the latest guerrilla offensive ten days ago.

One crashed into the crowded dockside area, starting a fire which destroyed 30 houses and wooden sheds. Residents hastily packed their belongings on to bicycles and ran to safety.

Another missile struck a French-run hospital in central Saigon, narrowly missing the children's ward. A spokesman said no one was injured, although the blast damaged a wall.

The third rocket smashed into an intersection in Saigon's "street of flowers" market, killing one South Vietnamese soldier and wounding three civilians, a Government spokesman said.

Other targets throughout South Vietnam hit with mortar or rocket fire. An American spokesman said no damage or casualties were in all 21 cities.

Among the targets listed as hit were a military base at An Khe, 60 miles south of Danang, which has 16 mortar troops, and a U.S. artillery base just east of Danang, where 40 mortar bombs fell, causing damage or casualties were in all 21 cities.

Several ground engagements reportedly raged around Danang, the Demilitarized Zone and Tay Ninh.

The South Vietnamese Government has protested to the International Control Commission against North Vietnamese shelling of populated areas in South Vietnam since the Paris peace talks resumed in January.

U.S. military officials said in Saigon that North Vietnamese and Vietcong lost 7,000 men dead in the first week of their present offensive. U.S. casualties were also heavy, more than double their weekly average, with more than 370 killed.

Across the border in Laos, Communist forces have captured the strategic Laotian military outpost of Nakhong, the heaviest defeat suffered by the Laotian army in the north this year.

The Ministers told M. Turcat: "On the occasion of the first flight, which you have so magnificently conducted, we send you our warmest congratulations, which are also extended to your crew."

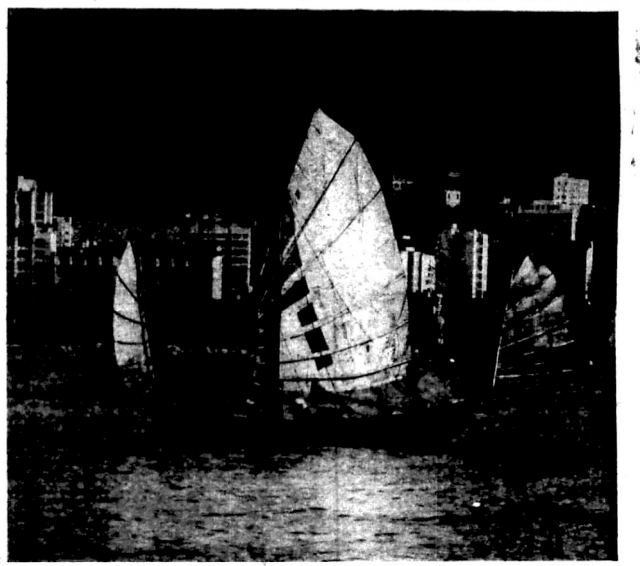

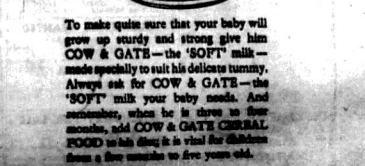

Uganda's Trade Licensing Bill before House

Standard Staff Reporter, Kampala. Uganda's Minister of Commerce and Industry, Mr. Kalema, has introduced the Trade Licensing Bill into the National Assembly for its Second Reading.

The first Member to speak on the Bill, Mr. J. W. Kiwuka (Indi Mbende North), said that it was too late for nominations to be planned now. They had failed to become citizens when the opportunity was there.

They had indicated that they were not with Uganda. These people had no interest in Uganda, he said.

Moving the Second Reading of the Bill, the Minister said the main purpose was to enable Ugandan citizens to come into trade.

Clause (1) gives power to the Minister of Regional Administration to declare any area a trading centre. Formerly, the power to do so was vested in local administrations.

Clause (2) to (6) give the Minister of Commerce and Industry power to restrict certain trading centres to Uganda citizens alone and to specify goods in which only citizens could trade.

In the case of companies or firms, any company whose share capital was more than 50 per cent held by Ugandans, would be regarded as a Uganda company or firm, he said.

Clause (7) concerns the issue of trading licences. Licensing authorities would be able to grant or withdraw licences. The party affected could appeal to the Minister whose decision would be final.

The debate was adjourned.

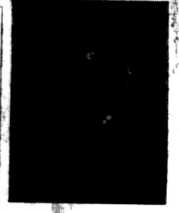

These ties bring hope to their makers

Rehabilitation work which also helps to raise funds has been started on a small scale at the Aman-Cheshire Homes. It is hoped that this will in future provide an absorbing occupation for more of the patients at the home.

A donation of five specially designed looms for handicapped people was made to the home by the Swedish Government and volunteer instructors are teaching the patients to make handwoven ties and hat bands on them.

Ordinary looms for weaving are normally operated by a foot treadle but, as many handicapped people are unable to use their feet, a loom had to be designed so that it could be operated entirely by hand.

In Sweden, this type of loom is used to a large extent in homes for the handicapped, but this is probably the first time such looms have been used in this country.

Fashionable woven ties in plain colours or in stripes can be made on the looms and the school has in mind a project for making school ties to order.

"At the moment we have been selling the ties among our friends and visitors to the home, but we hope to be able to sell more in a Nairobi shop and make some to order," one of the instructors, Mrs. Anny Graves, told me.

"In fact, we are hoping that some schools will order ties and hat bands to match."

Already an order from the Kenya Science Teachers' College is being dealt with and some wider strips to be used as sashes have been requested by some fashionable-conscious women.

The ties are being made from wool which is washable and does not fade. They are narrow and straight as most of today's ties are.

Also from Sweden are some which are stitched on to the "Handwoven Aman-Cheshire Home, Nairobi, Kenya."

The home has had difficulty in finding any shops in Nairobi to sell the ties for them. Some shops approached have actually set about the price.

However, the main difficulty can be obtained for the ties. As the ties look and are smarter than the conventional school ties, the home has once people learn about them, some interest will be shown.

The project will at least help the patients occupied and help themselves.

"When I tell them back at home that I was arranging delphiniums in February, they'll never believe me," Mrs. Trevor Jones exclaimed, obviously overcome by the variety of flowers that we in Kenya can grow at any time of the year.

Her first arrangement was based on her homeland, Wales in the snow, which was the prevailing weather when she left the country 24 hours previously.

For this she used white, yellow, and red flowers, including the entire arrangement, including the vase, in shades of blue, white, and red.

The second arrangement was done in a basket containing much basket work in shades of blue, white, and red.

Definitely Mrs. Trevor Jones shaped and filled in her arrangement and she said, just an improviser, selected bunch of summer flowers, the arrangement of which was completely informal.

Her completed arrangement of typical English flowers - roses, delphiniums, pansies and Queen Anne's Lace - was well received.

Another splendid arrangement was one inspired by a dramatic sunset she had seen over the Nairobi.

"I don't think I shall ever forget that night," she said as she interpreted it with the golds and lavenders of bougainvillea and ground orchids, epiphyllums and others that fitted in with the elaborate colour scheme.

As a base she used a large, elegant shaped brass container and the effect was clearly that of a sunset over the Sahara.

Mrs. Trevor Jones has won many awards and honours for her skill and is artistic designer of the Festival Pilgrimage of Flowers, Festival for Bangor Cathedral and 12 historic churches in North Wales for the royal investiture celebration in August. It has been arranged through the flower club to fly Kenya delphiniums to Wales for the event.

Mrs. Wanjiru is kept busy explaining to the visitors what the dishes are made from and how they are prepared.

Njugu, she explained to one group, is a mixture of potatoes and beans which are boiled and mashed together, and njani is black beans and bananas, prepared in a similar fashion.

Kenya Mystery Tours is a new venture and the organizers are still feeling their way and finding out what interests tourists the most.

PAKISTANI POLITICAL CRISIS

Key figures in contest to succeed President Ayub

President Ayub Khan's decision not to seek re-election at the end of his present presidential term in Pakistan marked the culmination of a nationwide political turmoil which began with student demonstrations last November.

Nobody would have predicted a few months ago that President Ayub's regime, which came into power after a bloodless military coup in October 1958, would be forced out of office so soon.

The nationwide protest movement gained momentum after the arrest of Mr. Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, the former Foreign Minister and Chairman of the Left-wing Pakistan People's Party, and the entry into office of the former Commander-in-Chief of the Pakistan Air Force, Air Marshal Asghar Khan.

In the Western countries, where the economic progress made by Pakistan under President Ayub has been greatly admired, the political turmoil and the President's decision to quit office came as a shock.

Equally surprised were the officials and political supporters of President Ayub, who made Pakistan's successful development decade the main plank for next year's general presidential election.

The seeds of the political discontent in Pakistan, however, lay in this very economic boom. Judged against the rapid national productivity increasing gross national product and average annual growth rate of about 10 per cent, Pakistan was cited as a model developing country.

But the fruits of economic development were not fairly shared. Coupled with denial of political freedoms, the urban middle classes found the situation intolerable.

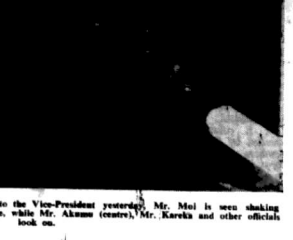

A colourful ceremony attended by Cabinet Ministers, members of the Diplomatic Corps and hundreds of people from the Pumwani and Eastleigh areas he said he was privileged to perform the ceremony because the hospital had an important role in nation-building.

This was because nation-building required healthy citizens, and the role of maternity hospitals was in the raising of strong and healthy children, who were the leaders of tomorrow.

The President saved prolonged laughter when he said parents little realised that their "horizontal" in maternity hospitals, where the mothers were attended to by specialist doctors and nurses, should be proud of the Pumwani Maternity

Hospital, as a large part of the city's population was born there. They can be assured that their wives, mothers and sisters can go to Pumwani for special treatment without fear. They can also be assured that they would get the best attention, unswerving in the country.

Speaking in Swahili, the President paid tribute to the staff at Pumwani and urged them to redouble their efforts in building a strong Kenya nation.

It is an honour to have been one of those who had seen Pumwani grow from a little clinic to a big hospital. It was difficult to visualize years back that we would be here today witnessing this ceremony.

The President stressed the importance not only of raising families but of ensuring that children received education and training to prepare them for the heavy responsibilities that lay ahead.

Kenya's population, he said, continued to grow at a rapid rate, and would tax the country's resources to the utmost. More and more funds would have to be diverted into health projects not only in the urban areas but throughout the country.

MAYOR OUTLINES PLANS FOR NEW NURSES' HOME

Plans for building a home for nurses at Pumwani Maternity Hospital at a cost of £75,000 were disclosed by the Mayor of Nairobi, Council Chairman, at a luncheon given by the Mayor at the hotel.

The Mayor said it was proposed that the home would accommodate 100 nurses. He proposed what he described as "the excellent co-operation" displayed in the realisation of the Pumwani Maternity Hospital and that this unit would be maintained and intensified.

Births at Pumwani had increased from 3,000 in 1960 to 8,000 last year and it was clear that the extensions would help relieve the pressure that had been gradually building up.

Council Chairman said the history of Pumwani Hospital typified the struggle of the Nairobi City Council to rise to the demands of a growing urban population for better and more adequate health facilities.

A vital part of the hospital's activities since its inception had been the training of midwives.

In 1946 the number of hospital beds was increased to 115, and by 1950 the number of the hospital was built at a cost of £25,000 giving the hospital 72 beds. But demands continued to grow, with 40 per cent of the patients coming from outside Nairobi.

In 1964 the demands were so acute that it was necessary to put up a prefabricated unit and convert an ambulance clinic into a ward giving Pumwani space for 115 beds. The next year £20,000 was spent for additional midwives and 40 midwives.

Council Chairman pointed out that the loan of £225,000 from the Government for more facilities, resulting in the present building, was the best maternity hospital in the country. I must mention one feature of the hospital in which the city belongs to a great pride. That is, no patient is ever refused admission," he said.

Facilities had been provided when to provide regular X-ray and X-ray unit, and a well-equipped laboratory. The N.E.P. had presented the hospital with equipment worth £10,000.

Lugonzo said the hospital was an oasis of development. It was just one of the projects the city council had undertaken to improve the living conditions of the people.

"This project has brought out the best in the field of co-operation city council. The other very important function is to provide ante-natal care for the mother which ensures that complications during pregnancy and delivery are avoided, and if they arise are dealt with promptly. It is important that expectant mothers should attend special clinics as soon as they become pregnant."

"We hope that a blood bank will be operating in the hospital, and that this vital facility will play a major role in reducing the incidence of maternal deaths. I appeal to the citizens of Nairobi to become regular blood donors so that we can meet the great demand we have for blood in this hospital."

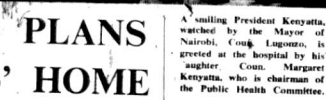
