



Kenya stalling stronger than it ever was

The Kenya stalling is in its strongest position yet, the Governor of the Central Bank, Mr. Duncan Ndegwa, said yesterday. He suggested that there was scope for a rapid move forward in development.

At the end of last month, the bank's holding of foreign exchange exceeded £40,000,000, which was the equivalent of four months' imports — the accepted level for a healthy balance of foreign exchange.

This is only the front line — it does not include the Government holdings of foreign exchange, the Kenya Gold Trust with the International Monetary Fund and commercial banks' balances overseas. Mr. Ndegwa said he was not wading enough understood and so a quarterly publication, *Economic and Financial Review*, was to be printed. The first issue is due out this month.

Egyptians pounded after Suez sniping

Israeli troops on the East Bank of the Suez Canal pounded Egyptian positions, on the other bank yesterday after a fresh outbreak of Arab sniping wounded several Israeli soldiers.

GOOD EXAM RESULTS

The Minister for Education, Dr. Kiavo, yesterday congratulated teachers in Kenya's secondary schools and their students for the hard work they had put in to prepare for the School Certificate examination.

Announcing the results of the examination in 1967 and last year, the Minister said the trend every year had been one of improvement, not only in numbers but also in the quality of the work.

About 13,000 students sat the examination in 1967 and last year about 17,000 sat. These included students in Government-maintained schools, boarding secondary schools and private candidates.

Dr. Kiavo particularly congratulated private candidates, realising how difficult it was to study on their own and to compare favourably with those who had received help.

There had been great anxiety in the country over the delay in announcing the results. The Ministry did its best to get the results out as soon as possible.

The increase in numbers of students and the quality of the work had not been able to get them out early.

Dr. Kiavo apologised to parents who had been anxious over the delay.

The Minister said after the marking had been completed, the University of Cambridge Syndicate, the Ministry in Nairobi would be making a selection of qualified teachers to help in preparing and checking the results.

There had been a good barometer spirit at work to get the papers out as soon as possible.

Selection for admission into Form V would start on Monday. This would be done by headmasters of secondary schools at the Kenya Polytechnic, Nairobi. If the work did not end on Monday it would continue without further delay.

The Minister said all means of communication would be used to tell those selected, so that they could start Higher School Certificate work without further delay.

A lot of time had already been wasted and the Ministry could not afford to waste any more.

He described the rise of 5,000 students sitting the examination in one year as dramatic. This was due to the hard work of the people who put up barriers, secondary schools and the Government, which helped by many international bodies.

He said standards would not be lowered, but that the intention of the Ministry to improve the standard, which were already high.

SHOTS IN £800 CITY SHOP RAID

Thieves struck in Nairobi yesterday morning when they broke into K. and A. Sili Selection Store Kenya Avenue, and made off with about £800 after threatening night-watchmen with pistols and knives.

One of the watchmen, Mr. Ndaba Njagi, said the men arrived in a car and threatened them with pistols and knives. Some chased them away by throwing stones and fired shots while others took the cash.

Shop windows had been broken on two sides, one of them facing the General Post Office. The men threw out the cash registers and loaded them into a car which later drove off at a high speed.

The watchmen said they blew whistles in an attempt to raise the alarm.

Tourism misconceptions

Widespread misconceptions existed about the settlement of Kenya claims between the Central Banks of the three East African countries. This was especially true of the methods for sharing foreign exchange earned from tourism.

The explanation given by the Governor of the Central Bank of Kenya, after the comment appearing here a week ago, should have dispelled any doubts. Mr. Ndegwa showed efficient machinery exists for the "drawback" of any one East African country against another and the settlement of all claims. Earnings from tourism formed the immediate subject but, further than that, the public should be aware that the balance of any one State's monetary account against another, to redeem foreign currency claims or pay for a deficit in import-export trading, is met in a convertible currency, viz., sterling or dollars. This obligation forms part of the Arusha Agreement.

When revenue on an East African overall basis is considered, due account must be taken of the earnings of the common services, notably the airways, railways and harbours. Kenya's subventions from these offers help to keep these services viable in the neighbouring countries.

The E.A. Association of Tour Operators dissociated itself from the unfortunate remarks made in a speech by the outgoing chairman, but, in all fairness, it should be recognised that he, and possibly other members, were misled by incorrect information sedulously spread in some quarters to support the false accusation that Kenya was in some shady manner withholding money due to Tanzania. Since then, Uganda has regrettably joined in by giving, through an official source, incorrect data relating to tourism, based on statistics three years old.

Such animosities between

the three partners in the E.A. Community are to be deprecated. The plain fact about tourism is that the Government creates the basic conditions in which the industry can thrive. After that, there are two factors: (1) The readiness of visitors to choose a particular country on the basis of its attractions and facilities; (2) the efficiency of the tour operators and travel agencies.

What has emerged from the application of the Licensing Act in Tanzania is that at least 30 travel agencies in Kenya are prepared to pay the £200 fee (£100 more than the counterparts in Tanzania) for the right to send on tours from Kenya. Why not? — though Kenya does not impose any fee in the opposite direction. The extra £100 is not much for an operator to pay, measured against revenue all the year round, and particularly as the fee can be offset in slightly increased charges to clients which are spread over the numbers handled, must be negligible.

Every Government is entitled to the undivided loyalty of agents and others operating in its country, especially where so much practical help is given, as in Kenya. It is understandable that a Government will take exception to criticisms, the more so when based on unfounded allegations. This is the root cause of the rumpus which has followed the speech, the contents of which ought to have been made public before delivery with some competent authority.

Another aspect of the tourist industry demands attention. Certain overseas agencies, it is reliably reported, inflate charges listed from Kenya. For example, if admission fees to parks and so on are calculated by the agent at, say, £1,000 dollars, cases have been noted where the figure has been considerably increased when passed on by agencies at the other end where the tours are booked. All respectable travel agents in East Africa deprecate such misrepresentation. They should be vigilant, reporting instances of extortion to the Ministry of Tourism for appropriate action.

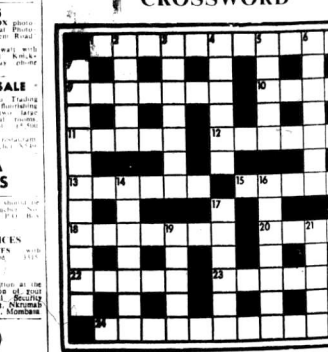

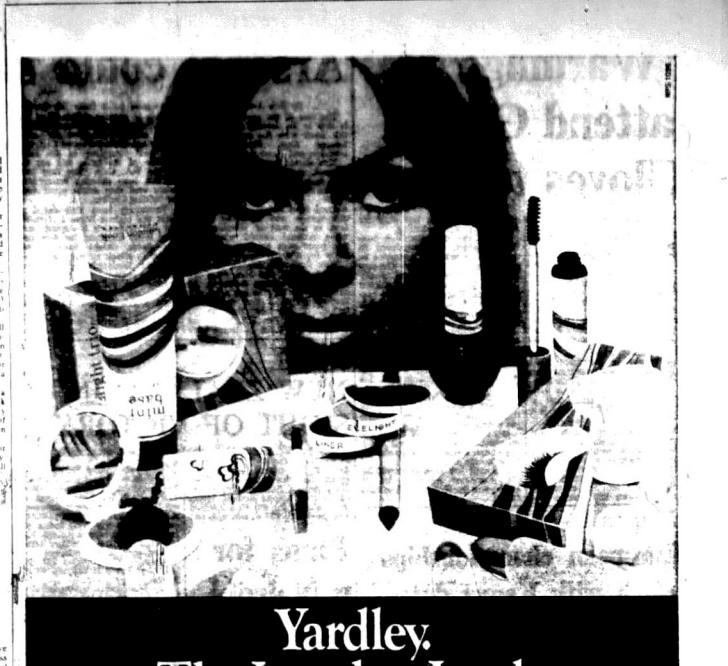

Europe urge to speed up E.A.C. pact

European Common Market Parliamentarians have called for closer relations with the three countries of the East African Community and with the 18 Afro-Malagasy States linked with it since 1964.

The M.P.s. Members of the European Parliament in Strasbourg passed a resolution calling on the six-nation community to give greater preference to agricultural exports from the 18 States and to give increased aid for their industrialisation.

A second resolution urged the Parliamentarians to ratify as soon as possible the one-year association agreement signed by Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda and the E.C. Africa in last year.

It also supported the establishment of a body grouping M.P.s from the three African States and the three former British colonies which would meet at least once a year.

The second resolution asked the Parliamentarians to support the Community's Council of Ministers to renew the Aroba agreement for a period coinciding with the second term of the association between the E.C. and the 18 Afro-Malagasy States.

This association, set up in 1964 under the name of the Association of States, expires on May 31 and negotiations for a new agreement began in December in Brussels.

A report from the Aroba agreement presented to the Parliament by an Italian Christian Democrat, Signor Giovanni Corbelli, after a meeting of European and East African M.P.s in Aroba in January, pointed out that Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda wanted the same advantages for their exports as the 18 Afro-Malagasy States.

The six-nation community's support of the Aroba agreement is restricted.

A spokesman for the Parliament said the Community should not be involved in the formation of a Free-Trade Area but extend its aid to English-speaking areas as well.

Big saving by new Bata plant

Bata's new Vibox factory at Limuru, which was opened this week by the Minister for Commerce and Industry, Mr. Kibaki, is the only plant of its kind in East Africa and represents an investment of 100,000.

Vibox is a semi-alkaloid and highly developed man-made shoe material. It is used extensively in the footwear industry, particularly for women's and children's shoes.

It can be produced in many colours, finishes and thicknesses and keeps its shape for a long time.

Prices only a half to be compared at a cost of 100,000 a year. Local production is saving valuable foreign exchange amounting to 120,000 a year as well as providing jobs for Vibox sales.

Exports worth 17,000 a year are already being sent to Malawi, Zambia and Uganda.
